



tent people execute well thought plans, the county has leased its latest report on the effort to shrink the size of the deer population in the Watchung Reservation.

According to the Division of Parks and Recreation, which

conveyed the findings of the Deer Management Subcom tee, the deer population has almost been halved. A year ago, the county reported 542 deer in the park; now

led to kill between 120 and 189 deer The county plans to bring the deer population to 60 leaving an average of 20 animals per square mile in the park. Looking at the numbers, there appears to be a discrepancy of 84 deer. That could be attributed to faulty calculating by

the county or deer reproducing, but probably both.

In relation to the county's whole plan — a 12-step process. that includes five consecutive winter deer hunts - this early success could mean that either smaller or fewer hunts will be

The county is faced with many hard realities and decisions. The reservation can only sustain so many deer before tarvation claims these animals.

In addition, with a smaller deer population in the area, there will be fewer car accidents involving deer, and - perhaps more significant to the public safety — fewer area residents planning to shoot deer that invade their property.
