1954-55 School Budget Adopted

A figure of \$615,000 was recommended as the amount to be raised by bond issue for the new school to be built by the Springfield Board of Education at a regular meeting held Tuesday night. This recommendation came from the architect, Emil A. Schmidt, of East Orange, who has been selected to draw the plans for the new building in Mountain avenue near Hillside.

The plans call for a 12-room school for the lower grades and are part of a long range program by the local school authorities. The matter will be presented to the voters in Springfield in a referendum after the school elections set for February 9.

The public hearing for the 1954-55 annual budget brought no objections and the amount of \$529,720 was adopted of which \$471,397 is to be raised by local taxes. The new budget will raise the tax rate 22 points, considering increases in rates. Among the items increased is \$25,750 for teachers' salaries to raise scales and provide several new teachers due to rising enrollments.

Budget comparisons are as follows: Current expenses, \$369,675; \$101,220; repairs and replacements, \$22,300; \$29,200; land and buildings, \$12,700; \$22,450; manual training, \$12,900; \$12,900; and loans and interest, \$69,500-\$64,000.

The Chamber of Commerce and Peter Roselle & Son, contractor for collection of garbage in Springfield, have agreed on a sliding scale arrangement to determine how much garbage each merchant can put out for collection over and above the two cans set by ordinance at a special informal conference held Tuesday night at Town Hall.

At a get-together, called by the Board of Health, the perennial problem of garbage collections in the business district was thoroughly discussed, and as Board Chairman, Arthur Mandville put it, "It's about time we had a meeting of minds to clear up this situation."

The strained feeling between Roselle and some of the merchants grew to its height when merchants had learned recently that the Roselle contract and the new sanitary code of 1943 put no limit on the amount of garbage to be picked up and therefore the merchants felt that being charged extra fees was unfair.

Felix C. Foreman, president of the Chamber of Commerce and representing the merchants emphasized this point at the Board meeting, but Crescent Roselle contended that for the past fifteen years or more, the merchants had paid for what he termed "extra service." This, he explained, included making special stops behind the stores and, in most cases, picking up garbage that was far in excess of what he understood the limitations to be.

Board of Health members agreed that a "compromise" and a settlement would be advantageous to all concerned, and that a nominal charge should be objectionable for extra garbage.

Foreman and Roselle agreed that something extra be worked out and decided that there would be a two-hour limit for regular pick-up at no charge. Additional refuse would be charged according to a scale set up by Roselle & Sons and agreed upon by the merchants.

Acting upon an idea originated by Program Chairman, Mrs. Edwin G. Davenport, and approved by the Executive Board of the Springfield Woman's Club, Mrs. Merton D. Williams, Club President, has designated the next meeting of the club as "Community Guest Night." The meeting will be held on Wednesday, February 3 at 8:15 p.m. in the James Caldwell School.

Invitations have been sent by the Springfield Woman's Club to the presidents or leaders and another member of every civic, social, and religious organization in Springfield. It is hoped that there will be some representation from each of the 55 local groups.

Mrs. Davenport has secured as the speaker for the event Clarence Moser, Associate Executive, National Field Staff of the YMCA and widely acclaimed author of the recent book, "Understanding Boys."

Assisting Mrs. Davenport with program plans are Mesdames: Mrs. P. Christensen, William Cosgrove, Robert Hayes, Charles Beard, Adam L. Sosa, Charles Phillips, Jr., and Lemuel Stevens.

Springfield Merchants Plan Big Sales Show

Breakfast Will "Kick Off" Annual Scout Drive, Feb. 6

Breakfast, with stacks of buck-wheat cakes as the main course, will kick off the 1954 Boy Scout drive in Springfield at the new Parish House, Main street, at 8:30 a.m. on Saturday, February 6. This annual breakfast will be served to all workers on the drive including majors, captains, workers, plus Cubs and Boy Scouts who accompany workers on their rounds for that day.

Immediately after this breakfast—at which time there will be some last minute instructions to all workers—the volunteers will cover every home in Springfield during the day to tell the story that will help make this program of providing training and leadership to all scouts in this area.

There will be the usual holiday display of banners, pennants and the other gay exhibition of color—music—and other attractions to help bring the Township residents into the local shops and attract shoppers from nearby municipalities.

Merchants participating in the Big Show hope to convince shoppers that all quality merchandise is available here—and at reduced prices in many cases. All well known brand goods will be displayed and offered at exceptional values.

The Big Show next month will be the first of a series of sales events being planned by the Chamber of Commerce. Springfield is making elaborate plans to stage a big civic show in June when Springfield will receive publicity from all parts of the nation because of the National Open Golf Championship to be staged at the Baltusrol Golf Club. Thousands of visitors will be attracted to Springfield during that tournament and the merchants plan some kind of a program that will be in keeping with this great nationwide event.

Ben Hogan Will Positively Play at Baltusrol in June

Ben Hogan, conceded to be the world's greatest golfer today and possibly the greatest competitor of all time, will definitely play in the Baltusrol Open championship at the Baltusrol Golf Club in June. Hogan confirmed this personally and announcement was made that the "challenger of the year" will once again be the opponent for the country's top pros, and lowest duffers in the third staging of golf's biggest competitive event, sponsored jointly by Life Magazine and the Professional Golfers Association.

This annual National Golf Day will be held at Baltusrol on Saturday, June 5, while the National Open championship is scheduled for June 17-19.

All proceeds, with no deductions for expenses, will again be presented in equal shares to the USO, an agency of the United Defense Fund, and the National Golf Fund, a non-profit corporation set up to disburse proceeds from National Golf Day tournaments for charitable and worthwhile projects related to golf.

In announcing the completion of plans for 1954, LIFE Publisher Andrew Hellsing and PGA President Horton Smith noted that the USO and NGR each received \$54,604 last year, the sum of 51 entry fees paid by golfers who sought to beat U. S. Open Champ Julius Boros. The USO is using its share to organize first postwar club for servicemen and women in Tokyo.

Morey LaRue Laundry Marking Its 64th Anniversary

Morey LaRue Laundry Company, one of the nation's oldest and largest commercial cleaning establishments and one of the leaders for the new Springfield Shopping Center, is celebrating its 64th anniversary in the industry. Morey LaRue has taken considerable steps in the new shopping center and expects this branch to serve as the headquarters for an ambitious expansion program.

The company's first plant was opened in Easton, Pa., in 1890, and operations were expanded to the Elizabeth area three years later. Under progressive management, the firm has become a leader in the laundry field, ranking among the first for its advances, not only in plant and equipment, but in methods, materials and services.

The laundry originally was operated as a partnership between the late Mahlon Morey and William LaRue, both of Easton. When the New Jersey expansion was carried out in 1893, Mr. Morey came to Elizabeth to supervise operations. The main office was transferred here several years later.

Incorporated in 1900, the growing firm suffered its first serious adversity in 1901. A fire swept its newly opened plant at 15-20 N. Jersey St. and destroyed equipment, stock and building. A factory in Belleville was rented immediately while rebuilding operations were begun. A new structure

Township Upheld In Firing Cop

Action of the Springfield Township Committee in dismissing former Patrolman Ivy Haeblerie on charges of misconduct and disobedience of police department rules, was upheld this week by County Judge Milton A. Feller.

Haeblerie, who lives at 30 Colonial terrace, was dismissed after testimony was heard regarding an alleged romance with a 20-year-old girl. He was accused of taking the girl to taverns while she was under age and violating other rules of the department.

"The Township Committee fired the 32-year-old policeman October 30 after the charges against him were heard at an open hearing. According to the charges, Haeblerie disobeyed orders and did not comply with rules and regulations of the police department by continuing to see the girl and leaving town while on duty without permission.

The former patrolman's attorney appealed the dismissal and Judge Feller had been hearing the case since last Friday. Before announcing any further appeal, Haeblerie's attorney will consult with the Patrolman's Benevolent Association.

The Springfield Sun wants to reiterate that the list of applicants who took the examination for postmaster and which appeared in last week's issue, does not indicate the exact position on the list in which they were certified. The names were printed exactly as received in a telegram from United States Senator Robert C. Hendrickson. As an example, Jack Fisher, who is superintendent of mills at the Springfield post office, appears as the last name on the list published last Thursday. Fisher, as it happens, is a resident of Livingston, and his position on the published list might not reflect the ratings he made in the civil service examination. His marks might have entitled him to a higher position on the list but, under the civil service regulations, he could not qualify because he was a non-resident and, automatically, is placed at the end of the list.


