1st Aid Squad Raises Record Amount \$5,129

The final financial report of the recently conducted annual fund drive by the Springfield First Aid Squad shows a total of \$5,129.29 collected—the highest amount ever contributed to this very worthy local cause.

Four Seeking 3 Places on School Board

Four Springfield residents are seeking the three places on the local Board of Education in the election to be held Tuesday, February 9, but this year's contest will hardly stimulate the excitement and fireworks of the 1951 free-for-all when eight candidates battled for the three places.

This year appeared to be the usual quiet school board election until 11:30 p.m. on the last day for filing petitions, Mrs. Genevieve Lewandowski of 42 Shunpike road, presented her nomination petition.

The other three candidates are incumbents—Gifford G. Hale of 14 South Maple avenue, Robert J. Smith of 14 Tenshaw avenue and S. Bryant Haas of 35 Edgewood avenue, who was appointed to finish the term of Mrs. Russell Pfizinger who had recently moved out of Springfield.

"The 1951 contest saw Robert J. Anderson, Robert J. Lovins, Mrs. Florence Nielson, H. Stanley Glenn, Clifford D. Walker, Mrs. Russell Pfizinger, Gifford G. Hale and Robert G. Smith trying for the three places on the Board with the last three, Mrs. Pfizinger and Smith and Hale winning. There were 707 votes cast in that election out of an approximate registration of available voters of 3,600.

Mrs. Lewandowski and her supporters for one of the places on the school board believe that she can bring to the educational system some new approach to the many problems confronting members of the board. When asked what prompted her to seek a place on the school board, Mrs. Lewandowski stated that her candidacy was, in no manner, any criticism of the members of the board but that she had some very definite ideas about Springfield's school system and would like to make some of these progressive approaches available to the local school system.

"In fairness to all and with regard for all," Mrs. Lewandowski continued, "a larger representation of women rightfully belongs on the Board. And since women and men alike have urged me to become a candidate, to take an active interest in the social and community problems of school children—especially those of large families, I have decided to submit my name for election. I being a member of a large family, sincerely feel that I can understand and interpret and help in clarifying their needs."

Local Man Escapes in Airplane Crash

Gerald B. Bodnar, of 69 Meisel avenue, who was one of the 24 passengers on an American Airlines plane to escape serious injury after a crash-landing six miles and a half from the Buffalo airport, is still a patient in the Sisters of Charity Hospital, Buffalo, but he is out of danger, according to his family here.

Mrs. Bodnar visited with her husband early this week and found him in the condition although the hospital authorities believe he will have to remain in Buffalo for several weeks because of internal injuries.

Mr. Bodnar is purchasing agent for the Hyatt Roller Bearing Corp. of Harrison and was on a business trip when the near fatal accident occurred.

Planning Expert Will Start Full Township Survey

Theodore T. McCrosky, a consulting engineer with offices in New York City, was appointed by the Springfield Township Committee at its regular meeting last night to "do a complete rezoning and land planning job for the Township, with a future land use plan, an up to the minute population analysis and to make an existing land use investigation of all Springfield."

While this isn't exactly a master planning survey, it is intended to give the Township Committee a complete picture of property and what changes may be necessary in the zoning set up as it exists today. Mr. McCrosky comes well recommended and has done similar jobs for such municipalities in Westchester County, Morristown and West Orange, and is now engaged in such a project in Summit.

His staff is expected to start immediately and complete reports have been promised to the Township Committee by September 1. Mr. McCrosky's proposal was submitted to the Township Committee last night with a very comprehensive plan of operation at a cost of \$6,000 which was accepted.

Other business last night was the awarding of a sidewalk paving contract to the Pressure Asphalt Co. of Union whose figure of \$31,467 for concrete was low of those submitted at last week's meeting. Mayor Albert G. Binder voted against awarding the contract since he believed the bituminous sidewalks would cost less and give good service. Mayor Binder explained his negative vote against the other three members of the Township Committee in a statement in which he said, "We do not have any concrete evidence of the superiority of the concrete over the bituminous. But we do have knowledge of a concrete increase in cost over non-concrete and, therefore, we are penalizing some taxpayers some good concrete dollars. This may sound like a pun but, in my mind, it's good bituminous logic."

However, none of this seemed to have an effect on his colleagues and he was outvoted 3 to 1, and the concrete sidewalks will come to Springfield.

Woman's Club to Hear Local Artist

Local Artist and Teacher Art Department members of the Springfield Woman's Club will be privileged to have as guest speaker at their next meeting Mr. Russell Post, local artist and teacher. The group will meet at the home of Art Department Chairman, Miss Gertrude Sela, 468 Morris avenue, on February 1 at 8 p.m.

Mr. Post, speaking on "Artists and Their Work," will discuss some of the early great Masters of the Italian, French, German, Dutch and English Schools and compare their work with some of the early twentieth century American artists. The influence of the artist's historical background upon his work, the influence of the country's economic situation upon the artist, these and other factors entering into the artist's life will be discussed at length by Mr. Post. He will attempt to make comparisons among the painters as to their viewpoints, subject matter, technique and styles. To illustrate his talk, Mr. Post will show reproductions of many of the paintings he will mention.

Mr. Post is a well known artist in his own right. He has studied at the Art Students League in New York where he specialized in Fine Arts at the Atelier of Professional Art in New York where he studied Commercial Art, and at New York University where he was an Art Education Major.

Before coming to Springfield, Mr. Post taught Art in the Irvington school system for nine years and taught for four years in Roselle High School. He is now in his fifth year in the Springfield school system. He taught a class of professional portrait painters at the Y.M.C.A. in Passaic, N. J., and also conducted classes at the Eastern Conservatory of Arts in Roselle.

Many of Mr. Post's paintings have appeared in exhibitions throughout New Jersey and in New York. At a recent exhibition sponsored by the Art Department of the Springfield Woman's Club, Mr. Post exhibited four water colors of local historical buildings.

Mr. and Mrs. Post, with their two daughters, reside at 135 Salter street, Springfield.

ON THE SUNNY SIDE

Mayor Albert G. Binder and Township Committeeman Eugene F. Donnelly said they were going to do something about promises they made during the flood of campaign oratory and literature last Fall—and they're proceeding to do just that.

Some of the very progressive ideas include the naming of a Town Engineer on a full time basis, already announced; the hiring of a well known planning expert and the employment of an experienced professional for re-appraising the entire township.

The full time engineer started operation January 15 and is now housed in the Lyon Building on Morris Avenue where he is organizing the various functions of his Department of Public Works.

The city planning expert is expected to start work at once to provide for an up-to-date plan for all the land in the Township now open for improvement, preparation of the required maps to illustrate the plan and to be a guide to the Township Planning Board and the Township Committee in the future.

The Township Committee is also employing an expert for re-assessing the entire township, a non-partisan evaluation of all properties, both residential and industrial. This will enable the Township to set up records that will, at all times, reflect the pertinent data concerning every individual piece of property so that actual differences may be available to the tax assessors and the public.

All this will cost money—but the benefits to the Township will be reflected in long range planning. Such a study will provide an inventory and an appraisal of present day values. The amount assessed for tax purposes is determined by each Township and is some proportion of the actual values which the appraisal shows.

These appointments—and several other forward looking programs—show a real business like approach. Springfield is growing very rapidly and this new 1954 governing body may have the answers. These programs require expenditure of money but Springfield should be able to justify these costs—if the jobs are well done.

Chamber Pres. Disagrees With Garbage Story in Sun

Felix G. Forlenza, president of the Springfield Chamber of Commerce, has addressed a letter to the Springfield Sun in which he disagrees with this newspaper's report of the garbage issue which appeared in last Thursday's edition.

Following is Mr. Forlenza's letter which speaks for itself:

Dear Mr. Sarokin:
In last week's issue of the Springfield Sun in your article concerning the meeting of representatives of the Chamber of Commerce, Peter Roselle & Sons and the Springfield Board of Health, you declared that it was agreed that there would be a two-can limitation for regular pick up at no charge to the merchant. I would like to point out that no such agreement was reached. Under no circumstances will the Chamber of Commerce agree to a two-can limitation. This would not be a compromise but rather it would revert the entire matter to its original status.

The fact that a compromise may be reached in no way indicates that the Chamber of Commerce has changed its position to the effect that the contractor is not entitled to payment so long as he is not required to give special service such as back door pick up or collection of items not specifically covered by the contract and specifications. A reasonable compromise will be accepted as a practical solution of the matter instead of forcing the situation into litigation, but a two can limitation is far from reasonable.
