### Fresh water defined by Byrne

By Gov. Brendan Byrne  
Q. What is the definition of fresh water as used in your Executive Order 100?  
A. Fresh water is defined as non-saline water from ground or surface water sources in the areas specified in the Executive Order, or as may be amended in subsequent orders. Fresh water does not include collected rain water or used water, such as dish water, shower or bath water or used water from any commercial or industrial process.

Q. I live in a rural area and have several acres of property. I maintain a small vegetable garden for my family because the price of vegetables in the stores is so high. Can I plant and water my garden this year?  
A. As the water emergency now stands, you may not use fresh water to raise your home vegetable garden. You may, however, use collected rain water or used water (such as sink or bath water) for your garden.

Q. I am the public works director in a water utility. I have a street cleaning program, and street cleaners use a good amount of water. Is it permissible to continue the program?  
A. According to Executive Order 100, the washing of streets is prohibited. You may, however, still practice dry sweeping and hedgespreading.

Q. I operate an auto-repair business, and we must wash cars prior to repainting them. Am I violating the water restrictions?  
A. Although collected rain water is preferred for washing prior to auto repairs or repainting, you may use the absolute minimum amount of fresh water as necessary to wash those parts of the car to be washed prior to your work. Keep in mind that your community is affected by the Emergency Water Rationing Plan, which means you are obligated to use no more than 75 percent of the water your business consumes during the base period determined by your water company.

Q. We operate a car dealership. As you know, car sales are the lowest they have been in more than 50 years. Now, I've been warned by the local police that I may not wash cars. We are quite upset about this.  
A. I sincerely regret that such use of fresh water is prohibited. Your alternatives are to use collected rain water, waste water, or a commercial vehicle wash. The use of a hose is strictly prohibited at any time.  
Q. As a tenant in a community covered by the Emergency Water Rationing Plan, I've received a surcharge for excess use from my landlord. How do I know I used the amount of water the landlord said I did?  
A. Unless your apartment has an individual water meter, the surcharge you are being asked to pay represents a pro-rated share passed through to you in proportion to the number of bedrooms in each building, complex or unit served by a water meter. Your landlord must receive written permission from the Water Emergency Task Force to pass through the surcharge. The Water Emergency Task Force has the authority to revoke the pass-through approval if the apartment owner fails to establish and continue water conservation measures.

Byrne still stranger to most: poll

Brendan Byrne has been governor of New Jersey for seven years, yet 90 percent of the state's residents feel they know little or nothing about him as a person.

The latest Eagleton Poll found that a majority of the 141 New Jerseyans who feel at least "a little" familiar with Byrne describe him as intelligent, friendly, honest and a hard worker; fewer characterized the governor as a strong leader.

Between Jan. 26 and Feb. 8, the Rutgers-based poll asked 100 New Jerseyans how well they knew Brendan Byrne "as a person." Surprisingly, since he has been a statewide figure for almost a decade, 56 percent said "not at all." In addition, 29 percent said they knew him "a little," just seven percent felt they knew the governor "pretty well" and three percent said "very well."

"The fact that nine out of 10 New Jerseyans have little sense about the personal qualities of the man who has been running their state exemplifies the information void in New Jersey as well as the distance between voters and elected officials," commented Janice Ballou, associate director of the Eagleton Poll. "Generally the visibility of public officials is low but New Jersey's lack of a commercial VFP television station increased the difficulty citizens have in learning about state officials."

### Dry beans are economic as a protein substitute

If you are looking for ways to cut the food budget, try dry beans as a protein substitute for some meats. Protein is an essential substance of every living cell in your body.  
Food protein differs in the amounts and proportions of amino acids they contain. The highest quality protein foods are meat, fish, poultry, eggs, milk and cheese. Less efficient protein foods are of vegetable origin and include dried beans, peas, lentils and nuts. You can combine an animal protein such as milk, cheese or meat in a meal with a plant protein, thereby producing an amino acid pattern of superior value.  
To prepare any of the dry beans bringing out their very best in flavor and goodness, use these guidelines: All beans need soaking to return the moisture lost in drying and to cut down on cooking time. Start with a two-minute boil, even if you plan to soak the beans overnight in the refrigerator. Add salt and other flavoring only after soaking, as the salt tends to toughen the surface and increase cooking time.
