Last week-end's heavy rainfall has set the spark for renewed appeals to the Township Committee with regard to the possibility of a complete drainage survey for several sections of the community, particularly in the vicinity of the upper end of Henshaw avenue, although a dry basement in Springfield last week-end was a rarity, there were homes, both new and old in several sections, which were virtually inundated. . . owners either blame the builders or improper drainage conditions in their respective areas. . . there were at least a score of residents in town with several feet of water in basements. . . in one instance water was as high as cellar windows.

Water in itself is damaging enough, but the mud, filth, slime and other after effects are known to be very menacing to health. . . wouldn't surprise this department at all to see Dr. H. P. Dangler, township health officer, once again renew his former pleas to municipal authorities to get started once and for all on this miserable problem in an effort to solve it for good. . . the situation is a serious one and this newspaper pledges itself to the support of any worthwhile program which will lead to correction. . . we invite all suggestions on the subject.

Baldwin Gets 3-Month Leave From Town

Doctor Orders Fire Chairman To Take Respite

Fire Commissioner Walter W. Baldwin, currently is on a three-month leave of absence from his duties as a member of the Township Committee. The leave was approved unanimously by the governing board last week when Baldwin reported his physician recommended the leave.

Mayor Robert W. Marshall has assumed Baldwin's post as a member of the Municipal Planning Board. No action has been taken as yet to assign the duties of the chairman of the fire committee and of the building and grounds committees. Baldwin also is president of the Board of Health.

Baldwin's term as a member of the governing board ends January 1. He recently filed a petition to run for reelection as an independent. He originally was elected as a Republican. He has indicated any decision to terminate his candidacy will hinge on how quickly he regains his health.

Baldwin has been one of the focal figures in a bitter intra-party dispute which has threatened to split the local Republican organization. When the G. O. P. named Township Committeeman Fred A. Handville and Charles A. Remlinger as its candidates, Baldwin and Francis J. Keane, former township committeeman and a former Democrat, filed as an independent ticket.

Baldwin has been at loggerheads with party leaders during the past year and apparently has been particularly at odds with the organization. Several of his supporters were defeated in county committee contests in the April primary.

Girl Scouts Plan Strawberry Fete

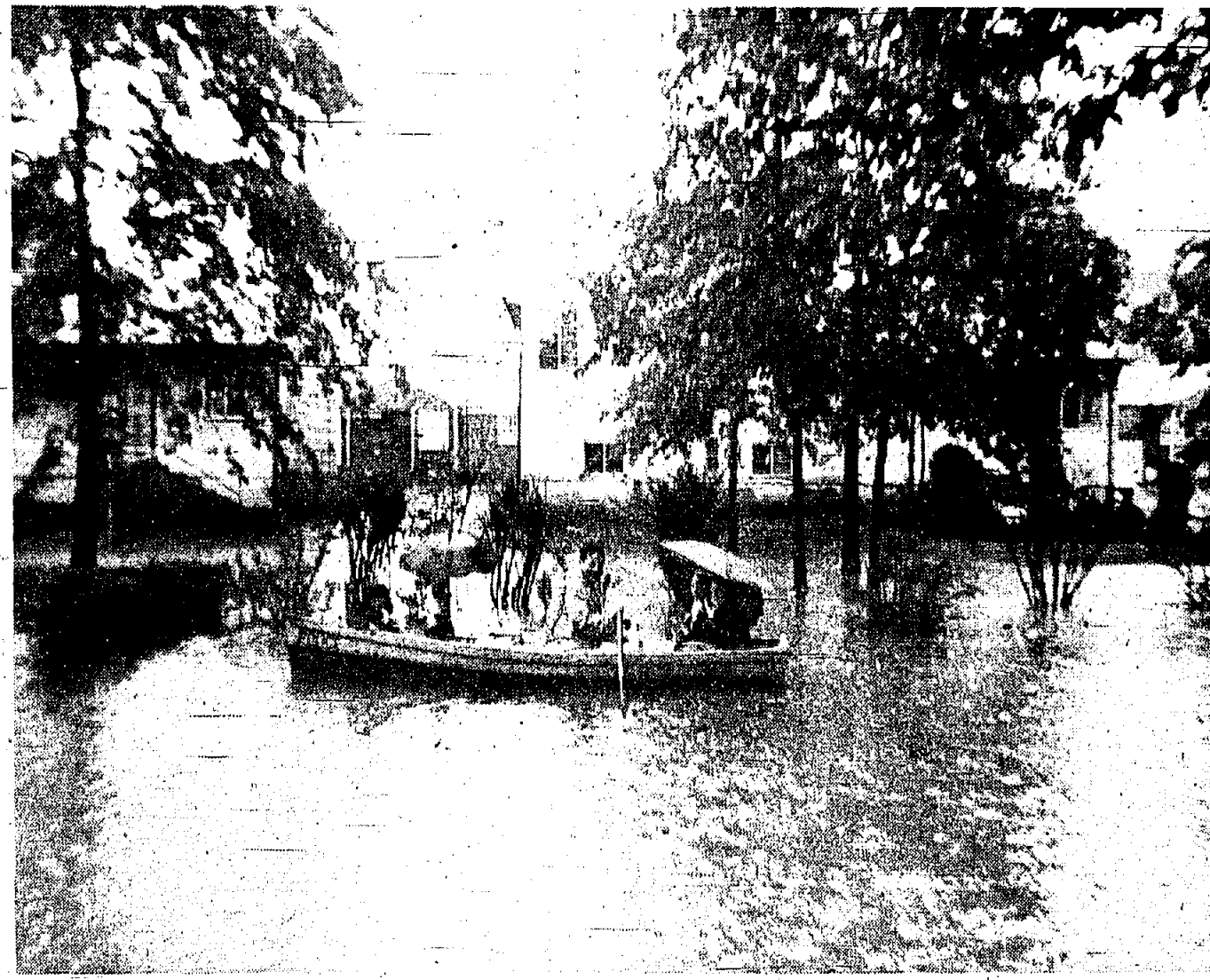

Major League Clubs Seek Crack Regional Battery

Indications today are that as soon as they are graduated from Regional High School, Bob Thwaites, of Clark, and Charlie Schaffernoth, who form the school's crack battery, probably will be signed by major league clubs.

Thwaites, who is completing his senior year, is one of the most effective right-handers in Regional baseball history. Schaffernoth, a catcher who is the son of former Patrolman and Mrs. Charles Schaffernoth, last year was selected for the all-county team.

The big backstop has a batting average of .351. His seventeen hits include two doubles and three triples. Thwaites, considered one of the three best hurlers in Union County scholastic ranks, has won six and lost three. He has allowed thirty hits in 66 and one-third innings and leads the county in strike-outs, eighty-seven.

HS Education Bd. Names Official

Dr. Norman Murray of Mineola, L. I., has been appointed vice-principal of Regional High School, it was announced recently by the board following a special meeting. He was named by the board which set the salary for the post at \$6,000.

Dr. Murray was appointed to the post after Dr. Ivon E. Culver, of Upper Darby, Pa., who originally had been appointed to the position had declined a contract. He cited health reasons, it was said.

Dr. Murray has had three years' experience teaching in public schools and five of teaching in Army schools. He is administrative assistant at the Institute of Field Studies, Teachers' College, Columbia University.

The educator, who will assist Supervising Principal Warren W. Halsey received his BS degree in 1937 from William and Mary College. He did graduate work at New York State Teacher's College and at Harvard University. He received his master's degree at Teachers College, Columbia, in 1949 and his doctorate in education from the same institution last year.

New Detective Starts Job Today

Patrolman Vincent Pinkava today officially became the first detective in the history of the township police department. The post was created by an ordinance which was adopted last week on final reading. The recommendation of Pinkava was made by Police Commissioner Albert G. Binder after consultation with Chief of Police William J. Thompson.

Pinkava will receive a salary of \$4,335 a year. The new detective is 35. He lives at 51 Mountain avenue with his wife and two children. He had been a member of the force for the past decade. During that period he has made a number of important arrests and conducted several investigations which have led to arrest of persons charged with theft in this area.

Rising flood waters which inundated many sections of the municipality, virtually marooned a score of families and caused widespread hardship here have resulted in numerous complaints which are expected to be laid at the door of the Township Committee next Wednesday night.

Township Slates Sidewalk Hearing

A hearing has been scheduled by the Township Committee for Wednesday, June 25, on an ordinance which provides for installation of sidewalks on the west side of South Springfield avenue and curbing on the south side. The measure was introduced last week at the meeting of the governing board.

The sidewalks will be installed, assuming the measure is approved on final reading, on the thoroughfare from Mountain avenue to Shunpike road. The curbing will be from Oakland avenue to Milltown road along the east side and from Mountain avenue to Shunpike road on the west side. Curbing will be placed on the south side of the North Drive of the Raymond-Graham School along South Springfield avenue to Piedstone drive.

The ordinance provides for appropriation of \$15,000 for the improvement. Of this amount \$750 will be taken from the capital improvement appropriation. The remainder will be financed by bond anticipation notes. The notes are not to bear interest exceeding 4 per cent.

Special assessments for benefits against property improved as a result will be paid in three annual installments from the date of confirmation of the special assessments.

Residents of the area have pressed for the improvement of a period of many months. No protests are anticipated at the hearing.

The parade started in Taylor Park, Millburn. The line of march included first aid squads, police and fire contingents, Boy and Girl Scouts as well as veterans' organizations.

The closing event took place here when a wreath was placed at the honor roll at the Municipal Green. Presentation of the Lions Club Citizens Award of the Year also was made at that time by the club to the First Aid Squad.

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE INSTALLATION OF SIDEWALKS ON THE WESTERLY SIDE OF SOUTH-SPRINGFIELD AVENUE FROM MOUNTAIN AVENUE TO SHUNPIKE ROAD AND THE INSTALLATION OF CURBING ALONG THE EASTERLY SIDE OF SOUTH-SPRINGFIELD AVENUE FROM OAKLAND AVENUE TO MILLTOWN ROAD AND ALONG THE WESTERLY SIDE OF SOUTH-SPRINGFIELD AVENUE FROM MOUNTAIN AVENUE TO SHUNPIKE ROAD AND FROM THE SOUTH SIDE OF THE NORTH DRIVE OF THE RAYMOND CHRISTIUM SCHOOL TO FIELDSTONE DRIVE IN THE TOWNSHIP OF UNION AND PROVIDING FOR THE FINANCING OF THE COST THEREOF AND APPROPRIATING THE NECESSARY FUNDS TO PAY THEREFOR.
