Perhaps you have read about government waste, federal spending and tax cuts, and you want to express your opinion; or need assistance with a problem involving a government agency.

What should you do? One way to get attention is to bring your concern to my attention. As your elected representative in Washington, I am interested in your views regarding government operations, your problems in dealing with the federal bureaucracy, and your opinions on legislation in Congress.

Each year more than 50,000 letters and inquiries are received at my Washington office and the district office in Union Township. Constituents write me urging support or opposition for a particular bill, or for help regarding a Social Security check or an immigration problem.

Since President Reagan launched his economic recovery plan by appealing to the people to encourage their representatives to support the administration's program, the volume of correspondence and telephone calls to Capitol Hill has been astounding. During the first six months of the year, House members received an estimated 133 million pieces of mail, easily topping the total of all of 1980. On one day, the post office serving the House handled 1.8 million pieces of mail, a record for a single day.

If the current rate of 300,000 to 500,000 letters per day continues, the House will receive close to 230 million letters this year—more than for every man, woman and child in the United States. The mail to my office has been averaging more than 1,000 letters and letters a week. The bulk of the mail has dealt with spending and tax issues, and pro-

posed changes in the Social Security system.

Following President Reagan's July 28 (Friday) address, my call speech, my Washington and Union offices were inundated with mail and telephone calls. During a 24-hour period following the President's address, staff personnel handled 737 telephone calls. The name of each caller was recorded and each was sent a letter explaining my support of the President's spending and tax cut program. Eighty five percent favored the President's tax program.

Unless it is an inquiry requiring research, or depends upon obtaining information from a federal agency, most of my mail is answered the same day it is received. If a constituent takes the time to write, no matter what the subject matter, an answer is deserved.

Even when you sign a petition, or are part of a group signing a letter, you will still receive a reply. Obviously, a personal letter to me has more impact, but each communication receives my attention and review before it is mailed out.

Very often people wish to know how I will vote on a bill that has not left Congress. I will write to you as soon as I have your response is contingent on the final language of the bill. What starts out as a letter and ends up as a "yes" or "no" vote is a process that takes time. I cannot do what you wish. You have a right to know that, without ten pages of double-talk, so you can hear someone who "writes your Congressman," please do. I want to hear from you. Address your letter to: Rep. Addition of programs, which could be financed from casino taxes, is one of three state constitutional amendments to be decided at the Nov. 3 General Election.

When New Jersey voters were asked in 1976 to approve a constitutional amendment to permit casino gambling in Atlantic City, an important part of the amendment designed to gain voter support was a provision that the tax on casino profits to the state be expended for certain purposes, specifically "reductions in property taxes, rentals, telephone, gas, electric and municipal utilities charges of eligible senior citizens and disabled residents of the state, in accordance with such formula as the legislature shall by law provide." This technique of allocating revenue for stated purposes is known as dedication or earmarking.

The amendment question on the ballot would expand the original dedication to include "additional or expanded health services or benefits to transportation services or benefits to eligible senior citizens and disabled persons."

The first program to be paid for from casino taxes was part of the 1976 tax reform program—\$50 added to the homestead exemption to authorized senior citizens and disabled persons. Financing of this program, \$11 million including administration cost, was transferred in Fiscal Year 1979 from the Property Tax Relief Fund, where it had been financed in 1977 and 1978 in order to make General Funds available for the senior citizens' prescription drug program. By Fiscal Year 1980 the legislature had enacted a lifetime credit program, which paid part of utility bills for eligible senior citizens and disabled persons. First year expenditures for this program turned out to be less than half of the \$46 million appropriation. Casino revenue for 1980 climbed to \$50.1 million from \$18.3 million in 1979 with the operation of three casinos. The fund balance at the end of that year was \$28.9 million. In Fiscal Year 1981 no new programs were added while revenues rose 27 percent with seven casinos in operation. Slightly over \$30 million in fund balance are projected to carry over to Fiscal Year 1982 in addition to estimated casino tax revenue of \$104 million from nine casinos, a \$34 million

increase over 1981 taxes. Three new programs were added to be financed from Casino Revenue Funds this year, each requiring separate enabling law: expansion of the utility rebate credit; lifetime to tenants, and funds to reimburse municipalities to implement the 1980 constitutional amendments which increased the residential property tax exemption for eligible senior citizens and disabled persons from \$100 to \$200, and expanded the exemption to homes of senior citizens and disabled land not owned by them. Estimated first year cost of the three programs is \$41.2 million. The largest 1982 cost increase to the Casino Fund is for the regular homestead rebates for senior citizens and disabled persons.

For several years there has been discussion about providing free bus service for senior citizens and disabled persons during off-peak hours to augment the present existing reduced bus fare program. Although the governor recommended such a program in the recent bill to fund the state lottery, the legislature eliminated that free service program so additional funds could be provided for bus-rail services. There also has been consideration of funding medical benefits for citizens and the disabled from the Casino Revenue Fund. While approval of the ballot question would permit expanded existing programs or new programs in health and transportation to be financed from the Fund, at present there is little assurance of the availability of revenue to finance such programs.

If the \$133.7 million appropriated for 1982 total revenue is expended assuming casino taxes produce the estimated \$104 million, the carry over surplus will be nearly depleted. To finance the same appropriations for the same programs in Fiscal Year 1983 will require an increase in casino revenue of nearly \$50 million. Financing of new programs could also be contingent on reducing cost of existing programs or transferring programs and their financing back to the General Fund or Property Tax Relief Fund.

Senior citizen groups are divided on the question, others suggest the amendment to be beneficial to disabled citizens, while opponents of the dedication principle advocate opposition and subsequent legislative action to repeal the original provision.

Should you be one of the unlucky people left stranded at the airport without a flight, the airline has an obligation to pay you a penalty fee, known as "denied boarding compensation."

However, if you don't hold a ticket or if you've failed to follow any of the airline's other specifications, you can be bumped from your flight and receive no penalty fee.

Several things will happen to you, very quickly, should you arrive at the airport and discover that your flight has been overbooked. First, the air-

rier will ask for volunteers to be bumped. These bumped passengers are entitled to both a penalty payment of the airline's operating and transportation to their final destination. Should you volunteer to be bumped, the airline will rebook you to your destination.

The airline decides how much its "denied boarding compensation" will be. They base their decision on two things. One is the length of the delay involved; the other is the cost of the ticket. You may be able to negotiate the amount of the penalty payment.

Once you decide to accept the airline's offer, you can't sue the carrier for any additional damages. Before you cash the check or deposit it in the bank, remember that you don't have to accept the airline's offer. If you reject the carrier's offer, you can sue for additional money from the courts.

You also do not have to accept the airline's offer of transportation to any airport other than the one to which you were originally ticketed.

These protection clauses may or may not be offered by foreign carriers or on international flights. The protection will definitely not be offered on charter flights and does not apply to commuter lines.

If you are one of the bumped passengers bewildered by all of the confusing regulations, ask the airline representative to explain your rights when you are bumped from a flight, the division's toll-free Tel-Consumer line at (800) 242-5846 can supply you with the information. Ask the Tel-Consumer operator for Passport Number 426, "Airline Overbooking."
