New Light May Bring Changes In Regulations

The Department of Law & Public Safety is ready to authorize installation of traffic signals on Morris avenue in the Battle Hill-Marion avenue section but the Township Committee will have to decide whether or not the residents in this area will be satisfied to accept some of the recommendations made by Herbert J. Klar, Chief of the Traffic Engineering Section.

In a letter to the Township Committee the Department asks that no left turns be permitted from Warner avenue, Washington avenue and Alvin Terrace onto Morris avenue and that parking be prohibited in certain areas to be served by these traffic signals. The matter will be taken under consideration by the Township Committee at its regular meeting next Wednesday.

Following is the letter from the Bureau of Traffic Safety to the Township Committee dated February 3, 1954:

This is in reference to your request for the installation of a traffic control signal at the intersection of Route 82 (Morris avenue) and formerly N. J. Route 8-24, and Battle Hill avenue-Marion avenue in the Township of Springfield.

In order for this signal to provide maximum protection to the people within the immediate area, it is necessary that certain local action be taken to insure the use of the signal by the people for whom its benefits are intended.

In this connection our Mr. E. R. Bennett, Traffic Investigator, recommends that the left turn from Warner avenue, Washington avenue, and Alvin Terrace onto Route 82 be prohibited, thereby necessitating the use of the signalized intersection by those motorists eliminating the hazardous conflicts which Chief Sarge has expressed concern.

In order that maximum safety between pedestrians and motorists may be provided, and to facilitate unrestricted movement of two directions of traffic on the narrow edge streets, the following parking prohibitions are desirable in the vicinity of the intersection.

Parking is prohibited at all times:

Along the north side of Route 82 between a point 100 feet east of the easterly curbline of Marion avenue and a point 150 feet west of the

Start Work On New Shopping Center Shortly

Ground will be broken within 30 days for the new shopping center to be built at the corner of Morris, Flermer and Main streets, according to an official statement released yesterday by William O. Mellich, 271 Madison avenue, New York City, the renting agent for the project.

The announcement adds another store, the Mae Moon Ladies' Wear, and there are now seven tenants leased for the local project. The J. J. Newberry Department store will operate 30,000 square feet of the first floor and basement area, all of which will be of the most modern design and air conditioned. The Newberry organization has 475 stores in 45 out of the 48 states and plans to bring to Springfield all the latest merchandising improvements.

The Grand Union Company will occupy 18,000 square feet in a superior market that is said to be the best in food stores. The other stores are Miles Shoe, Park Drug, Royal Bakery, and Motey LaRue Laundry. The Grand Union and Miles store will also be air conditioned.

There are no prizes, shows or other usual mid-way attractions intended to bring in the shoppers. The Morris avenue merchants, with the cooperation of the Springfield Chamber of Commerce, will go all out in the matter of offering the highest quality merchandise during these sales days at the very lowest prices.

Along the south side of Route 82 between a point 100 ft. west of the westerly curb line of Battle Hill avenue and a point 150 ft. east of the easterly curb line of Battle Hill avenue.

Along the east side of Battle Hill avenue between the southerly curb line of Route 82 and a point 150 ft. south thereof.

Along the west side of Battle Hill avenue between the southerly curb line of Route 82 and a point 100 ft. south thereof.

Along both sides of Marion avenue between the northerly curb line of Route 82 and a point 100 ft. north thereof.

It is also desirable that the existing bus stops be relocated to far side ways where a "hatted" bus will not hide from view any pedestrians in the cross walk. The following far side bus stop locations are recommended:

Along the southerly side of Route 82 between points 80 ft. and 100 ft. east of the easterly curb line of Battle Hill avenue.
