ON THE SUNNY SIDE

Charles Beardsley will again lead the local Republicans as chairman and he will be able to give Springfield more of his time and leadership talents since he will not have the added responsibility of the Union County chairmanship this year...

We go to New York theatres very seldom—and when we do it is usually a show that has been accepted by all the critics. One of these is Oklahoma, a Rodgers and Oscar Hammerstein must, and we frankly admitted to the missus that we liked it very much...

Last Sunday evening we saw the same show at the Paper Mill Playhouse with Ted Scott and Gail Manners in the top roles and it was even more thrilling than the New York performance. The voices are terrific, the staging has the same tempo as the Broadway company...

Here is something from the Feed Institute's Digest under the title of "Hints On How To Kill An Association Or Club." It is SO true:
Don't come to meetings. If you do come, come late. If the weather doesn't suit you, don't think of coming.

Find fault with the work of the officers and other members. Never accept an office or committee appointment as it is easier to criticize than to do things.
Get sore if you are not appointed on some committee; but if you are, do not attend committee meetings. If asked by the chairman to give your opinion regarding some important matter, tell him you have nothing to say. After the meeting tell everyone how things should be done.

Do nothing more than is absolutely necessary; but when other members roll up their sleeves and use their ability to help matters along, howl that the association is being run by a clique.
Don't bother about getting new members. Let the others do it.

When a banquet is given, tell everybody money is being wasted on blow-outs which make a big noise and accomplish nothing. When no banquet is given say the association is dead and needs a can tied to it. Don't ask for a banquet ticket until all are sold. Then swear you were cheated out of yours. If you get a ticket, don't pay for it.

Hold back your dues as long as possible or don't pay at all. If you don't receive an invoice for your dues, don't pay. When you do receive a bill for your dues, postpone paying until the secretary has to write for the money—then get sore because you've been dunned. When everything else fails—ouss the secretary.

# SUNNING SPORTS

AT THE SUN sports in the terminating week of April, Member Bill Brown's flycatcher has a 6-2 record, the Cindersmen under Coach John Brown are at 500 with a 1-1 record, and Coach John Muller's Junior Bull Dogs are still sporting a flawless record with 7 triumphs.

Highlighting the Regionals second win of their last three contests was hurler Joe Schaffernoth who held the Indians from Rahway hitless and runless. Beside hammering in one of the Bull Dogs' 4 runs, he struck out 11 batters and passed only two. After 3 and a third innings had been completed the next 14 batters were retired to end the ball game, 9 of them fanning. This win gave Schaffernoth a record of 5 wins and 1 setback. The other triumph of their 6-2 record is credited to Ed Ruby while the defeat is charged to George Reynolds. Pacing the Bull Dogs at the plate in that contest were George MacKenzie who had 2 for three with two runs scored, and Ron Golcher, making his debut as a starter for the Bull Dogs, with 2 hits for three trips to the plate including a long double which landed on the track.

With those two hits included Golcher now heads the list of Bull Dog batters with a .750 average. He previously singled during the St. Mary game in his only pinch hitting roll. Ron although only a sophomore, has already shown his ability to play a variety of ball and is sure to develop greatly in his remaining seasons at Regional. Behind Golcher is Johnnie Ziegler a promising backstop, who in his initial season as a variety man is batting at a .545 clip. Beside being a threat at the plate Johnnie is very adept at erasing opposing players trying to pilfer bases. Succeeding Ziegler and offering a dual-threat at the plate and on the mound, is Joe Schaffernoth hitting the horsehide at .317.

Although having a mediocre 1-1 record the trackmen seem to have a powerful combination in most of the events. Their initial meet of the season was with Linden in which they bowed by a scant margin of 2 points. The second meet much to the enjoyment of their many fans, was an entirely different story. The Bull Dogs completely outclassed the Comets from Hillside by the lopsided score of 80 and a third to 26 and two-thirds. Pacing the cindersmen, as was last year, Ronnie Harshorn, Ronnie excels in the sprints, hurdles, and both broad and high jumps. Talented also in the sprints and low hurdles is Buckley Brown in his initial season with the tracksters. So far this season undefeated in the mile run and half mile event are Karl Ford and Roger Smith respectively. Main scorers for the Bull Dogs in the weight events have been Curt Meyer, Bob Hubinger, and Bob Collandrea, who just recently set the school record for the discus throw. The one-two punch as far as the pole-vault goes still remains the same as last season with Art Curtis and Harrie Ravetz doing the vaulting.

Extending their win streak to seven the Regionals "B" team squeaked by a powerful Rahway nine. Les Lawn did the hurling and went all the way for his fourth win of the season. Ken Reinhardt, who will probably start after his fourth seasonal win, tomorrow has won three contests. Leading the J. V. hitters are two flycatchers, Rich Fuchs and John McGeehan batting .477 and .400 respectively. In their last contest the score was knotted at 3 apiece after 3 full innings of play. In the bottom half of the fourth frame the Bull Dogs pushed a run across which proved to be the winning margin. Here's how it happened: Paul Oleyar slammed a single, stole second, advanced to third on McGeehan's ground out and scored on a wild throw by the first sacker who attempted to nail him at third.

# Youth Baseball Tryouts Start Monday

The Springfield Youth Baseball League has announced that the baseball tryouts for boys in the 9-12 age group will start Monday evening at 6:30 p.m., with the following sites being used—Washington Avenue Field (infielders)—with the Regional High School Athletic Field for the pitchers, catchers and outfielders. Boys are requested to bring their own gloves, caps, sneakers or shoes, and sweat shirts.

Each boy must be registered (final registration day is this Saturday) with all registration cards to be given to Edward J. Ruby, 90 Mountain Avenue.

Each boy will be given a number for his shirt or jacket, with the men conducting the try-outs keeping tab on his ability, marking the boy on his ability to throw, hit, bat, accuracy, hustle, and interest. A report card showing his ability will then be submitted to the Selection Committee, who in turn will have the job of setting up a four-team Springfield Youth Baseball League. The Selection Committee is R. H. Humer, Robert Marino, and Bill Reardon.

There is still need of adult help for the tryouts—any men within the township interested in the formation of a Springfield Youth Baseball League are requested to contact either of the following: Monday night at those sites: Bob-Bennett, outfield (Melrose Ave. Field); Jack Barrett (infield—Washington Ave. Field); Rube Humer and Harold Berg (Pitchers-Catchers, at Melrose Ave. Field).

Boys who wish to tryout for pitching and catching berths will report to the Melrose Avenue Athletic Field, and should they fail to make the grade, they will be given an opportunity to become an infielder or an outfielder.

It is important that the boy throw accurately, especially if he has hopes of becoming a pitcher or an infielder, catchers must have

the ability to catch directly behind the batter.

The Springfield Recreation Commission will furnish the bats, balls, bases, and catcher's equipment for the tryouts.

When the tryout sessions are completed, the four-team Springfield Youth Baseball League will then be organized, playing a twelve-game, six-week schedule, operating on Monday and Wednesday evenings. Each team will play twice each week, with rain-out dates scheduled for Thursday nights.

Each team will have fifteen boys, nine through twelve, with a manager and coach, appointed from those conducting the tryouts. Those boys who do not make the grade will be given an opportunity to improve their ability by working out with the minors, working their way up to the major group by attending supervised practice sessions.

The boys will actually play games, using the facilities on the nights when the Youth Baseball League is not scheduled. **Positive Campaign**

"Too frequently in the past our townspeople have been presented with only the choice of choosing between the lesser of two evils. Our campaign will be positive and constructive and under no circumstances will I admit any support under the conditions of being acceptable only because I am the lesser of two evils.

"I am honestly convinced that for the future welfare of our town it is important that the Democratic Candidate be elected in November, not at any price or by any means that may justify an end. This conclusion dictates that we will not resort to slander, half-truths or deliberate misrepresentation by quotations out of context or without due regard to the circumstances under which statements and opinions are made.

"You might ask, what can the Democratic Party expect from me if elected? As the party's representative, and I as a candidate or official of the town, shall bend every effort to develop and maintain the integrity and dignity of the Democratic Party in Springfield and to earn the respect of all people in our town. I pledge to conduct myself and to perform my responsibilities in such a manner that future members of the Democratic Party may look to my record with pride. The integrity and honesty of the Democratic Party and its leadership must be so strongly established that it shall never be questioned. On a question of judgement YES, but our integrity NEVER.

"When the choice is put to me at some future date, as most assuredly it will, to choose between that which will benefit the Democratic party or some individual connected with it, or to choose that which will be most benefit to the town as a whole, I must make my choice clear. My convictions and my duty will require that I consider Springfield's interest paramount and will be so guided. To those who in the past have succumbed to the concept that to vote any other way but Republican would mean the casting of a wasted vote:

"I sincerely urge them to reconsider their position in the future. To those people who are in fact Democrats at heart or are sincerely sympathetic with our cause, we will prove beyond a shadow of doubt that we are deserving of and have earned their present and future confidence.

**Will Cooperate**

"If elected in November I do not intend to become a thorn in the side of the governing body by becoming an oppositionist merely for opposition's sake. I shall be the first to champion any constructive and worthwhile recommendations proposed in the interests of the people of Springfield by any member or members of the governing body regardless of party affiliation. This must not be construed by anyone to mean that I will not oppose or express my convictions to the majority when and if the best interests of the town are not being served by the actions of the governing body.

"I pledge myself in this respect to act at all times as a liaison with the public in the matter of informing them promptly and accurately, and to present any and all facts that become known to me which are pertinent to the welfare and interests of the town. I shall present them to the public when they become known to me and not when it is politically expedient to do otherwise.

"This is our creed; this is the theme of our campaign."

 the party has a weapon of incalculable value in holding the governorship. Governor Robert E. Meyner already has revealed he will campaign for the Democratic candidates and all Republicans must redouble their efforts to offset that advantage.

**Will Continue Fight**

"Here in Springfield we must eradicate the scars of the April primary and quickly close ranks to assure a Republican victory. During the past six weeks I brought my campaign and the platform for which I fought to the attention of virtually every Republican and independent voter in the township. I have not backed down from that platform and I will fight for its enactment just as vigorously henceforth as I did during the primary.

"I feel I have an obligation to the hundreds of voters who supported my candidacy as well as the many others who voted in the G. O. P. primary. Republicans can make progress only if there is a united party and there is no room for schisms after the primary. The primary election was designed to display party differences and let the party members decide. But now is the time to close the ranks and for all Republicans and independents to work together for the good of the community.

"I refer to the independents for they have been an important factor in Springfield. They have fought for the principle of good government and we of the Republican party offer to them our platform which we believe will be of benefit to the entire township," Marshall said.

"The former mayor indicated that he will conduct a campaign of information throughout the summer months rather than remaining silent until the fall campaign.

"I intend to remain in close touch with all municipal matters and shall feel free to comment on what transpires," he said. "As the Republican candidate for the governing board I feel I would be doing a disservice to those who worked hard to assure me of nomination if I just dropped out of politics until fall. If I feel the community should be alerted to certain facts I shall not remain silent. By the same token, however, I want to cooperate fully with members of the township committee and I shall always be available to all of its members for consultation at any time."


