## Quarry issue still isn't dead in Springfield

Although the excavation equipment and bulldozers have long been removed from the Houdaille Quarry, some local residents still feel uneasy about the tranquil mounds of red clay and piles of scattered rocks that cut into the oval groundwork. While some observers may only look at the crust as hastily dumped gravel left over from the work on Interstate 78, others have a premonition that perhaps a bowl-shaped foundation has already been mounted for the heavily-contested amphitheater.

Although Springfield residents bitterly opposed construction of a 4,000 seat amphitheater when county officials first considered the proposal in 1982, the issue still isn't dead. On Wednesday at 8 p.m., an ad hoc task force will have an open public meeting at town hall to hear local residents voice their opinions about the proposed amphitheater. The task force, 11 local citizens appointed by the freeholders, will evaluate how the community feels about the issue before reporting back to the freeholders.

Marilyn Schneider, who heads SCOPE, Springfield Citizens Organized to Protect the Environment, said her organization was instrumental in putting pressure on public officials to halt those earlier plans. However, she said the problem is just as real now as it was when she first fought against the amphitheater.

"It's like a monster," said Schneider about those plans. "It just keeps coming back. We can't get rid of it."

Under the plan, the county would build an amphitheater in the 72-acre tract adjacent to the recently completed "missing link" of Interstate 78. The New Jersey Symphony Orchestra has made a pitch to become the sole operator of the arena producing 40 shows each season.

However, community residents are concerned about the influx of automobiles that would jam the streets for such performances.

"It is important that everyone realize that it doesn't just affect us who live right near it, it will affect everyone," said Schneider. "Every road will be affected by the crowds that will come. If a referendum should pass, we may be faced with the problems that rock concerts cause at the Meadowlands."

In addition, Schneider said that the main thoroughfare to the quarry, Shungike Road, also serves as the major artery to Overlook Hospital in Summit. She predicted chaos.

"Can you imagine an ambulance getting stuck in amphitheater traffic because people are pouring in and out?" asked Schneider. "Where is the ambulance to go? There is a hospital over there."

Another question raised is that since the arena would be owned by the county, the amphitheater would be obligated to serve as the host to all types of concerts and events.

Selma Trager, another SCOPE member said, "Once you have an amphitheater, you can't say no to a group. We can't say, 'No, we don't want you because you are a rock band and not an orchestra.' Once it's there, it's too late to do anything

about what it's going to be used for."

The county expects to receive the property from the state Department of Transportation, which purchased the quarry several years ago for the dumping of fill generated by construction of the interstate. The county will get the quarry in exchange for parklands turned over to the state to help facilitate the completion of the highway through the Watchung Reservation.

However, some residents are wondering why the property can't be left in its natural state. Since the tract was part of the reservation before its disruption for the highway, they say that putting it back into its original state would be the logical solution.

"I think the main detriment is that open space has been taken from the reservation and there was a promise in the environmental impact statement to replace that open space with comparable open space in the Hidden Valley area," said Jonathan Roth, who acts as counsel for SCOPE. "The idea is that you have to seek a certain balance between development and open space, because it's been proven time and time again that, psychologically, people need to see that kind of greenery and that kind of open space."

On Wednesday, the task force will be soliciting such comments and recommendations from the public on alternatives for the quarry site. Although the task force won't present its findings to the freeholders

until November, SCOPE members have been passing out flyers and making telephone calls to make sure enough local support is aroused to defeat the amphitheater plans.

"We're just very concerned because there are powers higher up in the state that want the amphitheater here and they are pressing people to push for it," said

Schneider. "We feel that if the citizens of Springfield don't come out, who else is going to fight for them if they don't do it themselves?"

## GT students 'show off' work

Students enrolled in the Gifted and Talented program at Jonathan Dayton Regional High School recently displayed projects they completed during the 1986-87 academic year. The exposition, held May 27 at Arthur L. Johnson Regional High School, Clark, featured projects by students from the four high schools which make up Regional School District No. 1.

Dennis Fox, coordinator of Dayton's GT program, says the 8-year-old program provides a self-organized course of study for students who are self-motivated and who are self-directed learners. He says 75 percent of the class time is devoted to individual projects in which the students develop on their own.

According to Fox, when students enter the 10th grade they are given a test which measures their achievement level. Ninth graders are given an IQ test. The 10th-grade test is evaluated, at which time the names of those students who have tested high are given to a GT review board. This board consists of three teachers who collect the data, guidance counselors and any other staff personnel who can provide input on a student.

After the list of students stands at about 40, questionnaires are sent to the teachers of those 10th

graders being considered for the program. Teachers are to indicate if a student has above-average learning, technical or leadership skills.

"Rather than testing, we tend to rely on information which is given first hand from teachers," says Fox. "The processing is not always perfect. Sometimes we get a kid in the program that just does not have the drive or initiative that we would like him to have."

Some students are not chosen the first time around because the board feels they are not fully ready for the program. These students are evaluated a second time in their junior year.

Fox says that although the IQs of GT students are above the average of those students in the regular class program, those classified as GT tend to have "general intellectual ability."

The 1986-87 Dayton program has 28 students enrolled, the largest number since the program began.

The 14 youngsters in Fox's class were asked to come up with an individual project which would be completed on their own. Each student is required to hand in an outline on his project which indicates his field of study, project title, objectives, and his background, including knowledge and skills. The outline

also includes a plan for his work, including preliminary work, schedule, culmination and an estimated completion date.

Each student is assigned a mentor in the field of study he has chosen. The mentor can be either a staff member or an outside source who provides answers to questions the student may have on the project.

John Benigno's project for the exposition was titled "The Development of the Creative Process." It featured the development of his writing style.

"I tend to be very subjective, so I try to keep a more objective viewpoint on what happens outside," he says.

Benigno, who could not come up with a mentor, admits his writing is hard for the average reader to understand. He says the GT program has provided him with an "incentive to work beyond what I could have accomplished otherwise."

Junior Anne Hollister completed her project in the field of anthropology and archaeology. She studied how the atlatl, a wooden tool used by Southwestern Indians, helped to improve the distance at which a spear may be thrown.

Hollister was able to prove from her research, which included the construction of an atlatl and spear, that when the atlatl was used the spear traveled 60 percent farther. Her mentor was a professor in anthropology at Seton Hall University.

The project which people can probably best relate to was the assignment completed by junior Matt Zucker. He decided to construct a board game based on the television network rating system. He collected data from the Nielson Ratings and on the history of some popular television programs.

Zucker also wrote a letter to Parker Brothers, a manufacturer of board games, on the types of formats they have used. He received a reply which helped him develop player instructions and rules. He says his instructions were twice as long as recommended by the company.

"Players are given a network and move shows into different time slots. It's very realistic," he says. "The Reagan era has pushed up the popularity of sitcoms as the Nielson ratings reflect."

From his research Zucker determined that the television business is controlled by money.

## Citizen irate over truck fumes

How safe are you in your home when you hear a diesel-powered gasoline truck idling for 90 minutes next door? That was the question Francis Crosett asked town board members Tuesday night during the public-discussion portion of the bimonthly municipal meeting.

Crosett, who lives adjacent to Schable Oil Company, has raised this and similar questions to committee members during the last few weeks. He says he is not going to give up in his fight to have state Ordinance No. 87-5 strictly enforced.

"I'm gonna keep coming," said Crosett about his persistence on bringing up the issue at town meetings. "How can I keep cool when I can see my life savings blow up in smoke?"

The ordinance, passed last March, puts restrictions on exhaust emissions of idling diesel-powered engines. Consequently, Crosett contends that he has witnessed various violations of the ordinance while living next door to the oil company.

Board members, however, were

sympathetic of Crosett's complaints. Committeeman William Welsh said that since the ordinance is fairly new, some law enforcement officials may be unaware of specific violations.

Henry Bultman questioned the need to still require a \$6 annual fee to play tennis on public tennis courts. Bultman said that since the popularity of tennis has declined during the past few years, he didn't see a need for the fees and permits. He said there is no longer a problem of outsiders coming into town and using public courts.

Board members unanimously approved the appointment of Committeeman Jo-Ann Pieper as acting treasurer of the town. In that position, Pieper will perform treasury duties in the absence of both the town treasurer and assistant treasurer.

Committee members took the following actions:

Appointed Stanley Kalsh to the Board of Adjustment to fill the unex-

pired term of Edward Olesky.

Accepted the resignation of Daniel Kirchner from the Road Department. The resignation was effective June 10.

Approved a resolution authorizing Leo Eckmann, township engineer, to execute an application for Water Quality Certificate.

Authorized the town to advertise for bids for janitorial services.

## BOE approves resignation of new principal

Students and faculty at the Florence M. Gaudineer Middle School will be saying goodbye to their principal for the second year in a row.

On Monday, Springfield Board of Education members accepted the resignation of Richard Brockel, Brockel, who replaced Helene Kosloski at Gaudineer last year, cited "personal and professional reasons" for his resignation.

Brockel, who lives in Leonia, was an assistant principal at Richfield High School in Bergen County before taking on the job at Gaudineer.

Brockel, who has a master's degree in personnel and labor relations from Faleigh Dickinson University, is presently in a doctoral program at Seton Hall University.

In other business, Springfield school board members approved a prescription drug program for school employees. In the program, teachers, secretaries, principals and custodians would be able to purchase prescription drugs at reduced rates at participating area pharmacies, according to Dr. Leonard DiGiovanni, board secretary.

## Police checks for DWI

Anyone traveling on Morris or Mountain avenues late at night during the weekends, shouldn't be surprised if traffic is slower than usual.

The local police department is participating in the Driving While Under the Influence, D.W.I., Task Force. Sobriety Check-Point program. The first roadblock was set up on the corner of Morris and Mountain avenues between 11:30 p.m. Saturday and 2:30 a.m. Sunday. During that period, 187 cars were stopped and the drivers were issued leaflets explaining the program and the need to adhere to D.W.I. laws.

"We set up the roadblock in an effort to reduce the incidents of drunken driving in the township and to educate the public on the hazards involved in drunken driving," said Sgt. Ivan Shapow, who is in charge of the project. "The police department set up the road blocks in an effort to identify violators of drunken driving statutes and remove them from the roadways."

The roadblock led to the arrest of a Jersey City man who was found driving while under the influence of alcohol. Also, police say that a juvenile was apprehended in an unrelated charge.

Shapow and three police officers participated in the roadblock. Police

said they chose Morris Avenue because there are several bars along the street and it is a hotspot for accidents and drunk-driving incidents.

# Editorial

## What a waste!

The volume of solid waste being produced in New Jersey could be substantially reduced if our state legislators would be a little more selective about the kinds of news releases they send to the media.

Since we don't have the space or desire to print every news release that comes into our office, much of it goes into the trash can. Since this is an election year, we expect to be inundated with all kinds of releases singing the praises of our state legislators. So far, we've received everything from a photograph of several of our representatives saluting the flag to a release announcing the birth of a certain assemblyman's first grandchild - complete with quotes from the new grandfather and a fellow assemblyman who had introduced a resolution honoring grandpops.

What a waste of the taxpayers' money! A resolution and a news release? A little levity at the statehouse might be needed to ease the tensions that must build during each session. But someone has gone a little too far - too much of a production over reproduction.

Speaking of waste, looks like government officials on both the state and local levels are battling zero with us this week. On the local level, Roselle officials remain adamant in their refusal to allow the Union County Utilities Authority to operate a regional recycling program in the borough. The CUA is now suing Roselle in an attempt to overturn a new ordinance prohibiting such facilities in the borough.

Just what we need - another round in court concerning the county's solid waste management plan. If officials at all levels of government would spend more time communicating reasonably with each other and less time in court, maybe both the recycling plan and the resource recovery facility in Rahway could get off the ground. Stop wasting time and money in court!

While local and county officials are having problems disposing of solid waste, state officials are in a quandary over the disposal of 15,000 drums of radium-contaminated soil dug up in Essex County four years ago.

State Department of Environmental Protection Commissioner Richard T. Dewling came up with the brilliant plan to truck the hazardous material halfway across the state to a wildlife preserve in Ocean County. Did he think residents of Jackson were any less protective of their homes, their children, their lives than residents of Montclair or Vernon?

Now an Ocean County Superior Court judge has issued an order blocking the dumping of the barrels at Colliers Mills Wildlife Preserve until he can rule on the situation June 15. The same court judge has set as the deadline for moving the radon out of his county. We're back in court again! The state DEP has already announced it will be unable to meet the Essex County court order to move the barrels by Monday.

Amidst all the protests comes the news that radon experts say there are only two ways to deal with radon-contaminated soil: Dig it up or leave it and ventilate the house. State officials decided to dig up the soil in Essex County, displacing homeowners as they went along. Now, they say, they won't dig up any more soil. They'll ventilate instead. Good move, considering they've wasted four years trying to dispose of the 15,000 barrels they've already dug up. And now no one can be sure where that soil will ultimately end up. If both the Essex County and Ocean County judges rule against having the hazardous waste located in their areas, will the state cart it around until it finds a permanent home? Or will we have another garbage case similar to the Islip, Long Island, situation?

Come on, guys - stop wasting precious time and money on court cases. With all the experts around, someone should be able to come up with a place to dispose of the soil. Try talking this time.



## Recycling news

### Spring cleaning might be 'a crisis'

Recycling is on the increase in the U.S. as a result of a growing problem with waste disposal. Statistics show that unless Americans embrace recycling soon, we will use up finite landfill space in trying to hide our trash. More than half the cities in the U.S. will exhaust their current landfills by 1990, just three years from now," according to the Worldwatch Institute, a Washington-based environmental research group who recently reported on the "growing garbage glut." For this reason and a host of others, spring cleaning in communities throughout the nation is taking on a whole new meaning and our focus is shifting to an alternative recycling. The report documents what municipal officials in the U.S. and abroad are calling a "waste disposal crisis." Landfills are full in some cities, and the problem is forcing municipal officials to truck trash to distant sites at soaring prices. In

Minneapolis, for example, the cost of burying a ton of refuse skyrocketed from \$5 in 1981 to \$30 today, a sixfold increase. Philadelphia is paying \$60 a ton to dispose of its trash as far away as southern Virginia, and is weighing a trash-export agreement with the island of Curacao in the Netherlands Antilles. Glass manufacturers in North and South Carolina are taking the lead in an ongoing campaign to encourage recycling. The campaign surpassed its original goals for 1988 within the first few months, and as a result, the number of full-time professional recyclers in the two states increased 600 percent, with more than seven million bottles and jars now being recycled there each month. According to a recent public opinion survey taken in the Carolinas, 46 percent of those surveyed indicated they would reduce or avoid purchasing non-recyclable packages. Fifteen percent stated they would join in actions to have non-recyclables banned. Also, when respondents rated various types of packaging materials for product taste, glass came out on top. Two thirds of the people in the Carolinas' study also believed that as recycling increases for any packaging material, litter will be reduced for that material an added bonus. In view of the fact that three percent of the nation's energy goes each year to produce packaging materials, recycling saves energy and natural resources. A related consumer study conducted in the sunshine state found that Floridians, by a ratio of eight to one, say that they would make an effort to separate out recyclable materials from regular garbage if curbside pickup was available in their neighborhood. As in the Carolinas survey, the recyclability of a container's material is important to respondents. Forty-nine percent of Floridians say they would not purchase a beverage container if they knew it could not be recycled. Resource management demands our attention to recycling not just as "Spring Cleaners," but as environmentally conscious consumers. With this in mind, consumer preference for glass containers is a must - by choosing a 100 percent recyclable container, a new bottle of jar can be produced for every one used. And for that, we can give ourselves an environmental pat on the back. Editor's note: This article was submitted by the Glass Packaging Institute.

## Proclaim Liberty Should we change Constitution?

Whenever internal pressures build up, and conflicts between different groups of Americans become acute, there hobb to the surface those who want to change the Constitution. They argue with some persuasiveness that a plan of government that was suitable for 3.8 million widely scattered inhabitants, most of them living on farms or plantations, cramps the activities of 230 million in a centralized, heavily industrialized society.

Some of the arguments for change are brought forward by minorities who want to legislate something before there is a public consensus on the issue. That is what happened with National Prohibition - the 18th Amendment (1919) - which was later repealed by the 21st Amendment (1933). There was then an enthusiasm to set a temperance "lead," but the general will to enforce such a discipline by law was lacking.

Today a parallel scene is being set by those who want to get an amendment to accomplish the purpose of anti-abortion legislation, or to prevent the legislature from appropriating funds above a certain limit. The first trouble with Constitutional amendments - as substitutes for legislation is that they may be unenforceable. And the Bill also can be handled as crimes. And laws that can't be enforced are bad laws - whatever their theoretical merits. The fundamental trouble with such amendments is that they short-circuit the process of discussion and public debate by which a people develops a consensus and acquires the will to maintain a certain discipline by law.

There are other amendments being brought forward, and these have to do with the frame of government itself. Admirers of foreign models, like the Nazis and the Communists, seldom get much following in America. Today the right-wing extremists are praising the "national heroes" John F. Kennedy, Oliver North and Richard Secord for taking the same stand.

Or is it the same stand? Those who "took the Fifth" 35 years ago were for the most part private citizens. They were not in the same position of public trust as Vice Admiral Poindexter, Lt. Col. North and General Secord. The Fifth Amendment was without doubt intended to guarantee the liberty, dignity, and privacy of citizens. But it was not intended to describe the limits and responsibilities of officers in the executive, legislative and judicial branches of government. Most certainly it was not intended to apply to uniformed officers in the armed services.

The degree to which the Founding Fathers despised arbitrary regimes was equalled by their esteem for those who took up the burdens of public office to perform a public service. It would hardly have occurred to them that the time might come when persons entrusted with the stewardship of public trust would under scrutiny crawl back into their caves and demand the protection to which ordinary citizens are entitled in their round of ordinary affairs.

These officers trying to "take the Fifth," to which they are not entitled, are not private citizens. They have enjoyed the privileges of power and now they must accept some of the responsibilities. If an ordinary GI can be called upon to give up his schooling or his job, to leave his family and loved ones, and perhaps lose his life in the national interest, then those who have enjoyed the privileges of flag and field rank are bound to face in like measure behind a shield that was intended for private citizens.

## 'Whistleblowers' defended

Workers who blow the whistle on federal waste, fraud and abuse should be better protected against reprisals, according to Rep. Matthew Rinaldo, R-N.J.

"There have been too many instances of whistleblowers being fired, transferred, demoted or otherwise punished for having reported improprieties in the interest of protecting the taxpayers," the Congressman said. "Congress should back them up by strengthening the protections against retribution."

As examples of whistleblower mistreatment, he cited the firing of A. Ernest Fitzgerald, a civilian Air Force official who was ousted after disclosing defense contract abuses, and the dismissal of a Veterans Administration physician for reporting questionable practices in an experimental drug study involving VA patients.

The New Jersey Republican has joined a bipartisan group in sponsoring a bill that would protect whistleblowers. One, the Whistleblower Protection Act of 1987, seeks to protect civil servants by mandating that employees not suffer any adverse consequences for reporting instances of waste, fraud or abuse involving federal funds. A similar bill was passed by the House in the last Congress but was not taken up by the Senate before final adjournment.

Another whistleblower bill would protect employees of government contractors who expose abuse or corruption, and a third would do the same for members of the military.

Whistleblowers have saved the taxpayers hundreds of millions of dollars in recent years, according to Rinaldo, who said more than 21,500

calls were received last year on federal telephone hotlines from individuals reporting alleged illegals. "These calls ran the gamut from charges of fraudulent benefit claims and contract violations to embezzlement and grant abuses. One tip led to the 32-count indictment of a drug manufacturer, another resulted in the recovery of more than \$941,106 in contract overcharges, a third helped uncover a Medicare scam involving 35 individuals, and a fourth revealed an improper \$1.2 million federal grant."

He said the whistleblowers are often federal workers or employees of contractors working for the government, who should be assured that they cannot be fired for exposing abuse or corruption.

## GSP ownership transferred

# Officials eye improvements

By SUZETTE STALKER Officials throughout Union County hope that a change in the ownership of a 1.5-mile stretch of the Garden State Parkway will result in improvements in maintaining the roadway.

The transfer of ownership of a portion of the Garden State Parkway, which cuts through several Union County communities, from the state Department of Transportation to the Highway Authority was approved Thursday by the Statehouse Commission.

The Commission, which includes Governor Thomas Kean, members of his administration and Democratic and Republican representatives of the state legislature, unanimously approved the transfer, which, pending final approval by the Highway Authority, could become effective July 1.

The transfer involves the stretch of the parkway between Route 22 in Union and the Raritan River bridge in Middlesex County, nine miles of which are located in Union County. Two smaller sections in Ocean and Cape May counties are also included in the transfer.

The Union County section has been the target of complaints by area residents for several years concerning the litter and uncut grass along the route. "I've been hearing complaints from individuals and municipalities for years," stated Senator C. Louis

Bassano R-Union, a proponent of the transfer. "Basically, our section of the parkway is not as good as it is south of the Union Toll Plaza."

"The DOT didn't have the resources," he said. "They treated that section no different than they treated any other state highway. The grass gets cut about 5 or 6 times a year and the litter gets picked up about twice a year. The Parkway Authority spends \$10 million each year for the upkeep of the roadways, so they can spend the \$600,000 needed for normal maintenance of that section."

Kenilworth Mayor Livio Mancino, who has called the litter situation along the route "disgraceful" and blamed neglect of the area on a "lack of enforcement" by the DOT in keeping the area properly maintained, hopes the transfer will initiate better operation of the roadway.

"I've been advocating it for years," Mancino stated. "The DOT did a terrible job. All kinds of debris is being dumped along the road. Also, the grass isn't cut down and that draws mosquitoes, which is a health hazard. I think the Parkway Authority does a much better job."

Greg Muller, deputy mayor of Union, remarked "The track record of the highway authority is better than that of the DOT in maintaining that road. We're all for it, providing they maintain the standards that they have in the past."

Transportation Commissioner Hazel Gluck, and the highway authority, which maintains the rest of the parkway, negotiated the takeover agreement last month. Final approval of the transfer is expected to be given at the highway authority's next scheduled meeting on June 22.

Nothing that the authority protracted in negotiations for the transfer, Bassano stated. "They realized they better sit down and negotiate or they may get something less advantageous. We could have asked them to take care of capital improvements, including widening and resurfacing the road, instead of just normal maintenance. I think they realized then we were serious."

The Highway Authority has agreed to meet all applicable federal and state requirements regarding these sections of the parkway, including the restriction of tolls.

The annual revenue of \$2.5 million to \$3 million necessary to maintain that portion of the parkway will be derived from tolls elsewhere on the parkway.

The highway authority is not actually purchasing the three sections from the DOT, and will maintain the route at its own expense, eliminating the need for a toll.


The authority plans to alter and restripe the Union County section of the parkway, expanding it into five lanes instead of four, and thus alleviating commuter traffic in what is reputed to be the busiest section of the parkway.

According to highway authority spokesperson Ann McKee, "Other areas of the parkway have been widened, as much as 50 percent in some areas, and this is just in keeping with the rest of the parkway."

"The DOT and various state representatives have sought the transfer for several years, citing that the highway authority is better able to maintain the three sections from the DOT, and will maintain the route at its own expense, eliminating the need for a toll."

The three sections were created prior to the parkway with state and federal funds. When the parkway was created in 1952, these sections were incorporated into it, but re-

mained exempt from tolls since they were built with public funds. Mayor Paul Werkmeister of Linden expressed concern that the Highway Authority may possibly impose tolls on the section in the future. "If at any time they attempt to convert this into a toll road, Linden will come down very hard, and we'll even take it to Trenton," Werkmeister said. "If they put tolls in, it will increase local traffic on town roads, and we paid not to have that."

## To teach disabled kids

Specialized summer programs for youngsters will again be offered this year by the pediatric rehabilitation department of John F. Kennedy Medical Center's Robert Wood Johnson Jr. Rehabilitation Institute in Edison.

The classes are designed to help children with physical disabilities, learning disabilities, speech and language problems, development delays or just a lack of social skills necessary to enjoy company with their peers.

They will run between June 20 and Aug. 28, with most of the courses comprising one or two sessions per week. Courses include one for children who don't enjoy or excel at group physical activities or sports, another for youngsters who stutter and two other for those with articulation problems.

There is a class for disabled adolescents who want to enhance independence in self-care, mobility and other skills, and another for children with learning problems who have difficulty organizing information and preparing materials for

classroom tasks.

There is a special group for boys aged 6 to 8 who need to increase their positive feelings about themselves and develop the use of language for conversation; there is a similar program for girls aged 5 to 7.

There are several programs to develop for children who need to develop motor and movement skills or to improve flexibility, strength and endurance, a program in social skills for children and also summer tutoring to provide individual remedial instruction.



## Torborg signs with Pirates

Doug Torborg of Mountainside, a left-handed pitcher who recently completed a four-year collegiate career with the University of North Carolina, was selected by the Pittsburgh Pirates in last week's annual Amateur Draft and left for Bradenton, Florida on Monday, in order to sign with the major league club.

The 6-foot-2, 180-pound southpaw is the eldest son of former major league catcher Jeff Torborg, who is now a New York Yankee coach. A 1983 graduate of Jonathan Dayton Regional High School, Torborg had been drafted by the Yankees that year as well, but opted to attend college instead, a choice his younger brother, Greg, also made last year when he, too, was drafted by the Bronx Bombers, but accepted a scholarship offer from Duke University.

"Baseball has been very good to Jeff and me," said Susan Torborg, the mother of the North Carolina star. "We've enjoyed our years in baseball and we're hoping baseball will be good to Doug. We hope it's the start of a long, successful career for Doug."

After his arrival in Bradenton, Torborg is expected to get some training prior to being assigned to what will probably be Watertown, N.Y., which is where Pittsburgh's Class A franchise in the New York-Penn League is located. The exact round of his selection and the actual signing amount was not available as of press time.

Torborg, whose youngest brother, Dale, is just completing his freshman year at Dayton, said that while he was honored to have been selected by the Yankees four years ago, he felt — as his brother did last year — that it was "best" for him to attempt to enter the world of professional baseball. The national acclaim enjoyed by the Chapel Hill-based university also "swayed" him as well, he said, hoping that a degree in physical education from one of the country's most highly-regarded schools will be beneficial to him later on in life.

"We'll soon see," explained Torborg, who recorded four saves and a 1-1 mark in a "stopper role" coming out of the bullpen for UNC this past spring. "When I quit baseball, we'll see how highly regarded my degree is. But I hope I won't have to be testing that out for a good many years."

While maintaining a calm mood over his selection, the Mountainside resident admitted he was excited to be embarking on an opportunity that has long been the dream of many a young athlete.

"I really am," said Torborg about being drafted by Pittsburgh. "And I feel I'm in a pretty good situation with the Pirates. They look like a young team and they're rebuilding." "I was very, very excited for

him," said Springfield American Legion baseball coach Harry Weismann, whose team, aided by Torborg's pitching, reached the state Legion finals in 1983, before losing to Brooklawn. "He was always a hard worker, dedicated to the game and it's a nice tribute to his dedication. He was always dependable for me. I'm really pulling for him."

Ironically, Pete Gebrian, who is now a Pittsburgh scout, reportedly played a key role in the selection of Torborg, only 24 years after being unable to sign the pitcher's father, who was a highly regarded All-American catcher when he graduated from Rutgers University in 1963. At that time, Gebrian was a scout for the New York Mets, who were reportedly one of three teams interested in the services of the elder Torborg, who eventually signed with the Los Angeles Dodgers.

The amateur draft was not in existence then.

Prior to leaving for Bradenton, Torborg spent some time working out with the Yankees, in order to keep his arm "limber and in shape," the pitcher's mother said.









### Seminar yields homeowner info

Homeowners who attended a tax seminar held by the Westfield and Union offices of Weichert Realtors received a complete overview of the 1986 Tax Reform plus answers to the most asked questions about the new tax law and real estate. In the presentation given by Jan Hoffman, compiler of Weichert Relocation Company, they learned that:

□ The age 55 capital gains allowance — The 1986 Tax Act continues to allow a one-time exclusion of up to \$125,000 gain on the sale of a personal residence for individuals age 55 and older. Sellers trading down, i.e., buying a new home for a lower price than the selling price of their present home, save on taxes because the amount over \$125,000 is taxed as ordinary income.

□ Tax reforms and profits on income property — Personal income produced by rental properties will be taxed at a lower rate, with the ultimate result that solid properties with continued profit performance will show steady increases in market value and demand.

□ Deducting losses on investment property — The 1986 Tax Act will continue to allow deductibility of losses up to \$25,000 for property owners whose adjusted gross income is less than \$100,000, provided these investment properties are actively managed.

### Survey loan rates

The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development released May 27 the results of its latest survey of market conditions for fixed rate, long-term, level payment home loans as well as interest rates for home construction funds.

The survey found that the national average yield on secondary market transactions involving HUD/FHA Section 203(b) loans was 10.02 percent on May 1, up 108 basis points from an average yield of 8.94 percent on April 1. The national average yield was based on the most active commitments transacted for Section 203(b) loans. On May 1, these commitments related to loans bearing a contract rate of 9.50 percent.
