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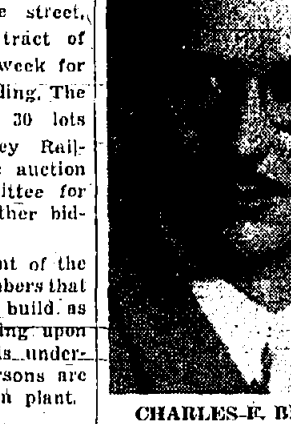
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## Selander Renamed Board Chairman At Organization

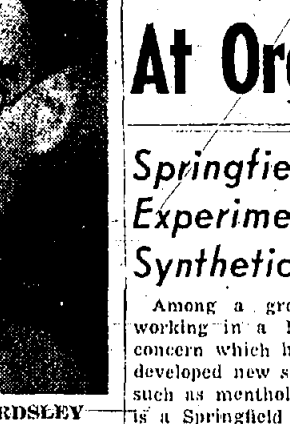

## Wartime Food Conservation

The homemakers of the country helped materially with conservation of the nation's wartime food supply last summer by home canning, and are continuing to do so through the winter by making good use of the products on their shelves.

A recent survey by the U. S. Department of Agriculture shows that nearly 25 million families put up some food last year, and produced altogether about 3,400,000,000 quarts of canned food. This amount appears to be divided about equally between fruits and vegetables. Of the vegetables, tomatoes and tomato juice lead all the rest. Beans take second place, and pickles and relishes, third place. Corn, peas and sauerkraut follow in that order.

When these homemakers were questioned for their reasons for canning, nearly half said that they began canning to insure an adequate supply of fruits and vegetables for their families during the winter months. Others reported that they started canning in order to save ration points; but many canners in response to appeals to conserve the national food supply.

A special survey in Union County brought in reports from 1,000 homemakers with an average of 174 jars per person, or a total of over 170,000 jars canned. County homemakers, however, canned more fruit than vegetables. As in the case of the national survey, Union County reports show that more tomatoes and tomato juice were canned than any other vegetable.

Good news for homemakers who plan to can in 1945 is the coming of the new aluminum pressure cookers. These canners should appear in retail markets in late winter or early spring. They will be two sizes, 7-quart and 14-quart. Each canner is to be equipped with a rack and three inset pans to give the cooker a year-round usefulness in the kitchen. The smaller size is easy to handle and saves considerable time and fuel when used for cooking stews, pot roasts, fricassee chicken, beans, and steamed puddings.

More green beans were canned than any other vegetable except tomatoes, and many homemakers are now searching for different ways of serving them. Cooked green beans are delicious served with broiled mushrooms and 1/4 t. of sweet basil; whole cloves, tomatoes, and a bit of lemon; canned tomatoes, cut celery, and a dash of rosemary; sliced onions, which have been lightly cooked in fat, and a dash of marjoram or sage; crisp diced bacon; whole cloves; cooked pork and fried apples; or mixed with other vegetables in a casserole. Green beans with hot mustard sauce and green

bean salad should appeal to those who like a snappy or tart flavor to their vegetables.

**Green Beans with Hot Mustard Sauce**  
1 t. prepared mustard  
1 t. flour  
1/2 t. salt  
2 egg yolks, beaten  
3 c. milk, scalded  
2 T. lemon juice or vinegar  
3 c. cooked green beans, drained  
Mix mustard, flour, and salt in double boiler; add egg yolks; beat well. Slowly add milk. Cook over boiling water, stirring constantly, until thick and smooth. Add lemon juice or vinegar and blend well. Heat the beans and pour the sauce on them, mixing lightly.

Green Bean Salad  
2 c. cooked green beans, cut fine  
1/2 c. raw cabbage, shredded  
2 c. celery, cut fine  
1/2 t. salt  
1/2 t. rosemary, sweet basil, or crushed mint leaves  
1/2 c. French dressing  
Lettuce or salad greens  
Combine all ingredients, except the lettuce, with French dressing, let stand 20-30 min. in a cool place before arranging on crisp, well-chilled salad greens. Serves 4.

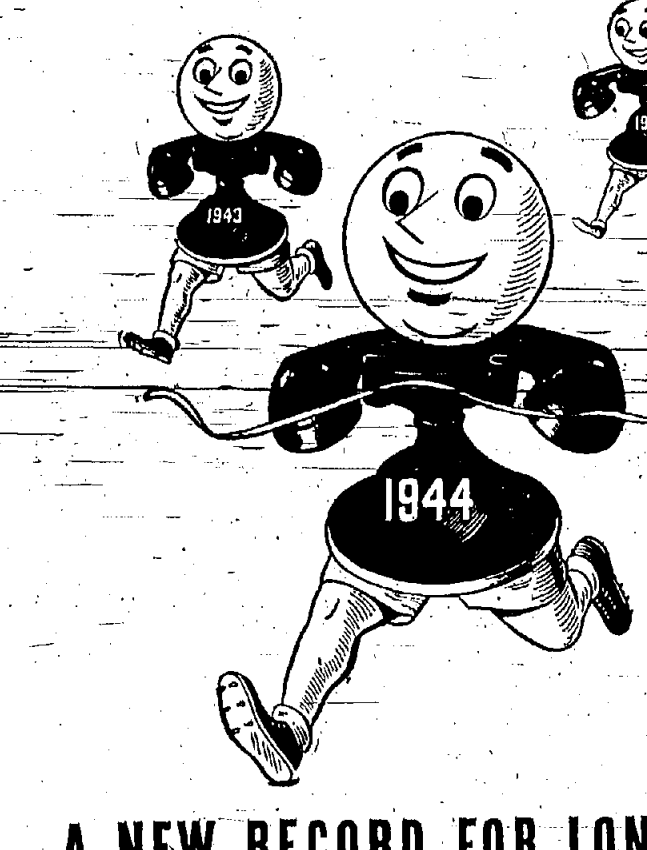
