

New Shopping Center Asks Summit's Aid

Plans for the other retail shopping center in Springfield—in that portion of the Township known as the Marmon estate part of which is in Summit—was revived this week when application was made to the Summit Common Council for rezoning. The Springfield governing body has already changed the zoning laws to make way for this elaborate shopping center and as soon as Summit acts favorably, announcement will be made by the real estate firm of Joseph P. Day & Co., as to the tenants.

Bernard Day, a Short Hills resident who is head of the New York City realty firm, stated last week in a telephone conversation that he hoped Summit would change the zoning ordinance to conform with Springfield's so that plans could go forward for this new shopping center.

Mr. Day would not make public the names of any of the stores with whom his firm has been negotiating for leases but it is understood that one of New York City's leading organizations would be one of the featured tenants of the shopping center.



Board Hopes to Finish Job On New Zone Law

A special meeting of the Township Planning Board will be held Monday evening, December 13, at which time "all the loose ends will be picked up" on the controversial new zoning ordinance and final recommendations prepared for the Township Committee's action.

Last Wednesday night's meeting, after two very hectic public hearings, resolved the most important target of the objectors by voting to return Shunpike Road property, at the corner of Baltusrol to Residential A.

The public hearings brought out organized objections to the proposal to have that portion of the Shunpike tract changed to limited business because of the reports that Daystrom, Inc., a holding company for a group of industries, planned to construct executive offices on this site.

Another change in the zoning ordinance has been recommended by the Planning Board to make Morris Avenue, from Meisel in the direction of Union, limited business. The other section of Morris, from the post office to the Millburn line, is already on the new zoning map in the limited business area.

Objections and requests for changes in other isolated sections of the new zoning ordinance will be decided upon at the meeting Wednesday evening and a complete report relayed to the Township Committee for their official action right after January 1.

Daystrom Ready With Drawings Of Building

Even though there has been no formal application to the proper Township board, representatives of Daystrom, Inc., made public this week an architect's sketch of the proposed colonial executive office building they would like to construct on the Shunpike Road tract opposite the Baltusrol Golf Club.

The presentation is in color and various groups throughout Springfield have already invited the Daystrom representatives to attend their meetings and explain the plans in detail.

The drawings will be shown to the members of the Continental Post, No. 228, of the American Legion, at the next regular meeting to be held Thursday, December 16. Invitations have also been extended to Daystrom for presentation by the Baltusrol Civic Association, the Rotary Club, the D.A.R. and several others but definite dates have not, as yet, been arranged.

The Planning Board, at its meeting a week ago Wednesday night, voted to recommend that this portion of Shunpike Road—the eight-acre plot where Daystrom is thinking of constructing the office building—be returned to residential. However, the Planning Board is a referral board and the governing body is not committed to accept the decision. If Shunpike Road remains residential the Daystrom organization will be forced to make application for a variance.

Daystrom's representatives, in releasing a sketch of the proposed executive office, stated that construction of such a one story building is dependent on reaching a satisfactory solution as to proper zoning with all groups and civic associations.

In modified Williamsburg design, the red brick building is "L" shaped and has colonial pillars at the entrance. The center entrance is topped by a graceful cupola, similar to the Governor's Palace at Williamsburg. Atop of the one-story structure is a typical Colonial railing design.

The front of the structure will be 150 feet in from Shunpike Road and the west side of the building will be about 250 feet from Baltusrol Way.

The office building, which will house approximately 40 to 50 persons, will have a parking area in the rear of the "L" which will be screened by shrubbery. Containing approximately 11,000 square feet of office area, the building will be 15 feet high and the over-all height to the top of the lower cupola will be 32 feet.

Numerous organizations have expressed interest in meeting with Daystrom officials to review the sketches and plans for the company's proposed executive offices.

Following the Glee Club will be the Music Department of the Springfield Women's Club, directed by Mrs. Osborne. Rev. Aloisius Carney of the St. James Roman Catholic Church will give the benediction.

Edward J. Ruby, Recreation Director of the Commission, says that many other entertaining features will be in the program and he is sure that all those who attend will enjoy the excellent show.

Handville To Head Safe Driving Day

Township Committeeman Frederick A. Handville has recently been appointed as Safe Driving Director for the S-D Day designated by President Eisenhower as December 15, 1954.

Director Handville has asked that every effort humanly possible should be exerted to set an example on December 15 to reduce materially the traffic accidents.

2. Be courteous to every driver and pedestrian—practice sportsmanship.
3. Give full attention to driving and walking.
4. Drive and walk as you would have everyone else drive and walk.

"Let us all remember that in the next month with the holiday season approaching, stores,

streets and sidewalks will be jammed to capacity and we will all have to be more alert and careful. Remember it is to our advantage to get behind this S. D. Day project and make it work so more people can be home and not in the hospital to enjoy a Merry Christmas."

With construction work on the General Greene Shopping Center moving along rapidly, the problem of traffic handling at that point is beginning to trouble the Township Committee and some effort to cure the certain congestion was made at last night's meeting. Township Attorney Max Sherman was instructed to immediately prepare an ordinance that will prohibit a left hand turn from Main street into Morris Avenue.

Eliminating the left hand turn at this jammed intersection should bring some relief but what to do with traffic out of Main street is a matter of considerable concern. Police authorities and the Township Committee have been making a thorough study of the situation because it is realized that the opening of the shopping center this coming Spring will present a very serious problem. The shopping center will have room to park about 500 cars and the entrances and exits will be made part of the proposed ordinance.

Autoists, turning out of Main street and into Morris Avenue towards Union and Elizabeth, have tied up traffic in all directions and the elimination of this left turn will help considerably.

Town Attorney Sherman's ordinance, with the aid of local traffic experts, is expected to take care of the problem of getting these cars back on Morris Avenue without further holding up the flow of cars through the Township.

Autoist Discovers How To Stop Car Without Brakes

Jack Horn, proprietor of the Texaco gas station on the very busy corner of Main street and Morris Avenue, appreciates it very much when autoists drop in at his place of business but Raymond E. Wachter, 36, of 2529 Kenneth Court, Scotch Plains, carried it a bit too far Tuesday afternoon.

Wachter, driving a 1948 Oldsmobile, frantically tried to stop his car as he approached Morris Avenue and suddenly discovering that his brakes were out entirely, swerved into the gas station, bounced off one of the gas pumps, ricocheted off the concrete wall and then smashed through the office section of the station, closed door of repair shop.

Horn was sitting at his desk in counting up the morning's receipts, when he noticed Wachter off the brakesless car careening right towards his cash book. He dived under the desk to escape injury by flying glass, but Wachter's car swung away and the front of the Oldsmobile went right through the adjoining door, glass splintering all over.

Wachter's car was wedged into the door and hanging over the oil pit when Horn and police rushed to his rescue. The left door was pried open and Wachter was hauled out without even a scratch on him, according to

the police report. He wasn't even cut by any of the flying glass and even his hat was at the usual rakish angle.

Wachter said he was driving on Main street toward Morris at a slow rate of speed, he insists—when he discovered that his brakes wouldn't hold at all. Since it was shortly after three o'clock, a great number of children and pedestrians were crossing Morris Avenue at Main street and traffic was heavy as usual on the Avenue. He hoped to retard the speed of the car by scraping along the curb and when he saw no cars being serviced at the Texaco station, headed into it and came to a stop by crashing through the overhead door—which, at that moment, was not over head.

The accident occurred at 3:10 p. m., according to the police report, and while Wachter, the owner and driver of the car is said not to have sustained any injuries, Horn is today nursing a bad back as the result, he said, of his sudden dive to safety when he saw the car aimed right at him.

Reports have it that the former rectory will be used as an office building and since Bonadies is slated to be named Motor Vehicle Agent in the Township, the building will probably serve as the office for licenses and other motor vehicle department business.





Mr. Conley, agent for this sale, also sold the old St. James Church building to the Crestmont Savings and Loan last year.

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
