

### Kean professors take library's art honor

The poster was a portion of a promotional package prepared by Martin Holloway of Springfield and Victor Valla of Basking Ridge, two fine arts professors at Kean College of New Jersey.

The package won a gold medal in the 18th annual Art Directors Club of New Jersey contest.

It contained tickets, award certificates, confirmation cards, cards for the mailing lists, the invitation in the form of a poster and two packages of flower seeds to illustrate the event's theme, "The Garden State."

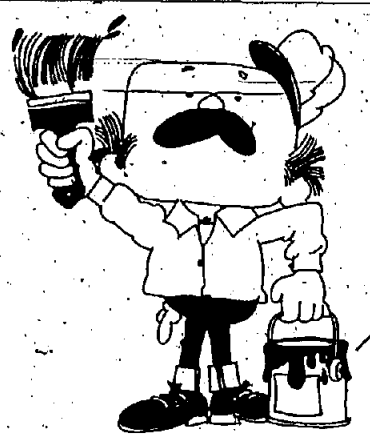

### Hot air rises in geo-solar home as fuel expenses go way down

A Springfield man is constructing a passively heated and cooled geosolar thermal envelope, with air locks, then no systems and a perfect vapor barrier, all surrounded by buffered air space.

No. Bruce Auterlieth is not making repairs on the Space Shuttle or erecting another New Jersey nuclear power plant. He is building a house on Marion Avenue.

The geosolar thermal envelope, or double-shell envelope, is a home specifically constructed with respect to the environment.

How the house is shaped, cooled, heated, angled and with what materials it is constructed—all are relative to the sun's heat and the earth's constant 52 degree temperature. There are no pumps, no motors, no fans, no furnace and no air conditioning. It is all natural.

Auterlieth, an architect, said the idea to construct such a home came to him the day after his house exploded on Dec. 29 of last year.

According to reports, an iron gas main located in front of the Auterlieth home cracked, the gas saturating the ground as it followed the line serving the Auterlieth home.

When the furnace lit, the house exploded into flames.

The next day, Auterlieth decided to have nothing more to do with Public Service Electric and Gas. He made up his mind to build a house similar to one he had read about in a magazine nearly four years ago.

The house was in Lake Tahoe, Nevada. Auterlieth wrote the designer for construction guidelines and a brochure explaining the principle which the double-shell envelope operates.

"I wanted it done right and as inexpensively as possible, so I hired me, Auterlieth said.

"It decided how many rooms I wanted and began laying out basic floor plans. After about 2,000 hours of research and planning, the former general contractor began ground on Mother's Day.

The plans call for an eight-room house, an attached garage and a greenhouse. It is designed on the principle that hot air rises and creates a draft.

"This principle depends a lot on the incline of the roof," he said. At its highest point, in front, the roof is 8 feet above the second-story ceiling, and at its lowest point, in the rear of the house, it is 12 inches above the ceiling.

The greenhouse, a large glass-enclosed area so named because of its heating effect and not because it houses plants, is located in the front of the house.

"It contains 17 windows, some 4 feet by 6 feet and others 4 feet by 8 feet. Heat that collects in the greenhouse rises to the highest point of the roof. Foil reflectors on the underside of the roof retain about 90 percent of the heat that usually is lost and bounces it back toward the house.

Since the roof is on an incline, it acts as a funnel. When the heat is reflected toward the house, it creates a current and air is forced toward the back of the house where the roof is only a foot above the second-story ceiling.

In order to capitalize on the hot air and the draft, the home is constructed as a house within a house, a double-shell. It has an inner and an outer wall with one foot of space in between, a buffered air space that allows for circulation of air currents.

"The air loops from the greenhouse through the roof around through the walls, through the basement and back into the greenhouse," Auterlieth said.

"In the summer, you open the windows at the top of the house. When hot air rises to its highest point, the air is cooled by the heat sink of the house and the cool air comes up from the basement (through the greenhouse) and fills the void."

"At night the glass loops heat faster, which creates an opposite current, Auterlieth said. Then the heat which has accumulated in the basement rises to its highest point.

"I visited a (geosolar) home in Vermont, near Great Gorge, in February. The day I went up there it was 25 degrees outside. Inside it was a comfortable 65 degrees with no heat."

"Fifty-two degrees is the constant air temperature, so the house can't get any colder than that. The question is how many degrees I have to make the house hotter than that; to be comfortable. What is it? Thirteen. If there are 13 degrees more or less, then discretion about handing out summonses," Dausar said. He explained that the issuance of summonses depends upon individual circumstances.

### Regional teacher files suit for discrimination

DANE ERDMANN, a David Brearley Regional High School teacher, is suing Donald Morachnik, Regional High School District superintendent and Charles Bauman, assistant county superintendent, for "intentional and malicious sex discrimination and violation of civil rights laws."

Within the last seven years, Erdmann has applied for four traditionally male administrative positions at each of the four regional high schools. She has been denied each time without explanation, she said.

The first "instance" was in April of 1974 when Erdmann applied for the position of Director of Athletics at Jonathan Dayton in Springfield. She was rejected for the position in May.

Erdmann coached the Brearley girls basketball team for five years, the first female sport initiated on the varsity level of the regional high schools, according to Erdmann.

### PBA warns of effects of Vreeland decision

"The Police Department feels that the Township Committee has declared war on us," Don Dausar, president of Springfield's Police Association (PBA), Local No. 76 said.

Dausar made the statement in reference to the Township Committee's dismissal of Jeffrey Vreeland from the Springfield police force July 20.

The five-man board reviewed Vreeland's case and personnel records before firing the officer on charges of harassing a 17-year-old Springfield resident and violating police regulations.

"They (the committee) have created a tremendous problem and it's already having its effects. Already this week people have come in to sign complaints against two other officers. It's going to snowball," Dausar said. "They're taking a difficult job and making it harder."

"Before, an officer more or less had discretion about handing out summonses," Dausar said. He explained that the issuance of summonses depends upon individual circumstances.

A patrolman may stop a man for running a red light only to find that the man just learned his wife had been rushed to

the hospital. Dausar said such a situation "called for a stop, but didn't warrant a summons."

"Now they're saying if you stop somebody and don't give them a summons, it's harassment."

"They have no guarantee, no backing from the Township Committee or the police chief," he said. The officers are not exactly pleased with the Township Committee's decision to fire Vreeland, Dausar added.

Chief George Parsell said Vreeland's firing was "a decision of the Township Committee. My feelings don't even enter it. I have nothing to with any dismissals. I just signed the complaints."

At present, working relations between the men and the chief are "hostile," according to Dausar.

"There's never been a good rapport between the chief and the men. The chief tends to side with anybody but the men. The men feel that the chief should at least lean towards the police officer," Dausar said.

"In the Police Chief. If they don't do their job I have to see what they do," Parsell said. When asked about the working relationship between the men and his men Parsell said, "You couldn't describe it."

Dausar said, "We are going to contact the state PBA. We want to get them involved in the situation."

"There has been a bill introduced in the state legislature to expedite any departmental charges against a police officer within 90 days."

Vreeland and Officer Robert Mason, Springfield's representative to the state PBA, will attend both the county and state meetings of the PBA next month, Dausar said.

Springfield delegation will support the PBA push for that 90-day law Assembly bill. "This situation (the firing of Vreeland) is a perfect example of what happens when things are let go for months."

"This particular action against this particular officer took about seven or eight months before they even preferred charges. Then something came out within the hearing and they added additional charges. That was totally unfair, totally unreasonable," Dausar charged.

"They just totally ruined the man by firing him. What are his chances of getting a job? Suppose he goes to another police department, and they ask him where he's worked for the last five

years and he says Springfield, and they ask him 'Why'd you leave?' and he says he was fired. He's just been thrown out in the cold."

"This particular officer had been involved in five incidents in the past year. So when the Township Committee sits down and hears this case against officer Vreeland, they're not being objective, not like an impartial judge."

"Of all the complaints that have been signed against (Springfield) police officers, I don't know of any but two that have been found guilty. When they went to the county, the decisions were reversed."

"There is going to be an appeal on the decision of the Township Committee."

According to Dausar, Vreeland is writing a letter to the state PBA outlining his history and the circumstances surrounding his dismissal.

"It's not like the police are trying to do something and get away with it. We feel that if it was so serious a charge that the man should have lost his job, then why did they let him work for an additional eight months?" Dausar said.

"We're going to put the Township Committee in a position where they can embarrass themselves, or so we hope."

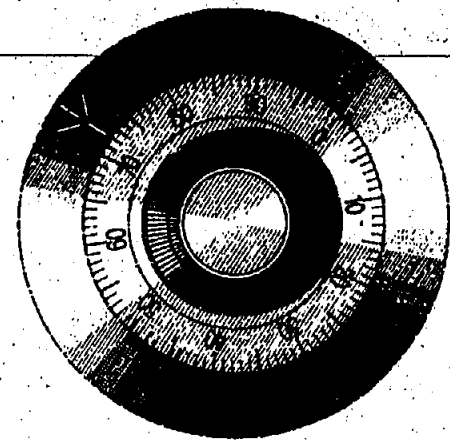

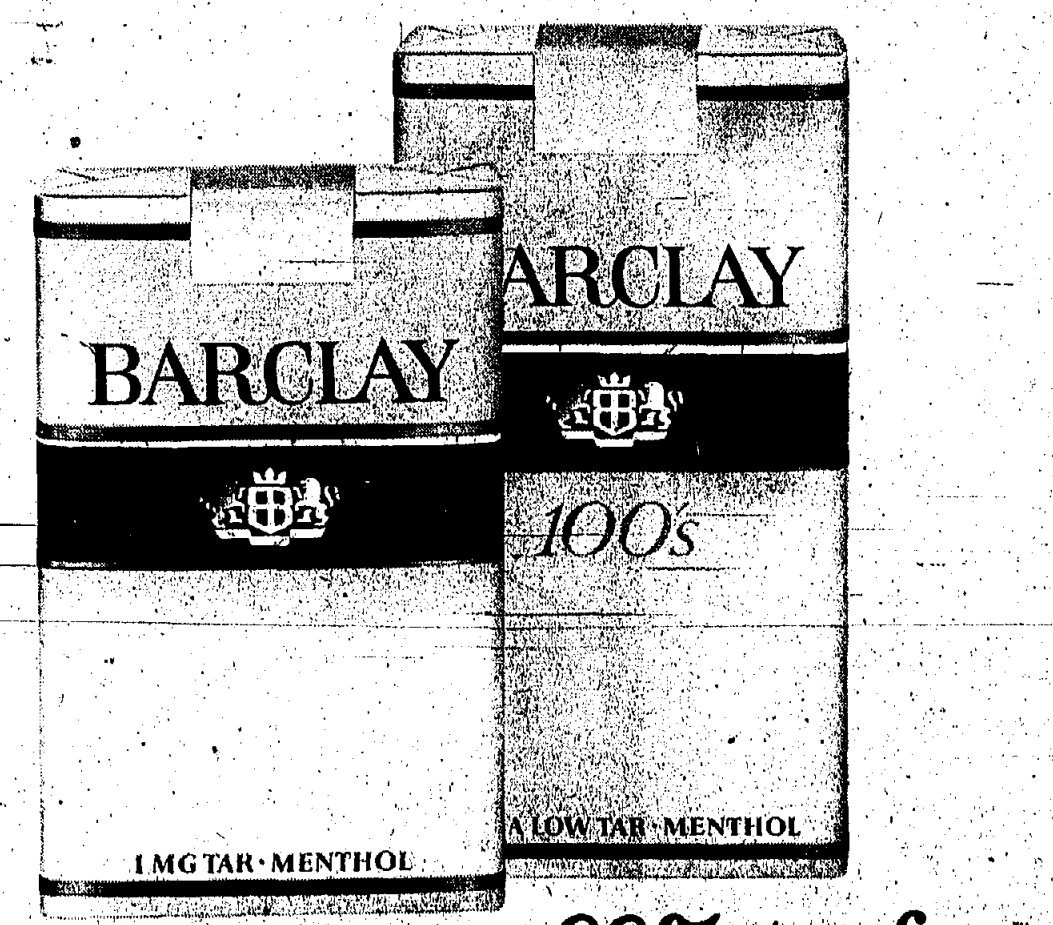

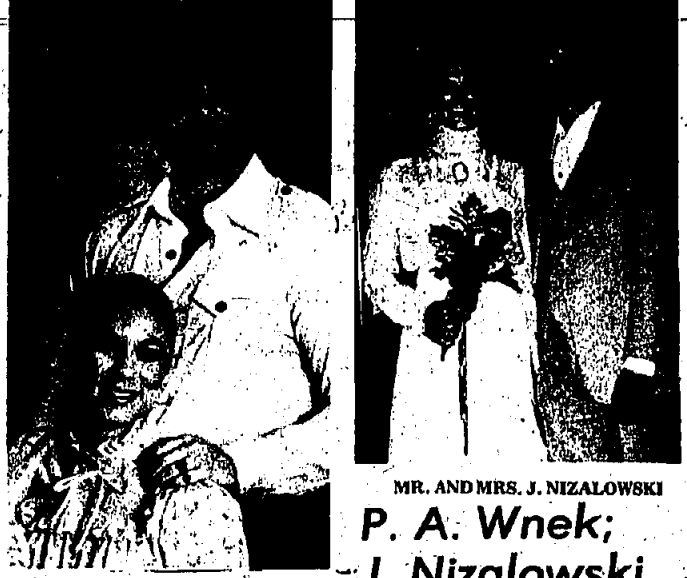

## Checks may shrink if other income rises

Dear John: I have been to the Social Security office on several occasions, but I just can't get a straight answer.

I am a divorced woman with one child 11 years old. I'm 36 years old and have been disabled since I was 26. I collect Social Security disability, which is drawn off my own account. I was already divorced when I became disabled.

Each month I receive a check for myself of \$398.70 and a check for my child of \$199.40, a total of \$598.10 each month.

I would like to remarry. The man I would like to marry brings in net about \$1,110 a month.

If I marry will I still receive both checks? And if so will the amount of the checks decrease any? And how much?—S.S.

Dear S.S.: I can understand your not getting a clear-cut answer from the Social Security office because I don't find such a clear-cut answer for your case in the Social Security handbook.

But I think the general rule is that any disability case can be reopened for review at any time.

What I do find in the handbook is a section, Chapter 5, No. 521, which states that any person entitled to disability benefits must notify the Social Security Administration if certain conditions change. And this includes increased income.

You do not state what your disability is, but presumably your case would be revised.

Would the checks decrease any? Who could know, except Social Security, and then only after reviewing your status.

Dear John: Regarding the survey conducted among physicians who treat the aged.

Only 10 percent of senior citizens may inquire about cosmetic plastic surgery, but that is no indication that only 10 percent are interested in it. There is no point in quizzing a doctor about that which is too costly to afford. Let the price drop to say \$200 per face-lift, and watch the line form, men included.

Another factor may be the doctor's attitude toward plastic surgery for the aged. If they are busy with heart disease, diabetes, etc., they tend to become impatient about the subject.

When I queried my medical doctor about a good plastic surgeon, he brushed the question aside. Later, he changed his thinking about the benefits of plastic surgery to the morale, and gave me a surgeon's name, but the prices have risen to such heights that I can no longer afford it.

I'm not sure that it is entirely vanity which is the source of the desire for cosmetic surgery. Americans are perfectionists. We want our cars, yards, houses, clothes, to look as well as can be managed. Why not our faces?

I'll wager that in the future (but not in my time), doctors will accept plastic surgery as an asset in the complete well-being of senior citizens.—M.G.

Dear M.G.: Let's face it, you may be right—what ever happened to the old saying that beauty is only skin deep?

## Sleeves of 45 records may have valuable

Sometimes the picture sleeve of a 45 rpm record can be worth as much or more than the record it covers.

One of the most valuable is an original "Can't Buy Me Love - You Can't Do That" by the Beatles. It is reportedly worth up to \$100. Even copies of the second printing of this picture sleeve can sell for up to \$5.

The picture sleeves of records by certain groups and individuals are often in demand. Some of these include Annette Funicello, the Beatles, the Beach Boys, Elvis Presley and the Rolling Stones. Not all their picture covers are valuable, but many are.

Some people seek picture sleeves solely on the basis of the illustration. They might pay a premium for one just because they like the way it looks. Others specialize in offbeat artists, novelty covers, female groups, punk bands, or some other category of picture sleeves.

The following is a sample of what some picture sleeves are worth.

WORTH UP TO \$5 OR MORE:  
—Up to My Neck—in High Muddy

Water - Carnival, Bear" by Linda Ronstadt and the Stone Poneys, "Don't Destroy Me - Boom Boom Baby" by Crash Craddock, "House of the Rising Sun - Talkin' Bout You" by The Animals.

WORTH UP TO \$10 OR MORE:  
"Great Balls of Fire - You Win Again" by Jerry Lee Lewis, "Strange Desire - My Dream Come True" by Jack Scott.

The condition of a sleeve will affect its value. A common flaw on many sleeves stored with records in them is a "ring" mark. Therefore, most collectors believe it is best to remove a 45 rpm record from its sleeve and store both separately. For added protection, put the sleeves in plastic bags.

Garage sales and flea markets are good places to find 45 rpm picture sleeves at bargain prices. I've paid as little as 10 cents at such places for some worth many times that amount.

However, to get the most for those you have, it's a good idea to sell directly to collectors. You can do this at one of the many record conventions held throughout the United States and

Canada. Or, you can place an ad in record-collector publications. The largest of these is GOLDMINE (Box 187, Fraser, Mich. 48026).

For a list of some valuable picture sleeves, send a self-addressed, stamped
