### Know Your Government By N. J. Taxpayers Association

#### HEALTHY SIGN

An upsurge of citizen interest in modernizing local government in New Jersey was an unheralded feature of the recent election.

A round-up by the New Jersey Taxpayers Association shows that citizens in seven New Jersey municipalities voted on changing the form of government or appointing charter commissions.

Two cities—Rahway and Englewood, the Borough of Ramsey, and Parsippany-Troy Hills Township elected charter commissions for the purpose of studying the advisability of changes in the form of government.

By a narrow margin the voters of Hoboken approved a change to the mayor-council form of government. This is the first city in the state to abolish commission government in favor of one of the forms made available by the new Optional Municipal Charter Law.

Highlands citizens, asked to express their opinion in an advisory referendum, indicated that they did not favor any change in the present form of their borough government. However, the referendum did not provide a specific recommendation for a new form. A change to council-manager government, as recommended by charter commission, was rejected at Boonton.

These referendum followed enactment of the Optional Municipal Charter Law in 1950. Early in 1952, the Borough of Vinland and Lindlin Township consolidated into the City of Vinland and made first use of the charter law by adopting the mayor-council form.

In January the township of Bridgewater will request a special charter from the State Legislature. If granted, voters of the

township will then pass on adoption of the new council-manager charter.
