More Money Is Needed For Cancer Fight

The Springfield drive for the 1954 cancer fund closes next week and all those who have not yet contributed are asked to send in their checks so that the local committee may meet its quota.

A total of 9,528 men, women and children died of cancer in New Jersey in 1953, according to figures compiled by the American Cancer Society, New Jersey Division, from the records of the New Jersey State Department of Health. This is 495 more than in 1952 when 9,033 deaths were reported and 1,207 more than the 8,321 deaths in 1948.

The latest figures reveal that 9,508 of the deaths were reported by counties and 20 died in camps and institutions. Increases were reported by 14 counties while Atlantic had the same number. In both years, 307, Burlington showed a drop of six; Gloucester, 40; Union, 37; Mercer, one, and Essex, seven. Union jumped 60.

Springfield will know who is to be named postmaster "within the next week or so," according to a communication received from United States Senator Robert C. Hendrickson, dated May 4.

Selection of the name will come from a new re-certification of those who took the examination, made public yesterday in Washington, which moved George M. Turk, present acting postmaster, to third position. Herbert R. Day to fourth and Edward C. Tidabach, fifth. The first two places on the re-certification list remain unchanged with Abel V. Del Vecchio still in the number one position and William H. Corby, second.

Moving of Acting Postmaster Turk to one of the top three on the new list of eligibles for appointment and bringing Mr. Day's name to fourth place are the most significant changes in the certified results first announced. Del Vecchio and Corby hold the first two top spots but Mr. Turk is now in third position instead of Tidabach, the latter now shown as fifth, with Mr. Day going from eighth place to fourth.

Information that these changes have been made on the re-certification of the applicants for the postmastership came in a telegram from Senator Hendrickson which was followed by the receipt of a letter dated May 4, also from Senator Hendrickson, as follows:
