None of the available land will be appropriated to interested persons by the park commission, except in the case of one plot that is being made available to its own employees. Mr. Tracy suggests that anyone living near any of the parks where garden space is available should contact his local Victory Garden Committee at once in order to have one of the plots assigned to his use.

## Lantz Boys Finish Lakehurst Training

MOUNTAINSIDE Barney and Michael Lantz, former Lakehurst students, who interrupted a professional musical career when they enlisted in the U. S. Naval Reserve April 8, 1942, after playing for five years in an accordion trio with their sister, Josephine Lantz, will graduate from their second Navy school together March 30.

Stons of Mr. and Mrs. Barney Lantz Sr. of 630 Summit avenue, Westfield, the brothers are attending a school which trains blimp crews in a three-months course at the Naval Air Station, Navy's light-air station, at Lakehurst, and will be assigned to blimp duties upon graduation.

Before being transferred to Lakehurst, Barney, 21, and Michael, 19, were trained in the same class with another brother, William, in aviation machinist's mate school at the Navy Pier, Chicago, Ill., where all three were successful in obtaining the rating of aviation machinist's mate, third class. The other brother now is at a naval aviation base in Florida.

Natives of New Jersey, the Lantz brothers both were graduated from Regional High School. The trio of accordions played as amateurs, and later as professionals, at numerous affairs in many New Jersey cities and towns and on many radio programs.

They performed on Major Edward Bowes' "Amateur Hour" radio program in July, 1940, and later appeared on his professionals' show with Morton Gould and his orchestra. They also were on programs of radio stations WOR and WABC in New York City, and Barney was on a Navy radio program entitled "Four Bells," for six months before enlisting.

Barney Lantz Sr. was a chief boatswain's mate in the Navy during the first World War, so it was only natural that three sons should have followed him into that branch of service.

Although there is little time for much practice on their favorite musical instrument, what with their studies and actual ground crew work at Lakehurst, the brothers have one accordion at the school and are popular with their shipmates—because upon occasion they take turns playing in their barracks.

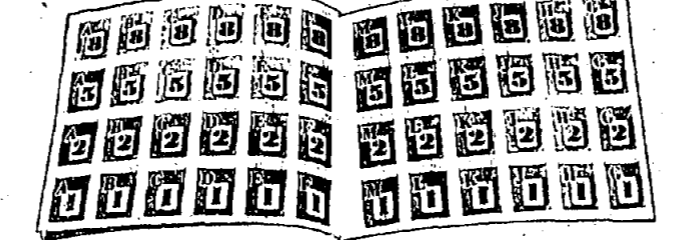
