### Stegner's book featured

## Chief issues warning

Springfield Police Chief William Chisholm has issued a warning to all residents to be aware of unpermitted solicitors as a result of a theft-by-deception arrest Saturday.

Frank Nichols, 37, of Jackson was charged by Detective Judd Lovenson with theft by deception and soliciting without a permit after he tried to sell a resident's driveway without a permit.

Nichols, a self-employed paving contractor, was wanted by several agencies for similar offenses, police said. Nichols drove through residential areas and offered to do driveway paving. He allegedly used water-down paint that did not coat the driveways and then charged exorbitant fees for his services, police said.

"This is a typical type of fraud prevalent in the spring, especially after a severe winter," police said.

Very often elderly people are targeted. "What usually happens, according to police, is the solicitor will ask to repair driveways and basements, but will only apply water-down paint with a sprayer and charge more than what a regular job would cost."

Chisholm advised homeowners to be wary of these types of fraud. Anyone legitimately licensed to solicit in this town will have a permit issued by the township, which the homeowner should request to see. Residents should report any people soliciting, who refuse to show a permit, to the Springfield police.

Nichols is being held at the Essex County Jail without bail, police said, on a warrant issued by the Essex County Sheriff's Department.

## Committee passes pool fee increase

The Township Committee adopted an ordinance Tuesday which calls for a 10 percent increase in the municipal pool membership fees for the 1994 season.

Committee member Hubert Stone was not present at the meeting. Committee member Harry Pappas voted against the ordinance stating, "I don't think the increase was such a modest increase. I'm not sure that we have gone the extra mile and explored each and every option for cost reduction."

The ordinance was passed by a 5-2 vote for any pool application received after June 15. "I think that's unaccommodating," he said.

Committee member Jeffrey Katz said the fee made perfect business sense because there would be no way to gauge what type of services were necessary to provide when setting up a staff if people waited until after the deadline to apply. He added that the fee forces people to make a commitment and therefore makes planning to accommodate those people a lot more realistic. Pappas clarified that he was in favor of charging a late fee, but not \$50.

Resident Charlie Jacques said, "I'm surprised to see the increase in the pool membership, particularly in the family membership. I'd like to know what caused this." According to Jacques, this fee was \$170 in 1992, and since then, a half-year membership has been offered to make it more affordable to families.

Katz responded to Jacques' comments by explaining that because the pool is a private facility, the township must guarantee its audience that it will remain solvent in the operation of that facility. He added that the township cannot begin a season without being certain it can cover all costs.

Jacques asked about improvements to the facility and how much shifting of funds occurs between facilities such as the pool, the softball field and the town dump. He followed up by asking how funds come from for the swim team.

"I said that because the pool is a utility, taxpayers' money cannot be applied. He added that the swim team is financed by its members and their parents."

Katz cited filter and roof replacements which are still being paid off, and additional shower facilities as areas of recent improvement. "I think you'll find that it will be well-managed this year," he said, adding that staffing will be at a minimum, but will be sufficient to satisfy the members' needs.

Jacques concluded by saying that he felt the 23 percent fee increase of the last two years is "excessive and self-defeating."

During a town meeting on April 11, some committee members expressed doubt over the validity of the increase because free passes will be lost to members.

Pappas asked remaining members how they could justify raising fees while giving pool members free passes when they apply.

In response to the question of what the township will do to offset the increase, Director George Rappe said the increases were made to help ensure that the pool will run as efficiently as possible.

Rappe said for a family membership which costs \$210, two passes are given, two for the weekend which are worth \$6 and two for weekdays which cost \$1 to purchase. For seniors, membership fees are \$55, which is down \$5. The cost for an individual is \$137. With both of those memberships, two guest passes are given.

Pappas said giving out free passes is "upsetting" when the overall fee is increased, because all other options were not carefully explored. Pappas said there are other cost-saving measures which could have been further examined including trimming the amount of municipal pool employees.

Fees were raised last year because allegedly the pool was in "dire straits," Pappas said.

At that time, committee members said free memberships will no longer be given to township employees.

## Concern leads to debris cleanup

A resident's concern and police action led to the cleanup of several truckloads of paving debris from a work site last week on the property of a resident in Springfield.

Springfield Police Chief William Chisholm said a car was sent to an abandoned construction site after a resident called in and complained about noise. Police asked a construction worker who had dumped excess rocks on a nearby pile of land to clean up the debris from the street before his shift ended at 6 a.m., Chisholm said.

Every night, for approximately a week, residents of Park Place Township were woken to the sound of what one resident, who asked to remain anonymous, referred to as "a truck banging up against buildings."

The resident said she called the police at about 11 p.m. and within minutes a car was sent to investigate the problem. At about 9:30 a.m. police were back at the site with the construction worker and made sure the debris was removed, she said.

An Autoland of New Jersey vice president, Andrea Kurban, said she was alerted to the problem by a Park Place neighbor who called the car dealership after she had called the Springfield police.

"It was good because our neighbor was kind enough to call us and let us know a very nice lady called to tell Autoland that she had heard loud noises in the middle of the night that sounded like someone was dumping something," she said.

Kurban assured the *Leader* that the construction company was not authorized by anyone at Autoland to dump the material. And the company will not receive any payment for their work until all parties involved are "comfortable" with the work and the cleanup.

Springfield police said the construction company inadvertently dumped the debris on the pavement. No complaints or tickets were issued; they were only asked to remove the material.

## Robbery downs business

A Springfield resident and self-employed plumber said his truck was robbed April 21 of several thousands of dollars worth of equipment at Ricken Home Center in Union and the Police Department would not investigate the incident.

Mel Lewis said he called the Union police and was told that an investigation would not be conducted because there were no witnesses to the incident and that a police car would not be dispatched. But he said, police told him if he brought the truck to Police Headquarters someone would take a look at the damage and take a report. And that, according to Lewis, did not happen either.

Union Police Chief Dennis Farrell said if Lewis reported that a car be dispatched to the scene, he should have gotten one. A citizen's report immediately filed out after an incident like Lewis' occurs, Farrell said.

"If a car was requested then he should have gotten one. But he was probably advised to fill out an after-the-fact breaking-and-entering report," Farrell said. Police reports which Lewis filed out listed the incident as a breaking-and-entering complaint.

"I think there should be more security to prevent something like this from happening, especially in broad daylight," Lewis said.

Lewis said after he left the store he entered his truck and noticed that someone had been in the truck. Tools and the truck's door lock were on the ground near the truck.

He said he went into Ricken and asked to speak to the security guard on duty. But after employees could not find the guard, he said he called the Union police. Lewis said he was most upset about the event because not only were the tools missing but there was not an investigation into the incident which has crippled his 13-year-old business.

"I did not have insurance on these tools. Someone took away my livelihood. How do I tell people I can't answer their call because I don't have any tools? I was a small business man struggling to stay in business, and now I'm totally devastated," Lewis said. "I'm shocked."

### Education costs, loss in state aid blamed for budget defeats

### Franks sponsors crime conference

Saying "people in the community must work together to fight back against crime," Congressman Bob Franks has announced that he is sponsoring a 7th Congressional District Conference on Crime on Saturday. The conference will include panel discussions on a number of crime-related issues, as well as practical demonstrations on how to protect people from becoming victims of crime.

"Whether or not you've personally been a victim, crime is affecting all of us," Franks said in announcing the conference recently at a press conference in Scotch Plains. Joining the congressman at the announcement were Union County Prosecutor Andrew Rantolo, Somerset County Prosecutor Nicholas Bissell, as well as police officers and community leaders who are assisting in organizing the conference.

"Nationwide, a murder is committed every 21 minutes, a rape every five minutes, an aggravated assault every 29 seconds and a burglary every 10 seconds. Although here in New Jersey, there has been an overall decrease in crime, crimes are becoming more violent. Between 1988 and 1992, there was a 50 percent increase in robberies involving guns. Violent crimes involving juveniles have risen 74 percent since 1974."

Franks said, "We need to work together to find new, innovative ways to deter crime and make our neighborhoods, schools, streets and homes safer again."

"The crime conference will investigate various aspects of the problem with an eye toward developing new crime-fighting initiatives that involve the entire community, not just law enforcement," Franks said. "Parents, students, educators, community leaders, prosecutors, public defenders, judges and corrections officials will

### Menendez supports crime control bill

Congressman Bob Menendez, D-13, cast his vote in support of the crime bill before the House of Representatives to help pass a multi-billion dollar crime control effort.

"This is a giant step forward in our efforts to fight crime," Menendez said. "There's no doubt that crime comes first on the list of people's worries, which is why we've put such a powerful bill together. It's big on enforcement and smart on prevention. It's a wise balance, and anyone who would call this bill an over-reaction probably has no understanding of what it really takes to fight crime."

The bill includes funding to put 50,000 more police officers on the streets, \$13.6 billion in grants to states for expanding prison facilities, \$600 million for "boot camps" and other alternatives to incarceration for youthful offenders, and over \$7 billion for crime prevention programs.

"Ironically, the more we spend on crime prevention, the more Republicans attack these bills as 'soft,'" Menendez said. "I'm as tough on crime as anybody. This bill is tough, but more importantly, it's smart."

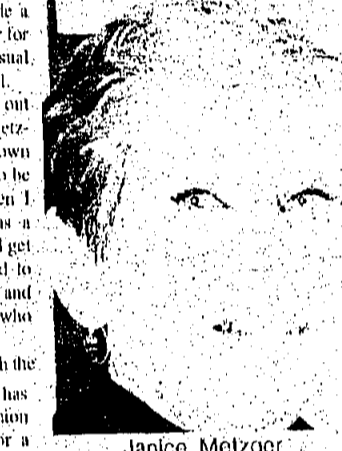

## Schinestuhl taking talents to Gettysburg

**Player Profile**

In relative terms, going from one small school to another is one factor that attracted the 192-pound Schinestuhl to Gettysburg.

"Coach (John) Wagner said that he felt I could play Division 3 football," said Schinestuhl, who attended the school's orientation last Saturday. "Gettysburg is not as large as some other schools and I liked the surroundings."

Gettysburg, coached by Barry Stroeter, was the only school Schinestuhl visited.

"I got in touch with them after the season and they saw me on film," said Schinestuhl, who plans to study physical therapy.

"They run the Wing-T just like we did at Roselle Park," Schinestuhl said.

If Siskel and Ebert were asked to

critique Schinestuhl's football ability on film, they would both give a quick thumbs up.

Schinestuhl, 18, became the first quarterback in school history to lead Roselle Park to back-to-back undefeated (11-0) seasons. His skill at quarterback and in the defensive secondary also helped Roselle Park capture its first back-to-back North Jersey, Section 2, Group 1 playoff championships.

"I think he'll fit in well at Gettysburg," Wagner said. "He was as tough a player as we've ever had and a real team leader."

Schinestuhl was a three-year varsity starter in football and basketball. He started in the secondary his sophomore year and helped lead Roselle Park to a 29-3 record the past three seasons on the gridiron.

and it was his field goal in overtime that defeated New Providence 107 in last year's sectional championship game, the first playoff title contest Roselle Park won at home.

"We had a lot of fun and enjoyed playing together," Schinestuhl said. "We all relied on each other and that's where we got our intensity from."

Schinestuhl look over the quarter-back reins in 1992 from since graduated All-Area standout Tom Rysko. The model of consistency right from the first snap, Schinestuhl completed 51-of-88 (58 percent) passes for 810 yards, tossed 12 touchdown passes and was intercepted only twice his junior year.

Last year Schinestuhl completed 54-of-69 passes (60 percent) for 1,044 yards, tossed 12 TD passes and was intercepted seven times.

He guided Roselle Park to a school-record 410 points in both 1992 and 1993 and school records in touchdowns with 58 in 1992 and 59 in 1993.

"I really don't look at statistics too much," Schinestuhl said. "I just want to win and that's all that matters to me. State are nice to look at after the game and nice if you win."

Making sure Schinestuhl and his teammates remained focused was something the Roselle Park coaches were well aware of.

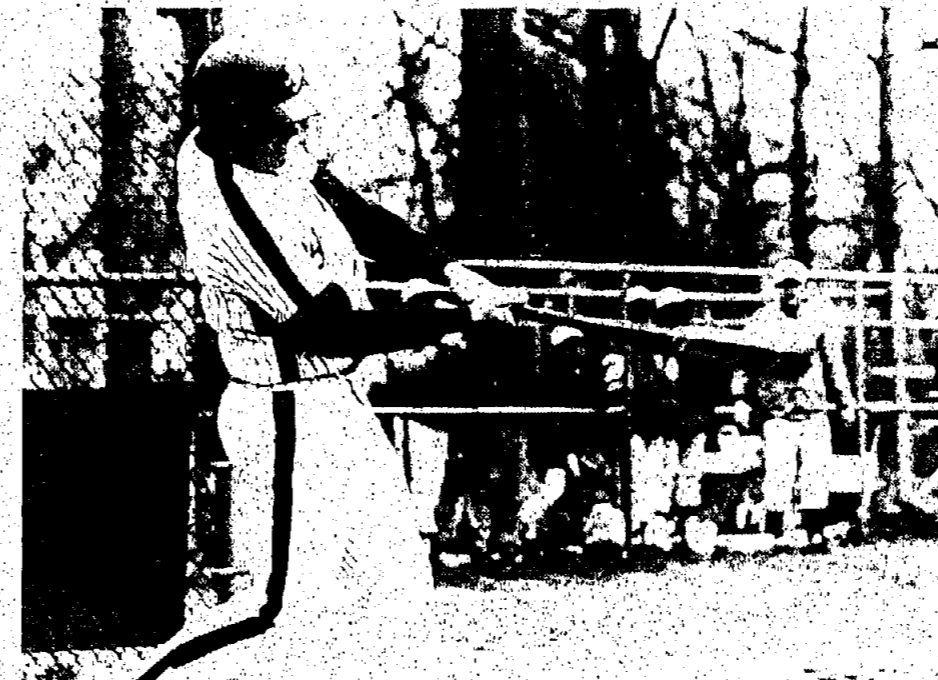
"I can't say enough about our coaching staff," Schinestuhl said. "They had us so prepared for every game. Nothing we saw was unexpected. They were great in changing it."

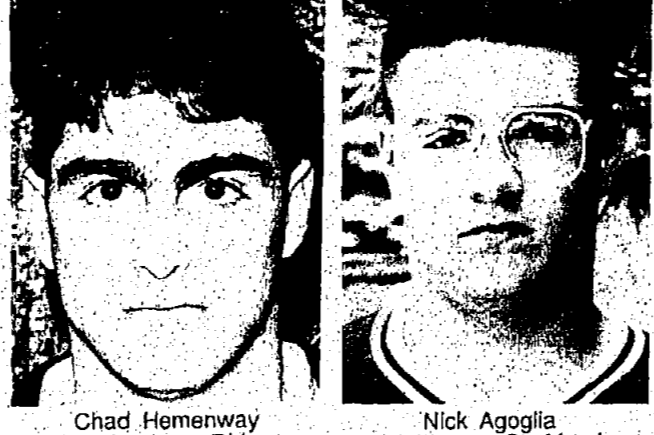
