Rinaldo running for fifth term; promises attack on inflation

Rep. Matthew J. Rinaldo (R-12th District) formally announced this week that he is a candidate for re-election to the U.S. Congress. He promised to wage "an all-out attack" against inflation.

The announcement followed Rinaldo's endorsement for a fifth term by more than 1,400 delegates to the Union County Republican convention in Elizabeth, who cheered his criticism of President Carter's handling of foreign and domestic policy.

"The president has given the American people a pop-gun attack against inflation that would take years to break the inflationary cycle. It would deprive the economy of billions of dollars of output and millions of jobs," Rinaldo warned.

Instead of saddling consumers, investors and business with higher gasoline taxes and record interest rates, which he warned would aggravate inflation, Rinaldo said a balanced budget with "less inflation could be achieved by offering tax incentives to encourage labor and business to hold down wage and price increases. He also wants a massive attack against "outmoded and unnecessary" government regulations that clog consumers' lives.

The Union County Congressman said President Carter's anti-inflation plan would result in windfall revenues to the federal government of \$78 billion in 1981. He said the President's proposed budget cuts, have not succeeded in "changing public expectations" of worsening inflation.

Rinaldo urged tax cuts that would encourage private investment and stimulate the search for new technology that would raise U.S. productivity. He called it a more practical and humane approach to fighting inflation than laying off millions of workers.

Any chance of achieving balanced budgets in each of the next four years, which Rinaldo said is essential to breaking the back of inflation, would be lost if the nation slips into a severe recession. He said a "Carter-style recession" could produce new budget deficits in excess of \$20 billion.

Inflation and the recession would feed on each other at that point, he warned.

While critical of President Carter's handling of foreign policy, Rinaldo added: "Afghanistan is 10,000 miles away. The American voters want to hear what the president and Congress expect to do about the price of gas and home heating oil; high medical bills, runaway crime, record interest rates, insufficient housing for young couples and elderly Americans, too few nursing homes that people can afford and a whole range of important homefront issues.

"More than anything else, the American people want to know who can make things happen in this country again, rather than condition the American people to accept lower living standards and higher prices."

Rinaldo serves on the House Interstate and Foreign Commerce Committee on Aging. He is the ranking Republican member of the Consumer Protection and Finance Subcommittee.

The Union Township Republican warned that an anti-inflation campaign would not succeed if it is "merely election time window dressing." He said nothing less than a sustained attack on inflation over the next four years could bring the rate down from the current 15 percent to less than five percent.

Rinaldo said the next Congress should be judged on the amount of money it saves and its success in implementing energy legislation already on the books. Rinaldo is a sponsor of several energy development bills.

Training offered for new careers

For persons who have been unemployed a long time, a post-paying career but can't afford to pay for the required training, the Union County Department of Human Resources may have some help.

The department's Division of Employment and Training has arranged for courses in pre-machinist, apprenticeship, computerized photography, offset press and photography, and secretarial data and word processing. Applications are being accepted now.

To be eligible, applicants must be economically disadvantaged, unemployed (working part-time) or in school, and must live in Union County with the exception of Elizabeth. The deadline for submitting applications for many of the courses is April 11. Most of the courses are scheduled to begin in late April.

Tuition for the programs is being paid with federal funds under the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act (CETA). Rosella Fletcher, assistant coordinator of education, said the number of courses is 225-230.

Working women get fair Social Security

One of the strengths of the Social Security system is its ability to adapt to changing needs. When the original Social Security Act was passed in 1935, the United States was a much different place than it is today. Over the years, the law has been amended on several occasions in an effort to keep it up to date to new conditions. The treatment of women under Social Security is a case in point. In 1935, the typical American family consisted of a husband—the breadwinner—and his dependent wife who cared for their children. For the most part, they remained together until death did them part. Only one in every four women was gainfully employed.

Today, by contrast, we find one divorce for every two marriages and more than half of all women are in the workforce. Earnings for the 12 months ended Feb. 29 were \$18.8 million (22.7 percent) compared with \$16.6 million (22.6 percent) in the comparable 1979 period—Reagan rose 0.9 per cent to \$2.5 billion and expenses increased 10.8 per cent to \$2.5 billion.
