Students walk out in Brearley protest

More than 80 high school students left their classrooms and school grounds at 10:30 a.m. on Wednesday to protest the decision to close Brearley High School in Kenilworth, according to school officials in a written statement Thursday.

School officials said approximately 27 students left Dayton Thursday, and 55 were believed to have left ALJ on Wednesday.

Officials of the Union County Regional High School District concluded that 18 of the 55 students returned to school, while six were returned by officers of the Clark Police Department. The Springfield Police Department does not have any record of dispatching officers to Dayton, police officials said Friday. Dayton Principal Judith Wickline said she did not approve of the students' actions.

"I don't think it is over a good idea to miss school for any reason," Wickline said.

According to a statement issued by the regional district, disciplinary action has been taken against those who participated in the walk-out. The students who left school and did not return have received the mandatory punishment for truancy and unexcused absences: two 4-hour Saturday school sessions. The 18 students who returned on their own volition were issued one Saturday school session.

This is the "normal disciplinary action for truancy or unexcused absence," according to Thomas Long, spokesman for the regional district.

When asked their reasons for leaving the school grounds, three Kenilworth students agreed that they wanted to observe the anniversary of the decision to close Brearley, and that they also wanted to make the point, specifically to Superintendent Donald Merachuk, that their transition to another school has not been a smooth one.

Jennifer Paster, a senior at Arthur L. Johnson, explained that her actions held a special meaning for her and those who participated. "We didn't want everybody to think that if we didn't recognize the significance of this day, that people would think that we forgot about it," she said.

Paster said that the idea of the walk-out had been discussed previously by herself and friends. "We were going to do something in October. When November came, we thought we would all stay home and nobody call 'em' but we thought a walk-out would be more recognizable," she said.

She added that the group felt that their decision to participate in the walk-out fulfilled certain priorities which they had established. "I think everybody who walked out accomplished something. We proved the point that we haven't forgotten," she said.

Paster described her transition process as a little different from her fellow classmates' because of her family's move from Linden to Kenilworth during the summer preceding her freshman year of high school.

"The transition is getting easier because I'm making new friends. It's different for me because I moved here before I started at Brearley. We purposely moved to Kenilworth because of the high school, and I had to make new friends then. Three years later I had to go through the same process again," she added.

Miss Gooch, a senior, agreed that the focus of the walk-out was to send a message to the regional administration. "The main reason was, we just wanted to tell Dr. Merachuk that we didn't forget the closing of the school. It didn't go by and everything is all right now."

"My mind was made up before the actual day," added Gooch. Since attending Arthur L. Johnson, Gooch said that he has had to drop some of his classes. He cited a lack of instructors who understand him or know him from his previous high school experience. "A lot of the teachers don't know me so I'm opposed to a teacher who knows what you're going to do, and I was assigned a new guidance counselor. Since she knows nothing about me, I had to switch back to my other one."


The annual program is directed by Senior Coordinator Theresa Herkato.

First aid squad lacks donations

Contributions are far below average for the Springfield First Aid Squad as it completes its second month of fund-raising. Roy Neischart, fund drive chairman, said.

The first mailing went out the week after Labor Day and the second just after Election Day, he said.

"Response to the first mailing is slow," he said, "but usually people are ready to jump after the second." This year, however, people are not responding the way they usually do and donations are drastically below last year, he said.

"Usually, we only get responses from about 30 percent of the town, and this year it's slower than other years," Neischart said.

Neischart said he thinks the lack of donations is due to a combination of the economy and the fact that people are asked to donate from so many different organizations they don't know where to place their gifts.

The first-aid squad is to help the squad buy a new ambulance and replace one that is 11 years old, he said. A new ambulance will cost between \$85,000 and \$95,000, depending on the number of options, Neischart said.

Even though all of the money cannot be generated in one year, the purchase was put off from last year because there was not enough money generated by the drive, he said. In past years the squad bought a new ambulance every four to five years, but now the amount of time is lengthening because of the lack of contributions, Neischart said.

"We are the only emergency service they have, and I can't believe the response is that poor," he said. "In order to keep serving the residents of Springfield, we need their contributions to keep us up to date. Their contributions keep us in existence."

The amount and percentage of contributions has not changed, while the squad's expenses are constantly increasing, he said. Some of the other expenses included in the 36-volunteer squad are, oxygen and oxygen equipment, first aid supplies and other supplies to keep it up to date, he said.

Language program stresses fluency

A report on the Union County Regional High School District's foreign language program was recently presented to the regional board by Aldo Collura, who is the coordinator of foreign language instruction for the regional.

Outlining the regional's emphasis on fluency, Collura reflected that rather than stress to the student to speak the language precisely, it is more important to make sure that there is communication fluency.

According to Collura, the instructional method used by the regional district "tries to train students to think in that language, which is a process that can't be done overnight." He compared the method to the way a child first encounters language, through repetition and imitation.

The process of training students to think in the respective language that they are studying is difficult at the high school level because the program is not one of total immersion. Collura characterized the first and second years as a "do it now, do it later" process.

The regional district emphasizes the development of skills so that students can handle themselves in varied situations, said Collura. Related to this emphasis is the use of computer software, tapes, workbooks, video and friends of the faculty who are native



Students leave classes in protest

Jennifer Shallcross agreed with Pastor and Good about the group's desire to alert officials to their situation. "We wanted to show Dr. Merschuk that the transition period was not going as smoothly as people are led to believe because he just sits there and doesn't get involved," said Shallcross.

Joanne Shallcross, Jennifer's mother, expressed concern at the lack of support that has been given by the regional to those students who were forced to change schools because of the closing of Brearley and to David Carl, principal of Arthur L. Johnson, and the members of his staff.

"Mr. Carl has done everything humanly possible to try to deal with the problems as they've been coming up. He inherited an impossible situation, and it is not fair that the people responsible for closing the school are taking a back seat. He should have a team of counselors to help him and his staff. This is a big adjustment for the Clark students too," she said.

Shallcross said that she had heard that some of the students were planning to walk out, but that others would remain in school and participate in the candlelight vigil outside Brearley later that evening as an alternative.

"I had heard rumors that some of the kids were going to walk out. I felt that this was not a good idea. To my knowledge they were going to the vigil instead of doing this because it wasn't a good idea."

"I found out about the walk-out at 10:50. My daughter and three of her friends came to my place of work and told me that they had walked out," said Shallcross.

Upon arriving at her home later that afternoon, Shallcross said, "I found a dozen Kentilworth kids who I have seen grow up, sitting in my family room huddled up together on my sofa, watching a movie like a bunch of lost puppies. They're children crying out for help. This is why I feel that the people who have inherited our children need help dealing with this transition, and I know that they're not getting that help."

Shallcross also cited academic concerns. "Two weeks ago, my daughter re-took the SATs and her scores went down. She was a B-plus student and on the honor roll at Brearley. Now she is getting C's. Her grades have dropped and I am very concerned," she said.

The younger Shallcross said, "My grades have dropped because I don't really care about my classes."

Janet Glynn, president of the Kentilworth-based Committee of Concerned Parents organization, echoed the anxieties of the Shallcrosses regarding the lack of staff support for the students who changed schools.

"Why doesn't somebody realize that the kids need help? We realize that you can't fight and fight, but the kids are having problems and they're not doing anything about it."

Robert Jones, the Kentilworth representative to the regional board, did not condone the students' actions. However, he did offer them his support.

"Agree or disagree, I support the kids of Kentilworth and their con-

dition, they walked out, but I have to stand behind them and their families," Jens commented.

Assembly approves Bagger's new bill

Legislation sponsored by Assemblyman Richard H. Bagger, R-22, that would assist municipalities in addressing illegal multi-family dwellings while protecting innocent tenants, was approved by the Assembly Nov. 15.

The measure, Assembly bill 1891, would establish zoning violations as grounds for eviction and permit municipalities to provide relocation assistance to tenants at the landlord's expense. According to Bagger, the bill is intended to make it easier for municipalities to crack down on illegal multi-family dwellings which are often the source of fire and housing code violations.

"In many communities, illegal conversions have divided one- or two-family homes into four, five or more apartments contrary to zoning requirements and without necessary housing code and fire safety provisions," Bagger said. "This legislation gives local governments the ability to bring these illegal and unsafe apartments into compliance, without financial hardship to tenants."

Under Bagger's bill, municipalities would be permitted to adopt an ordinance requiring illegal landlords to provide relocation assistance to tenants displaced by zoning enforcement activity. In addition, the municipal court could fine the violating landlord up to six months rent for each illegal apartment.

"The residential character of many older suburban communities is being gradually threatened by an increasing number of illegal residential conversions. Assembly bill 1891 gives municipalities the tools to enforce local zoning requirements, eliminate building code and fire safety violations and protect the tenants who were lured into illegal apartments," Bagger said.

The legislation was adopted in the Assembly by a vote of 70 to 0 and now heads to the governor for his signature.

Meteor shower dusts the sky

Each year in mid-December the earth passes through an area full of meteoroids. These tiny rocks and dust are remnants of a comet. As these objects burn up in the atmosphere, what are commonly referred to as "shooting stars" can be seen in the night sky. On the evenings and early mornings of Dec. 12, 13 and 14, the Geminids will offer an excellent opportunity to view such a meteor shower. It is not unusual to see between 40-60 meteors an hour.

The name "Geminid" comes from the fact that the meteors seem to radiate from the constellation Gemini. Most Geminids are very bright and easily seen. Some are even fireballs.

According to the Union County Board of Chosen Freeholders, Trailside Nature and Science Center will host a Geminid Meteor Watch on Dec. 13 from 8 to 11 p.m. The program will begin at Trailside's Planetarium with an orientation on the current night sky and tips on where to look for the meteors. Once outside, participants can locate the real thing and keep warm around a campfire. Meteor watchers should bring a blanket or lawn chair.

Registration is required and a fee of \$3 per person will be charged. For registration or other information, call Trailside at (908) 782-3670. Trailside is a facility of Union County Division of Parks and Recreation.

Residents recall Kennedy memories

The memory of the assassination of President John F. Kennedy comes back in a split second for many people who are old enough to remember the 35th president of the United States. The most frequently asked question, "Where were you when Kennedy was shot?" still can be answered as if the shooting occurred yesterday, even as the nation marks the 30th anniversary of his death this week.

Carrie Verducci, receptionist in Springfield, said she has a vivid recall of the day when J.F.K. was shot. She said she was walking between the clothing and food section of a store that has been replaced by Rite-Aids. "I can remember it just like yesterday; everything was all excited,"

Mike Garzone said he was in his store, Mountaineer Shoe Service, on that Friday afternoon when he learned the news and went next door to the deli to see if they had heard. Everyone started putting on their radios and televisions. He said, "It was quite an awesome feeling."

"Then later," he said, "when everyone heard, everything was quiet." Ted Lyons, who works for the Springfield maintenance department, said he was 5 years old at the time and was frightened by the excitement that followed the event.

Lyons said, "I remember being on the street and crying openly. Tears were just streaming down my face. I just couldn't stop crying and I wasn't the only one," he said.

Kurnos said he couldn't believe it was 30 years ago as he explained how it took him a long time to get over the devastation of the event.

"I remember thinking the whole world was going to come to an end," he said. Mountaineer Mayor Robert Vigilanti also had a poignant memory of the event. He recalled that he was packing his suitcase in the Lincoln Park Hotel in Cincinnati, Ohio, when the show he was watching, "Hazel," was interrupted by the news flash of the shooting. He left for the airport shortly after the news and by the time he arrived an announcement was being broadcast over the PA system that the president had died. Vigilanti said,

On Nov. 22, 1963, as he rode in an open convertible through the streets of Dallas, Kennedy was hit by a bullet and died 29 minutes later in Parkland Hospital.





Ferrante expressed his feelings about the Paper Mill Playhouse. "It's a great theater for the show, but they do a great job. It's hard to play comedy in a big theater," he said. "It's easier to do comedy on a more intimate stage. But it works so well at the Paper Mill, it's amazing. It really comes off well, and especially with such a wonderful cast and director. My family will be flying in from Los Angeles in December to see the show. They've seen all my shows and have traveled everywhere. They are really so supportive."

After Ferrante completes his run of Groucho, what will he do next? He chuckled. "I'll be going back to Los Angeles where I live. After I do my next show," Ferrante shrugged. "I'll go back to the life of an actor, and start looking for something else."




