A new toy which catches the eye of the doting parent or grandparent in the display windows is accepted with the usual squeals of delight and, for a fleeting moment, holds the attention of the youngster.

But, before the Howdy-Doody picture completes the immediate episode, the new and usually costly toy has been carelessly tossed into the catch-all. The only probable explanation, but the wide-eyed smile of appreciation is well worth even that one moment.

Grand Union to Open Premium Station Here

The Grand Union Stores stamp plan—the Triple S, Stop Save Stamps—has selected Springfield as the location for one of its redemption stores.

Formal announcement is expected from the Grand Union offices next week but the sign is already on the windows of the store at 269 Morris avenue, formerly occupied by the Springfield Hardware, announcing that the Triple S Redemption station would open there shortly.

Bringing this stamp redemption station to Springfield should attract a great many people to the Township as the Morris avenue location will serve this entire area for those who want to exchange their stamps for the many premiums offered to shoppers at the Grand Union and other local stores where Triple S stamps may be obtained.

Alterations are expected to be started shortly as the date for the opening of the Springfield station is to be announced by the Grand Union offices next week.

The Springfield Lodge of Elks, No. 2004, is now a reality.

Over 160 charter members were initiated, the lodge was instituted and the recently elected officers were installed in very impressive ceremonies held in the Regional High School Auditorium last Sunday afternoon.

The installation of local lodge officers was in charge of Grand Lodge officers of the State headed by Grand Exalted Ruler William R. Thorne of Trenton, the State President.

Mayor Albert G. Binder who also participated in the ceremonies as one of the more than 160 new charter members to be initiated, gave the welcome address and Past Grand Exalted Ruler William J. Jernick of the Nutley Lodge was the guest speaker of the afternoon program.

The Springfield Lodge which was started only a short time ago and was formally instituted last Sunday with more than 160 charter members, is already making plans to take over a site for headquarters. The building—the old Townley House at 357 Morris avenue—has been purchased to be used as the local lodge home. Elizabeth Bank Will Take Over First National

Local Bank Saw Springfield Grow Since Starting in 1925

After 31 years in business, during which time Springfield has grown into a thriving community, the First National Bank of Springfield is being sold to the National State Bank of Elizabeth.

Official approval of the offer to purchase the assets of the local bank is expected at a special meeting of the First National directors and shareholders on June 7 and after that, the business of the local bank will be conducted by the National State of Elizabeth.

Springfield's First National was organized in 1925 with Dr. Watson B. Morris, who recently died, as the first president of the local institution. Dr. Morris was one of the founders of the First National who with Dr. Henry P. Dengler, who also died only recently, were the prime movers in organizing and establishing a bank in Springfield.

The Board of Directors when the First National was organized in 1925 was made up of the following: Dr. Henry P. Dengler, Morris Lichtenstein, Robert S. Bunnell, James H. Clark, Robert

The National State Bank of Elizabeth which started business in 1812 and is conceded to be one of the leading financial institutions in New Jersey, will come to Springfield where it will open its fifth Union County office.

The Elizabeth bank is purchasing the assets of the First National Bank of Springfield and will assume the deposit liabilities of the local institution as soon as the Board of Directors and shareholders meet June 7 to approve the offer made by the Elizabeth bank.

Approval of the Comptroller of Currency in Washington, D. C. has already been received, it was reported, and the First National Directors have urged the acceptance of the offer to sell.

The purchase price was not announced but it is understood that the offer by the Elizabeth bank was so attractive that there is every indication that the official approval will be given at the June 7 special meeting.

The National State Bank is expected to take over as soon as possible after the June 7 meeting with the present First National Board of Directors serving in an advisory capacity and all other members of the local staff being retained.

W. Emlen Roosevelt, President of the National State Bank, confirmed the purchase of the First National assets and stated that he and other top echelon officers of the Elizabeth organization, will spend considerable time in Springfield to acquaint themselves with the needs of Springfield's business people during the transition period.

He also stated that the depositors of the local bank would continue to be served by those with whom they had done business during the years but that Springfield would enjoy the many additional facilities of a larger bank as well as a greatly increased lending limit of up to \$300,000 to any one borrower.

The National State Bank has presently three locations in Elizabeth and one in Roselle Park. Taking over the First National Bank of Springfield will bring the number of offices to five.

The present assets of the First National are over \$7,000,000 which added to those of the National State Bank will increase the size of that institution to over \$90,000,000. Robert S. Bunnell, President of the First National, and the present Board of Directors will be retained as an Advisory Board for the new local bank.

The committee is now hard at work for the July celebration and details should be forthcoming soon.

Carlton P. Roberts Dies Suddenly

Carlton P. Roberts, 53, of 85 E. Forest Drive, junior partner and Chief Engineer for the New York Architectural firm of Voorhees Walker Smith & Smith, died late Sunday evening at Columbia County Memorial Hospital, Hudson, N. Y. He had been stricken with a heart attack while enroute by train to Schenectady.

Born in Parkersburg, West Virginia, January 23, 1903, Mr. Roberts received a B. S. in Physics at Cambridge University, England, in 1924 and a Master's Degree in Physics at the University of Berlin in 1927.

Mr. Roberts went overseas with rank of Colonel as Deputy Army Engineer for First Army Headquarters, in full charge of engineering activities, including operations, training, supply, intelligence, mapping and map supply. He saw action in American, European and Pacific theaters, received the Bronze Arrowhead for leadership in landing with assault troops on Normandy beachhead, as well as five battle stars for European combat, Legion of Merit, Bronze and Silver Stars, Purple Heart and Army Commander's Commendation. The French Government awarded him a Croix de Guerre avec Palme and he received both the Philippine Liberation Medal and Victory Medal.

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





Preventing skids with a St. Christopher medal—More and more danger on the road. More and more deaths on the highway. More and more St. Christopher medals in automobiles.

Medals? What good can they do? Can they put new treads on old tires? Can they tighten brakes that are loose? Can they keep blinding lights from the eye?

They can NOT! A medal is inert matter. It has no power in itself. But, listen! On it is the likeness of a saint—a third-century martyr who, tradition tells us, spent much of his earthly time in transporting folks in safety across a turbulent stream—thereby becoming the patron saint of all travelers.

But what use can a third-century saint be to a twentieth-century motorist?

No use in his own right, but lots of use to him who believes in the intercession of the saints.

For instance: A Catholic steps into his car. His eye lights on a medal which portrays the patron saint of travelers. Being thus reminded, the motorist prays for protection on his journey to one whom the Church recognizes officially as a saint and whom we therefore know to be near and dear to God.

All prayers are heard. Therefore St. Christopher hears and carries the petition to the throne of Him who loves us. Such intercession from a saint beloved by God is potent. God hears and answers in His own way, which is always the best way for our ultimate good.

So you see, a St. Christopher medal in a car can do a lot of good. Indirectly it can stop skids, blowouts, or any other calamity, if one has faith in the prayers of a saint and appreciation of the fact that God can do anything He wants to do.

But to him who has no such faith, a St. Christopher medal is of the exact same use as a four-leaf clover, a buck-eye, or a rabbit's foot—no use at all except perhaps to reveal openly a silly superstition.

on whose shore fishing is done. With the exception of trout and large and small mouth bass, the season for which opens on June 15 and extends to November 30, there is no closed season, size or bag limit on other species of fish in the Delaware River.

Regulations have been approved in cooperation with the Pennsylvania Fish Commission, to fix the legal size of walleyed pike and pickerel at 12 inches, and bag limits of ten of each. The regulations also apply in the tributaries of the Delaware River between Trenton Falls and Birch Creek where the tide ebbs and flows.

The regulations have been made a part of the New Jersey State Fish and Game Code and will be enforced by the conservation authorities of both states.

Fishing licenses of either State River from water's edge to water's edge and fishermen will be permitted to take off in a boat from either shore and on returning, to have in possession any fish which might be legally taken. However, any person fishing from the shore must obtain a license in that State
