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## Key witness analyzes effects of mall

The township Planning Board listened last week to a mall general manager speculate on the social effects that a Springfield shopping center would have and, on Sept. 8, will hear testimony from a Paramus policeman on crime generated by a center.

John Hatrich, general manager of the Rockaway Town Square Mall in Morris County, talked on what crime, traffic, services, ties to the township and community programming could be expected from a mall at the proposed site off Route 22 and South Springfield Avenue.

Hatrich, manager of the mall for the past four-and-one-half years, said he based his comments on his experience

at Rockaway, which is among the four largest New Jersey malls for retail sales. Conditions at that mall should compare favorably to those that would exist in Springfield, he contended.

Rockaway crime figures for 1982 cited by Hatrich included six assaults, 19 stolen cars and 16 adult and 75 juvenile shoplifters (not including major stores). Those figures may be greater, he specified, because they do not include incidents reported to police that were not reported at the shopping center. An internal security force deals with most offenses and serious crimes, such as assault, are uncommon, he said.

Medical emergencies have reached 36 this year, the general manager added.

According to Hatrich, who could not supply exact numbers, the proposed mall would have crime figures comparable to those of Livingston Mall.

Hatrich responded to board questions that he was sure there had been an increase in police, fire and municipal court business since the mall opened in 1978; however, he noted that prior to the mall the Rockaway police force was small and afterward the fire department added only a ladder truck.

Hatrich also rejected the idea of Westfield Councilman Garland Booth that the Rockaway mall was responsible for business decline in Dover, the largest town (15,000 people) in the center's trade area.

He described Dover before the mall

as a business section that was "pretty well shot" and is now undergoing major renovations with condominium conversion, new facades and modern-day retail stores with apartments above.

He also argued that Rockaway accepted local retailers into the mall but did not actively seek them as tenants.

He added that the Rockaway center has become the "hub" of that community by providing community events, commuter parking and special services to senior citizens.

Although Hatrich continually drew parallels between Rockaway and the proposed Springfield center, the board and audience questioned the relevance of comparing characteristics of the less populated Morris County area and Springfield.

Board member Nat Stokes asked Robert Podvey, attorney for the site developers General Growth of Des Moines, Iowa: "In listening to your testimony, I wondered how you chose this particular witness to testify here ... statistics he gave us are certainly not pertinent to Springfield."

Podvey explained the witness was suggested by a member of General Growth to give a "realistic idea of what goes on in a center ... I'd be crazy to say Rockaway is like Springfield."

Claire-Todres of Springfield said she could not understand the "rationale" of a mall when there are several within a five to six-mile radius of Springfield.

Still, others said that traffic patterns could not be compared because location

to major roads is different at both sites.

Hatrich testified that two main roads lead from the Rockaway mall which borders Route 80 on one side. Route 15 also is nearby. He added, as is planned at the Springfield site, that road improvements were necessary before construction of the mall at Rockaway.

The planning board has changed meeting dates for the remaining mall hearings to the first and third Wednesdays of each month. The new dates will begin Sept. 8 and the Florence Gaudineer School has been booked through December to hear the case.

Also, local cable channel PA-1 will televise the last mall hearing on Sept. 9 at 2 p.m. and Sept. 11 at 9 p.m.

## Board makes contingency plan

Should a threatened teacher strike materialize Tuesday a plan has been developed for the Union County regional high schools to open and operate, the Regional Board of Education has announced.

The plan was released last week by the board, which is at impasse with the American Federation of Teachers (AFT), local 3417.

Mediations between the groups were initiated Tuesday with the help of mediator Herbert Haber of the Public Employment Relations Commission. He has made recommendations on disputed areas in the 1982-83 contract

and is presenting those this week to the board and teachers. Talks have been ongoing since February.

Sections of the board operating plan include:

There will be no cafeteria services during the strike.

Teachers who continue to strike will not be paid for the non-working days.

Substitute teachers will be employed to take the place of striking teachers.

Security personnel will be employed to assure safety and security.

All co-curricular activities, athletics, band activities, choral groups, clubs,

etc. will be prohibited during the strike. Practice games and scheduled activities will not be permitted.

Buses will be provided for teachers who come to school. Special parking lots have been made available to teachers so they will not have to drive through expected picket lines.

Student automobiles will not be permitted on school grounds. Students should plan to ride on school buses in the event of a strike.

Students scheduled to attend the Union County Vocational School for a shared time program, an exchange pro-

gram between the regional schools or one of the special education programs in another school will not begin these programs the first week of school. They will remain at home for the first week of school.

All students from the six regional district communities will be required to attend school. Attendance policies will be in effect.

The district also has advised parents that a Parent-Teachers Association telephone chain will be activated to inform them of the strike status. Parents also can telephone the high schools for information.

## Local schools await 947 pupils

The Springfield local schools open Wednesday for 947 pre-kindergarten through eighth-grade students who will be entering a reorganized district hit hard by state budget cuts.

The Edward Walton School, which last year served students in kindergarten through fifth grade, has been converted this year to a special services center to handle programs like the neurologically impaired.

Planned improvements to accommodate handicapped students in the building have been delayed because of the loss of minimum aid to the district, which was stripped earlier this year of its \$202,000 in state funds.

According to Superintendent of School Dr. Fred Baruchin, he is "not sure exactly what the disposition of the Walton School will be."

The loss of aid has caused further problems schools in the upcoming year.

"There are mammoth problems in collective bargaining, in processing requisitions for supplies and equipment, we expected to order. We put a freeze on that. It has thrown us into an extreme budgetary deficit," Baruchin said.

He described the future year as an attempt to operate on a shortfall budget caused by allocating funds for only

three schools and then reopening the James Caldwell School. With the current \$4.5 million budget for four schools (Walton, Caldwell, Thelma Sandmeier and Florence Gaudineer) and the loss of aid, program cuts may eventually be necessary.

For now, Baruchin assured, curriculum will be kept intact helped by an attempt to increase class sizes. Decisions whether to cut programs will be made around October, the superintendent said.

The district is still burdened with 1982-83 contract negotiations between it and the secretaries, custodians and teachers unions. The board of education, at impasse with those groups, is scheduled to negotiate tonight with the teachers.

Volunteers have painted much of the

building's interior. Repair of boilers should be finished by the beginning of school, Baruchin indicated.

This year 170 in grades K-4 will attend that school. Sandmeier will house 272 pre-K-4 grade students and Gaudineer 402 5-8 grade students. Fifth-graders will be in Gaudineer for the first time this year and have caused an enrollment increase there of 63 students more than last year.

Overall, the district enrollment decreased from 936 students in 1981-82 to 947 in 1982-83. That represents a four percent enrollment drop.

This year, the district also has one new teacher, Bruce K. Hanson, an art teacher at the Gaudineer school. He received a master of fine arts degree in 1979 from City College of New York and graduated in 1976 with a bachelor of

science in art and art history from Hunter College in New York.

Recently, the district also received a resignation from Bill McNeese, an eighth-grade social studies teacher who has moved to teach in the Roselle Park middle school and coach their basketball team.

Arlene Little, a sixth-grade language arts teacher, will be taking a maternity leave. That position will be filled by moving other staff members.

Other than the public schools, the St. James School will be opening its doors Thursday to 164 students in kindergarten through eighth grade and 35 pre-kindergartners. The principal of that school has notified parents that there will be participation this year in the New Jersey state program for reduced milk and lunches.

## Schwartz, Stiso rip mall

Howard Schwartz and Ed Stiso, Jr., Democratic candidates for Township Committee, have repeated their strong opposition to the construction of the proposed Bambergers-Alexanders Mall on Rt. 22 and South Plainfield Avenue.

In a statement released by the can-

didates, they stated, "We are unalterably opposed to the construction of such a regional mall in Springfield. The mall would destroy the stability and safety of Springfield as we know it."

Schwartz and Stiso have attended the

public meetings held by the Planning Board on a monthly basis at the Gaudineer School. Stiso stated that "I've lived in this town since 1947. It's developed from a rural area to a high-quality suburban community. The mall will irrevocably damage our town. It will choke Springfield with traffic, give us high crime and overwhelm existing municipal services. It should be stopped."

"We recognize that Bambergers-Alexanders is a powerful and formidable foe. We will not be intimidated by them," declared Howard Schwartz. He went on to add, "The argument that there will be an increase in realties is clearly outweighed by the consequent reduction of property values."

Schwartz and Stiso remarked that "the experts for the mall have testified that the property can be developed as it is presently zoned but at a slower pace." They asked, "Why should the residents of Springfield be made to suffer substantial hardship to foster the profits of these corporate giants? Is the shopping convenience for a few people worth the deterioration of the suburban atmosphere of Springfield? Obviously not!"

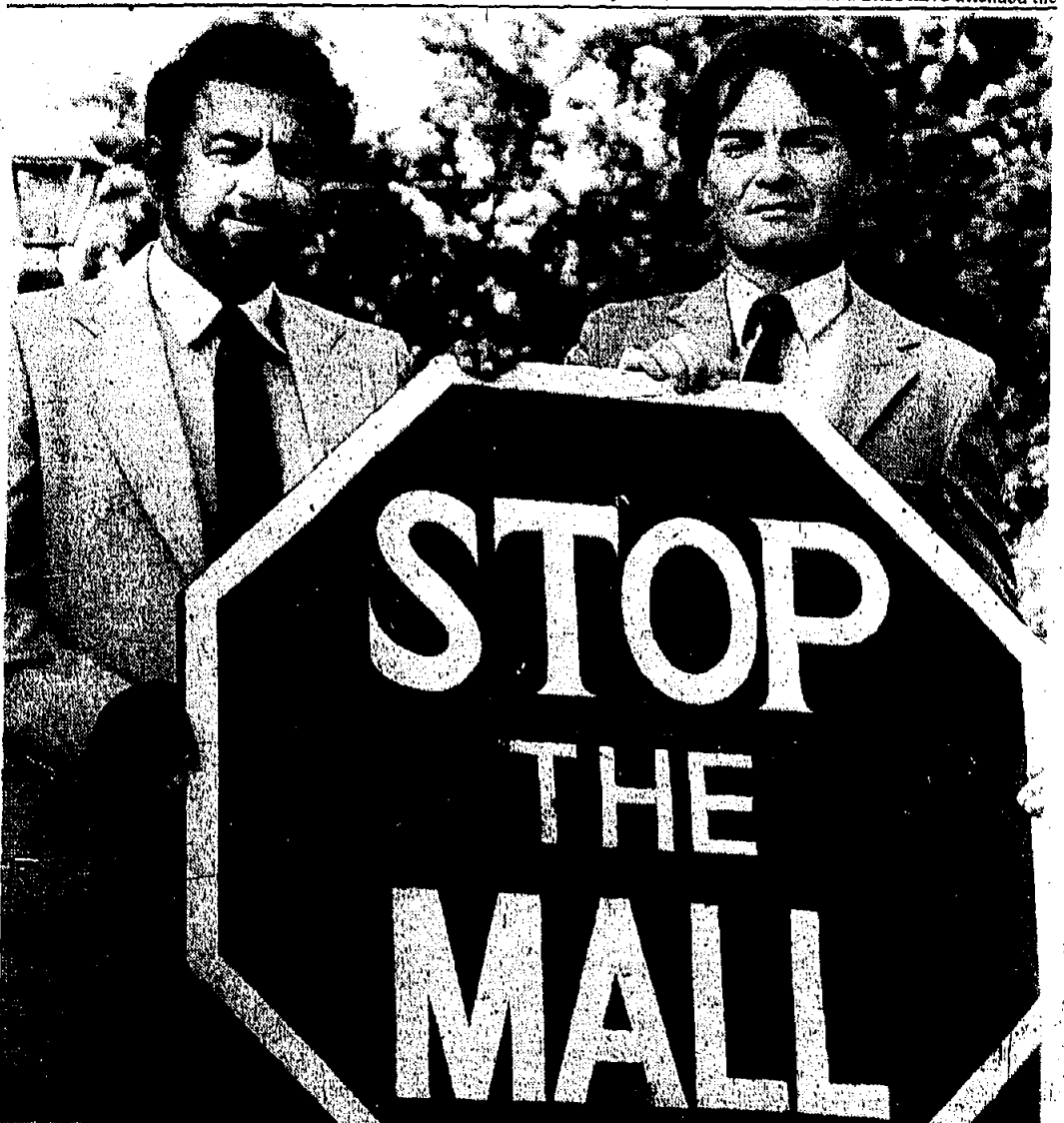
## Diamond headed for Seton Hall law

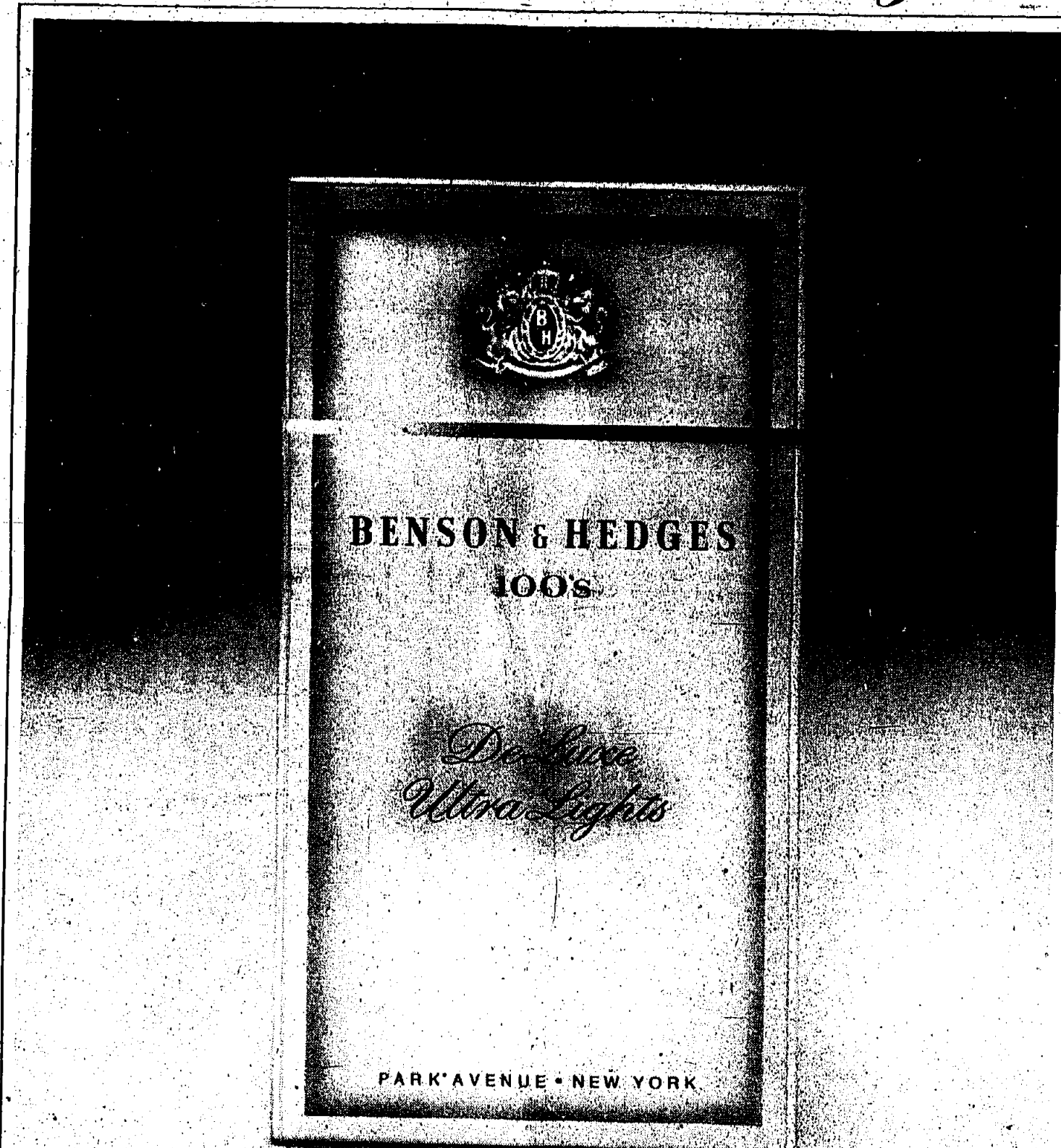

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## Humane Society lauds Kean College

Kean College has taken a pioneering role in humane education that has aroused national interest, according to officials of the Humane Society of the United States.

"The Union institution last autumn added to its curriculum for graduate students the first formal course in humane education in the state and among the first in the nation."

"We've had inquiries concerning the course from all parts of the United States," says Dr. Myra Weiger, chairman of the department of Educational Arts and Systems.

"We simply couldn't adequately cope with the volume of inquiries after it was introduced."

"It will again be available to graduate students this coming academic year," said the department chairman, and will undoubtedly continue as a permanent course in the School of Education as long as the interest in this field remains at such a high level.

Promotion of humane education has been a fundamental focus of the Humane Society of the United States since its founding in 1954, according to Nina Austenberg, director of the Mid-Atlantic region of the Society.

"The regional office is headquartered in Bedminster and directs activities for the Society in New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania and Delaware. There are over 4,000 supporters in New Jersey alone, according to Austenberg.

"We are delighted with the work undertaken by Kean College of New Jersey and Weiger," Austenberg said, "because of the need to make people—especially young people establishing a career in education—aware of the potential problems created by human/animal interaction and to develop in youngsters a sense of responsibility and sensitivity to animal care and well-being. It is important that the children learn the

role of animals in the ecosystem."

"Weiger, a member of the Kean College faculty since 1981, notes a number of graduates of the weekly course titled "Theory and Practice in Humane Education" are already engaged professionally.

She cited Raymond Goin, who completed his thesis for his master's degree with her on the topic of humane education and is a teacher in the Parsippany Elementary School System.

Other humane education students of Weiger professionally engaged include Doris Lippman of the Mountside school system; Ruthanne Magner, an educator with the Linden schools; the United States, based in East Hartford, Conn., the privately funded, non-profit organization seeks through education to pre-

pare children at an early age to an understanding of all creatures that share our earth," Austenberg added.

In addition to the professional educational approach to humane education, the Humane Society of the United States publishes a bi-monthly, slick-paper magazine directed to the interests of children. Titled simply "Kind," it approaches humane awareness from a youngster's viewpoint. It circulates throughout the country.

"The publication supplements the classroom work of Dr. Weiger's graduate students and helps to maintain the interest of the children," Austenberg explained. "Many people consider 'KIND' to be the finest magazine available in its field."

The author of numerous articles published in magazines for professional education, Weiger was invited to address the National Council of Teachers of English at that group's annual conference in Minneapolis

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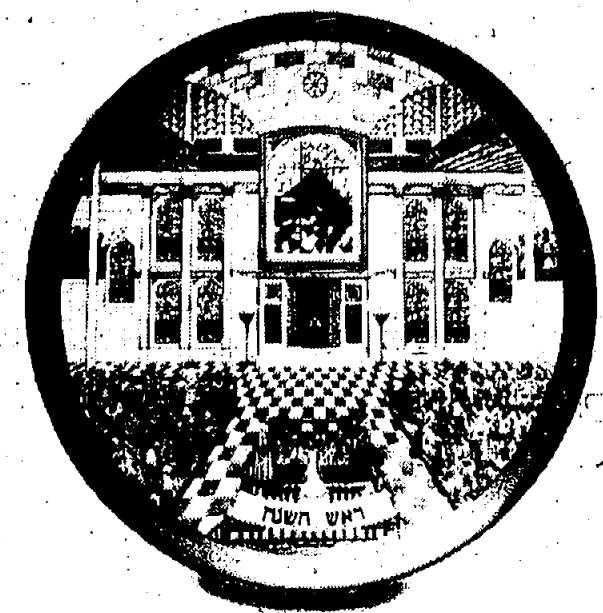
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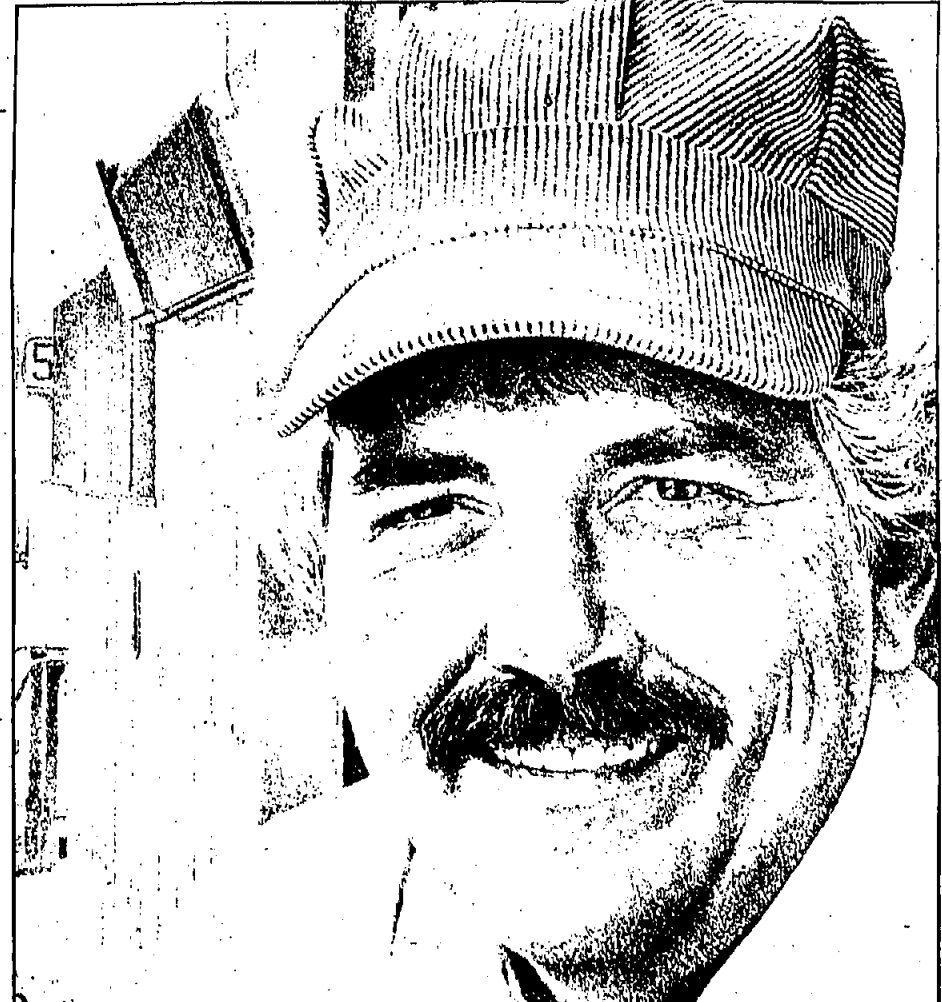

**Nursing school receives grant**  
The United States Department of Health and Human Services has awarded Seton Hall University's College of Nursing a three-year grant of \$33,536 to support and expand the graduate program.

Janet Kleinman, program director, said the grant program culminates in the award of a master of science degree in nursing. The curriculum embraces three semesters plus one summer session and has produced 43 graduates since the inception of the program in 1978.

Under the Seton Hall program the students' first clinical experiences involve "healthy" aged individuals. Chosen practice sites are community settings such as senior citizens centers, high-rise apartment buildings for senior citizens, and boarding homes for aged veterans.

During the second semester, the students begin to assume management of clients' health programs. Sites selected for this phase of the program are those that provide a full range of services. At each site physicians who support the efforts of the gerontologic nurse practitioner are available to serve as preceptors.

During the third semester students develop the primary health care role in an extended care facility.

## Food stamp reports

New federal regulations requiring food stamp participants to report income monthly will improve administration and curb abuse in the program, according to a New Jersey State Department of Human Services spokesman.

"We find that monthly reporting helps to insure that clients are reporting income and family changes information," said Sharon Postel, project director of the Monthly Reporting System.

"In the Aid to Families With Dependent Children Program, we have a 92 percent response in monthly reporting by recipients," Postel said.

"Our eligibility workers like the fact that they have more control over caseloads with reports coming in every month," she added.

"They love to have to get on reports promptly and if a client doesn't report, the worker can take action for non-compliance." Benefits are based primarily on a household's size and monthly income.

Under the new rule, if a household fails to submit the required monthly report of income after it has been notified, its food stamp benefits may be terminated.

Another feature of the new rules requires states to look at past income during household certification as well as anticipated income, said Ralph Picone, regional food stamp director for U.S. Department of Agriculture's Food and Nutrition Service.

Assistant Agriculture Secretary Mary C. Jarrett said the new reporting requirements will be both accurate and cost saving to the department.

"It will improve the program's operation because it will base benefits on a family's actual financial status rather than anticipating what next month's status will be," she explained.

The new rule is expected to save \$200 million in fiscal year 1984, Jarrett said, when all states must have the system implemented.

# Fishermen call 'Connie' for info

"When Canyon Connie says 'don't sail, you don't' is the word being passed among knowledgeable fishing boat skipper from Black Canyon of Montauk Point to Baltimore Canyon of Delaware Bay.

Canyon Connie is the recorded voice that dispenses weather information on a daily basis to offshore fishermen through the office of Get Filmin, Rutgers University's marine extension agent for Monmouth, Ocean and Atlantic counties.

Since May 1981, the forecasts and other related information Filmin provides have been helping canyon sport fishermen, commercial longliners, potters and draggers who work the continental shelf and slope to decide whether to risk money, time and, often, lives to bring in the day's catch.

Through feedback from anglers themselves, in calls or written testimonials, Filmin estimates the forecasts are running a 90 to 95 percent accuracy rate.

During peak season, the recording has been averaging about 300 calls a week and as many as 170 have been received over a single weekend, says Filmin, who is a member of the Cooperative Extension Service at the State University of New Jersey's Cook College.

Filmin gets the forecasts from the Bendix Field Engineering Corporation's Marine Service Division in Peterboro, an industry adviser to the N.J. Sea Grant program. Bendix, involved in worldwide weather forecasting for transoceanic shipping, donates the forecast to the Marine Advisory Service, which is part of Cooperative Extension.

The information is received by a teleprinter in the Ocean County Agriculture Center, where it is recorded for playback to county callers.

Consisting of a weather synopsis, an immediate forecast and a three-day five-day outlook, the information can be obtained by calling (201) 346-1152 between 4:30 p.m. and 8:30 a.m. daily, and round-the-clock over the weekend.

"To fishermen who put a considerable investment into their business or sport," Filmin says, "accurate forecasting can mean the difference between a profitable trip or a bust."

Bendix's information, he says, fills the gap between the coastal forecasts (up to 20 miles offshore) by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration weather radio from New York City and the high seas forecast broadcast by the National Weather Service on the side-band radio. The area served by Filmin is the continental shelf, approximately 75 to 90 miles from shore.

The charts show such data as the location and movement of the Gulf Stream and its related warm water eddies, sea surface temperatures and temperature gradients of the continental shelf and slope.

Filmin gets the charts at different times through the week, copies them and mails most within a day to some 115 "subscribers" from Maine to North Carolina, including commercial fishermen, charter captains and private sport fishermen.

"Almost all fish are somewhat temperature-dependent and knowledge of the location of certain water temperatures or fronts can be very important to successful fishing," he says.

Data on ocean surface temperatures have existed in various forms for several years, according to Filmin, "but there has been a problem getting it to fishermen in real time."

So, shortly after he began the weather forecasts, Filmin made arrangements to receive by teleprinter various ocean temperature charts

Knowledge of the location and behavior of the eddies is valued by fishermen of all types and for different reasons. Commercial swordfish longliners are particularly interested in the edges of the eddies, where the temperatures are conducive to good fishing.

Those who scour the bottom for lobsters, red crab and tlefish want to avoid the eddy that might pass through the area where their gear is set and snarl it with substrate spinning.

Eddy position can also be important to offshore commercial druggers who can achieve better fuel efficiency by towing their nets with the motion of the eddy instead of against it.

Sport fishermen and charter captains can locate areas where game fish are most likely to be instead of steaming all over the ocean trying to get a strike.

"A fisherman can spend upwards of \$500 a trip only to come up empty-handed because he couldn't find fish or he was turned back by horrendous weather conditions," Filmin says.

The marine agent's efforts in both the weather forecasts and the ocean temperature data have won high praise from the fishermen he serves as well as his own professional peers.

A Long Island sport fishing association called the canyon weather forecasts "the greatest single thing that has happened to the sport of us involved in this fishery."

"The accuracy of your forecast has proved time and again to the skeptics, and we all agree that if Canyon Connie says 'don't sail, you don't'."
