What about your steps and sidewalks? Are they kept clear of snow? Snow so quickly turns to ice that even the most sure-footed can take an unexpected spill.

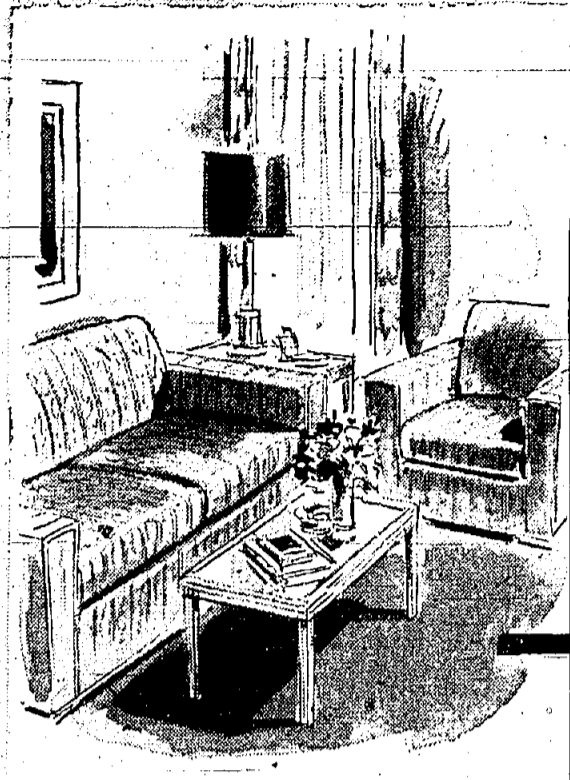
People are aware of this, yet it is amazing to see the numerous walks and steps that are not cleared. Don't endanger your own family or the safety of your guests

correctly placed outside lighting. Hand rails on outside steps are necessary for safety, too. The sun sends out 400,000 times as much light as the moon.



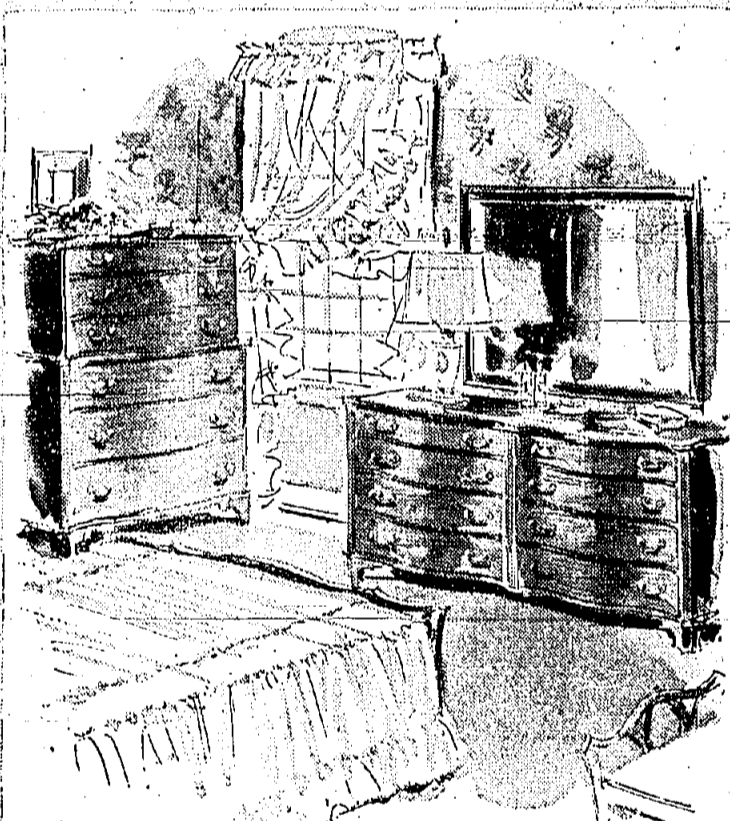

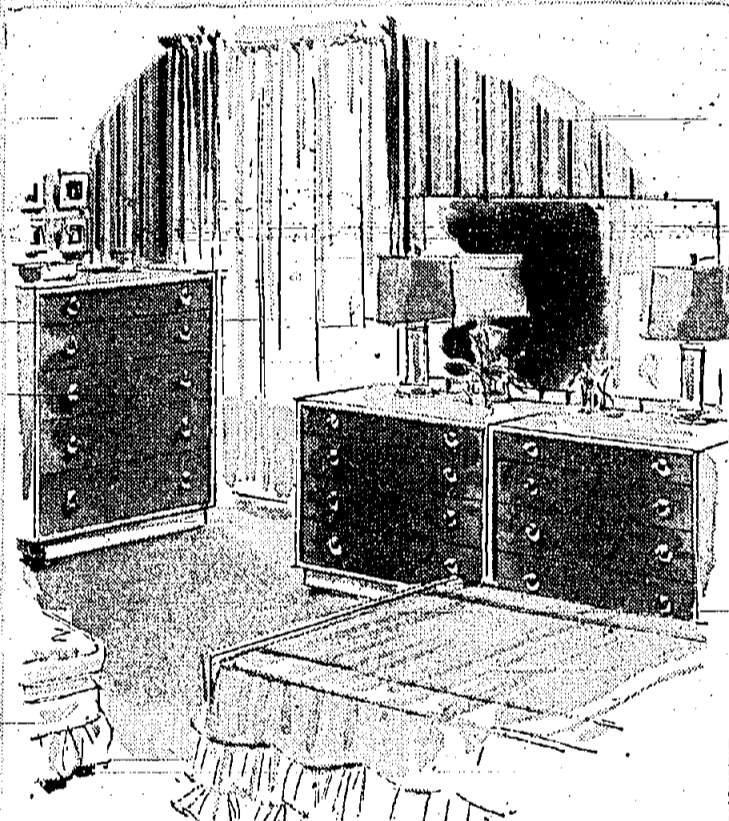

Coats Give Swank Look in Wet Weather

Many Styles, Fabrics in New Rainwear

It's a shame that we can't select a Miss Slush for 1949 unattractive as it might sound. But as we look over this season's stock of fashionable raincoats, a lucky girl it would be who could defend this title.

Once upon a time and not so long ago either, raincoats were designed for one purpose only: to prevent the person inside from getting wet. But designers now seem to have developed the viewpoint that there is no earthly reason why a raincoat shouldn't be attractive as well as utilitarian.

This year fashionable women will shed raindrops, not in the archaic tent-like ponchos and slickers, but in sleek, tailored, taffeta-trimmed models with fluttering hoods. And the new rainwear can be found in every conceivable fabric and style.

Old Fabrics, New Look
There are, of course, coats in corduroy that sturdy stand-by fabric which in recent years has worked its way up to the top rungs of the fashion ladder. Gabardine too is popular, as always, but designers now have taken this old faithful fabric and are using it in new and classic ways.

Among the newer water repellent fabrics are checked tweeds and opulent looking, versatile velvets. So smartly styled are many of these that they double as fine raincoats when the detachable hoods are removed.

One of the most unusual coats seen recently in the new line of rain wear was made of the most perishable of all fabrics, red velvet, exquisitely tailored. Some enthusiastic buyers have elegantly labeled this an "opera coat."

Much of the credit for this transformation in rain style must go to the processes developed out of the urgent demand created by the recent conflict. Now that war time water resistant processes have emerged from their hazy, they are being used to make even the most-perishable fabrics water repellent. As a result you can now look smart and chic even in the wettest weather.

Word of Warning
One word of warning is issued by the fashion experts about the care of your new raincoats. Excessive soil they say, lessens water repellency. Be sure you give it the proper method of cleaning. Some models should be laundered, others dry cleaned, so they warn, check to make sure which is the proper method for your coat. Tell your cleaner to use a pure solvent and to rinse thoroughly. For a small extra charge, the tailor will restore the water repellency in your garment.

While we're on the subject of damp weather we might point to the evolution of the umbrella. Not so long ago the umbrella was used only in the most inclement of weather, and what an awkward hideous monster it usually was. Not so today. For the lowly umbrella has been recalled into the fashion fold by topflight designers.

In fact umbrellas are now a fashion high-note. Designers have re-lensed themselves with gay abandon turning out handles made of fine woods and using gayly colored fabrics. Others have handles of highly colored rattan with cases to match. One of the most interesting is an umbrella with the parasol-look. It is completely elegant with its ruffled fringe.

Here the experts issue another word of wisdom. Umbrellas should be tightly wrapped when dry to keep the tips from being broken and to maintain well-oiled folds.

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Keynote at Smart Resorts Is Dainty and Dressy Footwear

The keynote of the season in smart winter resorts is the dainty foot for both spectator sports and dining occasions.

The feeling of lightness and airiness in dressy footwear is carried out in such treatments as nylon mesh as a background for narrow bands and medallions of calf or suede in matching or contrasting colors; by perforated and stitched out designs; by intricate interlacing and braiding of those straps in open lattice effect, and fabrics and soft leathers draped and folded.

Color is everywhere afoot... as an accent to the favorite white, or in multicolor combinations, a bright and gay answer to the need for a shoe to wear with many different sun-mixed costumes. Some multicolor pumps have the heel and back section in red calf, the vamp in seafoam sections of alternate yellow and blue.

Walking shoes this year of 1949 don't look the least bit "orthopedic," but they take care of the comfort as well as the attractiveness of the foot while walking, as anywhere else.

Shoe experts point out that a gracefully shaped Cuban heel adds to both appearance and comfort in a walking shoe. Soft suedes and beautiful polished calfs mould the foot like a glove, with a graceful tilt to the lever-so slightly extended soles.

DINING-NITE SPOTS

Playing the Cards

By ALEXANDER G. SPENCER
One right out of these three problems is fair, two is good, and three is outstanding.

1. The bidding has gone: East South West North 4 spades pass 4 no trump pass

What do you bid? 2. You are South and hold S A Q 7 5 H A 10 8 4 D 8 C 9 6

The bidding has gone: South West North East 1 heart pass 2 clubs pass

What do you bid now? 3. This time you are South as declarer with entries to both hands.

ANSWERS
1. Six hearts. Your partner's four no trump bid is not asking you to show aces, regardless of whether you use the Blackwood convention or not.

2. Two hearts. If you robid two spades you are "reversing"—bidding a higher ranking suit than

the one you first bid. A reverse bid tells partner you have a strong hand. With your minimum hand you rebid two hearts and forget the spade suit.

3. Lead the three spot. If West plays small, fessce dummy's seven. If East wins this trick your ace and king will clear the suit.

With both sides vulnerable and North dealing, the bidding went: North East South West 1 diamond pass 2 no trump pass 3 no trump pass pass pass

West opened the ten of clubs, the six went on from dummy, East played the queen. Now if you were South, what would you play?

Well, if you say the ace of clubs you agree with the way Professor Headacre played it.

That's just what he did—dropped the jack of clubs under East's queen.

East could never figure the professor's club holding to be ace-king-jack, so he led the four of clubs to the second trick.

The wily prof won this trick with the ace of clubs, and led a diamond. East won with the ace and was more than a little surprised to see the declarer win his club return with the king.

The professor rattled off five diamond tricks and two heart tricks, which, with the two clubs he'd already won, gave him the contract.

If the prof had won the first trick with the ace of clubs, East would probably have shifted to a spade when he gained the lead with the ace of diamonds.

and South would have gone off two tricks.

Completely Redecorated Park Theater, Morristown, to Open

Featuring a completely redecorated interior, all new seating, new screen, new marquee, and other equipment changes designed to make it a thoroughly modern motion picture house.

The theater, closed last fall for the extensive refurbishing program, has been modernized at a cost which officials stated was in excess of \$100,000.

The building eliminated the ornate boxes, gilt trimmings, and other hallmarks of a decade ago with the clean, uncluttered sweep of modern theater architecture.

Reopening ceremonies to be attended by Morristown and Morris County officials, will start at approximately 7 p. m. Saturday, January 15.

The modernization program was supervised by Morris Smolen, who is associated with the Walter Reade Theaters in the Park Theater, and Walter Reade, Jr., Ralph Lanterman, manager for all Walter Reade Theaters in Morristown, will supervise operation of the house.

The theater has new features from the street side right through to the back door, most important of which from patron comfort viewpoint are the new seats.

Overstuffed chairs, designed to equal living room comfort, have been installed throughout, with those in the orchestra being of a novel "slide back" type only recently placed on the market.

Relaxation of the pressure permits the chair to slide back into place.

In reseating, the theater eliminated nearly 200 seats—to provide more space between rows, and thus increase leg room.

Clearances of at least several inches from the seat-shoulder is now assured for even a very tall person.

Redecorating the exterior, a new marquee, new doors, and new

casualty's booth were provided. The marquee, carrying several rows of movable letters to announce current attractions, was specially built for the job by Road Ad Company of Asbury Park.

Moving of the cashier's booth to the door line made it possible to knock out one lobby wall and build a large, recessed confection stand.

The lobby ceiling has also been lowered to increase the intimate atmosphere; all "remaining" walls have been refinished and new display cases installed to more effectively show coming attractions.

In redecorating the interior, all boxes and all wall brace-brac has been removed, and the walls refaced from floor to ceiling in an unbroken sweep.

Lighting is all indirect, with lights so placed that they play different colors on the walls. Ceiling chandeliers have been removed, and the entire theater recarpeted.

To improve heating and air circulation, new ducts have been installed into the main auditorium. All surface not replastered or replaced have been repainted, to give the house a fresh appearance.

Men's and ladies' rooms have also been done over, with the Powder Rooms having new modern cosmetic tables for women patrons.

All projection and sound equipment has been overhauled, and a new screen—the most modern available—installed, to assure that the movies themselves will be as mechanically perfect as the rest of the theater.

The New Park will change its screen attraction twice each week—on Sundays and on Wednesdays—and will present double feature programs.

According to Mr. Reade, pictures will be arranged with the aim of providing the best possible screen fare at the most reasonable price possible for everybody.

He stated that "we have at our call the product of every studio in Hollywood and abroad to achieve that goal."

Mr. Reade also stated that from time to time the new Park's large stage will be utilized for special programs and "live" entertainment.
