Regional BOE adopts a new grading policy

The Board of Education of Union County Regional High School District 1 unanimously approved the institution of a new grading policy Tuesday night during its regular meeting at Governor Livingston Regional High School in Berkeley Heights.

The regional district includes Jonathan Dayton Regional High School in Springfield, which enrolls students from Mountainside, David Brearley Regional High School in Kenilworth, Arthur L. Johnson Regional High School in Clark and Governor Livingston.

Under the new grading policy, letter grades ranging from an A plus to an F will be given for each full-year and half-year course offered at the four regional high schools, as opposed to the current number system, which goes from a high 4.0 to a low 1.0 and below.

The new grading system, and the scores it reflects, has been outlined as follows: A plus: 95-100; A: 90-94; B plus: 85-89; B: 80-84; C plus: 75-79; C: 70-74; D: 65-69. An F will be given for 64 or below, which equals no credit.

Dr. Martin Siegel, director of curriculum for the regional high school district, said the policy switch was initiated "in response to concerns raised by parents concerning the way grades were being represented."

The policy was developed following a survey performed by an ad hoc committee appointed by the Regional Board of Education. The survey canvassed other New Jersey school districts and select colleges from around the country to elicit reactions to high-school grading policies.

Siegel said that the majority were primarily concerned with "clarity and simplicity" in evaluating high-school grading policies.

A second significant aspect of the new grading policy is that final examination exemptions for qualifying high school students have now been incorporated into the policy, and will no longer have to be reviewed by the regional Board of Education on a yearly basis.

The exemption policy, which was successfully introduced this year, allows high school seniors who have achieved a cumulative average of an A or better during the third and fourth marking periods in a full-year or one-semester course to be exempt from taking final examinations in June.

The idea behind the exam exemptions was that students would be motivated to keep up their grades during the final two semesters of their senior year - a time when students commonly experience "senior slump" before graduation.

Siegel reported that the program proved to be successful this past year, noting that "it kept the kids working during the second semester and that was the important thing."

New managers doing fine job at Springfield municipal pool

The Springfield Municipal Pool, which opened a few weeks ago, has been receiving a generous amount of praise from town residents and public officials.

Most of the compliments are directed toward the new pool manager, Bill Shaw and John Quinn, who have been responsible for overseeing renovation work at the pool and the scheduling of recreational activities.

"The new management is doing a tremendous job," said Township Committee member Marc Marshall.

"It's a tough job to do. We've got nothing but compliments," he added.

"They're terrific," remarked Committee member Jeffrey Katz. "The day camp is running exceptionally well."

Shaw and Quinn organized the recent July Fourth pool celebration, which was attended by almost 2,000 people. The pool area was decorated with garlands of balloons, donated by Perry Perfect, located in Springfield.

Shaw called the celebration, which featured balloon tosses and a tug of war, "a huge success." Other July Fourth activities included a hidden egg hunt, a scavenger hunt, and a greased watermelon contest.

"We're glad everyone appreciated all the hard work put in by the pool staff," said Shaw.

The new pool managers are planning more special activities such as a pool dance, rescheduled for July 28, as well as a poolside operatic concert.

Springfield resident Rose Baum Sinerchia of the New York Metropolitan Opera will perform an evening concert for the third straight year on Aug. 4. The opera singer, according to Shaw, is also giving swimstroke instruction at the pool.

The Municipal Pool, built in 1963, has facilities for baseball, basketball, bocce, handball, volleyball, arts and crafts, swimming and diving instruction, and day camp.

The pool is financed through membership fees collected from township residents and a limited number of memberships are available for non-residents.

"They're terrific," remarked Committee member Jeffrey Katz. "The day camp is running exceptionally well."

A summer membership at the pool costs \$155 for a family, \$105 for a single person, \$40 for senior citizens, and \$300 for out-of-town residents.

Shaw noted that approximately 1,300 members are on the roster, and between 800 and 1,000 people use the pool on a daily basis.

Mayor Philip Kurnos calls membership at the Municipal Pool "the best buy around."

In addition to scheduling recreational activities, the pool managers have been overseeing various poolside improvements. The present public address system is being replaced with a newer, redesigned one that has a main amplifier, plus many remote speakers.

The new system, managers said, requires new underground cables between all the pool buildings. The Emerald Lawn Sprinkler Service in Springfield has contributed some of the labor and equipment needed for this renovation work.

The flood lights and incandescent fixtures on building exteriors are being replaced with better lighting, which will provide more illumination at the pool, snack bar, walkways and parking areas.

The new management has also reduced the problem of insects near the pool by spraying grassy areas with a weed killer. This weed killer has destroyed growing clover plants which attract bees and other insects.

This season, the new pool manager has organized a swim team. So far, the team has a 2-0 record with wins against Florham Park and Fairfield. The swim team is later scheduled to compete against West Caldwell and East Hanover on July 19 and 26, respectively.

Police arrest suspect in robbery of dry cleaners

A man who allegedly posed as a health inspector and robbed a Springfield dry cleaner owner was arrested Saturday following a two-month investigation by Detective Judd Levenson of the Springfield Police Department.

According to Police Chief William Chisholm, a well-dressed man posing as a health inspector entered a dry cleaners on Mountain Avenue on May 11. The impostor carried a clipboard and told the owner he was conducting a health inspection of the dry cleaners.

The suspect never returned to the dry cleaners and the owner subsequently discovered \$700 in cash and checks missing from the register, said Chisholm.

Police look for suspects in parking lot robberies

Two separate robberies occurred last week in a furniture store parking lot on Morris Turnpike in Springfield, according to Police Chief William Chisholm. Police are still searching for suspects in both robberies, which took place three days apart at approximately 4 p.m.

The first robbery happened on June 3 when a car pulled alongside a woman as she walked toward her car located in the store parking lot, said Chisholm. A man on the passenger side of the approaching car reached out and grabbed her pocketbook as the driver sped off.

An unidentified witness noted the license plate of the suspect's car as it entered Route 78 following the robbery, said Chisholm. Springfield police later performed a check of the car's registration and discovered it to be a stolen vehicle.

Chisholm described the victim as a 42-year-old woman who lives in Short Hills. The police chief said the woman was carrying approximately \$200 in her purse, and that so far, no suspects have been arrested.

In the second robbery on July 6, two men stole a woman's car as she was placing shopping bags into her car, which was also parked in the furniture store parking lot, according to Chisholm.

One of the suspects grabbed the woman's car keys, threw the other shopping bags into the trunk, and fled the scene in her 1990 Honda Accord.

The second suspect, driving another stolen vehicle, followed the first driver as they raced onto Route 78.

Chisholm described the second victim as a 44-year-old Westfield resident. The woman's Honda, Chisholm added, was discovered about two hours later in Newark with the shopping bags still inside the car.

The Police Chief said both robberies are probably related, given the similar methods used by the suspects. Chisholm also said Detective Judd Levenson is investigating the robberies.

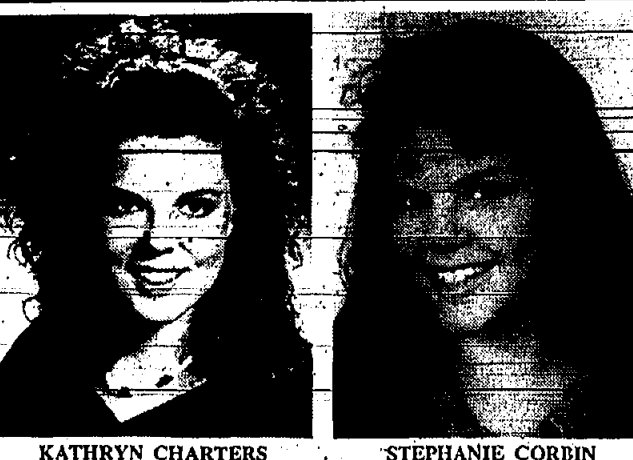

UCC and Hoechst cooperate on training program

Union County College this summer will send three of its engineering technology majors to Hoechst Celanese Corporation's Research and Development Center in Summit to inaugurate a cooperative program providing students with hands-on training in the plastics industry.

The Summit facility (R.L. Mitchell Technical Center) is one of two major research and development centers operated by Hoechst Celanese in the U.S.

The program will operate on a pilot basis during the summer and will be fully implemented during the Fall Semester. As it further develops, the College and Hoechst Celanese will organize a pilot option to be incorporated into UCC's mechanical engineering technology program that will include several plastics courses, some combined with laboratory work.

According to Donald Statinsky, supervisor at Hoechst Celanese's Engineering Plastics Division, the focus of the program is to develop a partnership between local educational institutions and industry. UCC is the

first two-year college selected by the worldwide firm to develop such an arrangement with plastics plants developed with Pennsylvania State University, Stevens Institute of Technology, and New Jersey Institute of Technology, among 12 such institutions.

Hoechst Celanese Corp. is a division of Hoechst AG, which is recognized as a world leader in the production of chemical, fiber and film, life sciences, and engineering plastics. The firm is strongly committed to being a "responsible corporate citizen" and is looking to become more proactive in its role as a resident of the community and the state, said Statinsky. By providing resources to aid in the education, training, and development of today's students, Hoechst Celanese is helping to mold the skilled labor of tomorrow, thereby making a sound investment in the future, he added.

Statinsky said UCC was selected by the firm based on its reputation for excellence, community commitment, progressive approach to education,

and geographic proximity to the Summit facility. They plan to work on a team within one company doing research from beginning to end, and Statinsky. The program will extend approximately three months.

Students will gain practical exposure to extruders and melting machines, and learn to evaluate physical properties of plastics. Tests conducted at the laboratory will coincide with those taught through the engineering program. They will be selected based on the recommendation of Prof. Lucio Campa, who coordinates the mechanical engineering technology program of the College.

The spirit of UCC's technology program was first to prepare students for the world of work, for professional careers in high technology industries, he said. They plan to work with company such as Hoechst Celanese. We will be able to train laboratory technicians in the high technology field of plastics research as a benefit back to the school and the community.

Completed with the approval of the program will have an excellent understanding of processing and manufacturing, with videotape used as an instructional tool to show a number of how such theories should be executed. Students will work with sophisticated production equipment, such as dryers, microprocessors, heat-weight fraction, computer, and injection. Great emphasis from industry also will present relevant aspects of the field to students.

As the program moves along this summer, Statinsky said various details will evolve depending upon the classes' particular orientations. He explained the purpose of having such programs with local colleges is to train potential workers with backgrounds in high technology industries.

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SPRAINS AND FRACTURES OF THE FOOT AND ANKLE

Sprains and Fractures of the foot and ankle bones are common and can result in long-term disability if not properly treated.

A sprain is a tear in the ligament that takes place when the ligament is stretched too far.

A fracture is a break in the bone that can happen in several ways. The most common break results when a ligament rips away a piece of the bone to which it is attached.

Pain and swelling accompany sprains and fractures, followed by discoloration due to injury to the small blood vessels around the injury. First aid should include application of ice to the injured area and keeping weight off the foot. Early attention is vitally important. Whenever you sustain a foot or ankle injury, you should contact your podiatrist right away.

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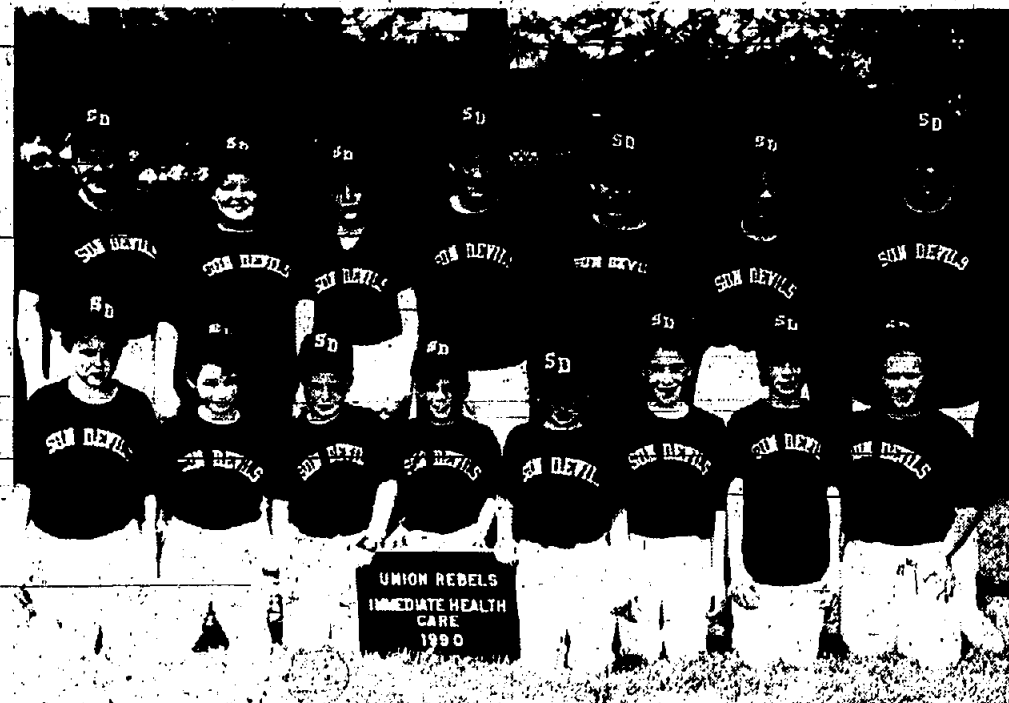
