## Mayor Calls On All To Help In Monday's Alert

Mayor Albert G. Binder is formally calling on all residents of Springfield to join in the state-wide public participation in the nation-wide air raid test "Operation Alert" ordered by the New Jersey Division of Civil Defense and Disaster Control for next Monday, June 14. Mayor Binder feels confident that Springfield will respond and cooperate and points out that failure to follow the instructions may result in fines for any one who ignores the instructions to be followed during the test.

All members of the police department will be on hand to test the public participation and operation and especially see to it that all traffic stops and all pedestrians take cover during the test in accordance with Civil Defense instructions.

Government Robert D. Meyer will report to New Jersey's five million residents on the results of the air raid test on Monday. State C.D.C. Director Leonard Dreyfus announced today.

Speaking from an observation post set up on the steps of the State House, the Governor will broadcast the report over the New York radio.

## Death of 'Doc' Lichtenstein Great Loss to Springfield

The death of Morris Lichtenstein last week, one of Springfield's leading citizens, is not only a great loss to the community but the story of his life is an inspiration and a lesson in courage and devotion to the "way of life and free enterprise."

"Doc" Lichtenstein, as he was known to his friends, died last Thursday and over 350 friends, relatives, banking associates, and town officials paid their last respects at services held at Smith and Smith (Suburban), 415 Morris avenue, Sunday afternoon. Mr. Lichtenstein leaves a son, Elliott A., who has been associated with him in operation of the Springfield Pharmacy on Morris avenue.

Mr. Lichtenstein was one of the charter founders of the First National Bank of Springfield and was vice president and on the board of directors of the bank at the time of his death. He was one of the organizers and former treasurer of the Lions Club, and a charter member of the Battle Hill Building and Loan Association, now out of business. He was active in all local drives and, during World War 2, received recognition in the form of a certificate from Washington for having sponsored the sale of the greatest number of bonds in the New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania area. He was also a member of the recently organized Springfield Historical Society and a member of the "once committee of that organization."

"Doc" Lichtenstein, according to his son, Elliott, fled from Latvia in 1906, seeking political refuge in America because of his activities in writing for an underground newspaper against the Czarist government. Lichtenstein succeeded in making good his escape but thirty of his comrades were killed in the same attempt for freedom.

On arriving in New York, Mr. Lichtenstein and various odd jobs, working as a longshoreman, a cutter in a pants factory and, at one time, when his fortunes were very low, he washed horse ears at

He worked as a drug clerk in West New York and South River, and came to Springfield in March, 1915. He purchased the Springfield Pharmacy that year and, with the establishment of a "Rex" store, Mrs. Anderson, related Elliott, who served as delivery messenger and general helper. "The back room," said Elliott, "had a pot stove for the cracker-barrel stoves and I remember my father telling us how they listened to ear phones with static drowning out the description."

## Marshall Fails To Show; Mayor Closes Matter

The Marshall-Township Committee controversy was carefully wrapped in cellophane last night and put away in the lower drawer of the deep freeze until after the summer. At least, that seems to be the end of this hot political scrap after Mayor Albert G. Binder at last night's meeting of the Township Committee learned that Marshall was not present to explain some of the alleged charges he made during the heat of the primary campaign when he defeated Harold G. Nenninger in a bitter Republican contest.

Mayor Binder, after asking if Mr. Marshall was present last night, said, "we'll have to consider this matter closed. We have done everything to have Mr. Marshall come to the Township Committee meeting and explain his accusations and the fact that he hasn't seen fit to appear, is a repudiation of any charges he might have made. There's nothing more we want to do about it."

An ordinance for the creation of a nine member planning board passed at a meeting of the township committee last night.

The old planning board consisting of six members went through the formalities of resigning and were re-appointed according to Law by Mayor Albert G. Binder. The mayor also appointed Alfred Swenson, Township engineer to the planning board and civilian member Henry Grabarz to complete the slate of members.

An amendment to the recently adopted salary ordinance was introduced at first reading at the township meeting last night. The amendment will include salaries for playground leaders, tennis instructors and part-time supervisors.

Liquor licenses for eight retail consumption stores, five distribution licenses and one club license were renewed officially by the Township committee at their regular meeting.

We're going to ignore—for the time being—local topics and say a few things about a good friend, a beloved, intensely human, loyal and gifted personality whose sudden death shocked and grieved the people of New Jersey—former Governor Harold G. Hoffman.

We were fortunate in having known Harold as a youngster and watched him with sincere admiration as he climbed, politically, to the highest office in the State of New Jersey, sparked by his unusual ability and through the sheer weight of his own lovable personality.

We are much richer in having known this most joyous and buoyant human being and, no matter what his station in life might have been—Mayor of his home town of South Amboy, Assemblyman, Congressman, Motor Vehicle Commissioner, Governor or Director of New Jersey Unemployment Agency—Harold never missed the chance of saying "hello," greeting his friends warmly and inquiring about members of the family he knew.

Harold Hoffman died as poor a man as he was when he entered politics in his youth—that he never wanted wealth except that which would live in the hearts of his friends; that wealth which can be carried across eternity.

Springfield lost one of its pioneers—one of its most outstanding citizens last week when Morris Lichtenstein—affectionately known to all as "Doc" Lichtenstein—passed away suddenly.

His friends were legion, his civic and fraternal interests unlimited, and he was always ready and willing to play his part in any program that might be the responsibility of "his Springfield."

The inspiring services at the Smith and Smith (Suburban) Funeral Home, 415 Morris Avenue, on Sunday, were a tribute to his memory. It was one of the largest funerals held in the beautiful Smith and Smith parlors, over 350 friends, relatives and officials attending.

His death is a distinct loss to Springfield but the fruit of his efforts and his confidence in his home town will serve as an inspiration to those who survive him.




