## Hardship hike denied

The Springfield Township Committee unanimously upheld a decision by the Rent Leveling Board to deny a hardship increase to the landlord of Troy Hills Condominiums, formerly known as Troy Village Apartments, at its meeting Tuesday.

The appeal, applied for by Troy Ltd., which manages the complex for the owner, East Coast Condo Tech, Inc., was heard by the committee in a chamber packed with residents who represented the tenants from about 161 units in the complex still being rented.

The applicant's attorney and the attorney for the Troy Village Tenants Association, presented arguments and answered questions for more than an hour.

After two days of hearings in May and July, the Rent Leveling Board unanimously turned down the applicant's request for a hardship increase. According to Michael Herzinger, chairman of the board, the hardship was denied because the "standardized expenses" claimed by the applicant, "were not actually spent."

According to Leonard Zucker, attorney for the tenants association, the landlord's adjusted expenses, "were only 49 percent of the gross rentals." The municipal ordinance states an applicant must show that 60 percent of his income went toward expenses before he can reach the threshold of claiming a hardship.

In his presentation, Zucker said

## School board unity seems to be in jeopardy

Although Springfield Board of Education members have claimed many times in the past few months that they are united and will work together, it was not apparent at their conference session Oct. 3.

At the meeting, the board discussed the proposed review of a school board policy, a handicapped student's application and a new teacher appointment. The board was expected to act upon these issues at last night's regular meeting.

According to Board Vice President Stuart Appelbaum, sparks began flying again after two recent incidents which Board President George Gomes believes have "compromised" his position.

One instance which has apparently revived friction between board members involved a contract negotiating session with teachers. According to Appelbaum, Gomes, who serves as chairman of the Teachers' Negotiating Committee, was angered when the board held negotiating talks with teachers Sept. 25, after he had attempted to call the meeting off.

As Gomes explained it, he was asked by the board's negotiating attorney, Frank Peterpaul, if he thought it would be beneficial for the board to hold a negotiating session on Sept. 25, without the presence of state mediator Robert Wenkley, who had been assisting the two sides with bargaining talks.

Gomes said he told Peterpaul that he did not think it would be wise for the board and the Springfield Education Association to meet without Wenkley. "I believed it would have been detrimental to the position the board had taken," Gomes said. He added that no one was aware of which side he was on.

## PTA seeks apology from Baruchin

A vote of "no confidence" taken in the performance of the Superintendent of Springfield Schools and the Board of Education secretary by PTA members a month ago, was followed up last night by a request for an apology from Superintendent Fred Baruchin for his responses to the PTA's action.

The vote was taken after a group of PTA Council members toured the schools on the first day of the school year and inspected lavatory facilities. In a report to the board, signed by PTA Council President Doreen Franko, the group found many lavatories were not supplied with toilet tissue and cleaning supplies, and they also found floors covered with dead bugs, rodent droppings and broken tiles.

"The women were most upset, however, by discovering a lavatory pipe with exposed asbestos, a cancer-causing insulation material."

The vote of no confidence was announced at a Sept. 13 board meeting. The PTA members said they were "tired" of a number of conditions at the schools, such as unsanitary



### Coletti discusses the job

## County view: from image to garbage

Acting County Manager Louis J. Coletti will lose part of his title tomorrow when he is sworn in as Union County manager at 4:30 p.m.

Coletti, deputy county manager since June, spoke out last week — in his last few days of being in an "acting" capacity — on the pros and cons of a John E. Rummels Hospital land sale, the county's image and its solid waste disposal dilemma — what he called "the number one problem facing the state of New Jersey." Coletti said that the county began to advertise for requests of qualification Oct. 4 in its search for a potential resource recovery plant. Such a plant has been proposed as an alternative to compensate for the anticipated closing of a dump site many Union County communities are now using, Industrial Land Reclaiming landfill in Edison.

Potential contractors will first be scrutinized for their ability to do the job, based upon past work on similar resource recovery projects, Coletti said. The "top three to five firms" will then be asked to submit cost proposals, he added. "We want to see qualifications first and costs

second," Coletti explained. "We're just not interested in somebody using Union County as a guinea pig. And there's a new twist — the Carteret announcement. Coletti was referring to a proposal made last week for construction of an incineration facility in Carteret in Middlesex County. That, he said, would offer "competition for resource recovery" in Union County.

"Union County has to seriously assess the Carteret proposal," Coletti said. He added that, while he has "had no formal contact from anyone concerning the proposal," sharing the Carteret facility with several other counties could be less costly than constructing a facility at an estimated cost of \$200 million. But Union County will continue "to develop our own plans, which gives us another option," Coletti said. "Resource recovery has two benefits," he added. "It's environmentally sounder than using landfills, and the reality of the situation is that New Jersey is a state that doesn't have any more available land for landfills. If we constructed a regional facility, it would be tremendously less costly than the only other alternative the state has offered which is to send our garbage to Ocean County. The cost will be astronomical if we're forced to do that."


On the issue of rebuilding and expanding Rummels Hospital, Berkeley Heights, Coletti said, "Everyone agrees that we need a new facility," although project funding remains unresolved. Coletti said that selling land at the site of the hospital in order to finance building costs for the facility's expansion is "a viable option."

The alternative, borrowing to cover both hospital building costs and the construction of a new state mandated county jail, would "harm" the county's bond rating, he asserted. "The jail and Rummels are the two single largest capital construction projects ever undertaken by Union County," he said, adding that Union County jail "does not meet federal or state standards."

"The county can't afford to undertake both at once and still keep its AAA bond rating. We own a tremendous amount of property," Coletti said of the Rummels site, adding that the potential for profits "depends on what parcel of land is decided to be sold. It's going to take some more thought. What land do we sell off? How much of it?" These are "still open questions," Coletti also maintained that the state should more frequently take fiscal responsibility for the programs it mandates,

claiming that county government is required to pay for a disproportionate amount of state mandated programs, mainly through property taxes. "I think it's absolutely right that the state begins to assume some of the mandated costs that they traditionally impose upon county government," he said. "The judiciary is probably the first cost the state should consider funding. We have absolutely no control from an administrative standpoint over those funds."

"It's a state service," Coletti continued, "and if it's a state service, the state should pay for it. A situation that is improved but not yet completed," Coletti said, is that of the county's image. Referring to events that led to the resignation of his predecessor Arthur Grisi — the reports that Grisi had been seeking a meeting with reputed mob figure John Riggi — Coletti said they denigrated the reputation of county officials. "The most immediate concern I have — based on events early in 1984 — is restoring Union County's credibility, and reinforcing the integrity of at least the administrative officials, bringing back the level of professionalism this county has had a very strong tradition of having," Coletti said. "I think time will eventually restore the public's confidence," he continued. "I think we've made progress, but I don't think that we've completely overcome that perception."

## Bookviews

Health is a natural concern for all of us, but in recent years we've all been bombarded with news from so-called experts that everything we eat and breath will kill us off. In this column we're going to look at books that examine various aspects of how safe we are in a complex world.

Talking about the world, perhaps the best news comes from Julian L. Simon and Herman Kahn who have written "The Resourceful Earth" (\$19.95, Basil Blackwell) to refute the notions that things are getting worse. In fact, this book's 580-plus pages suggest a less crowded, less polluted world by the year 2000, along with many other aspects of life which are a tribute to Mother Nature's ability to provide for us all.

If the specter of cancer haunts you, then read Edith Efron's marvelous expose, "The Apocalypses: Cancer and the Big Lie" (\$19.95, Simon & Schuster) which is subtitled, "How environmental politics controls what we know about cancer." Ms. Efron rips apart all the doom-saying and erroneous scientific information that suggests we all are on the brink of getting cancer from chemicals and

other things in the environment. Someone ought to pin a medal on this author for the clarity she brings to a complex subject. This is one of the most important books published in 1984.

That doesn't mean you shouldn't give up smoking if you still do. No question about it; it's a major killer. You'll get real angry after you read "The Smoke Ring: Tobacco, Money & Multi-national Politics" by Peter Taylor (\$18.95, Pantheon) because he explains how governments, despite plenty of evidence, put "wealth before health" to aid all those involved. The cigarette industry spends \$2 billion in advertising to keep people puffing and millions more to buy the politicians and influence the media.

"Normal Accidents" by Charles Perrow (\$21.95, Basic Books) looks at the high-risk technologies such as nuclear energy we are being asked to live with these days and suggests that blind faith in the scientists promising benefits and paradise should be scrapped in favor of some commonsense concerns so that Three Mile Island incidents don't recur. He predicts future catastrophes if some brakes aren't

applied. "Office Work Can Be Dangerous To Your Health" (\$8.95, Pantheon softcover) is an excellent review of the many health hazards such as poor air quality and inadequate fire safety procedures that threaten the lives of millions of office workers.

"Healthy Living in an Unhealthy World" (\$15.95, Simon & Schuster) is a hypochondriac's delight because it identifies all kinds of awful stuff, but happily suggests ways to offset their effects. The book I liked even better is "Detox" (\$13.95, Jeremy P. Tarcher, Inc.) by Phillis Salfier, M.D. and Maria Zellerbach. This book outlines a program to help anyone free themselves from an addictive reliance on nicotine, drugs, alcohol, caffeine, both prescription and non-prescription medicines, and things like junk food, sugar, and of course the chemicals which are supposed to be everywhere. This book is filled with good advice, but it gets carried away with endless warnings that include...the ingredients in soap! If a book can help, I suppose this one is as good as any other.

One way to stop worrying endlessly is to read "The 100 percent natural, Purely Organic Cholesterol-Free, Megavitamin

Low-Carbohydrate Nutrition HOAX" by Dr. Elizabeth M. Whelan and Dr. Frederick J. Stare (\$7.95, Atheneum) and, along with "The Apocalypses" should be must reading if you want to get to the truth of all those experts who advise weird diets and exercise programs. I recommend this book highly for its commonsense, yet scientific look at so much of the nonsense being foisted on us all.

One interesting book that's come my way is "Bypassing Bypass" (\$16.95, Stein & Day) which examines the still-controversial process of chelation therapy. Chelation is said to dramatically increase circulation as a non-surgical procedure to aid the heart. This holds out new hope to those with atherosclerosis causing clogged arteries and is said to be safe and painless.

Lastly, here's a roundup of books dealing with various diseases. "Lupus: The Body Against Itself" by Sheldon Paul Blau, M.D. and Dodi Schulz (\$12.95, Doubleday) has just been reissued in a completely updated and revised edition. This disease attacks a half million Americans, a majority of whom are young women. "Diabetes" by Richard K. Bernstein, M.D. (\$8.95, J.P. Tarcher) offers a "Glucograf" method for normalizing blood sugar and is now available in softcover. Also from the same publisher comes "Freedom From Chronic Disease" (\$7.95, J.P. Tarcher softcover) in the form of a drug-free nutritional program for managing health problems. Your move.

If you have a health problem or want to avoid one, there's a book out there to help you.

Industry is a four-piece band from Long Island, N.Y., originated in 1978 by percussionist Mercury Coronia, whose concept was tentatively entitled, "Industrial Complex." Industry began to expand slowly, first incorporating Brian Unger as lead guitarist. A former member of the group American Tears on Columbia Records, Unger owned a 6-track studio (Paris Recording), which became headquarters for the group. To this day, Industry's writing and rehearsing are carried out in a recording station in Paris.  
According to Unger, "We were very lucky to have the advantage of our own recording studio. We began, and continue to constantly strive for sonic perfection. Being born in the studio, Industry's orientation lies in that direction—the perfection of the sonic medium. We are dedicated to experimentation with new equipment and the utilization of different instruments, but we most definitely retain a deep respect for the romance and harmonies of earlier generations."

Over the last few years, Industry grew to include lead vocalist-keyboardist Jon Carin. Having recently turned 18, this versatile musician began training himself at the early age of four, and is now proficient, as are all members of Industry, on several different instruments. He studied synthesizer with Herb Deutsch, the man who helped develop the instrument, and began composing at the age of 12. By 14, he was recording his songs in his own home studio.  
Three months after Jon joined Industry, longtime acquaintance Rudy Perrone stepped in on bass guitar to complete the foursome. Perrone, who had previously recorded in 1977 alongside Mercury with the group Cathedral on Della Records, also put out an independent solo project in 1981, entitled "Oceans of Art."  
Industry's music is the result of varying collaborative efforts within the group, as each member serves as singer and songwriter. All of the members are basically self-taught musicians and all have highly-skilled engineering abilities.  
The group is composed of Carin,

lead vocals, keyboards, synthesizer; Coronia, vocals, drums; Perrone, vocals, bass, and Unger, vocals, lead guitar.



## Fall is time for home fix-ups and improvements

Allow to dry and check for any spackle shrinkage. If any depression has occurred, fill in and smooth the new area with additional spackle.

After spot has dried, lightly sand area using fine sandpaper—be sure to include perimeter, feathering the dried spackle with the adjacent wall area. Dust the area.

## Storm windows give clear view of energy savings

Thousands of homeowners install storm windows and doors each year. If you are one of those planning on investing in storm windows this season, here's a tip on how to make sure that the storm windows you buy will be year-round energy savers.

Instead of conventional insect screens that usually come on most storm windows and cover only the bottom half of the window, specify that your storm windows be equipped with a full screen made of solar screening.

This way, you'll get a window that will help you keep the heat inside during winter months and outside during summer months. And, you'll have a storm window that will pay for itself much faster in the form of lower heating and cooling bills.

How much faster? Well, a survey done by a Houston, Texas, utility company a few years ago showed an estimated pay-back period for storm windows to be from about 18 to almost 30 years, depending on whether you install them yourself or hire a contractor.

The same survey showed that solar screens could pay for themselves on summer energy costs along in two to three years, even if

contractor-installed. These screens block up to 70 percent of the sun's heat and glare for "instant" comfort on a bright sunny day.

The pay-back on a storm window equipped with a full-length solar screen should be considerably shorter than that for a conventional storm window alone.

By "piggy-backing" the two products together, you'll save on installation costs and have a window that is year-round energy efficient.

If full solar radiation is desirable on some windows, for example, south-facing windows, the solar screens can be removed and stored during the winter months.

Most energy auditors agree that windows are usually the least energy-efficient part of any building. In the winter, heat escapes through and around windows to the cold outside.

Since heat always travels in one direction, from warm to cold, the process reverse itself in summer...with outside heat radiating toward the cooler inside. The extra layer of insulation provided by solar screens helps to keep the heat where you want it, year-round.

In addition, solar screens work year-round to help protect draperies, carpets and upholstered furniture against fading. Solar screening comes in several colors and choices so you can enhance the exterior of your home.

Solar screens also provide daytime privacy...you can see out, but not in. And, they keep the bugs out when your windows are open.

Since the solar screening is an open mesh, woven of fiberglass, gentle breezes can come in, allowing healthier, natural ventilation.

If you're shopping for storm windows, ask for solar screening as an option. It will cost a few extra dollars now, but it will save you energy dollars for years to come.

If you already have storm windows, a screen shop can install full solar screens for you. Look in the telephone book under "Screens—Door and Window" or "Storm Windows and Doors."

## Textured paint can give the home a new 'feeling'

Are you in a "decorating dilemma"? The colorful, imaginative use of textured paint could be the answer. After it is brushed on, this paint can be simply and easily designed so that it

enhances and complements the style and feeling of almost any room in the house. It is also useful for effectively disguising walls that contain surface imperfections.

Any instrument can be used to pattern the paint before it dries. Try a comb, a piece of cardboard, or even a feather. For a stucco appearance, use a paint roller intended for use with textured paint.

Combine two complementary colors by making a random pattern or design in the wet paint using an unsharpened pencil. After the paint dries, fill in the impressions with a slightly deeper shade of the wall color or a preferred shade.

Textured paint is available in red, green, gold, tan and white, and in a variety of grains from coarse to fine. Textured paints can also be covered with flat latex wall paint to blend with your particular design scheme.

The following instructions, from the National Paint and Coatings Association, illustrate how to bring this versatile decorating product to your house.

• Clean the surface of all dirt and grease. Large cracks should be patched and glossy surfaces sanded to remove any sheen. Wallpaper and

paste should be removed prior to painting.

• Spread the textured paint using a paint roller or brush. For best results, limit your work area to one square yard at a time. This allows you to make sure the paint is evenly

spread and gives you better control over the design.

• Seal bare spots or areas of pattern irregularity with extra applications of the paint. To prevent paint build-up, applications should be limited to a 1/4 inch in depth.

## Look now for exterior needs

Fall weekends are ideal for homeowners to check their home's exterior for those telltale signs that signal a need for home repair projects.

The following tips from home improvement experts will help the homeowner assess the need for repainting their house.

Begin your home inspection by examining the south side of your home, which is subjected to the most wear, to determine how your previous paint coat is holding up.

Don't make the mistake of trying to conceal problems by merely painting over them. The problem won't be solved and will just get worse in time. A few hours of work now will save more time and expense later on.

Look high and low for problem areas. Here are a few things to look for and how best to handle them.

Mildew, discoloration or excessive bleeding is usually a sign of moisture damage, the most common problem found on homes.

Rain, frost, snow, and fog all gradually attack even the toughest exterior coatings. Combine these with moisture vapor from the interior and it can add up to significant deterioration.

Damage that occurs outside the kitchen, bath or laundry room indicates that moisture is being trapped inside the walls. You can minimize this source of damage by installing ducted ventilator fans that allow the moisture to escape.

If the surface of your home is flaking or excessively brittle, you should remove the old paint down to the bare wood.

There are several ways to take off old paint. The least expensive is a paint scraper, a wire brush, and lots of elbow grease. An electric sander can save time, and your arms, but is somewhat more costly. A water-soluble chemical remover sounds

## Solution to cramped kitchen

## Interior designer's mini-talk pays maxi-dividends

In response to a growing number of requests for on-the-spot decorating assistance, Short Hills interior designer Roberta Kopstein has developed what she calls the "mini consultation." This concept enables her to solve a multitude of decorating problems for a lot less time and money than is generally required for the conventional residential or contract design consultation.

During the meeting in the client's home of office, she gives professional advice on color, space plans, window and wall treatment, carpeting, lighting and accessories, for part of a room, one room or an entire house or office. Much of the planning can be accomplished in a single session.

"It's amazing what can be done in a couple of hours," remarked Kopstein, a graduate of the Parsons School of Design. "Sometimes it amounts to just kicking off my shoes, rearranging the furniture and accessories and coming up with a totally new effect."

She feels that rooms are often deficient in the comfort and function for which they were intended. Additional seating may be required or there may be too many elements vying for recognition in the space. Sometimes, the client who has collected furnishings over a lifetime lacks the objectivity to fit the room together. Kopstein's specialty is unifying the space from both a functional and aesthetic point of view.

The scope of her consultation varies greatly. For example, she recently received a frantic phone call from a woman who was about to have the interior of her home repainted. After settling on the colors, the women realized that without some kind of design advice, she would make the same mistakes she'd been making for years.

"Within two hours," Kopstein said, "we created a harmony and balance in which color literally flowed from room to room."

In another instance, an artistic friend who had a very clear idea of the look she wanted for her living room, was told by a department store decorator that the desired effect could not be achieved for less than \$15,000. Using Kopstein's design expertise, the job was done for a fraction of the first estimate by rearranging and reupholstering furniture, painting the walls a striking shade of dark brown enamel and installing recessed lighting. Somewhat different was the predicament of a young couple who had just enough money to buy a new home but virtually nothing left over for furniture. Kopstein prepared a schedule for them covering their decorating activities over the next five years — with emphasis on purchasing quality merchandise.

Kopstein also works with doctors and other professionals who want to update the interiors of their office while maintaining a limited decorating budget.

Overall, she described her design role as "providing very definite guidelines governing proportion, style and color, but always within the framework of the client's preferences and budget." Although purchases may be made through her, doing so is not a condition of her services. Occasionally clients have sources of their own, in which case Kopstein requests that they provide samples and photographs for her to review.

Double-domed acrylic glazing lets the sunlight penetrate the skylight where its heat is captured to warm the house.
