Pacific Mail Increase Brings New Regulations

Thousands of newspapers and magazines submitted by friends and relatives for mailing to Navy, Marine Corps and Coast Guard personnel overseas have been refused since July 1 under a new Navy Department ruling which became effective that day, headquarters of the Third Naval District reported today.

Apparently because of unfamiliarity with the new regulation, the Navy announcement and senders continue to try to dispatch second class material without the written request from the addressee now required.

The new regulation, introduced because of the tremendous increase in mail going to the Pacific, was announced June 21. At the same time the Navy announced a plan by which current magazines are now being stocked by ship service stores ashore and about giving sailors, Marines and Coast Guardsmen better service than before for full-size magazines which do not have overseas editions.

Post Office officials have advised the Navy that many persons desiring to send second class packages were unaware of the new regulations or in some cases thought they applied only to publications sent by the publishers or news dealers.

The Navy announcement emphasized that the regulations apply to all newspapers and magazines submitted for mailing to men of the three services.

Persons wishing to send newspapers or magazines second class must show a written request from the addressee for the material.

Senders are reminded in the event they wish to send such material first class that they are limited to eight ounces.

A graduate of Columbia School, Pfc. McCarthy also attended Regional High. Before entering the service, he was employed by General Instrument Company of Elizabeth.

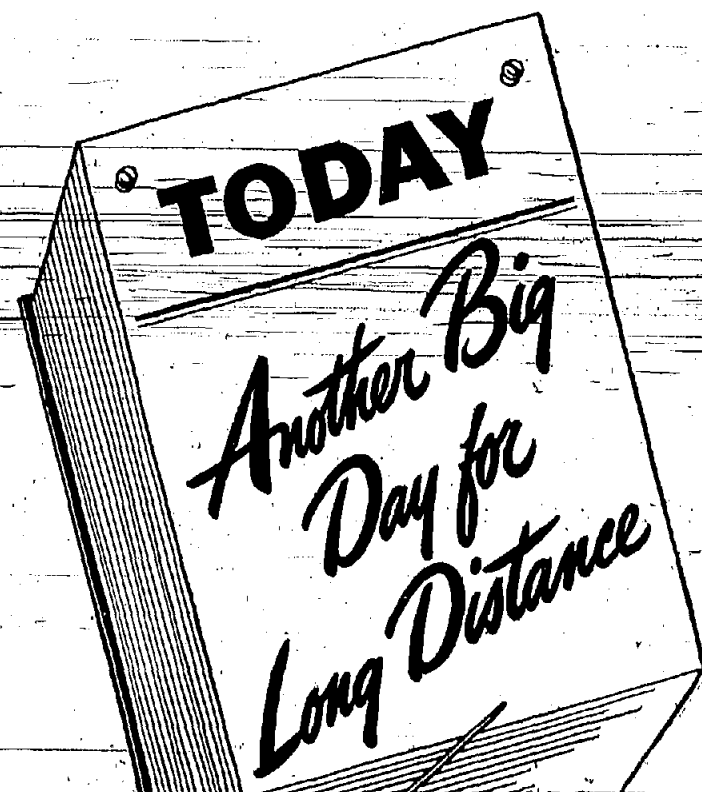
