

PTA Drive For Members Starts

Beginning October 12 and continuing through October 23, the Springfield Parent Teacher Association will conduct its annual membership drive. At that time every boy and girl in Springfield's Public Schools will make the same request of Mother and Dad. "Please help make our membership the highest ever this year."

When one joins The National Congress of Parents and Teachers he or she is a member of the largest organization in the country with a membership of over 4 million.

It is the hope of Mrs. L. E. Stinson, president of the local P.T.A., that when the parents receive their membership cards they take time to read the objects of the Congress which are printed plainly on the back.

The Springfield Parent Teacher Ass'n was organized in 1950 with an original membership of 63; last year's members totaled 1877, yet scanning its past it would seem that no organization in Springfield has done more to promote the welfare of children.

With its small but active membership the new P.T.A. immediately formed a child study group to deal with different phases of child training. The first actual project undertaken was the hot lunch program carried on in the Flomer Annex on the corner of Morris and Flomer Aves. Under the direction of Mrs. A. B. Anderson, chairman, a committee of parents served hot lunches of "reasonable supplementary dishes to grade school children."

Bonadies, Moran Give Their Plan for Civic Improvement

Vincent J. Bonadies and J. Leo Moran, Democratic candidates for township committee, flooded Springfield this week with a comprehensive political pamphlet, highlighting their program for civic improvement.

Asking for support on election day with the slogan of "Time for a Real Change to New Spaces with a Fresh and Realistic Program," Bonadies and Moran make public a pledge which states that "as Township Committee they will conduct public audience on two days every week at the Town Hall between the hours of 10:00 a.m. and 12 noon, which will afford all people the opportunity to discuss local problems and questions with town officials to encourage more active participation in the town affairs."

Of the many important parts of the announced program for Civic Improvement is the establishment of a baby-keep well station which has always been a pet project for Bonadies and his running mate, he stated, "don't like to introduce such a forward looking health program during a political campaign," said Bonadies in discussing the baby-keep well plan, "but there is nothing more important to Springfield with the influx of so many young married couples. I have done considerable research and Springfield should take some steps toward establishing such a station no matter what the outcome of the elections may be."

Will Turn Over Salaries.
"Such a health project will cost approximately \$6,000 a year but both Moran and I will turn over our full salaries as Township Committeemen to help meet the cost until the Township provides for the maintenance in the budget."

"I have already made arrangements with a local doctor who will make himself available for one day each week and I also have the promise from drug and medical companies to furnish supplies at no charge. Several of the leading Health Department authorities of Newark will help Springfield organize such a station and advise on maintaining it in the early stages, and a famous pediatrician from Newark has also promised to

Ballot Questions In Short Titles

Springfield voters will have to wade through the two long-winded referendum questions on the ballots in the general election November 3.

County Clerk Henry G. Nutton is restricted to a six word title for each question and for the 14 word referendum on bingo, he will have the following legend on the ballot: "Legalized Bingo With Restrictions."

For the 107 word referendum on tax exemptions for widows of all veterans, the title wording will be: "Extending Present Veterans' Widows Tax Exemption."

Republicans Slap At Independents

'Let's Look at the Records,' Say Independent Candidate

The Independent candidates for the Township Committee elections, Thomas A. Argyris and Francis J. Keane, believe "this is the hour" and plan to hammer at the present governing body. "Let's look at the record" is the theme of their statement issued yesterday.

A favorite phrase of professional politicians is: "Let's look at the record." To oblige our opponents who are again this year pointing with pride to the record, we have reviewed the record and wish to refresh their memories with the facts that are common knowledge to all citizens of Springfield.

We find a record of high taxes. A budget which grows larger and larger every year with practically nothing to show for the vast amounts of money spent. A record of annual lip service being paid but no action taken to the proposal of a reassessment program to insure a fair tax burden on everyone.

A record of years of discouragement of desirable industry wishing to locate in Springfield. We find a record which is highlighted by inadequate engineering of roads and sewers, and an antiquated Building Code which is unable to protect home owners.

An administration of zoning ordinances which never seem to serve the purpose of protecting the home owner from improper development of the Community. A record of scanty control and a parking problem which is living evidence of the years of inconsistent and inadequate planning.

It is a record lacking in efficiency, system, vision and accomplishments. A record filled with uncomplimentary headlines, selfish motives, spiteful acts and personal feuds. A record that has discouraged public participation in civic affairs, with Township Committeemen who consider themselves self-appointed experts in all phases of Government, ignoring

The political fur is beginning to fly and the Republican organization candidates in a formal statement today, aimed their howitzers at the Independents, charging one of their candidates with having "helped draft the off street parking ordinance but he now attacks it."

Following is the statement: "On November 3rd next you will vote for two men who are to serve you on the Township Committee for the next three years.

"The Republican candidates respectfully request that you review the records of the candidates before deciding on your choice."

"Very often the voters are in the unfortunate position of having to appraise candidates on their campaign statements alone. This year, however, you are in the fortunate position in that as between the Republican and Independent candidates there are records of past performance available to guide you.

"In a recent statement, the Independent candidates criticized the Off-Street Parking Ordinance which was adopted by the Republican Governing Party. The Independents stated that the Ordinance was too harsh to the merchants in town and that after the merchants had submitted suggestions for modification, not a word was changed from the original proposal.

"Now, let us look at the record. One of the Independent Candidates was chairman of the Planning Board which drafted and recommended the adoption of the Off-Street Parking Ordinance. Although he helped to frame the Ordinance, he now attacks it.

Moreover, the records will show that the ordinance, as originally drafted by the Planning Board and the Independent Candidate, is quite different from the Ordinance finally adopted by the Republican Township Committee.

"For example, the Ordinance submitted by the Planning Board and sponsored by the Independent Candidate contained this language:

"Paragraph 18: Compel non-conforming property owners to provide adequate Off-Street Parking within a limited time—suggested 2 years."

"Had the Township adopted that provision a good many of the business people in town would have been unable to comply and would have been forced out of business.

Now, this same Independent Candidate who sponsored this legislation weeps crocodile tears for the merchants in town.

"The Independent Candidates make light of the fact that the Republican Township Committee included in the Off-Street Parking Ordinance a provision for the granting of relief for hardship cases by the Board of Adjustment. Yet, the Independent Candidate

who now complains the Ordinance is too harsh included no such relief in the ordinance sponsored by the Planning Board of which he was the chairman.

"We respectfully submit that the Off-Street Parking Ordinance as finally adopted is in the interest of all of the people of the Township of Springfield. We decry the tactics of the Independents in attempting to set up one segment of the population against the general welfare of all of the people of Springfield.

"Incidentally, this same Independent Candidate was formerly a Democratic Member of the Township Committee. Today, he subjected our citizens in these try-catch offices as an Independent. Tomorrow—your guess is as good as ours—yet, the Independent Candidates berate our Republican Governing Body as being idealistic. which they say will be introduced and supported by them.
A Genuine Master Plan—devised and planned by a large Citizens' Committee working in conjunction with Municipal Boards for a period of one year at no compensation, to cover a minimum of five years and no more than ten years.
Establish a Permanent Flood Control Commission—composed of four members to serve for one to two years—competent, professional or qualified people selected on a purely non-partisan basis.

Re-Evaluation Program of Town Properties—on a fair and equitable basis derived by a standard formula applying to all properties in town.
Adoption of Parking Meters—a successful method of increasing town revenue.

Ordinance for Township Rent Control—Establishing a fair basis for both tenant and landlord.
Revise Off-Street Parking Ordinance—with a view toward relieving the stringent restrictions imposed on merchants and business men. Program of revision to include the expansion of parking facilities and improve the condition of present parking areas.

Appoint a Citizens Budget Committee—serve the purpose of informing public as well as being able to guide in all budget matters.
Create an Industrial Commission—to encourage and promote establish industry for out-industrial areas. Members of Commission to come from prominent township business leaders.

Create a Non-Partisan Recreation Commission—present committee now, a political plum with all political appointments. Recreation program to be extended to include the whole township instead of a few isolated areas.
Civil Service System for Police Department—a step to improve the morale of the police department as well as to maintain high standards. Promotions would be on a merit basis only.

Promote the Location of Bus Terminal—if the center of town and paid for by a joint arrangement with bus companies making use of its facilities.

Springfield Shows Voting Increase

Springfield is one of only five municipalities in Union County to show an increase in the number of eligible voters as compared with last year—although the gain is a very modest one.

According to the official figures released by the Union County Board of Elections, there will be thirty-nine more qualified voters in Springfield for the coming election than in 1952. The actual registration figures being 8,191 for this year as against 8,152 for last year.
Of the 21 municipalities in Union County only four others showed a gain—in-eligible voters with 200 for Clark as the greatest gain. Mountaineer had an increase of ten. The entire county lost a total of 8,383 voters from the all time high of a year ago.
