

New 100 Car Parking Lot Now Open For Morris Ave. Shoppers

Two important announcements were made yesterday which should improve business in Springfield considerably. The first is the opening of a new free parking lot in the rear of the group of stores in the area of the Springfield Pharmacy on Morris avenue which will accommodate 100 cars.

The other is a remodeling job planned by Elliott Lichtenstein on his own pharmacy front, Dwyer's Center Hardware and the Family Closet. Not only will the fronts of these stores be remodeled but Mr. Lichtenstein announces that there will be rear entrances to the stores in his own building so that shoppers can enter the places of business right from the new parking lot.

The parking lot, finished with a black top, is ready for use with entrances to the lot from Walnut Court and from Main street. It is intended to serve customers for all the places of business in this area in addition to the Springfield Pharmacy, Nagel's, Doyle's Center Hardware, Family Closet, Riello Barber Shop, Regional Street Shop and Tail Cleaners.

The remodeling job on the Stores in the Lichtenstein building is expected to start in two weeks with Morris J. Miller of Newark as the architect.

Driver of Bus Is Still In Hospital

Michael Kalba, 41, of 26 Clinton avenue, won't be back at his regular job of driving a Public Service bus for some time, according to information received at the West Hudson Hospital in Kearny yesterday. Kalba was driver of the bus which rammed into the rear of a tractor-trailer truck on the rain swept New Jersey Turnpike Monday night, injuring 17 persons and causing several other minor pileups of vehicles.

Kalba is in the hospital with chest lacerations and possible fractures, according to word at the hospital yesterday where they said his condition was considered fair.

Both the bus and the trailer-truck spun around on the slippery pavement and crashed against a guard rail, causing the south-bound lane of the Turnpike from Newark to Ridgefield Park to be closed to traffic for more than an hour.

Presbyterian Church Ready For Services

Church services will be resumed in the First Presbyterian Church of Springfield this Sunday at 10 a. m. with the Rev. Bruce W. Evans, pastor, preaching on the topic: "Keyswords for Living-Work." A full choir under the direction of Mr. Charles H. Sills will provide the special music. The church school will open one week later (September 12) at 9:30 a. m. and on this same date the customary two identical services of worship will be held at 9:30 and 11:00 a. m.

Sunday's service will be the first to be held in the newly decorated and refurbished church. During the summer months, services were held in the Parish House while the work was being completed. The walls of the church have been painted a colonial grey while the woodwork is white with a dark mahogany trim. New carpeting has been placed on the first floor and a new system of concealed-lighting has been installed in the ceiling. All work was done by local artisans.

The church itself is one of the historic landmarks of New Jersey known throughout the country for its conspicuous role in the Revolutionary War. The present building has been in constant use since it was erected in 1791. Since the organization date of 1745 the church has always presented a well rounded program in Christian leadership and education. Noticeable also through the years has been the cordial welcome extended to all who worship here. More recently a new Parish House has been erected on Main street thus enabling the church to present an ever widening program for its members and friends.

New Postmaster Sworn In; Crowd Attends Ceremonies

It's now Springfield Postmaster Abel V. Del Vecchio but just when the new local post office boss will start his duties depends on just how soon the postal department's inspectors can effect a transfer of the accounts and responsibilities. As soon as this transfer is made, Postmaster Del Vecchio will assume his duties.

A filled Township Hall Committee meeting chamber, made up of friends, relatives, Township and County officials as well as some "top brass" from other post offices, witnessed the inspiring swearing-in ceremonies Monday afternoon with Magistrate Henry C. McMullen administering the oath of office to the new postmaster.

Invocation was by Rev. Aloysius Carney, pastor of St. James Catholic Church, and Township Committeeman Eugene F. Donnelly presided over the ceremonies in place of Charles P. Beardsley, Republican Municipal Chairman, who could not be present.

Among those who spoke at the ceremonies and congratulated Postmaster Del Vecchio on his appointment included Mayor Albert G. Binder and Louis Kelly, postmaster of Newark. Mr. Del Vecchio responded with the promise of giving Springfield the best in postal service.

The new postmaster was top man in a civil service examination held for the office and was recommended for appointment by the local Republican organization. President Eisenhower nominated him and the United States Senate confirmed him on August 20. He takes the place of George M. Turk who has been acting postmaster in Springfield since the retirement of the late Postmaster Otto F. Heim in 1951.

Mr. Del Vecchio has been in the postal service in the Newark office since 1936 and was transferred to the inspector's office in 1941.

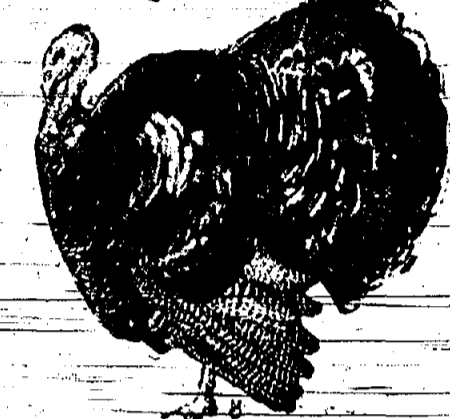

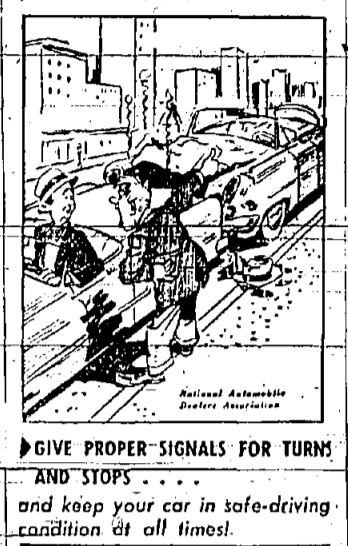

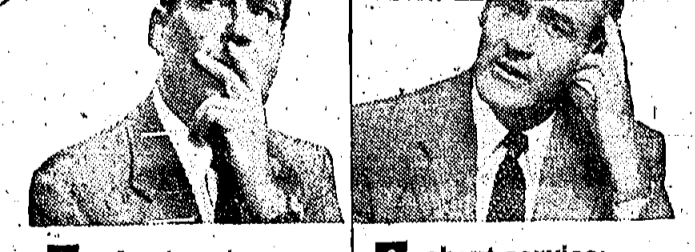
