





### Tifley Sworn In As Warrant Officer In C.A.P.

The fine weather of the past several weekends has been perfect for flying, and more than 100 Cadets of the C.A.P. Summit Squadron have been given orientation flights in Army Liaison-type planes from the airfields at Somerset Hills and Morristown. Several of the Cadets have signed up for private instruction and one of them soloed within ten days of beginning his instruction period.

Problems in navigation and air gunnery are soon to be worked out in Navy Mark IV Navigation Trainers and other automatic devices assigned to C.A.P. use as part of the AAF training program for our future fliers. Training in blind flying by instruments will shortly be available for Cadets when the C.A.P. buildings now being erected on the Morristown Air Base are completed.

Separate flights have recently been organized in Irvington and Morristown so that Cadets of the Summit Squadron living in those districts may attend training meetings close to their homes.

Appointment to the rank of Warrant Officer of Tech. Sgt. Ralph H. Tifley was announced by Lt. Brett-Surman this week. W/O Tifley of 31 Bryant avenue, Springfield, a veteran of the Argonne and Chateau Thierry in World War I, is an expert in radio communications and instructs C. A. P. Cadets in code and short-wave radio. Several of his unit were recently granted W.E.R.S. operator's licenses.

A group of 70 Cadets has just completed a five-weeks' course in parachute use given at the Summit Y.M.C.A. by three licensed instructors of the C.A.P. Those qualifying will be privileged to make practice jumps this summer from controlled-fall and free-fall towers at Hightstown. "The knowledge of how to maintain a parachute and the ability to use it in an emergency may save many lives in the coming air-age," said Lt. Brett-Surman at the conclusion of the course. "The youth of today will take cross-country flying as a matter of course just as we now think nothing of undertaking long journeys by automobile. But sooner or later some of them may have to bail out. The confidence of being able to do so with very little risk comes only with experience. It is better to get that experience early than too late. Many airmen who thought there was nothing to the technique of parachute-jumping have had hair-raising experiences with church steeples, power-lines, high buildings and trees. Some have lived to fly again but many more might have done so with adequate pre-flight training. Civil Air Patrol's training program helps the younger generation to learn—and live!"

Warrant Officer Robert Eaton, Cadet Officer of the Summit Squadron, announced this week that a new series of training courses will begin shortly at Summit and Morristown. Boys and girls between the ages of 15 and 17 who are interested in aviation as a career, and all boys nearing induction age, are invited to apply for membership in C.A.P.C. any Monday evening at the Summit High School, Tuesday evening at the Irvington High School, or Thursday evening at the Morristown High School at 7:30. All training is given free.

### Sgt. Kramer Is Awarded Medal

Sgt. Joseph C. Kramer, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. Kramer of 22 Henshaw avenue, has been awarded the Air Medal, somewhere in England. Sgt. Kramer is with the 8th Army Air Force in England. 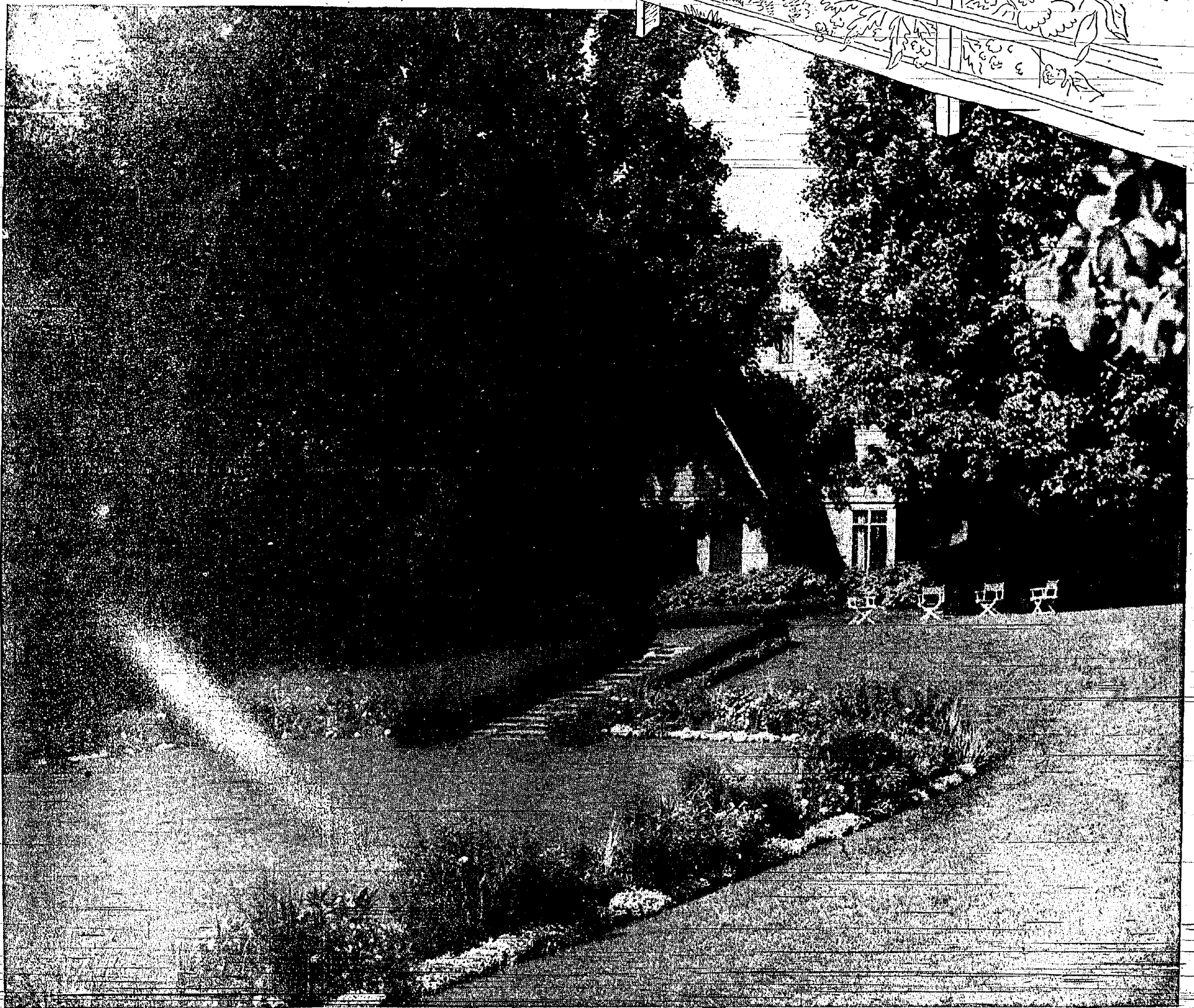
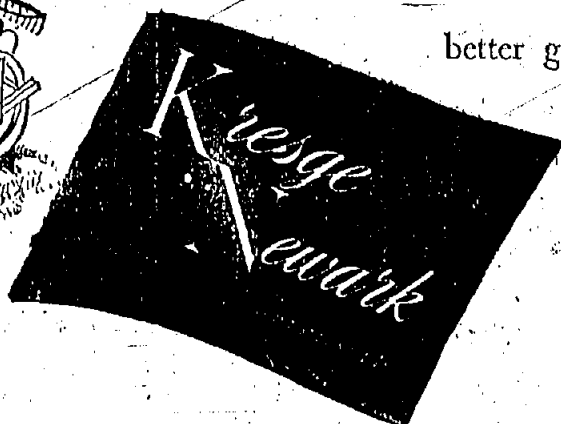
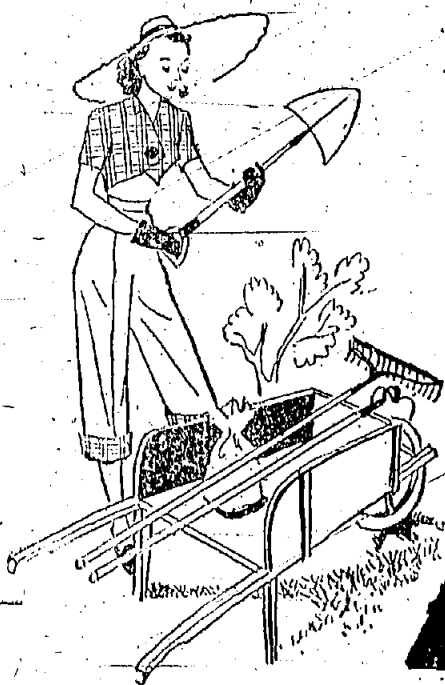
