

Public Schools Break Records For Attendance

The Springfield Public Schools opened on Thursday, September 9, with the largest enrollment ever accommodated. With some children not yet reporting due to illness or a late return to town from vacations, the grand total was 1272. They are divided as follows: James Caldwell, 447; Raymond Chisholm, 408; and Florence Gaudineer, 417.

There was an all-day program on Wednesday, September 8, for orientation of new teachers. They met with building principals and sponsors at 10 a. m. At 11 a. m. there was a general faculty meeting. The speakers were Miss Florence Gaudineer, school nurse; E. J. Jan-Tausch, psychologist; and B. P. Newschwanger, superintendent of schools. Procedures were reviewed, plans and innovations were presented, explained and discussed.

After a luncheon in the Gaudineer cafeteria, there was an address by Dr. Catherine E. Spears, head of the New Jersey State Neurological and Cerebral Palsy Clinic at Morristown Memorial Hospital. She described types and symptoms of nervous disorders in a manner to make the information of great potential value to persons working with large groups of children.

The remainder of the day was spent by the teachers in their respective buildings, completing preparations for the arrival of the children.

Charge Driver Did Not Report Crash

Students To Get Actual Safe Driving Education

In answer to a growing demand and because of the need for intelligent and safe driving practices for young people, the Health and Physical Education Department of Regional High School has instituted a full program of driver education.

The driving course, which is part of and coordinated with the Health and Physical Education program, is open to all those juniors who are 16½ years old. Those Juniors who are not yet 16½ years old, but who are 16, will be scheduled for the semester beginning February 1, 1955.

The plan under which the program will function requires that each student who enrolls for behind-the-wheel training must receive 30 hours of classroom instruction. In addition, each student will receive six hours of behind-the-wheel training plus 12 hours in the car as an observer and passenger. These requirements are stipulated by the New Jersey Department of Education. Students taking behind-the-wheel training must have parental permission.

Given Real Test

Those students not taking behind-the-wheel training, but who are taking driver education as part of the Health and Physical Education program, will receive 18 hours of class instruction only. All students, at the completion of the course, will be tested by the State Department of Motor Vehicles. If the student passes, he is not required to take the behind-the-wheel training.

First Aid Squad Seeking \$10,000

The month of September is the annual date for the First Aid Squad Fund Drive. The drive is the only method of financing this voluntary service to the residents of Springfield.

The goal this year is \$10,000. The squad sincerely hopes this amount is realized as the cost of serving the public is high. Half of this amount is hoped to be used for building suitable quarters. The Township has offered property for this purpose, but up to this time, building has been impossible. The space for equipment and ambulance is sorely inadequate, so it is imperative that more usable housing be provided for giving the public the service desired.

Operating expenses per year total \$3,000. These include such articles as bandages, antiseptics, towels, blankets, sheets; as well as gas, oil, insurance, oxygen, resuscitator and repairs. The remainder \$2,000 has to be set aside for the future purchase of a new ambulance. Each year, money must be saved for this purpose in order that a First Aid and Ambulance Squad will always be available in Springfield.

The generous cooperation is asked in this drive to continue the free services provided by a well equipped, highly trained squad, 24 hours a day.

"ARE YOU REGISTERED?"

1. In order to vote you must be registered at least 40 days before the election, Tuesday, November 2. Any U. S. citizen may register who on or before the next General Election will be 21 years old and a resident of New Jersey for 1 year and of his county for 3 months; who resides in the district in which he expects to cast his vote.

2. You become eligible to vote by registering in person during office hours at the office of Mrs. Eleonore H. Worthington, Township Clerk, or any Municipal Clerk in your County or at the office of your County Board of Elections, at least 40 days before the election. Naturalized citizens are asked to bring their naturalization papers with them.
