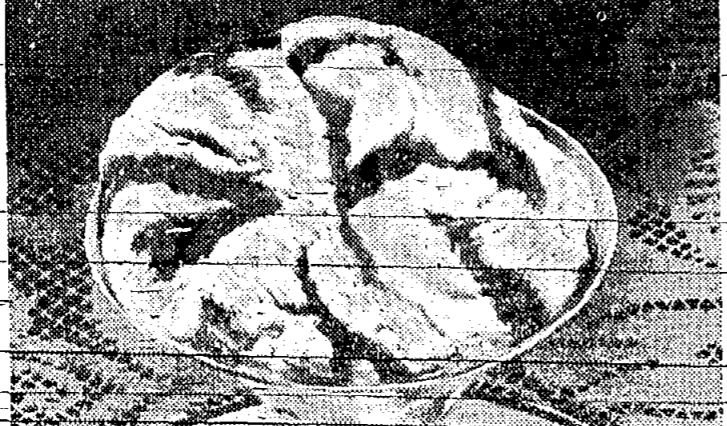

YOUR RED CROSS

Speaking from a logical viewpoint, Mrs. Harold A. Jones, now chairman of the Chapter committee on nurses' aides, said recently: "Graduates of either the home nursing or first aid courses of the Red Cross would be excellent prospects" for the nurses' aides course. Mrs. Jones is filling out the unexpired term of Mrs. Leslie Joyner who was unable to continue the chairmanship.

Springfield is cooperating with Summit Chapter in the training program, and in her capacity as Springfield chairman of the project, Mrs. Jones is a member of Summit Chapter's Nurses' Aides Committee. Her latest report shows that Springfield now has one Nurses' Aides graduate; one woman is taking the course in an evening class now; three women are awaiting the formation of another evening class.

A new class is to be started in Summit about January 17, and Springfield women who are interested in training for this service are invited to call Mrs. Jones, Millburn 6-0572W. This will be a day-time class. The course runs for a period of nine weeks; three class sessions are held each week. Lectures given by a registered nurse comprise the first half of the course. The latter half consists of training in hospital routine—at Overlook Hospital, and lectures.

One has only to talk to Mrs. F. W. Compton about the Junior work to understand her enthusiasm for this branch of the service. She likes children, understands them,

and is very proud of the fine things the Juniors are accomplishing. Mrs. Compton is assistant to Mrs. Charles G. Nelson, Junior, chairman, and now tributes to the unending cooperation displayed by the teacher-sponsors. Mrs. Neil Jakobsen, Jr., reporting on the activities of Juniors under her direction at Raymond Chisholm School, tells of a letter received at the school within the past few weeks, a letter of thanks from a mother living in Dorset, England. This mother's child, two years old, received one of the Christmas boxes of toys shipped to England in October.

More than 20 boxes were filled at the Chisholm School with small toys such as crayons, marbles and other gifts dear to children. 24 articles in each box. The mother told that her child was too small to express thanks, so she was writing in his stead. She also said that she had written to her husband, prisoner of war in Germany, telling him about the lovely Christmas box received by their child from the American Red Cross. The letter closed by wishing the American Juniors the best of luck. In describing the devotion of the pupils to the filling of these Christmas boxes, Mrs. Jakobsen stressed the delight which the children always take in carrying out this task of loving remembrance to children in other lands who are having a bare and meagre Christmas.

It was evident that she felt herself repaid for the efforts expended during the past few years in directing Junior activities. At present pupils under her supervision are making bed pan covers, hot water bottle covers, cutting out and mounting newspaper cartoons; binding and covering short stories taken from magazines (these are very popular at Army camps). 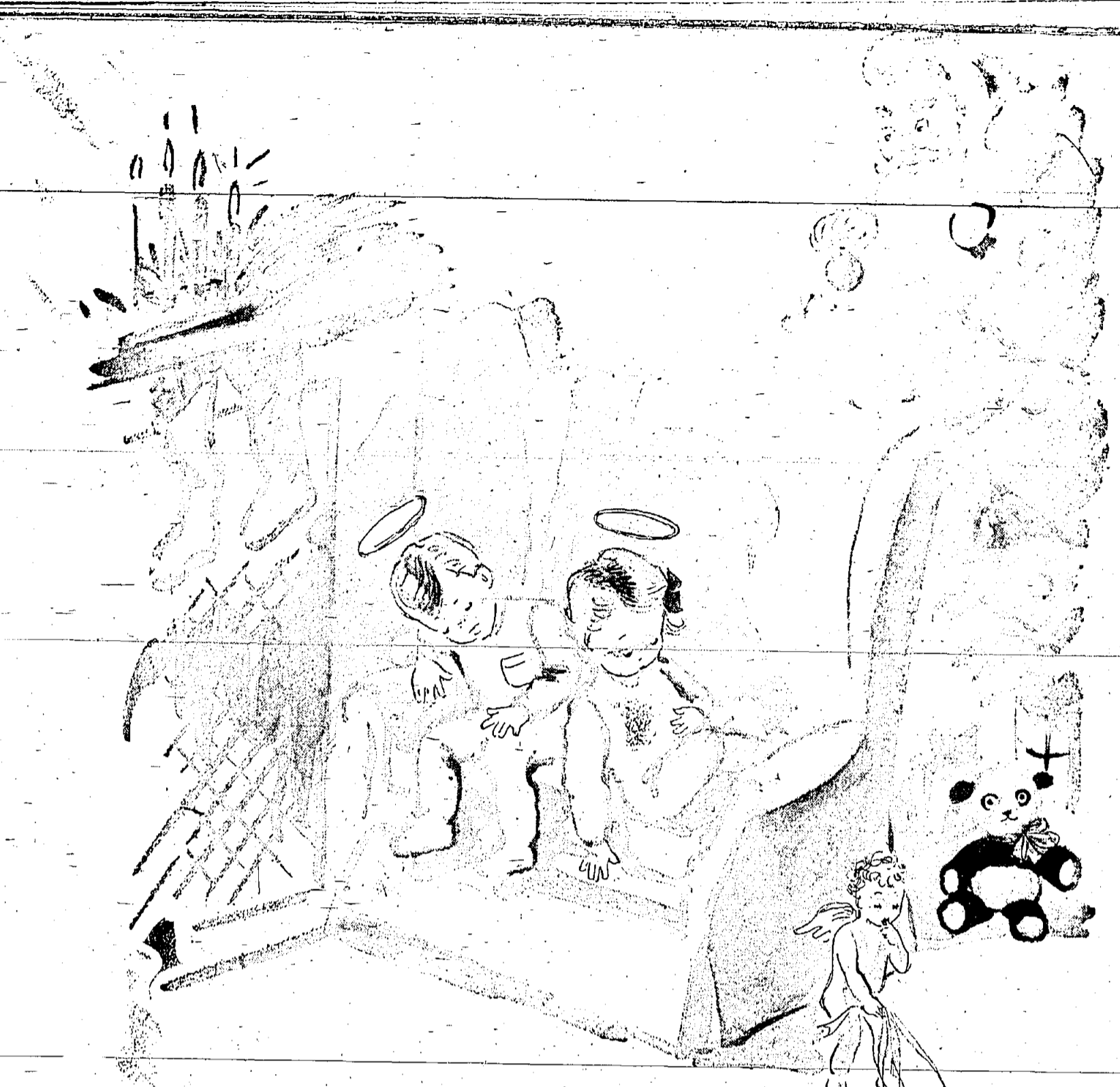
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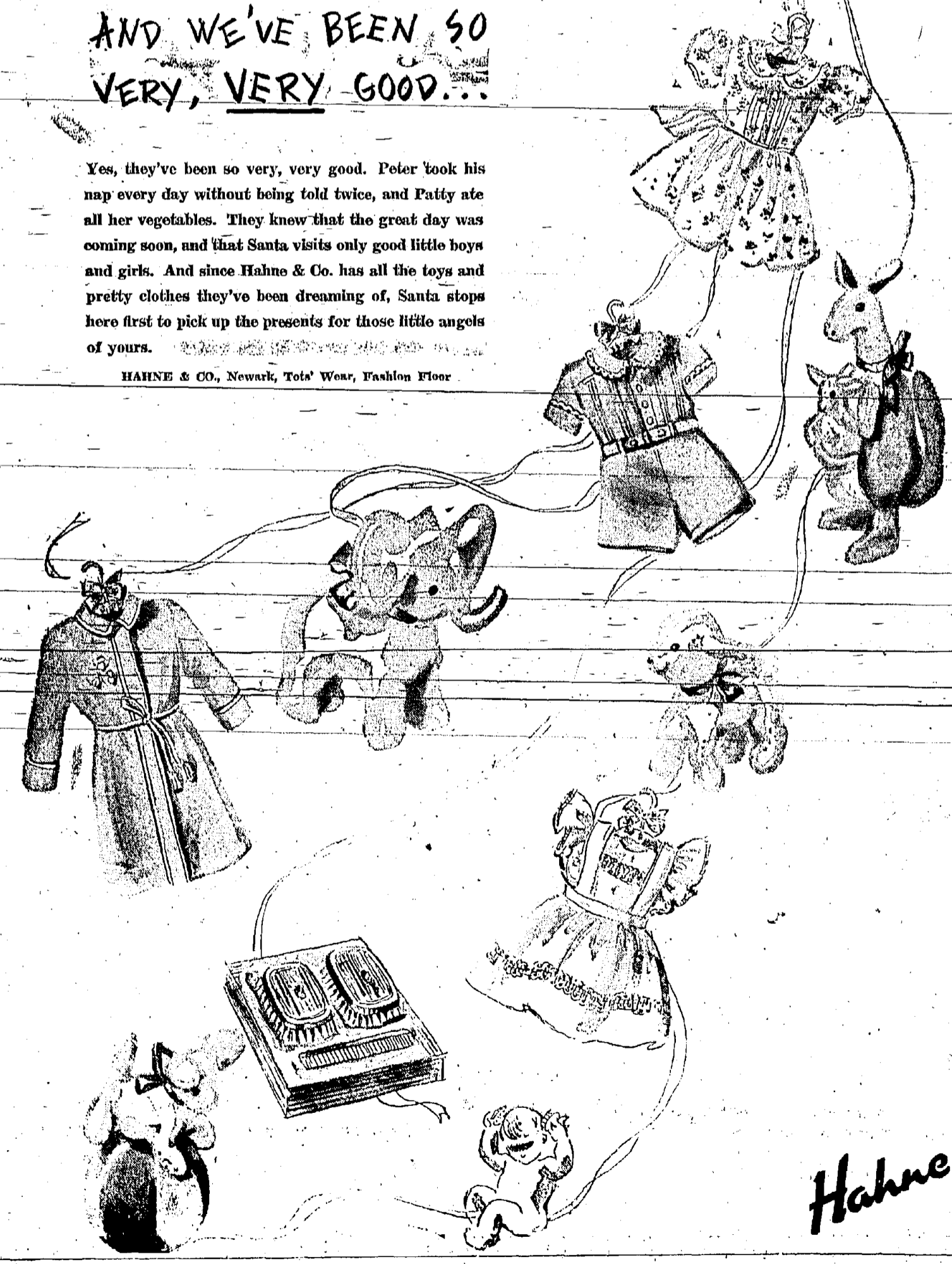

DRAGON SEED by Pearl Buck is the story of a farmer and his family. The scene is outside and inside the walls of Nanking just before the Japanese assault and the fall of the city.
MARY CHRISTMAS by Mary Ellen Chase is a rare and exquisite little story. It tells of the potent influence of the exotic Mary Christmas, an Armenian peddler, upon the lives of a happy Maine family.
GENTLEMAN RANKIER by John E. Jennings is the story of the young "blind sheep" of an English family who enlisted as a private in Braddock's army headed for the American wilderness. How he, and others like him, became Americans, is the theme which runs through this novel.
