Committee gives many awards for service to town, residents

For their efforts in protecting life and property, and maintaining the efficient operation of the township, the Springfield Township Committee bestowed a host of commendations during their public meeting Tuesday night.

Honorable Service Medals, Exceptional Duty Medals, Meritorious Service Medals, proclamations of appreciation and Community Service pins were awarded to a number of police officers, life guards and members of the community who have contributed their time and expertise to the township.

Karin Ferraro, Kristin McLeer and Denise Cameron, all life guards at the Springfield Community Pool, were commended for their rescues of swimmers in need of assistance during the past pool season. Each was noted for her quick and effective response to life-threatening situations, and awarded official commendations by the committee.

Carol Bonosky and Joanne Gemen-don were commended for their service to the township, and awarded the Springfield Community Service pin and a certificate of recognition respectively.

Bonosky was lauded for her efforts in establishing the township's "Right To Know" program. Her expertise and knowledge in identifying and labeling hazardous substances in the workplace has, according to officials, saved the township a substantial

amount of money. The alternative, said the committee, was to contract the work out to a private company, which would have cost the township thousands of dollars.

The blue of police uniforms lined the rear of the committee room as a contingent of its officers was commended for various meritorious acts in the line of duty.

Officers John Cook and Edward McNary were awarded the Honorable Service Medal for their apprehension in 1990 of two individuals who were found to be in possession of a loaded handgun, and over \$9,000 in cash proceeds from the suspect's involvement in a drug distribution network.

Officers Peter Davis and Walter Brooks were also awarded the Honorable Service Medal for their arrest of an individual for possession of a loaded .357-caliber magnum pistol and a substantial amount of marijuana, discovered after the officers called a K-9 unit to the scene.

Officers William Wrisley and Christopher LaFragola, for their apprehension of an individual carrying a loaded .22-caliber handgun and an additional 500 rounds of ammunition, were also given the Honorable Service Medal for their actions.

Medals for Exceptional Duty were awarded to four police officers for their roles in providing medical assistance in several heart-attack incidents in the township.

Officers William Wrisley and William Sodlack responded to a first aid call at a local residence, where they

administered cardiopulmonary resuscitation to a woman in full cardiac arrest. Responding to a similar call, Officer John Rowley and Cpl. Rodney Pedersen administered CPR to an 83-year-old heart attack victim, until medical assistance arrived and vital signs were restored.

Officers Michael Ferrigno and James Fine were awarded Meritorious Service Medals for their apprehension of three burglars in May this year. Responding to a report of a possible burglary, Ferrigno identified and, after giving chase, apprehended the burglar in his vehicle. Upon a search of the area, Fine and Ferrigno located and arrested the two accomplices. Cash, jewelry and weapons, the contents of a stolen safe, were recovered.

"Before you is the finest police force around," said Mayor Marc Marshall, a sentiment echoed by the full committee.

"You are the finest of a group of exceptional individuals," said Committee member Lee Eisen.

"We are proud of the fact that our police department excels in saving lives," said Committeeman Jeffrey Katz, calling the group's record of handling medical emergencies "enviable."

"The danger you guys face every day on the streets is not an imagined danger," said Marshall, concluding the ceremony. "Thank you for risking your lives, and thanks to your families."

Educators address foreign issues

It is usually easier to keep track of something as it gets smaller. Not so with the globe.

With communication and mobility improving every year, making the world's nations and their markets increasingly dependent on one another, educators in communities like Springfield are, as a result, broadening the scope of their students' curriculum to prepare them for the future.

"A course content base that does not include a global view is not as effective as it can be," said Albert LaMorge, director of curriculum for the Springfield schools, at the conclusion of a status report of the district's recently revised social studies curriculum.

"If all the people in the world were lined up, every fourth person would be Chinese," said LaMorge. "How many of our kids know even four things about China?"

According to LaMorge and the kindergarten and first grade teachers present, the revised social studies curriculum should help combat the problem of a narrow, Western perspective.

According to LaMorge, the revisions were prompted by a regular curriculum review required by the state.

In addition to contemporary standards being discussed in professional and academic circles at the national level, the course of study for the youngsters will include an examination of 12 countries on six continents, and the use of multi-cultural teaching materials consisting of texts, maps and more. The first-grade program has been expanded with an emphasis on geography.

Another issue related to shrinking of the globe, discussed the same evening by coincidence, is the program for students who speak English as a second language. Strides are being taken to improve the process by which foreign language speaking students assimilate elements of their new environment.

Springfield now has 12 participants in the ESL program, including students who speak Russian, Arabic, Spanish, Romanian, Portuguese, German and Tagalog, the native language of the Philippines. All of these students speak English to some degree.

"This is the second year that we have a diverse multicultural student population that represents more than seven different languages which are predominant languages used by the students and their families," said Rosemarie Kroschke, administrator of Special Services.

According to Kroschke, under state law, school districts must provide a program in English as a Second Language when the student population exceeds 10 students, and a bilingual program when enrollment exceeds 20 students that speak one foreign language.

ESL instructors Camille Paolino and Jan Kampel updated the school board on the methods and materials used in the program, which, said Kampel, often becomes a "safe haven" for the non-English-speaking children until they become more comfortable with English-speaking children.

"We're now faced with the reality of our community becoming multicultural," said Superintendent of Schools Dr. Gary Friedland, who described the program as an effort to keep up with that cultural transformation.

ESL programs have also been established to provide parents the opportunity to improve their language skills with their children. The weekly project and the other "at home" components of the program were funded through a \$20,000 grant from the State Department of Education, and will be evaluated in the spring.

"The mark of a superior program is when parents are involved and student learning is reinforced within the home," said board member Gary Tis. "Our program seeks to capitalize on new technology such as computer-aided instruction to enhance the mastery of the English language. I'm impressed with the planning that has gone into the program, the utilization of resources that provide unique experiences for students and their parents, and the creative approach that makes our program different from traditional ESL programs."

Controversial ordinance is tabled

An ordinance requiring members of the Planning and Zoning boards to receive formal instruction in municipal planning was tabled upon second reading by the Township Committee, which has agreed to look the bill over again and refine it if necessary.

In a display of bipartisan cooperation that has been uncommon throughout the evolution of the concept, the Republican majority voted in favor of Democratic Committeewoman Marcia Forman's motion to table the proposed ordinance for further consideration.

Forman, who authored the initial version of the ordinance, Tuesday evening criticized the second version, written by Republican Committeeman Jeffrey Katz, for its "inflexibility," and moved to table the issue for further discussion.

"While we agree on the concept, there are some points we don't agree on," Forman said.

"The approach that has been taken by Mr. Katz is a rather tight one as opposed to a flexible one that I would prefer," said Forman. "It is usually considered preferable to have a certain amount of flexibility in terms of instruction and timing and course material," she said, adding that the

passage of the ordinance in its present form would be "more a detriment than a profit to the town."

"I think as time goes by we should be able to make changes, and with this ordinance that would not be possible."

Responding to Forman's offer to "iron out the inconsistencies in both approach and content with Mr. Katz," Katz, while defending his revision of the initial proposal, agreed to re-examine it.

"I'm perfectly willing to work with Marcia if she thinks improvements can be made," said Katz.

"In the initial draft of the ordinance there were some defects," he said, "including things like stripping people of their right to sit on these boards, even though our courts would recognize that happens to be a right that can only be removed by due process."

"The initial draft established training, but it didn't identify what that training would consist of," Katz said. "But further than that, the draft proposed anything away from it, but improving on it — I never identified the source of funding. If there's one thing that any legislator understands, it's that you don't introduce an ordinance that's not enforceable."

Under the guidelines of the most recent version of the ordinance, Plan-

ning and Zoning board members would be required to complete a course of instruction in at least 10 areas of municipal planning which would be funded by the municipality. The ordinance would take effect Jan. 1, 1992, and would require compliance within six months of appointment to either board.

"Again, legislating a concept is something that is foreign to the area of legislation," said Katz. "You don't legislate concepts. If you don't tell people exactly what's expected of them, then the ordinance fails through vagueness."

SATs receive mixed review; educators question viability

This is the third and last in a series over the SAT and the controversy over its effectiveness, fairness and reliability in reporting on the academic ability of high school students.

Scholastic Aptitude Test scores have been released by most municipalities in Union County and the process of analysis and criticism continues.

While scores for the most part are down around the country as well as the state, educators are split on what the findings mean. Furthermore, discussions as to whether or not the scores are a viable means of analyzing students' knowledge — keeping cropping up.

The tests, considered the main standardized test in about half of the states and used by many colleges as a means of determining college readiness, have been called racist, biased, sexist, and unfair yardsticks of learning.

According to Tom Long, the super-

intendent of schools in Linden, "I'm a student of statistics and I know that the coefficient of reliability can be challenged for any standardized test. With the SATs especially, there are some students who do not test well and may not do as well as their potential.

Long, however, would not comment on the test's potential for bias. The test has come under fire from various minority and women's groups who have complained that the test's questions are biased.

According to the American Association of University Women — a watchdog group, "The bias arises because the types of questions favoring each gender are not evenly balanced on the SAT."

School district officials in various Union County municipalities have released figures for the 1991 tests. They have not, however, released separate numbers for men and women.

Many administrators will not comment on the SATs, Page 2

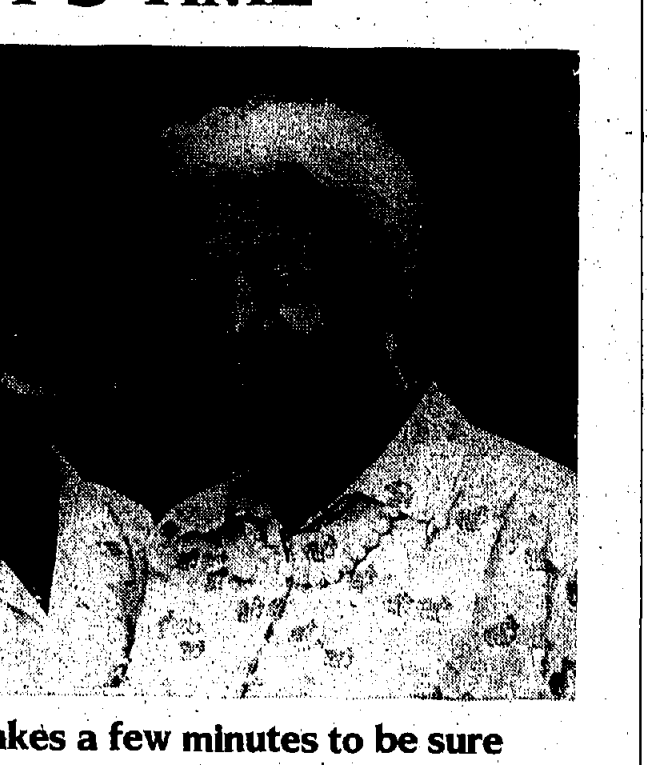

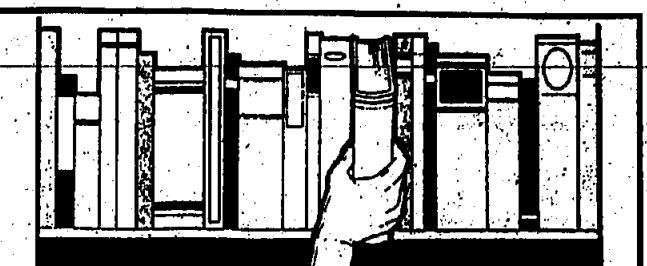

Burn center recognizes local firefighters

The Saint Barnabas Burn Foundation of Livingston will honor 11 Newark firefighters with special recognition awards and the Outstanding Team Effort Award at the Foundation's fourth annual Valor Awards dinner, Oct. 24, at Mayfair Farm in West Orange.

Five recipients of the foundation's "Outstanding Team Effort Award" are Captain Thomas McGovern of Toms River, firefighters George Anderson of Nutley, Steven DeCoster of Lawrence Harbor, Michael DeLane of Springfield and Peter Partridge of Hawthorne.

Honorary chairman of the dinner will be John J. McMullen, chairman and owner of the New Jersey Devils hockey team.

The foundation supports The Burn Center at Saint Barnabas Medical Center in Livingston, New Jersey's only certified burn treatment facility. Six New Jersey firefighters will

also receive Valor Awards for performing heroic acts in the line of duty from July 1990 to July 1991. The firefighters were nominated by their respective departments and selected by a committee of firefighters for the Valor Awards.

"The Saint Barnabas Burn Foundation is pleased to pay special tribute to these firefighters who risked their own lives to save another," stated David A. Wagner, executive director of the foundation.

Outstanding Team Effort Award recipient, Captain McGovern and firefighters Anderson, DeCoster, DeLane and Partridge, recipients of the Foundation's Outstanding Team Effort Award, rescued a man trapped under a 10 1/2 ton payload in Newark on June 4, 1991. The payload was being used to excavate an underground 20,000 gallon fuel tank when it tipped over into the hole, crushing

the cab and pinning the driver. Under McGovern's command, without hesitation, the Rescue Squad, who are all Emergency Medical Technicians, entered the hole amidst dangerous conditions. The earth was soft from recent rain storms and the bottom of the hole was filled with gasoline.

With assistance from Newark Emergency Medical Service, they worked feverishly to free the man. So as not to create a spark and ignite the gasoline, the men used hydraulic tools to cut through the metal of the cab. The rescue was completed in three hours and the victim was transported to a local hospital for treatment.

DeLane, 30, became a Newark firefighter in 1988. Partridge, 37, a Newark firefighter since 1974, has also taught training courses at Sussex County Fire Academy and New Jersey State Fire College.
