## Florio approves 99-year deal on Houdaille Quarry

Governor Jim Florio last week signed a bill granting a 99-year lease to Union County on the Houdaille Quarry in Springfield.

The new agreement revises a previous one in which Union County leased the 25-acre Department of Transportation site, at \$1 per year. The agreement was the result of months of negotiations between state and county legislators, the governor's office, federal and state transportation officials and environmentalists. The agreement was a victory for proponents of open space preservation.

Marylin Schneider, a Springfield resident and chairperson of the Springfield/Summit Citizen's Organization to Protect the Environment, said she was pleased with the revised agreement.

Schneider, whose organization pushed for the 99-year lease, said this week a major goal was to ensure the preservation of valuable open space. The potential recreational use of the quarry, Schneider noted, was secondary to the preservation of the environment.

"We have to give a lot of the credit to Maureen Ogden and Senator Basilio Schneider," Schneider said. "It was their leadership that made this possible."

While county officials said this week a major goal was to ensure the preservation of valuable open space, the deal also includes provisions for the quarry to be used for other purposes.

## Agents arrest local in bookmaking plot

New York and New Jersey law enforcement agents last week arrested a Springfield man who was involved in an illegal bookmaking operation, according to the Union County Prosecutor's Office.

Assistant Prosecutor Michael J. Lapolla announced that a month-long investigation into an illegal bookmaking operation run out of a Manhattan apartment culminated with a raid on the premises and the arrest of Pasquale Catullo, 25, of Springfield and a second suspect by detectives of the Manhattan South Public Morals Division of the New York City Police Department and the Union County Prosecutor's Office, Organized Crime Unit.

"Confiscated within the apartment were hundreds of thousands of dollars of bookmaking records and computerized tapes, along with telephones and tape recorders," said Catolencio. "Analysis of those records showed the operation grossed over \$75,000 weekly, and involved over 20 bookmaking agents and 100 or more bettors."

Both Catullo and Chialli were charged with promoting gambling and possession of gambling records, both Class E felonies in the state of New York.

Lapolla said the two were arraigned in Manhattan and would be released pending grand jury action. "A joint investigation by the Public Morals and the Organized Crime Unit of the New York City Police Department and the Union County Prosecutor's Office is continuing," Lapolla said.

## School board begins ADA transition

The Springfield Board of Education last week took steps to comply with federal legislation requiring school districts to make their facilities accessible to the handicapped.

Monday, the board introduced its plan to transition the school district's facilities and drinking fountains to accommodate the wheelchair-bound.

The ADA transition report was compiled by a committee that comprises members of the education and Springfield communities.

To make every facility in its jurisdiction handicapped accessible, only one program.

**Augustine prods FAA on noise**

Assemblyman Alan M. Augustine said today that his stinging public criticism of the Federal Aviation Administration's failure to take action in response to widespread citizen complaints about aircraft flight noise will lead to further demand for enactment.

Augustine, who delivered a statement leveling harsh criticism of the FAA at a Jan. 5 public hearing in Cranford, said he continues to hold to the position that officials in the FAA responsible for illegal implementation of the Expanded East Coast Plan "should be held accountable for their actions."

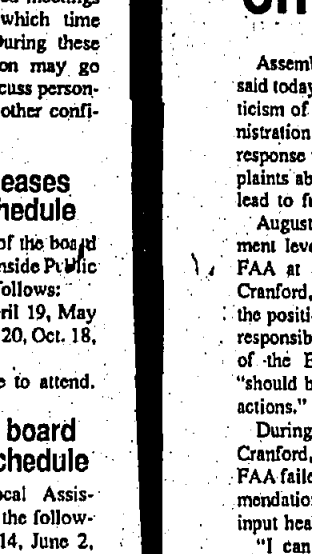
During his public testimony in Cranford, Augustine noted that the FAA failed to act on any of the recommendations he had made at a public input hearing held the previous year.

"I can't understand the agency's failure to follow through and its apparent willingness to ignore the requests for information and study data voiced by myself and many other public officials," Augustine said. "I wasn't making them on behalf of the citizens I represent as an elected public official. Apparently, the FAA doesn't care about the rights of those citizens."

Augustine noted—that the Draft Environmental Impact Statement presented for comment at the hearing, cost taxpayers \$4 million and was delivered nearly two years after its promised due date.

In a portion of his statement that completely unraveled the credibility of the Draft EIS, Augustine noted that while the FAA reported that the EIS was necessary to reduce flight delays, the agency's own statistics reveal that the percentage of delayed operations at Newark airport has actually increased since EISCP was instituted.

Participating in this service project were two members of the Jewish War Veterans of Post 78 of Hillside entertained patients at the East Orange Veterans Hospital.

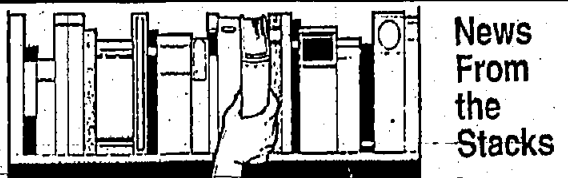
The Scouts assisted the patients in finding the numbers on the bingo cards, either by pointing them out, or acting as eyes for blind patients.
