

Bonadies' MV Job Officially Set

It's now official—Vincent J. Bonadies, Township Committeeman-elect, is the motor vehicle agent, for Springfield, the formal notice having been received in a telegram from Acting Director Frederick J. Gassert Jr., Division of Motor Vehicles, last Thursday morning.

Bonadies was in Trenton this past Monday to meet Director Gassert for the formal indoctrination and discussion of other matters pertaining to the Springfield office including the location for the agency.

Following is the text of the official telegram:

You have been designated motor vehicle agent in Springfield. Please be at my office at the State House, Trenton, Monday, January 3, 9:30 a.m. for indoctrination. In the meantime, it is suggested that you look for a location which location must be

approved by the general agent. Be prepared to discuss this matter Monday.

Frederick J. Gassert Jr., Acting Director, Division of Motor Vehicles.

Bonadies was recommended for the motor vehicle agency here by County Chairman James J. Kinneally, but the actual appointment didn't come until the telegram was received.

The agency will, no doubt, be located in the property recently purchased by Bonadies, the former St. James Rectory. Extensive alterations have been planned to transform the spacious home into an office building; the request for variance having already been granted by the Township Committee. According to Bonadies, the new motor vehicle offices will be open for business on January 15, 1955.

Hearing Set For School Budget

A public hearing will be held Tuesday evening, January 18, in the Florence M. Gaudinier to consider the Springfield Board of Education proposed budget calculations for 1955-56 amounting to a total of \$646,750 which is an increase of \$117,030 over the current figures tentatively adopted at last week's meeting. Increases in teachers' salaries have boosted the total needed to operate the local

schools, the new tentative budget calling for a \$3,400 minimum for four years of college training instead of \$3,200. The maximum for teachers' salaries, in the tentative budget, will be \$5,700 instead of \$5,500.

Instead of 16 increments including six of \$200 and 10 of \$100, teachers will receive 14 increments with six of \$200 and eight of \$150. The salary of B. F. News-w. a n g e r, superintendent of schools, will be raised from \$8,000 to \$9,000 if the budget passes.

The budget provides funds to hire a principal, two janitors and seven teachers for the new school. A \$30,000 increase under debt service to amortize some bonds and interest on the new school was pointed out by board members.

Small increases in other items were noted although the \$15,000 expense for classroom supplies and \$8,600 for books remained the same.

The board appointed William Wagner, head custodian, to the additional job of clerk of works for the new school and G. W. French, maintenance man, as his assistant. To relieve Mr. Wagner of some present duties including driving the school bus, the board named Herbert W. Fredericksen of Lake Parsippany, one of 40 applicants for the position which has starting pay of \$3,000. Overtime pay of janitors for November totaling \$226 was approved.

It was announced all employees would be required to take X-ray tests for tuberculosis and 78 of 82 have complied to date. State law compels teachers to be examined every three years, the board reported.

Skousen To Run For School Board
Loran E. Skousen of 72 Wentz avenue, has submitted his petition to run in the forthcoming Springfield Board of Education elections in February, according to an unofficial report received this morning.

Skousen will be remembered for his fine work as head of the Citizens Advisory Committee which was instrumental in aiding the School Board in the past with regard to school construction.

"Eye Sore" Eliminated
The shacks on the property of the Elizabethtown Water Company in Springfield avenue have been demolished and the "eye sore" eliminated. Public and fire department officials marked the string of broken down structures as hazardous and the authorities recommended that the shacks be removed.

The water company immediately made application for a permit to raze the shacks and all the debris was cleared away the early part of last week.

Army Proposes Guided Missile Base Near Here

The news that there is a possibility that the Army may install a guided missile base somewhere in the Watchung Reservation may be of interest to Springfield since part of the reservation goes into the Township at the western point just off Baltusrol road. Just where this missile installation and a radar-control-center at a distance from the launching site will be is a matter of conjecture but the Union County Park Commission last week issued a statement in reference to the proposal as follows:

"The announcement by the Army of their proposal to install an Army Guided Missile Base located somewhere in Watchung Reservation and their request for two sites of approximately 15 acres each was received by the members of The Union County Park Commission on Tuesday afternoon, December 14th. It was our understanding at this meeting that this information was of a classified nature and therefore no information was given out at that time. As it has now been officially announced by the Army representatives, the members of the Park

Commission feel that they should make a statement regarding their position in this matter. As stated in news dispatches, the Army has requested a site of 15 acres, which would be completely cleared to the ground and fenced in as a launcher area. They have also requested that 30 acres surrounding this site be set aside as a restricted area. In addition to the above, a similar area is requested for a Radar Control Center at a distance from the launching site.

This request is, naturally, of grave concern to the Commission as it would radically alter the uses of the Reservation. As a policy matter in the public interest, and especially in view of the importance of National Security, the Park Commission feels obliged to give immediate consideration to the requirements of the Army in the establishing of a base for the Park Commission and their associates. The wisdom of this is only now being fully appreciated operations in this vicinity. We are, however, charged with the maintenance and improvement of public property in the form of a park system; a system that we have been fortunate to have had set aside and developed over the past thirty years through the foresight of the earlier members of the Park Commission and residential development of Union County. The present Commissioners feel that this land has been entrusted to their care to serve its rightful purpose and that those residents whose property lies adjacent are entitled to assurance that the land under Park jurisdiction will not be used in any manner to depreciate the value of their investment. We would not want to take any action to dispose of Park property if such would appear detrimental to the interest of the majority of the people of Union County. An Army base would radically change the appearance of any Park area, and create certain restrictions on its use. Therefore, this matter will be taken under careful consideration by the Park Commission to determine the exact requirements and specifications of

the Army installation, and to weigh the merits of the suggested Park site against other available sites in the area generally, picked out by the Army whether these sites be publicly or privately owned. If after this survey is completed and it is determined that there are no other areas available to meet the Army requirements, we would then feel compelled to consider the Army proposal most earnestly. Meanwhile, until such time as all these surveys have been completed and a further meeting with the Army authorities held to explore the matter further, we deemed it advisable to issue this statement to the public to reassure them that our final judgement will be based on a full evaluation of the various problems presented.

CATHOLIC FORUM

"Dominus Vobiscum!" It is in Chungking of a Sunday morning. The Catholic Church in which I kneel is crowded with a cosmopolitan congregation. A Chinese priest is saying the Mass in an undertone. His voice comes to us, even in the front pews, as a mere mumble, so that we cannot recognize the language he is using. But suddenly he turns to the people and says in clear audible tones: "Dominus Vobiscum!"

"Dominus Vobiscum!" How familiar and home-like those words of blessing! Sunday after Sunday I have heard them in my hometown church—in Catholic churches in Europe, Asia, Africa, South America and Australia.

No Latin scholar, I; but here in my little double-column prayer book I have the Mass prayers in Latin in one column of each page and in the other column the exact translation in my native tongue. "Dominus Vobiscum"—"The Lord Be With You!" So with the help of these and the few other Latin words which the priest says aloud, I am able to check my place in the prayer book and thus follow through the entire Mass with the Chinese priest, just as readily as I can with my good Pastor at home. Surely then the Latin of the Mass is of advantage to the Catholic who travels, and just as surely of no disadvantage to him who stays at home.

Latin, a language known by nearly all cultured people in the long centuries of Christianity, was adopted by the Western Church as the logical language for the sacred liturgy. Latin—unchanging and unchangeable—is indeed the logical language for the Church, which has ever been unchanging and unchangeable in its basic worship and teachings.

The few Latin words audible at Mass soon become familiar and understood by even the child who reads his prayer book. The two Latin words from the Mass used in this little article, we believe and hope, are non-familiar to you; so that you will understand when we most sincerely say to each of our readers: "Dominus Vobiscum!"


