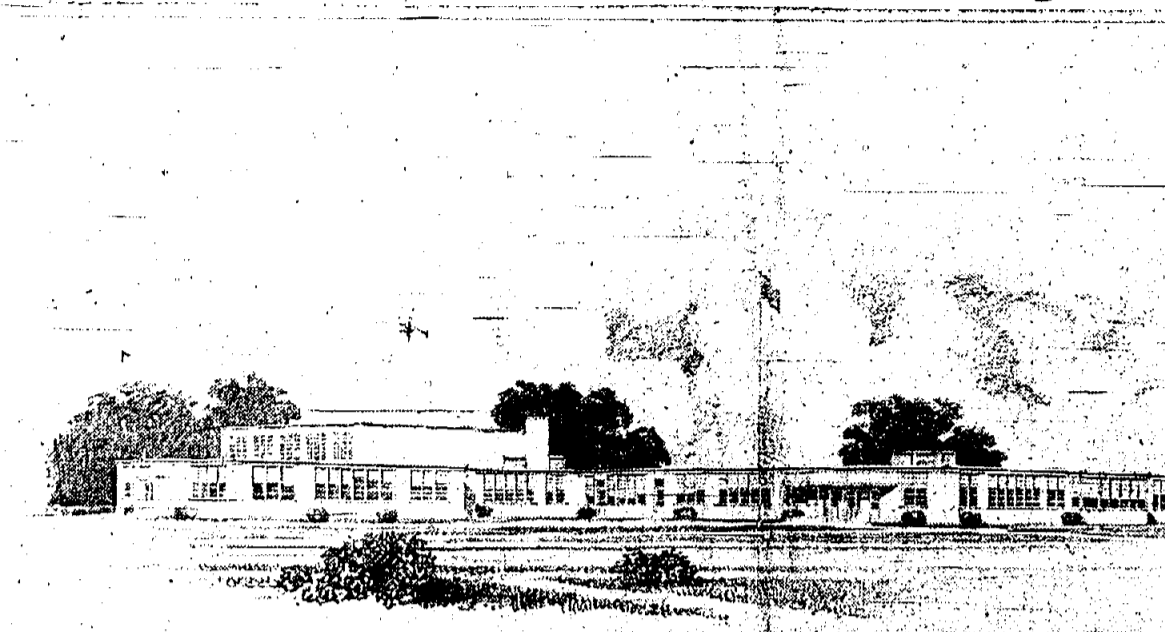

Town's Historic Home Show Is Feature of DAR Program

Three local homes will be open for inspection. The "1744 House," on South Springfield avenue, was built in 1744 by Anthony Swath. It is one of very few houses within the confines of present day Springfield which is known to be of pre-revolutionary construction. It was used by Hessian troops as headquarters and as a temporary field hospital during the Battle of Springfield and thus escaped burning by the British after the battle.

The plans for this house are filed at the Library of Congress and the present owners, Mr. and Mrs. Karl Tallan, have spent much time and effort in restoring it to its original condition. A solid mahogany staircase, an Adam style mantel in the parlor and

Title of Mayor May Become Law

Mayor Robert W. Marshall, whose official designation is chairman of the Township Committee, may shortly be "graced" with the legal title of "mayor." That is, if a new Assembly bill is reintroduced and gains approval of Governor Driscoll.

A measure by Assemblyman Beadleston, Republican, of Monmouth County, bestowing the title of mayor on township committee heads, under certain provisions, has been returned by Governor Driscoll to the lower house because, he says, it does not make for uniformity.

The fact that the measure would leave bestowing of the title up to the individual committee, might make for injection of personal feeling, the governor says, adding: "If the title 'mayor' has merit at all, it should prevail uniformly. Its bestowal ought not be left to the whim of township committee members."

The governor asks a change on that score and provision that such "mayors" shall have only the authority bestowed by law to townships.

Regional Students Score High in Test

NEW BRUNSWICK—Joseph Harrop and George C. Schwarz of Regional High School, placed high in the biology and chemistry examinations, respectively, at the second annual State Science Day held on the Rutgers University campus last Saturday.

Harrop was third in the biology competition, and Schwarz finished seventh in the chemistry examination. For his efforts, Harrop received a gold-filled key and a plaque to be retained by his high school. Schwarz was awarded a certificate.

Approximately 300 science-minded juniors and seniors from 120 secondary schools in all parts of the State took the competitive examinations in physics, chemistry, biology, and engineering. First place winners in each field were awarded a four-year tuition scholarship to the State University, a solid gold key, and a plaque to be held by their high schools.

In addition to those students taking the exams, about 100 non-competing students and more than 200 high school teachers attended the State Science Day program sponsored by the State University and the New Jersey Science Teachers' Association.

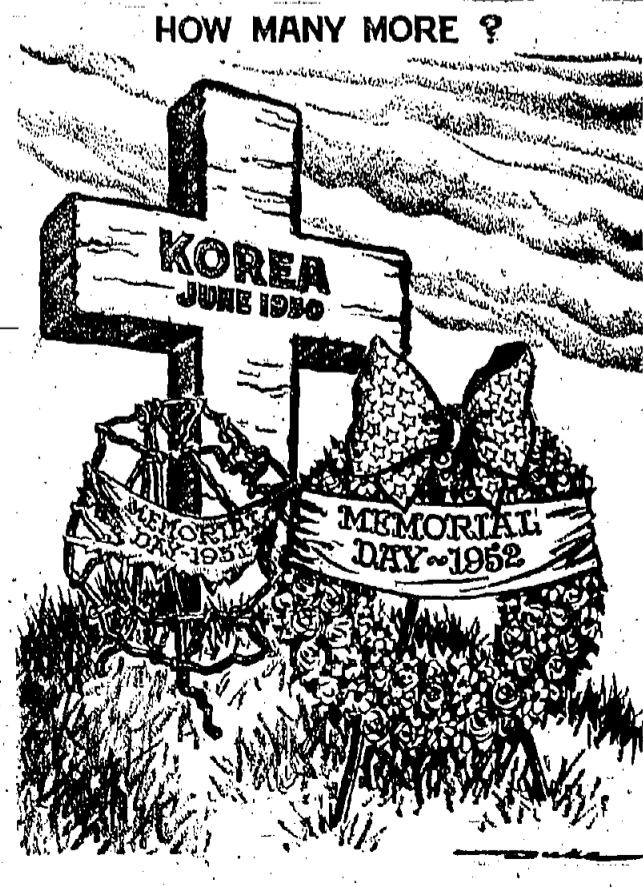
Local Police Head Warns Of Memorial Day Hazards

Memorial Day, traditional beginning of the summer vacation season, may also be the start of lots of killed and injured in traffic accidents unless motorists and pedestrians exercise more than usual care. This grim warning was issued today by Police Chief Thompson.

"Since the holiday falls on Friday, the peak of traffic will be on the return trip home that night or week-end. But the holiday too need not be inevitable. If motorists and pedestrians abide now to include safety and courtesy in their holiday planning, accidents can be prevented," the chief declared.

The chief said the three main points of congestion are on routes leading to and from seashore points in parts of Middlesex and Monmouth counties, in the northern lake regions in the Singac and Ledgewood areas and in the Camden district on roads to and from southern New Jersey resorts. The peak travel hours to be avoided are: from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Saturdays, Sundays and holidays to the resorts, 8 to 8 p.m. on Sundays and holidays, and from 7 to 9 a.m. on Mondays returning from resort areas. Alternate routes to avoid congestion have been well marked.

Motorists planning trips over weekends or holidays are urged in particular not to make their driving an endurance contest. Too many miles and too much speed bring driver fatigue. That rundown feeling can mean a collision with another vehicle or a run-down pedestrian, Thompson said. "Summer motoring can be pleasant and safe if every motorist will cooperate."





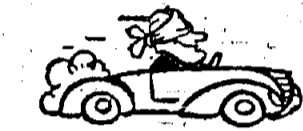

How To Display The American Flag

The national flag should be raised and lowered by hand. It should be displayed only from sunrise to sunset, or between such hours as may be designated by proper authority.

Do not raise the flag while it is furled. Unfurl, then hoist quickly to the top of the staff. Lower it slowly and with dignity.

Place no objects on or over the flag. Various articles are sometimes placed on a speaker's table covered with the flag. This practice should be avoided.

(1) When displayed over the middle of the street, the flag should be suspended vertically with the union to the north in an east and west street, or to the east in a north and south street.

(2) When displayed with another flag from crossed staffs, the flag of the United States of America should be on the right (the flag's own right) and its staff should be in front of the staff of the other flag.

(3) When it is to be flown at half mast, the flag should be hoisted to the peak for an instant and then lowered to the half mast position; but before lowering the flag for the day it should again be raised to the peak. By half-mast is meant hauling down the flag to one-half the distance between the top and the bottom of the staff.

(4) When flags of states or cities or pennants of societies are flown on the same halyard with the flag of the United States of America, the latter should always be at the peak. When flown from adjacent staffs the Stars and Stripes should be hoisted first and lowered last.

(5) When the flag is suspended over a sidewalk from a rope, extending from house to pole at the edge of the sidewalk, the flag should be hoisted out from the building toward the pole, union first.

(6) When the flag is displayed from a staff projecting horizontally or at any angle from the window sill, balcony, or front of a building, the union of the flag should go clear to peak of the staff (unless the flag is to be displayed at half-mast).

(7) During the ceremony of hoisting or lowering the flag, or when the flag is passing in a parade or in a review, all persons present should face the flag, stand at attention, and salute. Those present in uniform should render the right hand salute. Those men not in uniform should remove their headgear with the right hand and hold it at the left shoulder, the hand being over the heart. Women should salute by placing the right hand over the heart. The salute to the flag in a moving column is rendered as the flag passes.

from staffs with our National Flag, the latter should be at the center or at the highest point of the group. (11) When the flags of two or more nations are displayed they should be flown from separate staffs of the same height and the flags should be of approximately equal size. International usage forbids the display of the flag of one nation above that of another nation in time of peace.

When displayed in the chancel or on a platform in a church, the flag should be placed on a staff at the clergyman's right; other flags at his left. If displayed in the body of the church, the flag should be at the congregation's right as they face the clergyman.

Take every precaution to prevent the flag from becoming soiled. It should not be allowed to touch the ground or floor, nor to brush against objects.

When the flag is used in unveiling a statue or monument, it should not be used as a covering of the object to be unveiled. If it is displayed on such occasions, do not allow the flag to fall to the ground, but let it be carried aloft to form a feature of the ceremony.

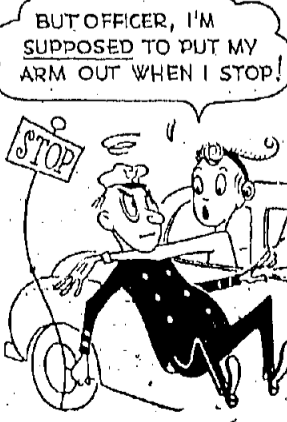
