## Registration slated for summer classes

The first six-week summer session, which runs from June 1 to July 9, includes courses in accounting, biology, business, chemistry, criminal justice, economics, education, engineering, English, fine arts, government, history, human services, mathematics, modern languages, philosophy, physics, psychology and sociology.

The majority of the courses carry three credits, which in most cases can be transferred to other colleges and universities.

Registration hours are 9 to 11 a.m., 1 to 3 p.m., and 5 to 8 p.m. in the Office of Admissions and Records, MacDonnell Hall.

Tuition at Union College is \$35 per credit hour. Among those who traditionally attend the College's Summer Session are college students from other schools who are home for summer vacation and want to earn extra credits, either to graduate earlier or to lighten their course loads in subsequent semesters. The Summer Session student body also includes adults enrolled in courses for career advancement or personal enrichment, as well as high school students getting a head start on their college education.

Summer Session II runs from July 12 to August 19.

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

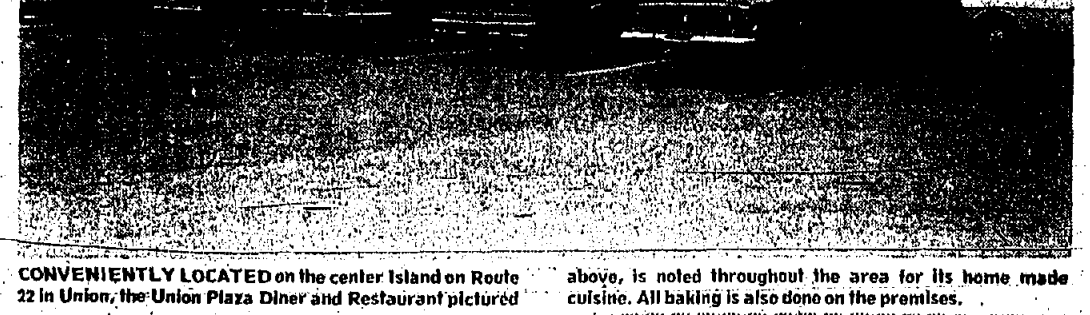

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## Disc & Data

**Disc and Data's Pick Of The LPs—"Stealer"**  
MCA-5292

From ground zero to success in 40 minutes. That's the emerging story of Stealer, a Los Angeles-based quartet whose natural feel for melodies and riving rock 'n' roll stance have melded into this, their debut album, on MCA Records. It's 40 minutes of the most refreshing, honest and compelling music being created today. It's exciting, a power-driven sound, hammered and shaped through hard work during the past year-and-a-half which is now paying off because of the determination-of this young group.

Stealer was formed when "leaves" vocalist/guitarist Robin Miller, who has worked with Tim Curry, called drummer Lee Kim Kim, who has worked with the uninitiated with his wry side-talking about his real forte being with war. Milwaukee bands in himself-performing with Bob Welch and Walter Egan, then got in touch with bassist Randy Kozits and keyboardist Tony Russo. After an jam session, the band was formed. But it wasn't until the last year, each working in various "Top 40" bands or doing session dates around town, during this period that they decided to make their final put Stealer on record.

"I had a certain confidence in our own music," Miller explains, "but I just didn't have the vehicle. I played my songs for others, and we'd start rehearsing, but at the same time, I'd get more and more ideas that we'd begin working with." And actually, Kozits, in interjects, "Our songs were doing now aren't even the ones we played in the beginning. The sound is much more mature as is the band."

The album, "Stealer," walks that fine line between AOR and Top 40, melodically appealing to a wide-ranging audience, and lyrically rooted in the traditional love story, shaded slightly with the inevitable tanglements of today's society.
