Juveniles In Springfield, Big Problem

Police authorities, civic minded Springfield citizens and parents are very much concerned with the rapidly spreading reports that juvenile delinquency is raising its ugly head here and becoming a very serious problem.

Springfield police have received several complaints concerning the groups of youngsters who have been loitering in various local "hangouts" until closing time. The noise of these teenagers has been the cause of several complaints to the police but the authorities can do no more than disperse the groups and order some of the very young ones to go home.

"We cannot shut our eyes to the fact that Springfield, like all other municipalities," said one authority, "is confronted with a very serious juvenile delinquency threat. Various local organizations, aware of the problem, have been trying to work out some plan (Continued on page 2)

High School Star Gets Jump Wings

Pvt. Jack Douglas Haskell, son of Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Haskell, 257 Myrtle Ave., Garwood, recently graduated, receiving his wings from Jump School at Fort Bragg, North Carolina, after three weeks of specialized training. A graduate of and former football star at Regional High School, he attended North Carolina State College, Raleigh, playing football for the Wolf Pack.

Pvt. Haskell was drafted into the army, September 24, 1953 and completed his basic training at Camp Rucker, Alabama, where he remained until he volunteered for the 82nd Airborne Division of World War II fame. In the spring of 1954, he completed Jump School at Ft. Bragg, where the requirements for graduation, after rigid training, were seven qualifying jumps from a 34 foot tower, followed by five jumps from a C-119 "Flying Box Car."

He recently participated in the "Flashburn Maneuvers" at Ft. Bragg, and attended the annual 82nd Airborne Convention held at the Hotel Roosevelt in New York City July 1 to 7.

Tax Collections Ahead of 1953

Tax collections during the month of June brought in a total of \$26,915.82 as compared with \$19,768.48 for the same period last year, according to the report submitted by the Collector of Taxes Charles H. Huff to the Township Committee. The total taxes collected for 1954 including June, shows an increase over 1953 with \$592,460.01 this year against \$493,191.45 for last year.

There was also collected \$4,735.94 of the 1953 taxes which brought the total of 1953 taxes to \$500,927.39. A total of \$21,897.16 of taxes due for previous years has been received by Collector Huff.

The complete total which includes interest and costs on taxes, assessments and franchise taxes brings the receipts for 1954 up to \$557,021.33 compared with \$558,113.04 for 1953.

Building Boom Is Headed This Way

Springfield seems to be headed into a real building boom with several more projects getting under way. Executive and sales offices have already been started for the Union County Coal and Lumber Company on Mountain avenue, across the street from their present offices. The yard and railroad siding will now be available for those who do business with the executives and the office without crossing the street.

Another development on Wehner avenue, opposite the General Greene Village, has been started by the Springfield Development Co., with only two model homes being completed now. Eventually, when the developers have complied with regulations and Township requirements, there will be a great number of such homes on the 90 lots this group now owns.

The Lynn Tract, a Robbins development, out South Springfield avenue, has completed its 50 homes and the Sherril Homes, located in the same area, have finished their eighteen dwellings.

Board To Approve New School Plans

A special meeting of the Springfield Board of Education will be held Tuesday, August 3, to approve plans and specifications for the new school to be constructed on Mountain avenue, it was announced at a regular meeting held Tuesday night. Bonds for the proposed school were purchased by Boland, Saffin & Co., of New York, at an interest rate of 2 3/8 per cent over a 19-year period.

The board approved bids for paving and curbing by Pressure Asphalt Co., Union, \$2,267.50 and roofing by Atlas Roofing Co., Irvington, \$1,898.

Miss Marilyn Innes of Irvington, a graduate of Rutgers, Newark University, was employed as a teacher for the 1954-55 school year. Her assignment was not announced.

"Drexel" To Be New Exchange Here In 1955

Along about November or December of next year—when you want to telephone your home in Springfield to inform the lady that you'll be late for dinner—office conference and stuff—you will dial DREXEL instead of Millburn.

That is the new designation—DREXEL 6 and 9—to take the place of Millburn 6 and Short Hills 7—the New Jersey Telephone Company announced today in preparation for the change to the dial service.

The cutover from the present operator system to dial service means that there will no longer be a Millburn or Short Hills designation in this area which includes Springfield, Millburn and Short Hills. There will be some changes in the numbers but, according to Charles A. Dowd, Jr., telephone manager in this area, most of the digits in the present telephone numbers will remain the same.

Simultaneously, New Jersey Bell announced the future designations of MCREWY 5, CRESVIEW 3 and 7, and FRONTIER 7 for its Chatham, Summit and Madison exchange areas, respectively, when they go dial in late 1955.

The telephone company said the introduction of the new names is in keeping with its program for nationwide dialing by operators and, ultimately, by customers.

Among the basic considerations in selecting a new telephone designation are that it be different from the locally name, easily pronounced, readily understood and easily spelled especially as to the first two letters, the company said.

New Jersey Bell emphasized, however, that the most important consideration in any selection is how the new designation fits into a statewide as well as nationwide dialing system.

These names will guide the long distance operator much as a street address guides the postman, the company explained. A "cut-off" state long distance call to Millburn would be placed in the following manner:

"I want Springfield, New Jersey. The number is DREXEL 6-9940."

Under the program for long distance operator and customer dialing, the United States and southern Canada have been divided into more than 90 areas. Each area has been assigned a three digit area code. New Jersey's code under this arrangement is 201.

The central office names in each of these areas will be chosen from a master list containing several hundred carefully selected neutral names which meet the aforementioned requirements.

With long range dialing, the distant party calling DREXEL 6-9940 in Millburn will first dial (Continued on page 2)

Captain Ralph G. Swanson of 446 Morris ave., acting commander of the Summit Squadron Civil Air Patrol leaves Thursday, July 23 for Mitchell Field Air Base, Long Island, N. Y. to take up assignment as Commanding Officer of the annual C.A.P. Training Encampment comprising ten officers and two hundred cadets for a fourteen day cadet training program.

The purpose of these annual C.A.P. summer encampments is to provide cadets with an actively training period during which C.A.P. cadets will receive both academic and vocational instructions. Further, to provide cadets with an opportunity to acquire the atmosphere associated with military life, and to familiarize themselves with the scope of the United States Air Force training program, and the common relationship between vocational training as taught and practiced in the Air Force and those trades peculiar to the aviation industry in civilian life.

Captain Swanson will be assisted by a staff of ten C.A.P. and Air Force reserve officers and four airmen.

Abandon Plan For Moving Building

John Bullock, of Summit, who will supervise the new restaurant, Sip and Sup, at the corner of Morris and Springfield avenues, announced yesterday that he will not wait for acceptance to move the house now on the property, and plans to demolish the building and start construction as soon as possible.

The building had been offered to the Springfield Girl Scouts and the organization had hoped to move it to some Township owned property but the site is not immediately available and, apparently, the idea has been abandoned.

Mr. Bullock announced that plans and specifications have been submitted to Building Inspector Reuben Marsh and negotiations are going on with a wrecking organization to demolish the building now on the property. As soon as this has been completed, the grading work will start to level off the corner and fill in some low spots in the rear of the property.

Once the actual work is started, Bullock feels confident that new eating place can be opened in a few months. "We intend to make our place very attractive," said Mr. Bullock, "and the kind of food and how it is prepared will spell the success, we look for in our Springfield operation."

Parents Here Elated As Missing Girl Returns

Two of the happiest people in Springfield are Mr. and Mrs. Louis Rothbard of 310 Alden road who were reunited over the past week-end with their adopted daughter, Doranne, who has been missing and the object of an eight state missing persons alarm for eighteen months. Doranne came to Springfield this past week-end a happily married woman and the mother of a seven-weeks-old boy to add to the joy of the Rothbards.

Doranne was last seen on January 20, 1953, combing her hair in front of her locker at the Johnston Dayton Regional high school where she was a senior. Until recently, the police authorities ran down clues from all parts of the country and states had it that the missing girl had been in several cities but investigation by the police brought no results until the daughter—now happily married and living in Brooklyn, contacted the parents in Springfield.

"We're all so happy," said Mrs. Rothbard yesterday. "Doranne telephoned us on Monday to tell us how relieved she and her husband were now that we're all united again. Seeing them almost repaid for those months of sleepless nights and worry. I used to sit up until the early hours of the morning—waiting and hoping for Doranne to return since all of us had thought of amnesia."

"Doranne told us how miserable she was," commented Mrs. Rothbard, "when she realized what anguish and grief she must be causing. Very very often, Doranne, told me that she sat at the telephone trying to muster up enough courage to call up and tell her parents where she was—but the fear that some one might want to interfere with her new found happiness and, perhaps, might try to annul her marriage must have kept her from contacting us."

ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE REGULATIONS GOVERNING AND RESTRICTING THE USE AND SUPPLY OF WATER FROM WHATEVER SOURCE FOR REFRIGERATION AND AIR CONDITIONING IN THE TOWNSHIP OF SPRINGFIELD.
BE IT ORDAINED BY THE TOWNSHIP COMMITTEE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF SPRINGFIELD, IN THE COUNTY OF UNION:
Section 1. All existing installations of refrigeration equipment, air conditioning, or refrigeration and air conditioning equipment installed on any premises, requiring the use of water, supplied by any public water company, or by any company supplying water to the public, or by any public water supply, or derived from a well shall, subject to the rules and regulations prescribed in this ordinance. The owner or person in possession of any premises upon which refrigeration and air conditioning equipment, requiring the use of water, is already installed, shall make application and obtain a permit for the existing installation not later than December 31, 1954. The said application shall contain the same information required by this ordinance. All existing installations of refrigeration equipment, air conditioning, or refrigeration and air conditioning equipment, requiring the use of water, installed prior to the adoption of this ordinance shall comply with the requirements of this ordinance in the same manner as new installations and such equipment already installed shall be changed, rebuilt or remedied and all of the work and equipment required therefore shall be installed and completed on or before September 30, 1955, pursuant to the inspection and approval of the Township Engineer; provided, however, that the Township Committee may for good cause shown by resolution, extend the time for compliance for a further period not exceeding four years from the adoption of the foregoing ordinance.
Section 2. No air conditioning or refrigerating unit employing water in the sanitary sewage system except upon application to the Board of Health and approval therefor, by the Board of Health.
Section 3. Any person, firm or corporation who installs any such equipment, and any owner, agent, lessee or occupant who causes or permits the installation or operation of any such equipment, in violation of the provisions of this ordinance shall upon conviction thereof pay a fine of not more than Two Hundred Dollars or imprisonment for not more than thirty days. Each day that a violation is permitted to exist, shall constitute a separate offense.
Section 4. If any section, paragraph, or sub-division clause or provision of this ordinance shall be adjudged invalid such adjudication shall apply only to the section, paragraph, sub-division, clause or provision so adjudged and the remainder of this ordinance shall be deemed valid and effective.
Section 5. This ordinance shall take effect upon final passage and publication as required by law.
