

Santagata refuses to bow out; Pappas vows aggressive race

Union County Freeholder Louis Santagata, who was ousted from the GOP ticket at a Republican County Screening Committee meeting last month, is back in the race.

Santagata, a former Hillside mayor, this week said he has collected "well over 200 signatures" on a petition that will be submitted to the county clerk before the filing deadline for the June primary. That deadline is today.

By obtaining the required 100 signatures, Santagata is now eligible to seek election "off the line" in the primary.

Santagata, who is completing an initial three-year term on the Freeholder Board, failed to secure his party's nomination last month when a 25-member screening committee selected Springfield Township Committeeman Harry Pappas to run in the GOP primary with incumbent Freeholder Linda DiGiovanni and Linda-Lee Kelly.

The committee, which consisted of municipal chairpersons, the county chairman and other GOP leaders, gave Santagata 11 votes. Kelly received 22, DiGiovanni, 20, and Pappas, 16. Henry Kurz, a former Roselle Park councilman, also sought nomination and received six votes from committee members.

Santagata said he declined offers from other Republicans who wanted to join him as running mates because he didn't want to "hurt" DiGiovanni or Kelly.

"I'm just trying to regain the position I feel I deserve," said Santagata, who described his removal from the ticket as "absolutely obscene."

Santagata said if his effort in the primary fails, he will seek election as an independent in the general election.

"I'm not an Independent; I'm a Republican," he said. "I'm nothing new in Union County politics."

Santagata said he feels he was

removed from the Republican line because he occasionally disagreed with party policy.

"Never once did I go out there and vote against party lines," he said. "There were times, however, that I disagreed with policy and expressed a difference of opinion."

The decision last month to "drop" Santagata from the ticket generated a petition drive among Republicans, requesting that County GOP Chairman Frank McDermott call a meeting to discuss the nomination process.

Republican gubernatorial candidate Cary Edwards added to the controversy when he issued a letter criticizing the county committee for excluding Santagata.

"This is a dramatic departure from the past where hundreds of rank-and-file Republicans have attended the Union County convention to participate in a democratic process of selecting county candidates," Edwards wrote.

McDermott said the removal of an incumbent from the ticket "is nothing new in Union County politics."

McDermott said Santagata was

"more than entitled to seek election," adding that "it's a free and open primary."

Pappas also said he "had no problem" with Santagata's decision to run off the Republican line.

Pappas stressed that he "didn't do anything wrong" when he sought the nomination, explaining that when Kurz announced a week before the meeting that he intended to appear before the screening committee, "that opened up the process."

"There were no clandestine meetings with people being told how to vote. There were 25 intelligent people who knew what they were doing. The bottom line is, I received 16 out of 25 votes" and won the nomination instead of Santagata, he said.

As far as the upcoming election battle, Pappas said he was "not averse to running a very aggressive campaign."

Santagata also predicted a tough campaign.

"I think you're going to see an awful lot of dirt thrown about," he said.

Garwood bows out of study

The first defection? Or the exodus of a weak link? The Garwood Board of Education has dropped out of a joint deregionalization study undertaken by local boards in Berkeley Heights, Kenilworth, Montclair and Springfield. The study focuses on options for disbarring the Union County Regional High School District.

Garwood board members and school officials reportedly cited restrictive parameters being analyzed by the consultant hired by the local boards. The educators indicated that they wanted the consultant to examine additional deregionalization or new regionalization scenarios.

The Garwood board joins the Clark board as non-participants in the multi-board study. The Clark board never signed on to the study, arguing that Clark gets a good fiscal deal from the region and is relatively satisfied with the educational program.

Garwood residents also shoulder a relatively light regional tax compared with some of the other member towns.

Regional Superintendent Donald Merschnik stated this week that the four-town deregionalization study is skewed because "the best option, K-12 regionalization, won't be examined."

"The answers that they get," Merschnik said, in reference to the local boards, "will be the answers that they want."

Committee clashes over subs

Campus Sub-Shop bid selected over Dickey Dee's

Township Committee members clashed Tuesday evening about the issue of selecting a concessionaire to run the snack bar at the municipal pool.

In a 3-1 vote, committee members endorsed the question from Campus Sub Shop II over a proposal from last year's concessionaire, Dickey Dee's. Marla Forman, Jo Ann Holmes and Philip Kurmos voted to select Campus Sub while Harry Pappas voted no. Committee member Jeffrey Katz was not present.

In an executive session prior to the regular meeting, Holmes recommended that the committee opt for the Campus Sub shop over Dickey Dee's more lucrative offer. The vendors offer a fee to the pool utility to run the snack bar; Campus Sub offered \$5,000 and Dickey Dee's offered \$5,010.

Holmes argued that the committee should select Campus Sub, which was the snack bar concessionaire two years ago, even though it offered the pool utility less money because many

residents were not happy with the service provided by Dickey Dee's last year. She also mentioned that Campus Sub had offered a more extensive menu with more frugal pricing and would be using a local supplier.

Township Committee member Harry Pappas stated in the executive session that he would vote against accepting Campus Sub since the alleged complaints against Dickey Dee's were undocumented, the company's quote provided more revenue for the pool, and it should also have been given the option to provide a more extensive menu.

Mayor Philip Kurmos interjected that the differential between the two companies' quotes was merely \$1,010 and that this revenue "doesn't impact the town budget" since the pool utility is autonomous.

The township attorney noted that the town was not required to seek formal bids for the snack bar concession since the amount in question was "under the threshold."

In a phone interview after the regular meeting, Pappas stated that the

Quayle? In 1996? Maybe...

With memories of the 1992 presidential election still lingering, some might think that it's too early to begin thinking about the 1996 election.

Springfield resident Kevin Scholla is not one of those people.

Scholla is the coordinator of an organization called Dan Quayle Diplomats, a county support group for the former vice president. The group's aim is to emphasize his ideas and encourage Quayle to seek the presidency in 1996.

"The election is four years away, but I believe that we have to start now to change the impression that people have of him," Scholla said. "Quayle doesn't get good press and I'd like to see him get the credit he deserves."

Scholla worked at the Bush/Quayle headquarters in Kenilworth and is involved in the Union County Republican Party. But the Dan Quayle Diplomats is his own, independent organization.

"The group is not part of the county Republican Party, but people have found out about it through word-of-mouth within the party," he said. "I've even had calls from people in other states who found out about the organization through Quayle's office in Washington."

Scholla had the opportunity to meet Quayle during the campaign. He attended a breakfast in Vineland where the former vice president was speaking. "I got to shake his hand, say hello and get my picture taken with him," he said.

Right now, Scholla is organizing a trip to Washington for a group of supporters. They will attend a party for Quayle before he leaves Washington to return to Indiana.

"Right now, he's still in Washington because his children are still in school," Scholla said. "Once school ends for the summer, they'll be moving in Indianapolis. The party will give us a chance to show our support before he leaves. It's tentatively scheduled for early June and he will be there to speak and shake hands with us."

When Quayle returns to Indiana, a representation of Scholla's group will be going too. According to Scholla, some Dan Quayle Diplomats stationery will be included in the Dan Quayle Commemorative Foundation museum in Huntington.

Kenilworth may again decide budget's fate

The Union County Regional High School District's proposed tax levels were defeated by voters in 1990 and 1991, but won approval at the ballot box in 1992 — in large part due to a sizable pro-budget turnout in Kenilworth.

Kenilworth residents had been assured that the best way to ensure the retention of David Brarley Regional High School within the regional framework would be to pass the 1992 budget.

But last November the Regional Board of Education opted to cease operating Brarley in September, and now the budgetary dynamics may be altered.

As voters from Berkeley Heights, Clark, Garwood, Kenilworth, Mountaineer and Springfield participate in school election day Tuesday and get set to pass judgment on the regional district's proposed \$30,058,505 1993-94 tax levy, a reduction of 1.73 percent over the current year, Brarley supporters in Kenilworth are mounting a major drive to deliver a "no" vote.

Jane Glynn of the Committee of Concerned Parents of Kenilworth said this week that Brarley supporters are "going all-out" to defeat the tax levy.

The tax levy vote is not calculated on a town-by-town basis. The "yes" or "no" votes are tabulated for the region as a whole regardless of town affiliation.

Glynn argued that even though Kenilworth produced a huge turnout last year, borough residents "were never enamored with the regional budget."

She contended that the district "spends too much," is not serious about cost-containment, and makes little effort to "involve industry and seek grants."

"How can they close a school and raise our taxes?" Glynn said.

Despite the fact that the proposed 1993-94 tax levy represents a 1.73 percent cut for the district as a whole, the regional funding formula translates to proposed increases next year for Berkeley Heights, 0.2 percent; Clark, 1.5 percent; Kenilworth, 3.2 percent; and Mountaineer, 4.6 percent. The tax-levy would fall in Garwood, 12.3 percent, and Springfield, 7.7 percent.

OK the local budget

Representing an increase of less than 2 percent over last year, the proposed \$9.9 million budget presented by the Springfield Board of Education deserves the support of residents.

The nine-member board — which administers education to Springfield youngsters from preschool to eighth grade — was particularly resourceful this year, securing revenues from state and federal grants, leased facilities and tuition from non-resident students to offset expenses.

Increases in the costs of medical insurance, maintenance, salaries and instructional materials represents the lion's share of the 1993-94 fiscal plan for the district's schools — Gaudineer, James Caldwell, Sandmeier and Walton.

To further offset these increases, the board opted this year to dip into its surplus account, which, together with other sources including participation in the state's early retirement plan, registered about \$445,000 on the revenue side of the ledger.

The local school district has earned a reputation for providing a high quality education in an effective learning environment. This budget will enable that process to continue.

We welcome the return of three Board of Education candidates to their posts. Stephen Fischbein, Kenneth Faigenbaum and Keith Krutzen, who are unopposed in their re-election bids this year, have proven to be thoughtful and dedicated members who deserve another term on the board.

We urge the board as a whole to continue to seek creative funding sources as it has done this year, and to spend tax dollars wisely.

Vote LiCausi

Theresa LiCausi deserves to be re-elected to a full term on the Union County Regional Board of Education. Appointed last year to assume long-time Springfield representative Natalie Wald's post on the board, LiCausi has proven to be an energetic advocate of quality education and cost containment.

LiCausi appears to be an independent, common sense thinker who can digest the substance of a debate as well as contribute to its progress.

Her professed eagerness to put a significant dent in the regional district's expenditures, without "penny-pinching on programs," is what taxpayers need. Budget cutting, particularly in education, can be a delicate matter. LiCausi's vote to close a high school says she'll make the tough calls. That's a good sign. There'll be plenty of them.

Give support

Springfield voters should approve the 1993-94 budget proposed by the Union County Regional School District. While we remain disappointed that the \$37.4 million spending plan does not reflect the savings initially projected with the closing of David Brearley Regional High School, there will be significant savings nonetheless.

The decision to close one of its four high schools was the right one. With that decision comes the administrative, curricular and fiscal juggling inherent in such a downsizing.

As the district marks a transition year in which the number of schools in the consortium decreases from four to three, this is not the time to play with programs — which could be the case if the budget is rejected.

The regional district needs support this year, not chaos.

Despite the fact that it's extremely early and only political junkies and people who have to write a weekly column are paying attention, it's clear Cary has a problem.

OK, the illegal alien thing hurt him a couple of months ago, but Whitman had the same problem. In fact, she owed a lot more in back taxes. Plus, she was a process guy if there ever was one, was full of talk about government and how it worked. It didn't hurt him.

never said flatly: "I made a mistake. I blew it." It's not a court of law; it's a campaign.

Cary's problem could also be a question of knowing your audience. One long-time State House observer told me this week: "Cary's problem is that he knows a lot about state government and never takes a chance to talk that to an audience on the campaign trail. He's an interesting, engaging guy and the people who know what he's going on in Trenton know he's smart about the process, but the average voter is bored by all the details. He doesn't know when to shut up."

OK, but that analysis is a bit flawed. The overwhelming number of voters never get to actually meet a gubernatorial candidate. Plus in 1989, Florio, a process guy if there ever was one, was full of talk about government and how it worked. It didn't hurt him.

The bottom line is that much of a statewide campaign is fought over the airwaves, radio and television. And since none of the GOP candidates had the way to get on the air of March 1, Edwards' problem was in this race. Well, now Cary is on the air and

things are becoming more clear. A trend is emerging.

This past week, Edwards and Whitman unveiled their first wave of radio spots. And while the signs are everywhere that the economy and unemployment remain the No. 1 issue in New Jersey — a recent poll found that 40 percent of all residents were worried that they might lose their job in the next year — what does Edwards talk about? Crime.

Here's some of the spot: "Can you believe that Christine Whitman? Last week, when Republican candidate Cary Edwards unveiled a comprehensive crime fighting plan, Whitman's campaign answered that crime is not an issue in the governor's race. Maybe crime isn't around Whitman's estate, but it sure is around the rest of New Jersey." The ad goes on to say that Cary is the "only" candidate who knows how to fight crime and the "toughness to wage effective war on criminals."

A couple of things. Whitman never said crime wasn't an issue. She said, "The real issue in this campaign is Jim Florio and taxes." For a lot of voters who are having trouble paying their monthly bills, Florio and taxes are the issue — together with the economy. Taxpayers wonder why government cannot operate more like a business. As public officials, our challenge and our goal is to restore the public's faith and confidence in the ability of public officials to make government responsive to the needs of the people in a way that is efficient and cost effective.

To meet this challenge, I am advocating that we "reinvigorate" government by moving away from our present bureaucratic structure and change to a more responsive, "entrepreneurial" style of government. To do this, we need to define county government's role. We need to develop a mission statement that will shift the focus away from compliance with the bureaucratic rules and regulations of our present system.

Next, politicians always talk about

tem and, instead concentrate on achieving results or positive outcomes.

Needed reforms can help rebuild Congress

As a candidate for Congress, I said that Congress wasn't working for the American people. The institution seemed unwilling, and often incapable, of addressing the very real problems people face in their everyday lives.

Serving in Congress for the last three months hasn't changed my opinion; it's only reinforced it. In fact, Congress is far more messed up than I ever imagined. Congress has become a giant \$3 billion bureaucracy that places huge barriers in the way of progress and stifles creativity, new ideas and change.

A defining moment for me came on the night the House Budget Committee, on which I served, voted on a budget resolution for the upcoming fiscal year. As minority members of the committee, we had taken our job very seriously. Endless hours were spent pouring over facts and figures to identify specific areas of federal deficit by \$429 billion over the next five years without raising taxes.

I came to the meeting prepared to debate the resolution and vote on their own plan. Their budget resolution, which authorized more than \$1.5 trillion in spending, was just 15 pages long. It offered no specifics or any justification for setting its spending targets. That's no way to

manage the taxpayers' money. The American people deserve a better system.

The terms of committee chairman and ranking members need to be limited as well. Having served 13 years in the New Jersey Legislature, I have enormous respect for experience. Length of service, however, should not be the sole criteria we use to determine who wields the most influence in Congress. With so much power over setting the national agenda in the hands of a few committee chairmen, Congress won't change until we open up the process to new members with new ideas.

There's another common-sense reform that's long overdue — make all laws apply to Congress. Congress makes the nation's laws and then proceeds to exempt itself from complying with them. How can members of Congress possibly understand the impact their laws have on people throughout our country when they aren't required to obey them? It's wrong and must be changed!

Reduce the number of committees and cut committee budgets by 25 percent. Congress is the most expensive Legislature in the world, spending nearly \$3 billion of your tax dollars per year just to run the institution. By merely cutting committee budgets by 25 percent, we could save over \$600 million. With dozens of committees — plus subcommittees and spe-

cial committees — there is certainly room for far greater savings by eliminating needless and overlapping committees.

The reforms I have outlined provide the fundamental changes needed to build a new Congress — one that can effectively address the real concerns of the American people.

Vote for budget on its merits

To the Editor:

On Nov. 17, 1992, the Board of Union County Regional High School District voted to close David Brearley Regional High School in Kenilworth. Vehement local opposition to that difficult choice has plunged this regional district into the deepest crisis of its 56-year history.

Faced with the obvious need to close one of its four schools for the sake of educational quality and economy, the board supported the recommendation of Superintendent Douglas Menachuk in closing Brearley, one of the four. One of the other three clearly would have yielded less beneficial results for students and taxpayers.

Of course, opponents of the Brearley-closing have demonstrated, written letters in the editor, spoken at public meetings, contacted state legislators for assistance and run a spirited fund-raising effort.

However, they have also urged students not to cooperate in the coming transition to new schools; they have discouraged potential occupants from leasing the Brearley building; they have filed a costly, time-consuming lawsuit against the district; and they have lobbied for enactment of state legislation aimed at nothing less than dissolution of the district itself.

Unfortunately, it is within this emotional, politically charged environment that we must now consider the district's proposed budget for the 1993-94 school year. For the sake of our district's students, it is important that we deal with the budget on its merits, not for the chance to send imagined political messages.

Sadly, due at least in part to the expensive struggle we have been forced to wage, the district will not realize the savings once expected from a school closing. Nevertheless, the proposed budget for 1993-94 remains more than \$2 million under cap. Providing for contracted pay increases, an enhanced eight-period school day and one-time expenses involved in closing Brearley, it reflects a substantial cost-control effort that still provides very real educational improvements.

The idea of saving a local school is emotionally appealing to say the least. But no one should misunderstand the real costs of keeping Brearley open. This district now serves only 2,162 students compared to 5,722 during the peak year 1979. Only 423 students now attend Brearley and this number would fall to 408 if the school remained open next year.

If Brearley had remained open — even if all four schools were taken over by local districts — a precious chance to enhance educational opportunities will be lost. And the total cost of running four schools rather than three will be higher no matter who administers them.

Thanks for your support of education during this very difficult time.




