 Important for human beings. But my God is in my head, not my heart. I'm a proud Jew, but not a religious Jew."
 Clary married Natalie Cantor, one of Eddie Cantor's daughters, 20 years ago. "She has a son from her first marriage," he says, "and I now have three grandchildren. I also have a sense of humor. If I don't bounce back, I might as well kill myself."
 "My grandchildren have been told about my life, including the little five-year-old. I sat down and talked

with them, and now they know all about it. They, and all the other children in the world are saying, 'You owe me a legacy. You have to tell me.' So, I decided to write it down. I hope it, lecture about it."
 "What the survivors have to do is go to the Los Angeles center and videotape their testimony. Most of them don't speak good English." (Clary himself has a slight French accent). "It's very important. You have to do it before you die. Put it on paper. Some cannot express themselves. It's very painful. Yet, we all have the same stories. There's nothing wrong with being emotional, nothing wrong with that."
 "If it was not gratifying to let people know about the Holocaust," Clary says, "I would have stopped long ago. I have received a great many letters that say, 'We will not forget. We will teach our children.' I also have received threatening phone calls from a man with a heavy accent. Nazi? It's possible. I have changed my phone number."
 Clary, who has appeared on Broadway in "New Faces of 1982," and in such films as "Schindler's

Heaven," "La Plume de Ma Tante," "Around the World in 80 Days" and "Sugar," is best known for his role as the French prisoner of war, Louis Lebeau, in the TV comedy series, "Hogan's Heroes."
 In the question and answer period at the Wilkins Theater Thursday, one youngster asked him if he felt uncomfortable playing a POW. "I haven't any regrets doing 'Hogan's Heroes,'" he explained. "Hogan's Heroes didn't deal with Nazi camps. It dealt with a prisoner of war camp. It was completely different. As prisoners, we had enough to eat. In fact, we were comfortable, and we made fun of the German soldiers, not the Nazis."
 "I enjoyed six years of 'Heroes,' and I became filthy rich."

"My philosophy is to stop hating everyone you can do that, and start liking each other. You can do it."
 "We all don't want to die. We want to live as long as we can. I'm looking at young people, and I know you can do it. You have to wake up and see everyone as a human being, not all is lost."

Bulldogs fall 6-0 Shocked by blocked punt in OT

 Hurt by two key injuries, key penalties and just plain bad luck, Jonathan Dayton's Bulldogs fell 6-0 in overtime to Warren Hills in the opener of the North Jersey, Section 2, Group 2 playoffs at Melsel Field, Springfield, Saturday.

The lone tally of the game came when Jack Throckmorton of Warren Hills returned a blocked punt five yards for a touchdown with 1:59 gone in the overtime period. Observers who expected a defensive struggle were not disappointed. The Bulldogs turned in one of their most impressive performances of the year. They held Warren Hills to just four first downs and 99 total yards — only 35 on the ground and 64 in the air. The deepest penetration by the Warren Hills offense was to the Dayton 35-yard line.

Dayton, who had 12 first downs, gained only 152 total yards — 75 yards on the ground and 78 in the air. The offense was crippled early on as both Darren Iacone, who is Dayton's starting punter, halfback, and safety, and tackle David Cole suffered first quarter injuries and did not return.

Dayton's inability to score on two possessions set up the defeat. It appeared that the Bulldogs would be able to capitalize on a big play turned in by junior cornerback Chris Cavanaugh in the first quarter. He picked off a pass from Warren Hills quarterback Doug Shriver at midfield and returned it 47 yards to the three.


On first and goal, prior to his injury, Iacone dove ahead for a one-yard gain. On second and goal from the two, quarterback Matt Graziano muffed the snap from center, but recovered for a two-yard loss. On third and goal, the Bulldogs attempted a sweep left, but a were called for holding. Pushed back to the 20 by the 15-yard penalty, Graziano threw into the end zone, but was intercepted, the first of four, and Warren Hills had stopped the threat.

Late in the fourth quarter, the Bulldogs mounted another drive. On a trick play, Graziano threw behind the line of scrimmage to backup QB Tony Policare, who lined up in the slot. Policare delivered a 35-yard strike to Tom Kisch for a first down deep in Warren Hills territory. Two short passes to split end John Lusardi followed and Dayton was on the 24-yard line. Graziano aimed for the end zone, but was again intercepted by Scott Stanilish, his third, and Warren Hills was again frustrated.

"We thought we had it then," recalled coach Tony Policare. "We had a lot of momentum at that time."
 At the start of the overtime, Dayton chose to receive, but got poor field position deep in its own territory. Two sweeps went for no gain, and then the Bulldogs were called for off sides. With the ball on their own five, Policare opted for a quick kick on third down. Backup Levent Bayrasli's punt was

deflected to his right at the line and Throckmorton recovered and went over for the score and game.
 "We just did not have a good day at quarterback," said Policare. "Three of Graziano's passes were knocked down at the line of scrimmage. Warren Hills has a good forcing defense."
 Policare also noted that after Iacone was injured, the Bulldogs were forced to go with a one-back offense. That back was Bayrasli who came into the game nursing an injury. "He was only at about 80 percent," he said.

Policare called Warren Hills "outstanding." The '92 team's only losses came in a last-second decision to Hackensack and to a powerful Randolph squad. He noted that his opposite number, Jeff Swinson, called Dayton's the best defense his team has seen all season.
 Policare, though, obviously disappointed, is optimistic about the future. His squad, now at 5-4 for the season, is a young one which will have many players returning next year. "After the game," said Policare, "I told them that I love them all and that we've got some talent. We played very good defense with seven kids who are underclassmen, including three sophomores. Warren Hills is basically a team of experience — all seniors — and that's where we'll be next year."

Town gathers to give thanks

An impressive crowd turned out for the first large-scale production of a community-wide Thanksgiving celebration held Sunday at Jonathan Dayton Regional High School.

More than 400 residents attended the affair, along with more than 100 who participated in a variety of musical and poetic readings, including the Community Opera of New Jersey, and many township organizations which set up booths to explain their programs.
 The day's program explained its purpose. "This Thanksgiving Celebration is lovingly brought to you by the people who live, work and meet in Springfield, a community rich in heritage and very gifted people."

According to the Rev. Jeffrey Curtis, one of the program's coordinators, the idea was conceived by the Springfield Clergy Association several months ago.

Janice Bongiovanni, co-coordinator, said the program took the place of this year's traditional Thanksgiving Eve service that is held annually by alternating houses of worship.
 Mayor Philip Feintuch made a welcoming address and read President Reagan's Thanksgiving proclamation.
 Musical numbers were performed

by choirs from Jonathan Dayton, the Florence Gaudinier School, the Senior Citizens, "Young At Heart Singers," the Springfield Emanuel United Methodist Church, Temple Sha'arey Shalom, the First Presbyterian Church and St. James Church.
 The entire production was written by Sid Frank, and conceived and directed by Ron Brown. Frank and Brown have also written a song entitled "Union County, New Jersey," which they have proposed for the county's theme song.
 Historical and poetic readings were performed by the Dayton Drama Class.

Karlsberg autopsy released

An autopsy report indicates that Dr. Herbert Karlsberg, 65, husband of murder victim Sylvia Karlsberg, died Nov. 8 from coronary disease, according to Springfield police.

Springfield Police Detective James Hietala said the dentist's body was discovered at his Milltown Road home after his office notified police that he did not show up for work that morning.
 Hietala said police are still awaiting results of a toxicological report.
 Mrs. Karlsberg was stabbed to death in the couple's home on Feb. 13, 1982. Her murder is still being investigated.

More asbestos work planned

 At its meeting Nov. 14, the Springfield Board of Education approved a plan to begin preparations for asbestos removal in Springfield schools over the mid-winter recess.

The board has targeted three areas: a custodial closet in the Thelma Sandmeier School, a lavatory in Eve Lombardi's classroom in the James Caldwell School, and the Caldwell School Art Room.
 Leo Eisen, chairman of the Building and Grounds Committee, said the asbestos present in the above locations is not the friable or loose type that has been linked to lung disorders and cancer.
 He said the board's action is a precautionary measure because the pipes are located in areas where children can poke at them and expose the asbestos.
 The firm of Shive, Spinelli, et al. was approved to draw the plans and specifications for the removal project. Martin Spinelli also made the specifications for asbestos removal in the district in December 1983.
 Doreen Franko, president of the PTA Council, requested the board to use another firm for the removal, "because the work was not adequately completed the first time."
 Board member Lou Monaco also recommended using another architectural firm. "I think it's time for a new philosophy regarding asbestos removal," Monaco said.

The majority of the board felt that shopping for a new architect would further delay the project.
 DiGiovanni said he would supervise the asbestos removal.
 The state Board of Health visited the district's three schools Nov. 15 for an asbestos examination. According to DiGiovanni, the state will issue report shortly on their findings.
 Franko, who accompanied the state inspector on a tour of the Caldwell School, commented, "As it stands now, we probably don't have any asbestos flying around in the air, but at any given time it could become a hazard." The PTA Council has requested the board to authorize the removal of asbestos in "all student-occupied areas," according to Franko.
 The board also approved demolition plans for its newly-purchased property at 48 Caldwell Place. DiGiovanni said the demolition work will not begin prior to 9 a.m. and will cease from 2:30 to 3:30 p.m. The work is expected to begin within the next few weeks, DiGiovanni said.

The Helping Hand program got its go-ahead from the board, who is sanctioning the program through the PTA's.
 The district's three cafeteria workers were awarded an average increase of 45 cents per hour, according to Ken Falgenbaum, finance chairman, while the cafeteria manager received a \$800 increase.
 Three substitutes were added to the district's list, including Ruth

Luciani, a former teacher and substitute and wife of board member Dr. Richard Luciani.
 Kate Greenpool, board attorney, rendered a legal interpretation of the board's policy concerning conflict of interest, specifically the employment of a spouse or relative in the district.
 Greenpool advised that as long as Luciani had been approved by prior boards, before her husband was elected, she could remain a substitute.
 He also said that Luciani could vote on his wife's employment, as long as her name was a part of a collective list.
 The board approved the first reading of changes in three policies that concern the appointments of committee members. The policies were amended to evenly-distribute the authority of making committee appointments between the board president and vice president.
 Also approved was a plan to eliminate the use of substandard classrooms and a four-year maintenance plan.
 The district was cited for using substandard classrooms when it was reviewed by a state monitoring team in January because it had not made a formal application to the state for permission to use the rooms.
 The maintenance plan is also a certification requirement. It provides an overall plan for large-scale maintenance projects such as, plumbing, electrical work, heating and paving.



Bogus trademarks targeted: Rinaldo

Rep. Matthew J. Rinaldo, R-7th District, says that tough new laws passed by Congress to crack down on counterfeit products could save the country thousands of jobs and hundreds of millions of dollars annually.

Rinaldo said the new law makes it a criminal offense for the first time to engage in trademark counterfeiting. This means that unscrupulous operators will no longer be able to copy famous name brands right down to the serial numbers without running the risk of a jail sentence and a hefty fine.

Under the new law, an individual may be imprisoned for up to five years and fined up to \$250,000 for dealing in counterfeit products or services. The penalty is even stiffer for repeat offenders, and corporations engaging in trademark infringements are subject to a fine of up to \$1 million.

Additionally, trademark owners will be able to get a court order to seize bogus products and collect for damages or profits and attorneys' fees in civil cases where a trademark is intentionally misused.

The cost of these practical activities in the U.S. economy has been enormous, Rinaldo said. "The U.S. International Trade Commission estimated that bogus products steal about \$5 billion a year from U.S. sales and put 101,000 Americans out of work. In addition, inferior counterfeit products can be hazardous to consumers."

The congressman said a study of the problems by the Energy and Commerce Committee's subcommittee on oversight and investigations found that commercial counterfeiting has spread to an amazingly wide range of products including drugs, automobile and aircraft parts, clothing, medical devices, chemicals, computers and personal care items.

Township attorney gets 'rave reviews'

SPRINGFIELD—A case that was successfully tried by a local lawyer was the subject of commentary in the most recent issue of "The Products Liability Reporter" and the "Law Reporter," the official publications of the American Trial Lawyers Association.

Springfield-based attorney Jack Wurgaft received an award in excess of \$2.2 million on behalf of an injured employee of a Newark body shop who suffered severe burn injuries from a utility light burst and ignited leaking gasoline. The Essex County jury verdict was against the manufacturer of the light upon the theory that the exposed bulb apparatus and switch encased in a plastic cage was unsafe for use in proximity to combustible liquids or vapors and that the manufacturer had failed to warn against such use. The case was developed and presented through the recollection of "witnesses" including physicians, engineers, marketing specialists and, in addition, a human factors consultant identified as to the foreseeability of the misuse which should have been anticipated by the manufacturer.



3 eggs
 1 tsp. vanilla extract

 1 T baking soda
 1/2 tsp. salt
 1 cup sour cream
 1 1/2 oz. pkg. semi-sweet chocolate morsels
 1/2 cup walnuts, chopped
 1 tsp. ground cinnamon
 Cream butter or margarine; gradually add sugar, beating until light and fluffy.
 Add egg, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Add vanilla extract.

Combine flour, baking and salt; add to creamed mixture, alternating with sour cream.
 Combine chocolate morsels; nuts and cinnamon.
 Spoon half batter in glass or lasagna dish. Sprinkle half chocolate morsel mixture.
 Microwave at medium for eight minutes, turning dish every 2 minutes; microwave at high for 6 minutes, turning dish every 2 minutes or until top surface is dry.

Bookviews

 Americans are traveling more these days and, thanks to the strong U.S. dollar, are enjoying benefits from overseas travel. Tourism is emerging as a major industry in America and, having traveled widely here, I know there is much to see and do. Let's look at some books to help your travel plans.

"Mobile Travel Guide: Major Cities 1984" (\$7.95, Rand McNally) is a terrific bargain, filled with information about 63 major U.S. cities, along with ratings to determine the quality of lodgings and restaurants. It contains maps and concise data of considerable value.

Barron's has begun to publish a series of "In Your Pocket" city guides. The first three are New York, Los Angeles and San Francisco. Each contains over 1,000 listings of museums, parks, theaters, hotels, you name it. These would be useful even to longtime residents of these cities and they are small enough to be easily carried around in a pocket or purse. They're priced at \$2.95 each.

W.W. Norton & Company is now publishing a series of "Blue Guides," long established as leading guidebooks to Europe. Even in paperback, they are not inexpensive. For example, the "Blue Guide to France" is \$19.95 in softcover and \$33.95 in hardcover. However, these "Blue Guides" pack a lot into their 1,000 pages, covering local art, history, architecture, tips on customs, food and much more.

Sophisticated travelers would certainly want to include a "Blue Guide" as part of their planning process. In the U.S., there are "Blue Guides" to both New York and Boston.

Another helpful item from Barron's is their "Phrase Book & Dictionary for Travelers" (\$4.95). I've seen the one for "French at a Glance" and it was quite impressive. They even come with a nice plastic jacket to protect them.

and fit neatly into the palm of your hand.
 For gastronomes, I can happily recommend "The Vineyard Almanac & Wine Gazetteer" (\$4.95, includes postage, from The Vineyard Almanac, POB 2641, Saratoga, Calif. 95076.) It covers all the districts of California, plus Washington, Oregon, New York, Pennsylvania and other winegrowing states, including New Jersey. And it's filled with useful data on wines.

"The New York Ethical Food Market Guide & Cookbook" (\$14.95, Dodd Mead) is another delightful softcover filled with useful data on special markets throughout the city's five boroughs, plus many exotic recipes.

Many regions around the country are getting the guidebook treatment. "The Best Places" by David Brewster, devoted to restaurants, lodging and tourism in Washington, Oregon and British Columbia (\$11.95), and "Seattle Best Places" (\$9.95), both published by Sasquatch Publishing Company, 1831 Second Ave., Seattle, Wash. 98101. Seattle may not seem a tourist destination for those who have not visited this wonderful city, but it can be a delightful place. Don't miss its great waterfront market area.

"The Traveler's Guide to Montana" (\$7.95, Falcon Press Publishing Co., POB 279, Billings, Mont. 59103) will make you want to see the Big Sky State, particularly if you're into camping, fishing, rodeos and such. Its beauty is breathtaking. Or you may prefer "A Guide To Writer's Homes in New England" (\$10.95, Applewood Books, Box 2670, Cambridge, Mass. 02139) so you can visit the homes of Robert Frost, Emily Dickinson, Mark Twain and many others with this affordable softcover.


Los Angeles is less a city than a conglomeration, but you can have lots of fun if you consult "Away for the Weekends: Great Getaways Less Than 250 Miles from Los Angeles" (\$9.95, Clarkson Potter, Inc.). Authors Michele and Tom Grimm are experts on this subject and this is a fine paperback guide.

Most self-published books are a disaster, but let me pause to recommend "Raja HaHa" by Fred Hoxter (\$3.95, Backside Press, POB 112412, San Diego, Calif. 92111-0240), which will make you laugh so hard you'll want to visit "chillipeperland," that stretch of California that touches base with Tijuana and the cities which attract so many tourists. Not a guidebook, but a barrel of fun.

Routledge & Kegan Paul are publishing a series called "Rough Guides" to countries such as Portugal, Greece, Mexico, Morocco, etc. Priced at about \$7.95 each, they have a lot of useful information for travelers who don't need to stay in five star hotels or dine in expensive restaurants. Indeed, they are intended for those who want to see a country without spending a fortune.

I think "The Insider's Guide to Japan" by Peter Popham (\$12.95, Kodansha International, softcover) is positively indispensable if you intend to visit that nation. Indeed, if you only wanted to enjoy its bounty of beautiful, full color photos, this book would be a bargain. It's just a super guide.

Lastly, if you dream of working overseas, pick up a copy of Curtis Casadesu's "Foreign Jobs: The Most Popular Countries" (\$8.95, Monarch Press, softcover), which is filled with excellent advice on the pleasures and pitfalls involved, as well as who to contact for job information, and much more.

Holiday wrap enhanced by do-it-yourself

Do you ask yourself each Christmas: "Why should I bother wrapping all these gifts when the wrapping is going to get ripped-off anyway?" Are you tired of seeing your Christmas paper end up as garbage year after year?

This Christmas, try something a bit different - wrap your gifts in a tantalizing fashion - with easy "design-your-own" gift wrap embellished with simple-to-make decorations that your friends and relatives will treasure.

Taking the time to create your own gift wrap is a great way to show someone you care. If you don't have time to make your own presents, you can still add a personal touch by packaging your gifts to give pleasure even before they're opened.



To create something extra special for your friends and relatives, simply gather together some household items, and packages or bottles of dye in traditional Christmas colors such as forest green, cardinal red, blue and gold. Then, try some of these easy, fun ways to design-your-own gift wrap:

- Turn plain white paper into personalized wrapping paper. First, trace the letters, "Merry Christmas," and the name of the gift recipient onto stencil paper using a fine-lead pencil or pen. Leave a large border around the pattern. Cut carefully through the stencil onto scrap cardboard with an art-blade knife or a small, pointed sharp scissor.
- Then, prepare a hot, concentrated dye solution in the colors you've chosen: mix 1/4 cup liquid dye in one pint of hot tap water; or dissolve one package of powder dye in one pint of hot water. Try to be careful when working with knife and hot water.
- Hold the stencil in place on the paper. Using quick, light brushstrokes, paint from the edges of the stencil toward the center of your design to keep your image clear.
- Repeat in another location, allowing time for dye to dry if stenciling is to be done nearby. Be sure to cut a new stencil for each color change.
- A man's white cotton handkerchief and white lace ribbon become festive gift packaging in just a few easy steps. First, "ombre" (dip-dye) a handkerchief, using three different dye colors within the same color family.
- This is done by first wetting the fabric and preparing a dye-bath for the lightest shade of your color choice, following package directions.
- Immerse the white handkerchief and stir for 10 minutes; remove it from the dye-bath and hang it to the side using two clip hangers.
- Then, dissolve the next darkest shade of dye and add it to the original dye-bath. Immerse just the bottom 1/2 of the handkerchief and let soak for 10 minutes. Repeat with the remaining darker shade of dye. Rinse and hang dry.
- To complete, immerse the lace ribbon in the dye-bath. When all is dry, wrap your gift with the handkerchief and tie with matching ribbon.
- This decorative gift wrap can be used later as a fashionable handkerchief or scarf and hair ribbon - an extra gift for your friends and relatives to enjoy!

A fine wine is testimony to the giver

A bottle of fine wine is a popular year-end gift. And when the wine is champagne from France, it is testimony to the donor's good taste and flattery to the recipient's.

Few wines have the special glamour and prestige of champagne. Keeping a bottle or two of the bubbly on hand at year's end is good advance planning. It makes an ideal "thank you" when visiting and a welcome addition to your own table when entertaining at one.

Champagne matches every lifestyle and any dining preference. In the Champagne region, 60 miles east of Paris, it is regularly served throughout a meal. And if you want to add sparkle to your holiday meals this season, here are one service suggestion from the Champagne News and Information Bureau.

• Brut champagne is the driest, the most versatile, and goes with virtually every dish. When in doubt, serve or give brut.

• Brut non-vintage champagne, with no year shown on the label, is blended to consistent house style year after year. A vintage brut bottling, on the other hand, may exhibit characteristics more typical of a particular year and will show the harvest — 1976, 1978 or 1979 — on the label.

• Blanc de blancs champagne is made entirely from white chardonnay grapes. It is somewhat lighter than the traditional champagne blend of red and white grapes. Someone who customarily serves wine with meals will serve blanc de blancs champagne as an aperitif, before the meal, or with fish or shellfish when seafood is the appetizer or main course.


• Rose champagne derives its pink color from the skins of red grapes and is often considered the wine of romance. Give it to be sardines on your gift list. At table, rose champagne is often served with game or red meat, as well as with cheese.

• Extra dry champagne is for people who like a touch of sweetness in their wine. This style is the ideal accompaniment to desserts, pastries or fruits of for after-dinner toasts.

• Super champagne or top-of-the-line bottlings are blended by most French producers. These are usually made from grapes grown in the highest rated vineyards, in vintage years, and are available in both golden and rose styles. Give these to the people at the top of your Christmas list.

Model Railroad Club to give annual show

The Union County Model Railroad Club, Inc., is getting ready for its annual Christmas show at club headquarters on Jefferson Avenue, south of eastbound Route 22 in Union.

The show, which will include a 60-by-160-foot layout — the largest model railroad layout in the world — will take place on three weekends: Nov. 23-25, Nov. 30-Dec. 2, and Dec. 7-9. The hours will be: Fridays, 7-10 p.m.; Saturdays, noon-10 p.m.; and Sundays, noon-6 p.m.

Among the attractions is a 1,600-square-foot HO scale model railroad, containing 28 towns and three cities, all connected by approximately 3,500 feet of track. The railroad features continuously operating trains, including a 100-car coal train, as well as trolley, traction and interurban equipment.

Also on display will be an N scale layout 60 feet long, as well as static displays of railroad artifacts and models, demonstrations of modeling techniques and skills, and a movie of the HO railroad itself taken from the engineer's viewpoint. The HO railroad will also feature a full light and sound show, explaining the design, function and operation of the layout.



Several criteria determine a cultured pearl's intrinsic value. These are:

- **Lustre** — Not surface shine, lustre is the glow which comes from within the cultured pearl, and which is revealed in the shadow area of the pearl. The greater the lustre, the higher the quality of the pearl.
- **Roundness** — Perfectly round pearls are both rare and costly. Relatively round pearls are both rare and costly. Relatively round pearls are seen by the human eye as round, and therefore pleasing. Fasciful baroque pearls are dramatic, and generally less expensive than round cultured pearls.

- **Cleanliness** — Examine cultured pearls carefully for cracks, spots and blotches which can be seen with the naked eye, for these reduce the value of the cultured pearls.
- **Color** — While most of us think of cultured pearls as being creamy

- white, with a tinge of rose, they come in a wide range of hues, from pink to black. In the United States, rose hues are preferred, and therefore are usually more costly than other colors.
- **Size** — Generally speaking, the

larger a cultured pearl is, the more expensive it will be, as a result of two factors: scarcity and demand.

- **Shape** — Symmetry is the key here, for more perfectly shaped cultured pearls generally command higher prices.
- **Matching** — As few cultured pearls are sold singly, this is a vital consideration. Because no two cultured pearls are identical, it takes a good deal of time and care to

assemble a necklace of matching cultured pearls, and even a simple pair of cultured pearl earrings. All of these factors, taken together, determine the value of a piece of cultured pearl jewelry, and should be scrupulously considered when selecting a gift of cultured pearls, a token of your affection which will be enjoyed by the recipient for many Christmases to come.

Holiday craft idea

Making your own pine cone wreath

MATERIALS

- Two 16 or 18 inch wire wreath frames
- 50 long, slender (white) pine cones to form base, and approximately 100 regular (yellow) pine cones.
- Chestnuts, burrs, tiny pine cones, twisted off rosettes of spruce cones, artificial fruit for filling in and/or accent.
- Wire for tying wreaths together and for hanging.
- Glue gun and glue sticks.
- 1½ yards of wide velvet ribbon for bow (optional).
- Clear acrylic spray (laquer).

PROCEDURE

1. Soak about 50 long, slender pine cones (the type that can be easily found in wooded areas during the fall) in water until they close.
2. Once closed, insert them like wheel spokes, alternating direction, through the wire spaces in one wreath frame.

3. Attach the two largest wires of the two frames together, back to back. If they match well, glue the wires together. If not, wire them.

4. Glue shorter, thicker pine cones (found in abundance in wooded areas during fall months) in three circular rows to the pairs of wires in the empty top frame.

5. Attach artificial fruit, if desired, leaving space for a ribbon bow. Fill in empty spaces with anything available — chestnuts, burrs, tiny cones and twisted off rosettes of spruce cones.

6. Attach a loop of wire or heavy cord for hanging and spray with several coats of clear laquer to enhance color and preserve.

7. If you have difficulty tying a satisfactory velvet bow, use the glue gun to spot-glue the loops of the bow. Then wire in place.

Floppy disk has place on holiday lists

At Christmas, purchasing the "big" items are priorities on everybody's list. If that big item happens to be a computer with a disk drive, floppy disks should be number two on the list.

They are the most vital part of a computer system, because they store all the information you've worked so hard to create. Besides, what's the point in getting this wonderful computer you've been waiting for all year, when you don't have the tools to go with it?

Selecting the right disk for a new computer system is simple. Most home and personal computer systems accept 5¼-inch floppy disks and have single-sided or double-sided storage capacity.

If you're not certain about the correct disk size and storage capacity, ask the store clerk or look on the box.

There are hundreds of floppy disks being sold and not all of them are the same. In more cases than not, you get what you pay for. Buy brand names which include a warranty, and be partial to those brands you are already familiar with.

The gift-giver must be very careful in choosing floppy disks, because computers are extremely sensitive to imperfection. Some poor quality floppy disks will be automatically rejected by the computer; others can ruin the internal mechanism in your disk drive, costing far more than you bargained for in needless disappointment and frustration. An easy testing method is to spin the floppy disk in the disk drive; if it sounds noisy, don't use it.

Disks are, first and foremost, working tools that are used over and over again and for long-term storage. Major manufacturers place a great deal of emphasis on reliability and durability both in production and rigorous testing of floppy disks.

Of course, the role of the floppy disk is to work flawlessly behind-the-scenes, while the owner has fun playing with his or her new computer system. And no time is more important to have that floppy disk perform flawlessly than when the computer is new and possibly the biggest item under the Christmas tree.

Lanterns again light the way for tourists at Mystic Seaport

For many people, Christmas just wouldn't be Christmas without a visit to Mystic Seaport.

An evening Lantern Light Tour of the Seaport is becoming a holiday tradition — one that changes slightly every year, yet always delivers the Christmas spirit early.

Other seasonal activities at the maritime museum include daytime Christmas tours, a Star of Bethlehem Show at the planetarium, the Children's Victorian-Tours, and a community carol sing. And decorations in the seaport's 19th-century village — from wreaths on doorways to evergreen trees atop ships' masts — make any excursion to the seaport a merry one.

From Dec. 7 to 22, one-hour walking-tours leave from the adjacent Seaman's Inn from 5 to 9 p.m. bringing small groups of visitors on a sensory visit to another era.

Leaving the 20th century behind, they will spend the next hour smelling gingerbread, dancing to a fiddler's tune in the tavern, singing Christmas carols and meeting a cast of characters from the past.

Housewives, sailors, fishermen and sea captains all appear in the lantern-lit journey that unfolds like scenes in a play, one in which everyone has a role. There's even a surprise appearance by St. Nicholas, the 19th-century forerunner of Santa Claus.

Led by a guide in the costume of the last century, visitors are welcomed as guests in several historic homes, learning as they go how Christmas customs evolved in past generations. In the course of the evening, participants also go aboard the whaleship "Charles W. Morgan" and walk through the cramped

quarters below decks. Though the Seaport streets may be dusted with snow, tour-goers are warmed by open hearth fireplaces and pot-bellied stoves along their way.

When the tour is over, many choose to enjoy a traditional roast goose dinner, complete with all the trimmings, at Seaman's Inn. Wassail and plum pudding are other treats to sample from the menu. Tickets go on sale early for the tours and may be scarce as the holiday approaches. Another alternative to the evening programs are group daytime tours that explore the theme, "Christmas at Sea and Ashore."

Escorted by costume guides, groups of 15 or more are given an intimate look at the seaport's village and exhibits on daytime tours from Dec. 1 to 23.

The one-hour tours trace the development of Christmas customs in the early, middle and late 1800s. Before or after the tour, groups may purchase lunch at Seaman's Inn. Advance tour reservations are required through the seaport's Travel Development department (adult groups) or the Education department (child groups).

Children can also take their own "hands-on" tour of the seaport on the three Saturdays before Christmas: Dec. 8, 15 and 22. The four-hour program includes a variety of craft activities and games from the Victorian era. The planetarium show is also included. Reservations are made through the seaport's Education Department. "The Star of Bethlehem," a half-hour planetarium show that illustrates theories about the origin of the Christmas star, is scheduled Dec. 3 to 23, both days and evenings. There is an additional charge for

private group showings, but daytime showings are free to seaport visitors.

On Dec. 23, a community carol sing brings thousands to celebrate the season with song in the seaport's Anchor Circle.

The treasures of the sea — from scrimshaw to figureheads — await discovery in the seaport's many exhibit galleries. And, in working exhibits, visitors can see blacksmithing, woodcarving, sail making, printing, weaving and other crafts demonstrated daily. The music of sea chanteys also enlivens winter afternoons at the seaport.

Local garden clubs decorate many of the seaport buildings as part of an annual competition. The decorations in the village area, however, are in keeping with the history of each structure.

The Buckingham House, for example, built in the 1760s, is undecorated, reflecting the beliefs of its original residents — Congregationalists who observed the holiday without frivolity.

The 1820s Burrows House, however, dates to a later era when Christmas was a recognized holiday in Connecticut. Handmade decorations, ornaments and gifts were the order of the day.

And, in the Victorian Greenman House, home of a wealthy family who owned the shipyard once located on the site of the seaport, the parlor holds some of the earliest mass-produced ornaments, cards and gifts.
