prise and a disappointment. The reason for this method of payment, dates back to experience under the insurance act of 1917 which provided for lump sum payments. Too often it was found that the money disappeared and the dependent was "broke" and in need. Right here at home today, as soon as a death is reported in the papers, the next of kin is deluged with letters, pamphlets, phone calls and salesmen, telling them to buy this and that, offering advice on investments and many other kindred matters. In other words, they are on the "sucker list." In spreading payments over a period of ten, twenty or thirty years or for life—in some cases, the government has acted in the best interests of all dependents.

SECOND: There should be TWO OR MORE beneficiaries named on every policy. Very few realize that in the case of death of the named beneficiary, the unnamed contingent beneficiary, such as a child or parent will receive benefits for only TEN years LESS what has already been paid. Take the case of a widow with one child and let us assume that she will receive \$50 per month for 20 years or a total of \$12,000. Should she die after the second year, she would have received \$1,200. Then the child would receive benefits for only eight years or \$4,800. The total then paid under the policy would be \$6,000 or ONE-HALF the amount had the child also been named on the policy. To correct this injustice, the National American Legion is working with Congress and the Veterans Administration to prepare corrective legislation, but until such time we suggest that every man and woman in the service arrange NOW to name a second or third person as beneficiary.

We are receiving complaints from folks at home that their service people are not receiving the SUN and we are receiving complaints from the SUN that papers are being returned because of wrong addresses. Now somewhere along the line is a happy medium where all complaints will be eliminated. We would suggest that those in service drop the SUN a line telling of a change. The Legion wants every one to get the paper. The Legion is paying the bill and means to see that the home town news reaches all. Please help by keeping us informed.
