NJIT to repeat energy course for teachers

New Jersey Institute of Technology has announced it will again offer a special energy program for high school teachers during the 1978-1979 academic year. Announcement of the program continuation came from Dr. Howard Kimmel, a member of the NJIT faculty and director of the program.

Participation is limited to approximately 50 high school science and mathematics teachers who attend the NJIT offering without charge. Advanced credit is given. According to Dr. Kimmel, two or three openings are still available for the 1978-79 year.

The purpose of this intensive program for high school teachers is to enable the teachers to have a meaningful understanding of the limited fuel resources we have at hand and to be able to interpret this information at the classroom level. Dr. Kimmel said.

Topics to be covered include the use of standard energy resources, such as fossil fuels; emerging sources being put into limited use, such as solar energy; and the potential of exploratory work that may develop as new sources for the future. The environmental effects that relate to different fuel sources are also an important consideration.

Teachers participating also have an opportunity for involvement in a practical design project, such as a residential solar system, that includes theory, design, economic considerations and construction detail.

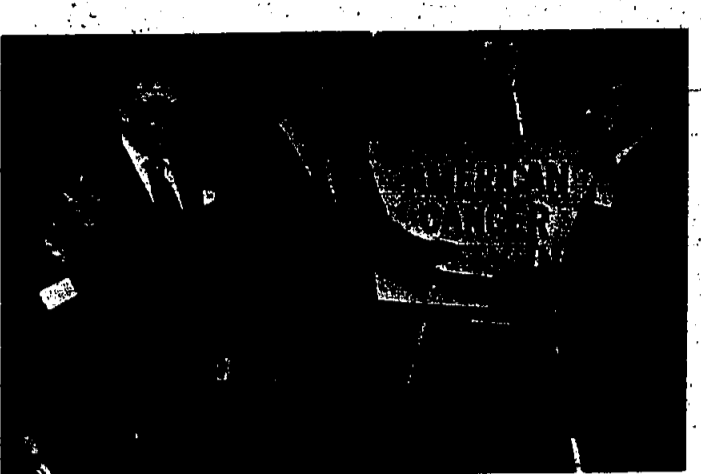

Pappas is called to White House for Cyprus talk

Harry P. Pappas, Union County Democratic chairman, was called back to the White House yesterday by President Jimmy Carter to discuss new developments in the government's policy on the Greek-Turkish-Cypriot situation.

Pappas, who has served as national advisory board chairman of the AHEPA Sons (American Hellenic Educational Progressive Association) with office in the nation's capital, said, "The President wants to lift the present arms embargo against Turkey, and many Hellenic-Americans view his position as dangerous to the people of Cyprus and Greece."

"To date," Pappas said, "the arms embargo has not forced the Turkish government to withdraw its 40,000 troops from Cyprus. In addition, the President feels the embargo will drive the Turkish government closer to the Russians. To prevent the move, the President wants the arms embargo lifted by Congress."

"I have no problem working with the President to lift the embargo. However, I am concerned with a statement he made to me in Washington on June 22 that he cannot guarantee the Turks will keep their word once an agreement is made and the arms embargo is lifted."

"Solutions can always be found when the lines of communications are kept open. I offered some suggestions to the President and now we are going to talk about them."

Rucco, local Republican candidate for a Township Committee seat, and other speakers pointed out that the No. 8 bus line is the only form of public transportation available along the Morris Avenue corridor. Neither Springfield nor Union is served by railroads. The crowd told the hearing examiner, Richard Voliva, it is ironic that bus service is threatened at a time when the nation is urging auto manufacturers to reduce private auto demands for petroleum.

Later, as Springfield's population grew, he said, successive boards of education in this town were "intrigued" by the advantages that might result from having a consolidated system in which each student's progress could be monitored from kindergarten through 12th grade. But he and Rosenbaum explained, there was no enabling legislation until the past few years.

The Springfield board called for Margolis to study the legal steps of desegregation and for the local superintendent of schools, Dr. Fred Baruchin, to come up with recommendations on a format for a study. Meanwhile, the board let all its options open about who should conduct such a study.

"I think it would have to be done under the aegis of this board," commented Feinstein, while Clarke thought it might be better to ask an outside agency.

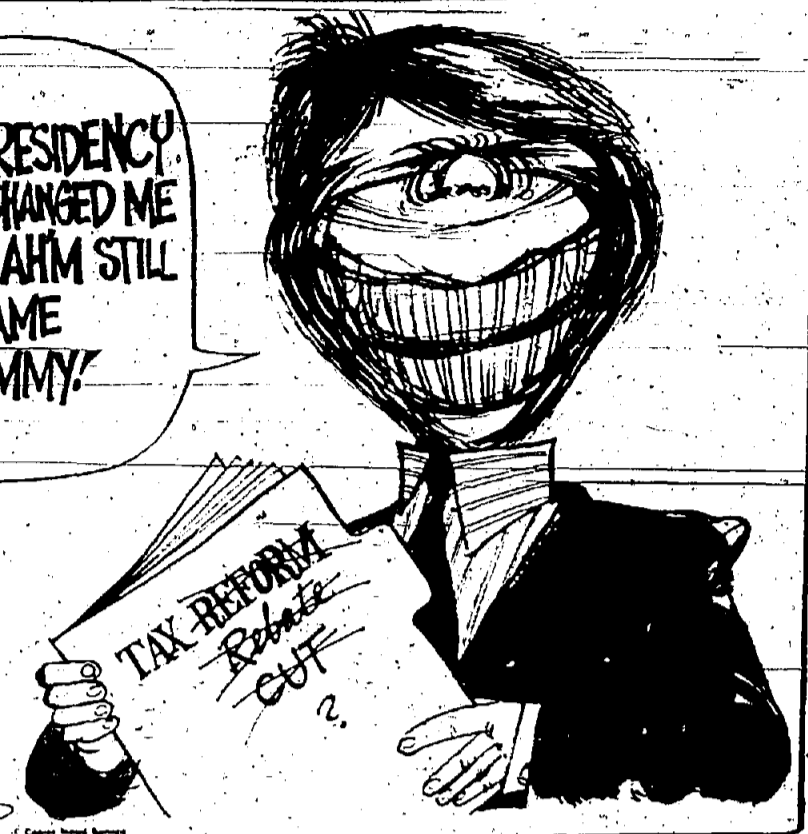

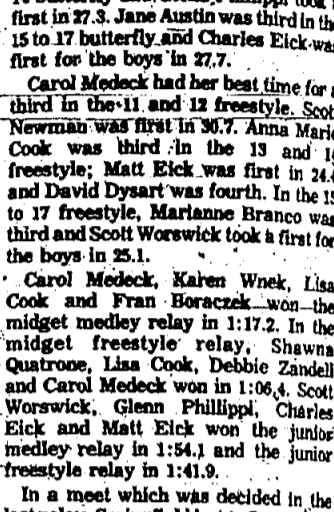

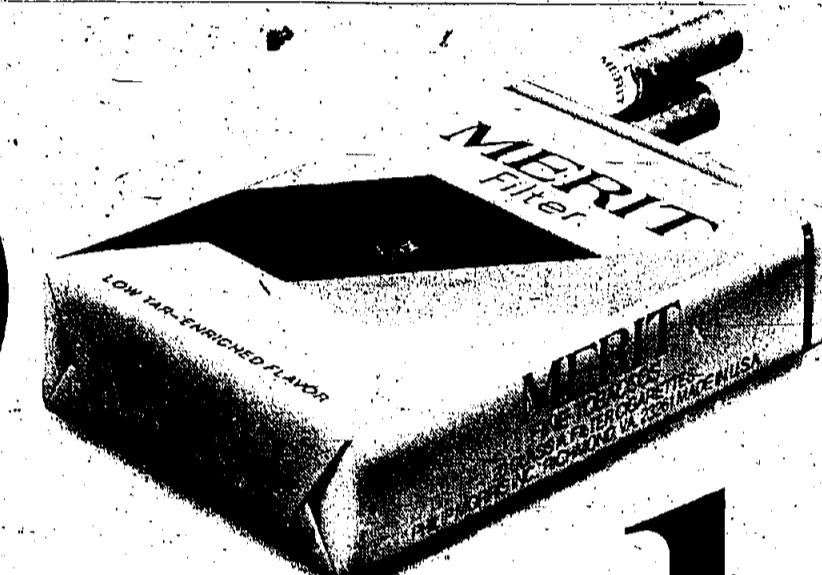
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McDonough said he will urge the County's legislative delegates to rally behind the mayors and freetholders in rejecting the proposed plan.
