A call has been sent out by Mayor Binder to the newly appointed committee for a preliminary meeting Monday evening at which time discussions will be held on the method of operations and to define the purposes of such an advisory group.

"Five strands of colored lights will be installed," said Joseph L. Focht, President of the Chamber, "and all of them should be in place next week."

## Rush Work On New Shopping Center Here

In a rush to beat the weather, contractors on the new 10-unit General Greens Shopping Center here are rushing the construction, with a great deal of the steel girthers and frame work already in place, most of the floor completed and much of the roof.

Not all the steel has been delivered and there are some construction changes necessary but the job will not be delayed, and Max J. Levine, head of the corporation developing the shopping center, is confident that the schedules will be maintained and the entire project will be ready for the formal openings in the Spring.

The center will be featured by Grand Union, this nationally known food organization announcing that the local store will have the most modern merchandising facilities and equipment for service to the shoppers while maintaining the established reputation for quality foods at the lowest prices.

The other featured tenant will be the J. J. Newberry Co., a variety and junior department store, with something new for the shoppers. The Newberry organization planted a sign on the property this week, facing Morris avenue, announcing that "this is another Newberry store... over 460 stores, coast to coast."

Others who have leased space in the new shopping center located at the intersection of Morris, Flomer and Main, include Morey-La Rue Laundry Co. of Elizabeth; Park-Drugs, National Shoe Stores, Milton's Liquor Store, an ice cream and luncheon shop—ten units altogether. Formal opening is planned for spring.

## Collect \$1,100. In Dystrophy Drive

Robert E. Day, who headed the Springfield fire fighters in their door-to-door solicitation for funds to fight muscular dystrophy, reports that approximately \$1,100 was collected by the local men. A statement of the collections is being prepared and the money will be forwarded to the muscular dystrophy headquarters.

Fireman Day, who had charge of the drive wants to thank not only the members of the local department in giving of their time to collect the \$1,100 "but all citizens in the Township who cooperated in the drive and contributed so willingly to such a worthy cause."

## Tax Collections Higher Than 1953

Tax collections for 1954 and for the month of October were ahead of last year with the total received up to and including last month amounting to \$1,173,655.09 as compared with \$993,605.37 for the same period in 1953.

The 1954 taxes collected during October, totaled \$161,995.30 as compared with \$127,582.30 for the same month last year. This month's Collector of Taxes Charles H. Huff also received \$205,65.05 still due from the October report where the 1953 figures were higher than the current tax collections were in the delinquent amounts collected. The total of back taxes collected up to October of last year was \$30,238.93 while only \$29,855.47 of delinquent taxes was received in 1953.

## Planning Board Makes Shunp'k Residential A

Members of the Planning Board met at Town Hall in a special meeting last night and, after disposing of several routine matters, went into the conference room to consider the controversial new zoning ordinance for 1954.

At a late hour last night, the planning board announced that it will recommend to the Township Committee that the controversial area opposite the Baltusrol Golf Club should be zoned residential "A."

Minutes of the two public hearings were carefully kept and typewritten copies have been in the hands of the members of the Planning Board but no previous caucus was held.

The chief topic under consideration was the Shunpike Road zoning change which was under fire at the two public hearings. Spokesmen representing various civic associations objected to changing this section from residential to limited business and seven of these groups selected members from their own organizations to attend last night's meeting and "sit in" with the Planning Board.

Chairman of the Planning Board Frank M. Kerr announced this week that he did not intend to recognize any such committee and "that the Planning Board did not need any help to decide on the new zoning ordinance after the two public hearings held in the Gaudineer school."

The recommendation of the Planning Board will be relayed to the Township Committee at its December 15 meeting at which time the decision will be made. The Planning Board is a referral body and can only make recommendations, said one Town official.

## St. James Musical Revue Big Success

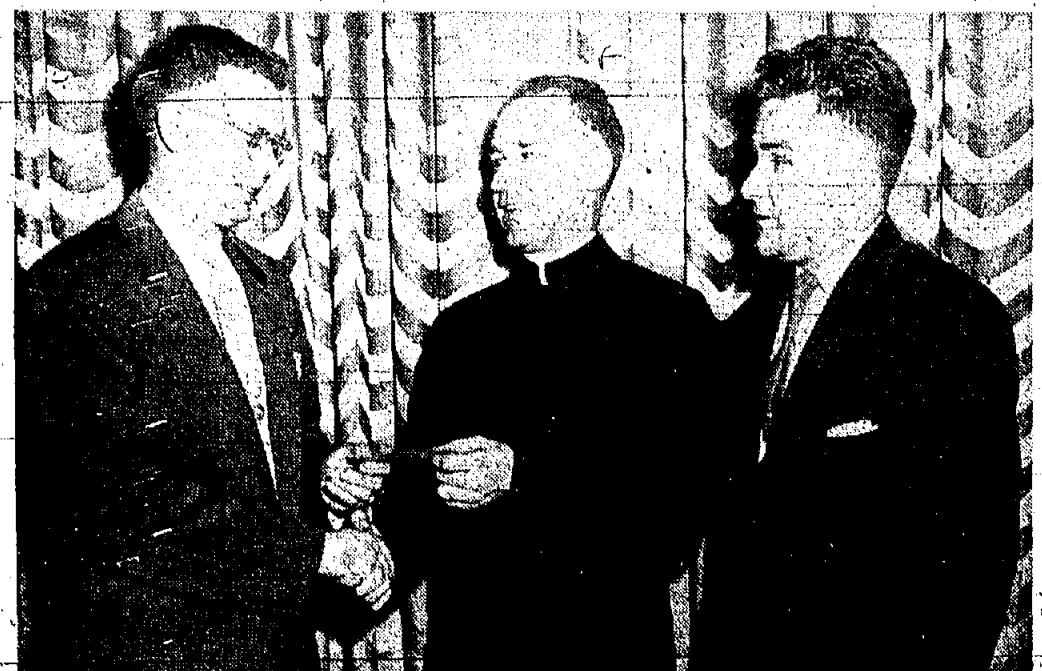

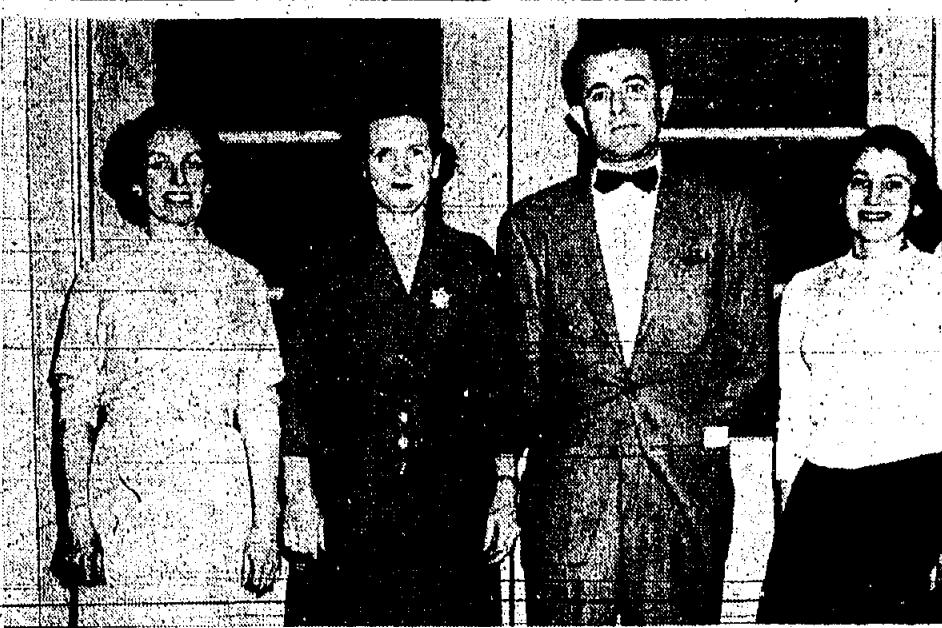

Women Voters Urge Vote Law Revision

Newark, N. J.—The urgent need for the revision of New Jersey's election laws was highlighted by the confusion and delay in the tallying of votes for the tight Senatorial race; the League of Women Voters of New Jersey stated. Differences in interpretation and enforcement of the law from county to county with a resultant hold-up of votes in many cases were particularly noticeable.

The League cited instances of confusion in the election such as the uncertainty as to the deadline for application for a recount, the controversy in Essex County over seizure by the Superintendent of Elections of military and absentee ballots and the delay in tallying ballots in several counties. Pre-election differences between counties showed up in privileges granted to voters of some sections in provision for mobile

registration and voting the disabled from cars. Other pre-election variations were found in the methods of checking and keeping registry lists up-to-date, in the training of election personnel and in election costs.
