Bassano renews drinking age fight

Assemblyman C. Louis Bassano, who has sponsored legislation to restore the drinking age to 21 in the past four years, said, "and the fact that also recommended that his bill be merged with the bill of Sen. Anthony Russo in an effort to secure action as soon as possible."

"I have not heard from the senator, so I can only assume that he is not interested in quick action," Bassano said. "He seems more content to travel to New York or to issue news releases than he is in substantive action."

Russo seeks SS restorations now

State Senator Anthony E. Russo, D-20th District, has urged United States Senators Harrison Williams and Bill Bradley to make restoration of minimum Social Security benefits a priority item after the August congressional recess.

Noting that the House of Representatives already has passed legislation restoring the \$122 a month minimum payment, Russo called on the two Garden State senators to press their colleagues for swift action "to ease the minds of the three million elderly residents who are dependent on the checks."

"Although it is clear that the benefits will be restored before the effective date of the cuts, it is imperative that the U.S. Senate act as quickly as possible to remove the psychological sword of Damocles hanging over the heads of senior citizens with whom he has spoken in the past few months." "Even those receiving more than the minimum are understandably concerned that a cut in minimum benefits would signal an attempt to

reduce their payments," he said. "The toll in anguish and anxiety being paid by senior citizens who depend on Social Security benefits is too high."

Acknowledging that changes would be required to maintain the integrity of the Social Security system, Russo said, however, that the reforms should not be made at the expense of those who have planned on the levels of income projected by Social Security officials.

Russo said he has written to Williams and Bradley to "impress upon them the urgency of making restoration of the minimum benefits the number one item on the agenda after the Senate goes back into session."

"Such written requests are customary in the Legislature," Bassano said. "Bassano has never done so in this bill because it raises a serious question of how sincere he is in seeking action."
