Large Increase Is Reported By Crestmont

The Crestmont Savings and Loan Association, releasing a report of assets this week, shows nearly \$14,000,000.00 or more than 16 per cent over what the figures were over a year ago. The momentum in increased business continues into this year, the Springfield office alone reporting approximately \$350,000.00 in the first month of 1956.

Loren F. Gardiner, executive vice-president of the association, in releasing the annual report, said that the institution's progress continued to be based on serving an increased number of Maplewood and Springfield citizens and serving them well.

"With each passing year," he said, "we serve a growing number of people, either by providing a safe, convenient and profitable place for their savings, or by granting them loans on a sound basis for the purchase of homes."

Mr. Gardiner listed highlights of the specialized thrift and home financing institutions' 1955 operations as follows: Net savings in 1955 increased by \$1,700,000.00 or 18 per cent, bringing total savings to \$12,585,000.00. The number of savings account-holders increased to 10,658, a gain of 1182 or 13 per cent, over last year. 3. Dividends paid out to savers totaled \$269,136.10. 4. Home loans increased both in number and amount, with such loans numbering 1,469, and totaling \$11,167,000.00 in 1955, gains of 29 per cent, and 23 per cent, respectively. Total home loans outstanding now amount to \$11,167,000.00.

As for housing, Mr. Gardiner reported that demands continue strong, being sustained by "an intense desire on the part of the public for up-to-date and larger homes, a rising rate of disposable personal income, and a continued high rate of family formation." While housing may decline to around 3.2 million units in 1956, down from 1955's production of 1.3 million units, he commented, the year would still go down as the country's third-biggest home building year.

"Despite some tightening of mortgage money, there will be plenty of funds available to finance the 1956 volume of home building," according to Mr. Gardiner.

At the annual meeting of Crestmont Savings, five directors were re-elected; Carl L. Becker, William Frey, Joseph Grimmer, Stephen Y. Ronnie and J. Herbert Woolley, and one new director, Loren F. Gardiner, who is the executive manager of the association and was elected to fill a vacancy created by the resignation of Fred J. Stephens.

The officers of the association re-elected were J. William Anspach, president; Loren F. Gardiner, executive vice-president (Continued on page 2)

A new tax rate "that will be slightly less than \$10.00 per hundred assessed valuation" faces Springfield and Mayor Albert G. Binder believes the residents of the Township should know "of the extenuating circumstances, beyond the control of the governing body, that have brought about this new rate."

Mayor Binder has sent an invitation to all civic groups and other organizations to be present at the Town Hall this Saturday afternoon at 2 p.m. for an informal discussion at which time "the whole story of compulsory tax equalization and other budget details" will be given to those present.

"This is not a public hearing," said Mayor Binder, "and everybody is welcome. If any resident did not receive my letter, and is interested in the budget and tax rate, please come Saturday."

Following is a copy of the letter from Mayor Binder to various civic groups:

"The Township governing body has just completed the 1956 budget from which the tax rate will be determined. It appears that the new rate will be slightly less than ten dollars (\$10.00) per hundred assessed valuation. Our present rate is \$9.94 per hundred."

"There are many extenuating circumstances that have brought about this rise, over most of which the Township governing body has no control."

"This budget will be introduced on February 8, 1956, and will be published on February 9th, and the final and public hearing will be held at a subsequent date to be announced later."

New Walton School Opens This Monday

All double sessions will be eliminated in Springfield schools starting with next Monday when 345 pupils are scheduled to report to regular classes at the new and recently completed Edward Walton School on Mountain Avenue.

The new school will take pupils from kindergarten and through the Sixth Grade with thirteen teachers assigned and ready to start studies in the new classrooms.

Completion of the new Walton School was delayed because of material shortages and bad weather but the final inspection of the building last week assured members of the Board of Education and other Township officials that the contractor, Stephen Palmisano Sons of Bayonne, had done a remarkable job in the face of all obstacles. The inspection was very thorough and acceptance of the building was immediate after the tour of the school was completed.

Police to Help Golf Club Stop Vandalism

The Baltusrol Golf Club has been made the victim of damaging vandalism and the club officials are appealing to parents in the neighborhood to make certain their children won't be caught in the trap being set to catch some of them.

Police were notified that the ground superintendent's office along Hillside Avenue was broken into Monday night and considerable damage was caused. Windows were broken but nothing was taken which is an indication that this is the work of youngsters and the golf club intends "to do something about stopping this vandalism."

The police are cooperating with the Baltusrol officials and the property will be watched carefully for all intruders.

"Do-It-Yourself" Campaign For Cerebral Palsy Funds

Something new and unique in fund raising is being employed by the Cerebral Palsy League in Springfield which, it is hoped, will attract enough contributions to keep the Cerebral Palsy Center for Union County children at 636 Salem Avenue, Elizabeth, open so that treatment of these urgent cases will not have to cease.

Mrs. Amy Bandomer, Springfield chairman of the drive, and Freeholder Director Albert J. Benninger, County Campaign Chairman, announced that a new "self-service or assembly line fund drive" will be held in Springfield in an attempt to reach the quota of \$1500 which has been set for Springfield's part in the drive for funds from now until February 19.

Large envelopes will be furnished for each street, containing all necessary record sheets for contributions, receipts and other paraphernalia. There will be no captains of soliciting groups for each street and the large official envelope will be left at the first residence in each street. The person is then asked to enclose the contribution in the large envelope, make note on the receipt, and then bring the envelope into the neighbor next door. This is continued until the end of each street where it will be picked up by a member of Mrs. Bandomer's general committee.

"This is a do-it-yourself form of campaign drive," said Mrs. Bandomer, "and we believe such an honor system campaign for funds will bring us over the top of \$1500 quota in Springfield. It is an imposition on many of Springfield's civic minded residents to have them participate in so many fund drives and this plan may be the solution. We have not named street captains and, in its place, we will start these large official envelopes traveling up and down each street with each neighbor turning the envelope over to the other until everybody on each street has had an opportunity to inspect the contents and make whatever contribution they desire. The County Palsy League has run out of money and unless we meet the \$1500 quota in Springfield, the treatment for many of these children will have to cease."

Those who care to make contributions in Springfield and do not have an opportunity to get the large official envelopes, can send their checks, made payable to the Cerebral Palsy League, to Springfield.
