Motorist Caught After Wild Chase

A five-mile chase by Maplewood and Springfield police ended early Tuesday resulting in a smashed car and two reckless driving summonses for Luke Monroe, 22 of 48 Russell place, Summit, according to the local police report.

Attempting to flee the pursuing radio cars, police said, Monroe skidded and lost control of the car he was driving west in Shunpike road and hit a tree atop Baltusrol Mountain near the North Jersey Quarry Co. Police said he suffered no apparent injuries.

The chase started at Oakland and Valley streets, Maplewood, where police tried to halt Monroe on a routine check about 2 a.m. Maplewood Patrolmen Thomas Morrison and Harold Staatsburg pursued Monroe when he did not stop, over Valley street and Springfield avenue (Seven Bridges Rd.) to Morris avenue, Springfield and continued up Flener avenue to Shunpike road with Springfield. Patrolmen George Parsell and George Slessel joined the chase.

The front of the car Monroe was driving was heavily damaged. Police identified the owner as Leavator Walker, also of 48 Russell place, Summit. Monroe was charged with reckless driving for appearance in Maplewood and Springfield courts Monday.

Daystrom Office Plans Presented

Publication in last week's Springfield Sun of the architect's drawing showing the proposed executive offices for Daystrom, Inc., in the Township, has crystallized public opinion very much in favor of such a project and many residents, heretofore not entirely sold on the idea, are now planning to ask the Springfield governing body to make every effort to bring this very acceptable ratable to the township.

"They can build this kind of an office right in my back yard," said one who had a far different idea as to Daystrom's plans for Springfield. "The fine Colonial design of such a building anywhere would hardly deprecate property in the immediate vicinity. As a matter of fact, it would be far better for the area than a lot of the development houses now crowding into Springfield."

Representatives of Daystrom are also appearing before civic groups and individuals showing the complete drawings and plans for the proposed one story building. Last night the presentation was made before members of the Springfield Fire Department and Civil Defense units. According to the plans, dates have already been set for this presentation at meetings of the Rotary Club next Tuesday, the Lions Club, and the various civic associations.

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Democrats, At Victory Dinner, Hope To Grab Control In 1955

School Boards Preparing For Feb. Elections

The terms of both presidents Raymond W. Forbes of the Union County Regional High School Board of Education and George D. Harrison, Jr., of the Springfield Board of Education, expire with the coming elections in February but neither one has announced that he will be a candidate for reelection.

The Regional High Board of Education election is to be held on Tuesday, February 1, while the local Board will fill the vacancies on the following Tuesday, February 8. The terms of three members on each board run out with the February elections. In addition to Mr. Forbes, who is a Springfield resident; the terms of Dr. Minor C. K. Jones of Mountainside, and John E. Conlin of Garwood expire but there is every indication that all three will again seek office although there has been no official statement by any of them.

There are also three members of the Springfield Board of Education whose terms run out with the coming elections. In addition to Mr. Harrison, the terms of Howard Smith and Thomas Doherty also expire. The final date for filing as candidates for the Regional Board is January 12 while the last day for aspirants to run for the vacancies on the Springfield school board is January 19.

Reduce Plots For Homes On Baltusrol Top

The recent threat "to secede from Springfield and join Summit" by a group of residents located in the Baltusrol Top section of the Township, may be shelved with the announcement made at Monday night's meeting of the Planning Board that homes in that exclusive area may be built on half acre plots instead of full acres, as first shown on the map of the new zoning ordinance.

The recommended plot for future building in the top section called for 150 foot front on a full acre of ground. Residents in that area and Edward J. Grassmann, owner of considerable acreage in Baltusrol Top, objected to the size acceptable for a home at the two public hearings held by the Planning Board. When the board showed no signs of weakening on this section of the new zoning ordinance, residents started a petition requesting that Summit take over that portion of Springfield since it was closer and more accessible to Summit. Formal request was to be made to Summit but the change in the lot size will, probably, call off another effort to proceed with the idea.

The new change to be made in the zoning law will cut the size to a half acre with 120 foot front instead of the 150 foot front on a full acre.

Developers Buy Haselman Land; To Build Homes

The Haselman property, the approximately eighteen acres along South Springfield avenue approaching Route 22, has been sold again—this time through Springfield Tax Assessor Wilbert W. Layng. The deal was consummated over the week-end and the story has it that a syndicate plans to construct one family homes on the property—but the project has already bumped into zoning trouble.

Attorneys for the developers appeared before the members of the Springfield Planning Board at a special meeting, held Monday night and presented, informally, the plans for making this 18 acre tract of land the site for homes to sell in the \$18,000 bracket.

However, the sub-division plans of the developers showed 60 foot front lots, according to the Planning Board, but the Board will insist on complying with the restriction calling for 75 foot front with a minimum of 10,000 square feet. The Haselman property is zoned for 75 foot front on the current map and the new zoning law, now under consideration by Springfield.

This is the third reported sale of the Haselman property in the past two years, the first two resulting in the land going back to the owners because the Township Committee would not permit the property to be used for industry and the other instances when apartment houses were planned.

Members of the syndicate who purchased the property through Tax Assessor Layng hoped to be able to build about 70 to 80 homes on the Haselman tract with the usual roads, curbs and other facilities installed. Monday night's appearance before the planning board was an informal discussion of the syndicate's plans but it was very apparent that there is to be no change as far as demanding a 75 foot front and a 10,000

Ness Property Setting Pace For Real Estate Prices Here

Rumors of zooming real estate prices in Springfield are rapidly approaching the fabulous boom stage but the story-book thriller is found in the 28-acre piece of property known as the Ness tract. The property is located off Morrison Road and extends all the way through to Main street.

The property is news this week because Paul V. Ness, a Short Hills resident who now owns the land, appeared before the Township Committee with a request that Springfield build a road through his property from Main street through to Morrison Road at the Township's expense. The request was denied with emphasis.

Just to prove that the Ness property is one of those local real estate miracles, the rumors have it that the entire piece of land—the nearly 28 acres—was on the market not more than ten or twelve years ago at \$3,500 for the entire tract. This price, the story says, it was peddled about with the various groups and individuals interested but not enough to grab the land.

The story further has it that negotiations have been completed and contracts drawn for the sale of only FOUR ACRES to the First Presbyterian Church at \$4,000 PER ACRE. The church once owned all this property and needed the extra four acres to extend the present site of the rectory. However, consummation of the deal was delayed, according to the story, with a provision by Ness that the church

Several fabulous amounts are said to have been offered to Ness for the property, one report stating that he has been asking \$125,000. The rumor has it that prospective buyers of the property are considering purchase in the hopes that apartment houses may be constructed on this site.

However, the Township Committee has been very adamant in its decision not to permit any more apartments in Springfield at this time and the controversy may be resolved in court action. The Ness site was recently rezoned into limited business and the governing body is on record against homes or apartment houses on this property.

square foot minimum on any homes to be built on this land. According to Robert J. Haselman, owner of most of the property in question, permission was granted to developers in the same vicinity to build on less than 75 front feet and he believes that the purchasers of the tract should be permitted to build on "60 front foot lots." He denied that the sale of the property carried with it the assurance from any one that "60 front foot lots" would be acceptable by the Township but readily admitted that "the demand for 75 front foot and a minimum of 10,000 square feet might also affect the present deal for the purchase."

The next meeting of the Planning Board is January 6 at which time the developers of this Haselman tract will formally make application for sub-division and present maps and plans of the project.

Murphy, the Health Board Secretary Mrs. Elconore Worthington

read a legal opinion prepared by Township Attorney Max Sherman which had been prepared in reply to a previous but similar request made by Rev. A. G. Carney.

Pastor of St. James, last July. Mr. Sherman's opinion denied the legal right of the Board of Health to render such medical and nursing service and the opinion of Mr. Sherman stated will hold for the request submitted by Mr. Murphy at last night's meeting. Township Committeeman Eugene F. Donnelly, a member of the Health Board, said that the Board may provide some method of medical inspection that would arrest any epidemic or its contagion but he questioned the right of the health bureau to furnish regular nursing service to the parochial school system. Mr. Murphy held that "his petitioners were only asking for services that are now furnished other children in Springfield to which the pupils of the parochial school here are entitled. In this state we have the child-benefit theory which holds that a benefit can be conferred on a child in a parochial school without violation of any law. We're not asking for any educational services. We want the 300 children of local taxpayers whose enrollment in the parochial school is a saving to Springfield's educational costs, to receive the same medical and nurse services now available to the other school pupils of the Township."

It was announced that Dr. Henry P. Dangler, the Health Officer, who did not attend last night's meeting because of illness, has been working on a plan to furnish medical service to all school children in Springfield, including the parochial schools. The Board decided to withhold any decision on Mr. Murphy's request until they have had an opportunity to explore the medical plan being prepared by Dr. Dangler but promised that a formal decision would be made by the next regular meeting of the Health Board.

story office building on the plot of ground in Shunpike road, just opposite the Baltusrol Golf Club entrance. There are eighteen acres of ground which, according to the detailed plans, will be landscaped, with shrubbery in the rear, and to be constructed 150 feet in from Shunpike road and 250 feet in from Baltusrol way. "Springfield should make every effort to give every concession possible to bring this fine structure to the Township," one long time resident stated. "Too rapid a growth in homes is already taxing our school facilities and Springfield can stand these additional rates and taxes. The same number of homes on that Shunpike property would mean costly services and school facilities. "Such an office building should bring in approximately \$10,000 in taxes to Springfield," this resident continued. "Of course, there are some 'agisters'—but it is hoped that the Planning Board, the Township Committee or what-

ever governing body may have the final say—will not permit the vociferous objectors to influence their decision. Those who want to see Springfield keep in step with the progress of this area would like to see Daystrom construct such an office here, whether it is done by rezoning, by variance or, even by mirrors."

Every youth of the Parish is expected to attend this rally.



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

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

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
