Cable's '30 Medical Minutes' gets a booster from Overlook

The Overlook Hospital Foundation has announced a grant to Communities on Cable (COC) for the purpose of producing 12 segments of "Thirty Medical Minutes," a live, call-in show which COC co-produces with Overlook Hospital.

COC operates Channel PA-2, serving the municipalities of Summit, New Providence, Berkeley Heights, Millburn and Springfield. It is an organization dedicated to fostering widespread community use of public-access cable television.

"Thirty Medical Minutes" premiered in the fall featuring medical experts on a wide range of topics, from dealing with medical emergencies to caring for adolescent children. Some of the program's guests have included Dr. Barry Lawton of Millburn, co-author of "The Healthy Adolescent! A Parents' Manual," Dr. Gloria Schrago, director of Pediatrics at Overlook on Sudden Infant Death Syndrome, and Dr. Robert Binkler on new developments in orthodontia and Mary Nightingale, executive director of the Family Service Agency of Summit, on her group's new workshop for divorcing families. "Thirty Medical Minutes" airs every other Tuesday at 8:30 p.m.

According to Virginia von Hoffmann of Summit, chairman of the foundation's grants committee, the purpose of the grant is to encourage the continuing relationship between the hospital and COC.

"We see public-access cable TV as a tremendous medium for bringing important health information to the homes of people in Overlook's service area," she noted. "The potential of cable TV as a community resource is just beginning to be realized. We are happy that once again Overlook is able to play a leadership role in a significant community service."

Catherine Miller of Short Hills, president of COC, noted that her organization was particularly grateful for the vote of confidence represented by the Overlook grant. "Clearly, COC shares with Overlook the belief that public-access television is an important vehicle for fostering community interaction and awareness," she said. "We hope that our relationship will grow and that we will be able to offer much in the way of consumer health-oriented programming."

The 12 programs which have been funded through the grant will be aired beginning in the fall.

DOT to seek bids on Route 78

The state Department of Transportation has set a target date of July to advertise for the first of three excavating and grading contracts in relation to Interstate Route 78.

All of the Route 78 contracts are for excavating and grading. One extends approximately two miles from west of Glenside Avenue to west of Shunpike Road in Springfield, Summit and Mountaintop.

Another I-78 project is 1.1 miles in length and begins east of Glenside Road and ends west of Glenside Avenue in Berkeley Heights and Summit. The third extends one mile west of McMans Avenue to east of Glenside Road in Berkeley Heights. These two projects will be advertised in August and September.

Board votes, 8-1, to keep Caldwell

According to residents delighted with the Board of Education's decision to keep the existing township schools open in some capacity, a compromise was struck for all the citizens of Springfield and a potential bomb was defused. Still, others who opposed the decision because it delayed the inevitable closing of schools described the board's thinking as a sort of "I'll think about it tomorrow." Scarlet O'Hara philosophy.

The 8-1 vote in favor of the reorganization plan made by Dr. Fred Baruchin, superintendent of schools, was greeted with thunderous applause from about 200 residents who packed into the Raymond Chisholm School gym. As the final vote was tallied and the gavel brought down, parents, teachers and friends rushed to the front of the room, many crying and hugging each other to congratulate the board members.

The plan dictates five basic changes in the school district: it keeps open the James Caldwell School as a K-4 facility; it reorganizes the Edward Walton School as a special services, administrative and early childhood center; it reorganizes the Thelma Sandmeier School as a K-4 facility; it reorganizes the Florence Gaudineer School as a 5-8 facility, and the plan offers the Chisholm School for sale.

Baruchin said the township has expressed interest in obtaining Chisholm for possible recreation, senior citizen and other uses.

Caldwell is currently a K-5 school, Sandmeier, K-3, and Walton, 4-8, Chisholm, in addition to housing before the plan, is used by the YMCA, which has one year remaining on a two-year lease scheduled for renewal next month.

Baruchin suggested that the township issue a bond to purchase the building but before that, he said, an assessor will be called in to determine the value of the Chisholm property. In the past, the board suggested that the township pay a token price for use of Chisholm, but Baruchin advised that the assessor would depend on negotiations between the board and the township.

The adopted plan would save about \$260,000 more than if the board were to keep the district as is.

The funds will accrue through the elimination of eight staff positions, one principal position, one custodian, the utilities costs of Chisholm and elimination of busing for Caldwell students to Walton and Sandmeier schools.

By putting the district's three neurologically impaired students in Walton, there would be an additional saving of about \$21,000 off \$700 tuition cost per student if taught outside the district, Baruchin said. He added that room there for two out-of-district students would bring additional money to the district.

To many at the May 19 meeting this reorganization sounded familiar, partly because it had been heard before in the fall. Board member Ellen Dalman proposed an almost identical reorganization prior to the board's voting 5-4, in November to close Caldwell. However, at the time, the board scrapped her suggestion.

"This is a derivative of Mrs. Dalman's alternate proposal made in November," Baruchin said.

Although the audience and several board members admitted that the proposal was being considered about "six months ago," the popular reaction seemed to be that it was better late than never.

"I believe the proposal... came six months ago," said Board President Myrna Wasserman. But she continued, "I believe it warrants consideration as I would have believed six months ago." Board member Lou Monaco said, "It's never too late. I don't care when we voted on the proposal."

"It gives the greatest good to the greatest number of people," he added.

Barbara Adler, the lone board member to vote against the plan, had a stronger reaction to the plan and its resubmission to the board.

Baruchin's plan cites today's child's needs

The following are excerpts from the 15-page superintendent's reorganization report given last week to the board of education.

- "An article which we received last month... points up the fact that today's child is a victim... of stress... borne of social change. There is a related suggestion that we must recognize and accommodate to children's special needs in such a time. Comfortable surroundings, perhaps, constitute one way that we can help promote a sense of security for children, and both slow down and temper the increasing acceleration and complexity of their modern lifestyles. The neighborhood school concept lends itself well to those purposes in Springfield."
- The superintendent's report suggested that the district anticipate declining enrollment later in the decade at the high school level.
- In 1988-89 355 students are anticipated at Jonathan Dayton Regional High School, as opposed to 1,023 this year. Furthermore, the entire regional enrollment in 1988-89 could be accommodated in two of the four buildings presently utilized by that district.
- "Consequently, the Dayton building would therefore be available to Springfield. The local board might then look to its acquisition to conduct a combined 5-8 middle school program for Springfield and Mountaintop, without formal fusion of these two districts."
- "If that were done, all other local elementary schools could be moved in to the Florence M. Gaudineer School, while central offices and services could be unified in Dayton. This would permit the unification and centralization of pre-kindergarten through fourth-grade education; 5-8 education; central offices and services; minimize transportation needs and allow the closing of all other school buildings in Springfield simultaneously at that time.
- The report also gave the reasons for housing special services in the Edward Walton School.
- "Legislation has recently been passed and signed into law mandating the provision of preschool programs for handicapped students in September, 1983. The district's eminent success with its DyDyce preschool effort, coupled with the unusual suitability of the Walton School for the purpose, would augur well for the development of additional programs for local or nonresident students on a tuition-supported or funded basis. Also, the district has already served for several years, at the request of the state, as the "child fund" agency for Union County — to identify handicapped preschool children."
- The two sections of the report italicized in the district reorganization are:
 - "A Future Directions Planning Committee" be organized by the Board of Education to study long-range educational planning."
 - "An assessor be employed to determine the true value of the Raymond Chisholm building and property."

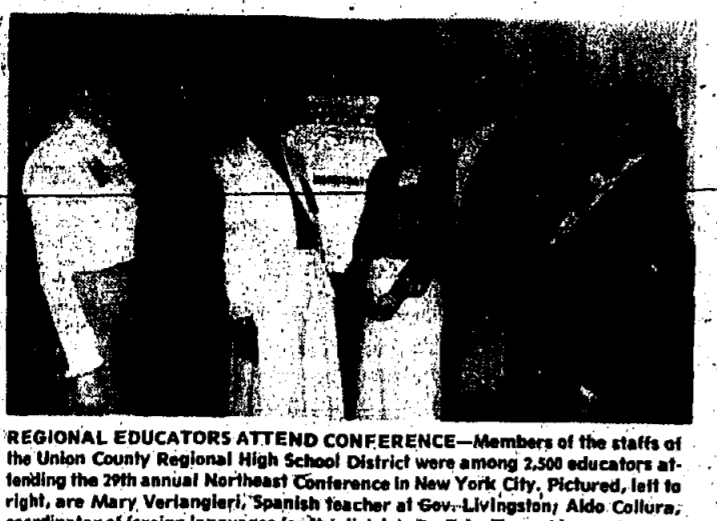

By GWEN WARANIS. Extension House economist. When it comes to finances, many families make the same mistakes. Check your family's weak spots by answering yes or no to the following questions.

- 1. Do you know how your money is spent?
- 2. Does your family communicate with each other about money? Family includes adult children and your parents, as well as spouses and young children or teens.
- 3. Do you have a will?
- 4. Do you rely heavily on professional financial advice?
- 5. Have you started planning for retirement?
- 6. Can you differentiate between what you want and what you need?
- 7. If you have made financial plans, have you carried them out?
- 8. A no answer to any of the above signifies potential problems in your family's money management. Here's why:
 - 1. Keeping track of income and expenses is a helpful exercise. It can increase your awareness of the money earned and how you spend and save it.
 - 2. Not communicating about money—many family power struggles involve resentments which grow from feelings of dominance or dependence created by money. Spouses, adult children and their parents, and children should be encouraged to talk about money.
 - 3. Without a will, the state will distribute your assets for you. This distribution may not be in accordance with your wishes. Also, bonding costs can be high for heirs of intestate (those without a will) persons.
 - 4. Families know themselves and their temperaments best. With the use of current knowledge from media, magazines and other sources, it is possible to become your own financial advisor.
 - 5. Not planning for retirement—Social Security is not a complete retirement wage. Other options (IRA, Keogh, annuities, pensions) should be explored early in a person's working life.

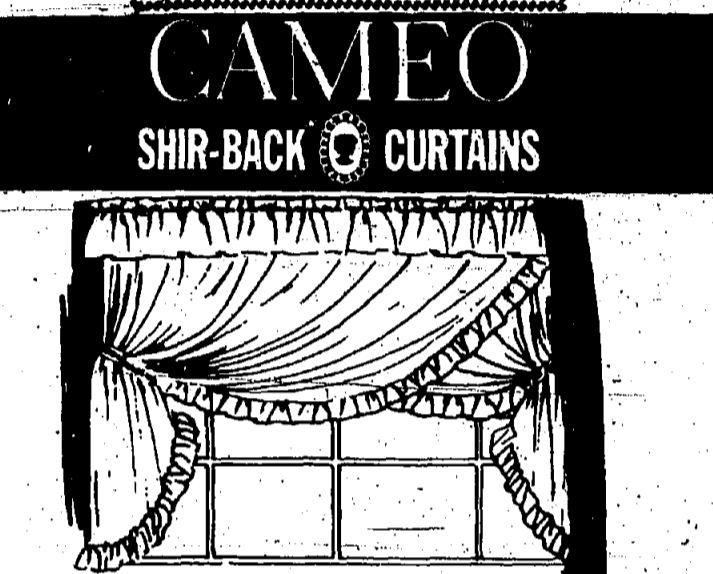

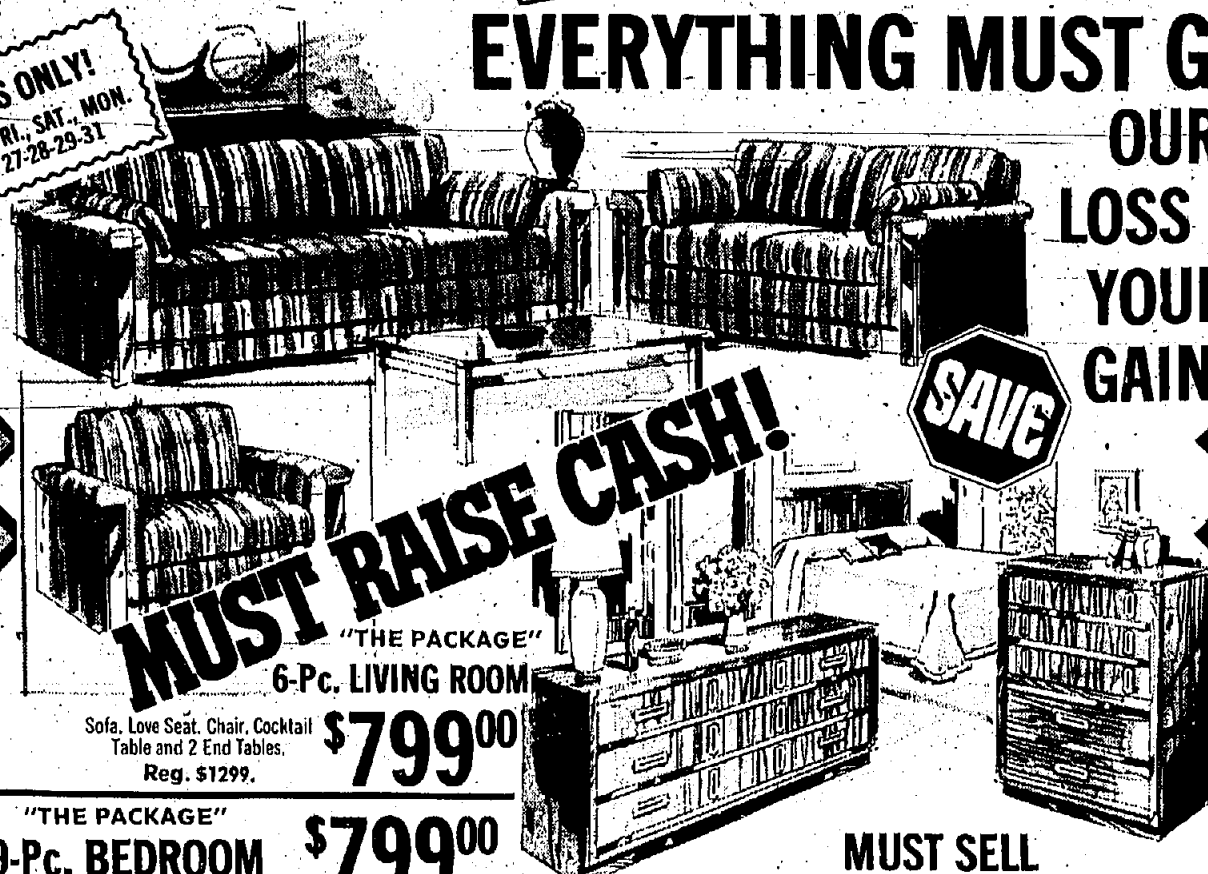


