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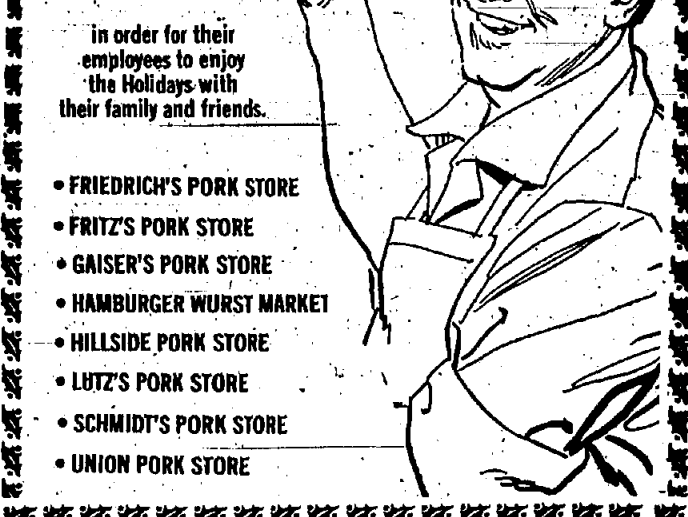

A chapter in New Jersey history came to a close with the completion of the first state-wide gubernatorial re-count.

It was the closest election the state has ever experienced with only about 0.7 percent of the total vote separating the winner from the loser, and it demonstrated a number of things about the election system in general.

First and perhaps most important this election showed just how much truth there is in the old civic cliché that every vote counts. It made people realize just how much their participation does count and that could have a profound effect on voter turnout in future elections.

Secondly, the election proved that the system does work, even when taxed to the limit. The fact that the recount changed only about 16 votes testifies as to how well the systems worked in the first place.

But the big story this year was of course the recount, precipitated by the fact that only some 1,700 votes out of a total of 2.3 million cast separated the winner, Tom Kean, from his Democratic rival.

The state-wide gubernatorial recount was unprecedented in New Jersey. There were no established practices or history to guide the recounters or make their very difficult task easier.

Under tremendous pressure there were improvements of existing roads. Yet the Somerset County Planning Board is pushing for completion of Route 16, so that two of the towns where it would be built.

Montgomery and Hillsborough townships in Somerset County, Princeton, and the affected townships of Hopewell and Lawrence, both in Mercer County, are opposed to the road.

If New Jersey succeeds in shifting federal funding away from the unneeded link so that it can make other road improvements, it will be to the benefit of the state.

DOT has studied and studied to make this decision and has the statistics to show that the Route 16 link is not needed to serve interstate and regional traffic and that, if built, it would relieve existing Routes 1 and 31 of only a tiny fraction of their present and future traffic.

No substantial relief for Routes 206 and 207 would result, either. DOT maintains that the Route 16 link is not needed to serve interstate and regional traffic and that, if built, it would relieve existing Routes 1 and 31 of only a tiny fraction of their present and future traffic.

Over and over again, I think it's also to DOT's credit to have pinpointed the important facts that construction of the highway would not be consistent with New Jersey's Implementation Plan for Air Quality, and would result in unnecessary increases in gasoline consumption.

Projects which probably could be paid for by diverting the Route 95 federal money include denuclearization of Route 206 from Princeton to Somerville, Somerset County local road and transit projects and bus park-and-ride facilities in the region.

Finally, labor shouldn't worry, because if we can just spend the money, there will be plenty of jobs to perform. Your point of view should be made known to local officials if you live in the affected towns or counties—and in any case to the state Department of Transportation. It's another case where your opinion really counts.

## Your Library: The discovery of lost civilizations

Following are the reviews of the recently reviewed popular books for winter reading at the Springfield Library.

**JOURNEY INTO THE PAST**  
"The Tigris Expedition," by The Heyerdahl  
Determined to trace one of the ancient trade routes, from the Tigris-Euphrates Valley to Somalia, Thor Heyerdahl, in 1977, began to make the complex preparations for his journey.

The crew (11 in all)—each an assiduous venturer—represented several different countries.

Heyerdahl had studied everything he could find about the ships of the ancient Sumerians, and discovered that they used baidi-reeds—a light, buoyant, leakless material. Finding it satisfactory, he built the Tigris—a 60-foot, 25-ton, basket-like craft, which was launched on the Tigris River in Iraq.

Sumerian tablets recorded the names of lands and places known 3,000 years ago: Dilmun (Bahrain), Makan (Oman), Meluhha (Indus Valley in Pakistan). The 4,200-mile voyage took the Tigris (over a five-month period) down the Arabian-Persian Gulf, through the Strait of Hormuz to the Gulf of Oman, the Indian Ocean to the Coast of Africa. While establishing the long-forgotten trade routes, the voyagers encountered... perilous weather (fog, squalls, high winds, etc.). They also met with near-accidents from tankers, the ships, reefs, promontories, sharks and snakes. But these experiences were worthwhile as they achieved their goal, which included the discovery of three Old World civilizations (Sumerian, Mesopotamian and the Indus) with their archeological treasures.

**MODERN JEWISH POETS**  
"Voices Within the Ark," edited by Howard Schwarz, Anthony Rudolf.

In this unusual, comprehensive anthology can be found the finest poetry written by Jewish poets since the turn of the century. The Jewish heritage of these writers has left its distinctive and profound mark on virtually all of them.

Most of them have been in some measure influenced by the Bible, the Talmud, the Kabbalah, Hassidic tales, the Holocaust and the state of Israel. Four hundred Jewish poets—since 1900—coming from 40 nations and writing in more than 20 languages (translated here into English) are represented. This is a book for anyone who has even the remotest interest in the subject.

This collection is divided into four parts. The introduction to the first—the Hebrew section—explains the revival of spoken Hebrew since the founding of Israel. These poets were either immigrants to Palestine or were born there, but a few lived in the Diaspora.

Some reflect the personal or historical aspects of life (the ancient past or present). The second book is devoted to Yiddish poets, the majority of whom have come from Poland, Russia or America. Although Yiddish became the vernacular of Jews in Europe, it was the Americans, despite their distance from the source, who produced an abundance of Yiddish verse.

In Book III are those writings in English and coming from the United States, the British Isles, Canada, Australia, etc. Book IV contains all the other languages—from Arabic to Turkish.

**ROUTING DEPRESSION**  
"A New Beginning," by Gary Emery Ph. D.  
Depression is defined by what a person does, thinks, and feels. If you slow down and are apathetic, if you feel sad, guilty or anxious; if you have a negative view of yourself, the world,

and the future; if you have trouble with your appetite and sleeping, then you may be in a depressive state, particularly if these symptoms are prolonged. This book is tailored to help you overcome your negative responses to healthful living.

The author is a clinical psychologist who has assisted in developing techniques of "cognitive therapy" which emphasizes how you evaluate or think about your experiences. Misinterpreting or distorting your experiences is largely responsible for feelings of inadequacy, sadness or guilt. Emery's approach to a positive outlook is to become aware of self-defeating reactions, to alter these perceptions realistically, to work on the psychological causes of depression and to focus on more self-reliant, self-directed, positive behavior and outlook. For each step in his cognitive therapy, the author gives specific illustrations. Lists 20 though-provoking questions, includes tables with helpful advice, suggests keeping activity records. He discusses also: weight gain, overcoming alcohol and drug dependency, relationship problems, and handling the stress of motherhood and the stresses of aging.

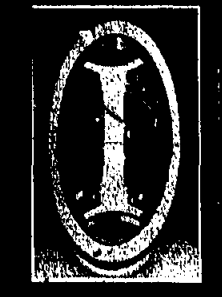

Ebonee Webb has traditional music album - By MILY HAMMER - Disc and Data's LP Pick of the Week - "Ebonye Webb" (Capitol ST-1248) - For almost a century Memphis, Tenn., has been producing some of the richest contributions to the heritage of American music, starting with W.C. Handy and the Beale Street Blues, continuing with the likes of Elvis Presley, A. Green, Isaac Hayes and The Bar-Kays, and crystallizing in the legendary Stax Records of the 1960s. One group continuing the estimable Memphis tradition is the dynamic rhythm and blues act, Ebonye Webb, who now has his first American album, "Ebonye Webb" on Capitol Records. The group's roots go back to the early part of the last decade, at which time the members became instantly popular and were hired to perform onstage and in the studio with Rufus Thomas, Sam Cooke, The Bar-Kays and other Stax/Volt musical giants. After the downfall of Stax, Ebonye Webb became a solo act playing various nightclubs across the country and abroad, where the enjoyment of live music in lands as diverse as Africa, Canada and Japan. In fact, Ebonye Webb had such a remarkable impact on the Japanese market, they were asked to record an album featuring their patented brand of rhythm and funk, but with vocals sung in the Japanese language. This was the first time a project of this nature had been attempted, and it turned out to be a resounding success. In 1978, Ebonye Webb had the second biggest hit in Japan, "Disco-Commissan," and was invited to appear on several television specials.
