More Money Is Needed For Cancer Fight

The Springfield drive for the 1954 cancer fund closes next week and all those who have not yet contributed are asked to send in their checks so that the local committee may meet its quota.

A total of 9,528 men, women and children died of cancer in New Jersey in 1953, according to figures compiled by the American Cancer Society, New Jersey Division, from the records of the New Jersey State Department of Health. This is 495 more than in 1952 when 9,033 deaths were reported and 1,207 more than the 8,321 deaths in 1949.

The latest figures reveal that 5,508 of the deaths were reported by counties and 20 died in camps and institutions. Increases were reported by 14 counties while Atlantic had the same number in both years, 307. Burlington showed a drop of six; Gloucester, 40; Hudson, 37; Mercer, one, and Essex, seven. Union jumped 60.

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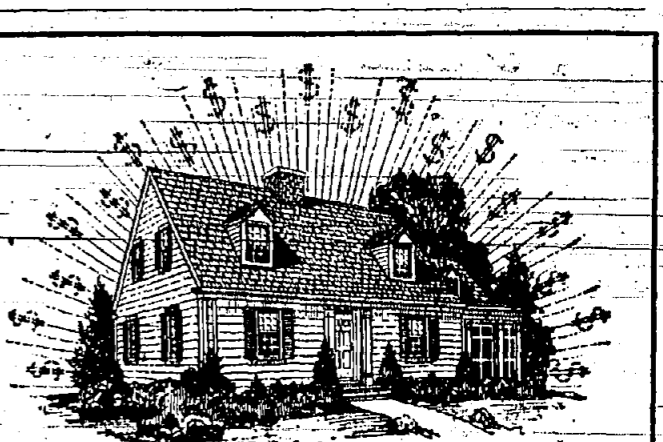
