## 10 Page Letter Tells Why We Can't Have White Line

It all started because the Township of Springfield wanted official permission to paint a white line—a "no passing" white line on South Springfield avenue to help control traffic on that street.

About a year ago—September 28, 1955, to be exact—Springfield Township addressed a letter to the New Jersey State Highway Department, requesting authority.

It meant spending about \$1.40 for white paint and a few hours of work for a chap who could mark a straight line.

The chain reaction—the red tape that has entangled this simple request by Springfield can only be matched by Hollywood or the light opera.

**A LETTER—TEN SINGLE SPACED TYPEWRITTEN PAGES**—with scads of almost humorous do's and don'ts—has been received by the Township Committee, from Herbert J. Klar, Chief of the Traffic Engineering section, ALMOST A YEAR LATER IN REPLY.

Surveys were made—hours and days were spent by the Department experts—and the long, gobbledegook instructions made the Springfield governing body give up in disgust.

Here is Mayor Albert G. Binder's written comments attached to copies of the long-winded letter to be submitted to other members of the Township Committee. None of the other members of the governing body would make any further comments because the Mayor's reply, they said, covers it very well.

**Mayor Binder's Statement**—I have read Mr. Cade's recommendations dated July 2, 1956 on our simple and relatively minor request to establish a "No Passing Zone" on South Springfield Avenue between Florence Gaudineer School and Meisel Avenue.

"His seven (7) page recommendation reads like a thesis on rebuilding all of the roads in the state of New Jersey. It may be clear and concise to the State Highway Department, but it leaves me muttering to myself as I wander around the school trying to find my way in, around, and thru the multiple recommendations of Stop Signs, No Passing, Set Backs, No one way traffic, etc., etc., ad infinitum.

"I think this should almost lesson No. 1 for all Township officials. Do not make request for assistance of the State Highway Department unless you are prepared to lose your shirt and part of your pants in a bargaining set to. I can see Mr. Dwight Palmer, State Highway Commissioner, (Continued on page 3)

## GOP Candidates Say Dems Have Lost Platform

"With Election Day less than two weeks away, the admission of the Democratic candidates for the Township Committee—that they cannot sustain their charges of a runaway tax rate marks the complete collapse of their platform," Mayor Albert G. Binder and Finance Commissioner Eugene F. Donnelly, Republican nominees for the governing board, declared today.

"The Democrats based their appeal on two points, an alleged runaway tax rate and so-called dictatorship," Mayor Binder and Commissioner Donnelly said.

"This failed to hold up as thousands of residents immediately saw through the attempt to make voters believe the Township Committee is responsible for schools, Regional High School and county taxes. The Democrats apparently, despite Abraham Lincoln's admonition, believed they could fool all the people all the time.

"At the 'Candidates' Night' held last week by the Springfield League of Women Voters, we exposed the hoax which the Democrats have been attempting to perpetrate. When we pointed out the tax rate for local purposes has increased only 10 1/2 points in three years, they did not deny the statement. They made no effort to present any defense when confronted with the actual figures. The Democrats admitted, we quote them "Springfield Citizens are getting adequate services for their tax dollars."

**The Other Issue**—"The other issue which has been given a steady beating on the Democratic snare drums is that of dictatorship. Although they have belabored the point in the press they tacitly admitted there is nothing to it when they failed to cite any incident to show that any member of the Township Committee ever has taken a dictatorial attitude toward his fellow committeemen or toward the public. As a result the Democrats have been left with a platform that can best be described in two words, 'Me Too'."

"At 'Candidates' Night' the Democrats conceded that purchase of new patrol cars, additional fire equipment and the municipal construction program were meritorious moves. Their only criticism was that the Township Committee had not attracted enough new industry in Springfield. That (Continued on page 2)

## Ed. Board Asks Citizens To Study Schools

Recognizing the deep interest the Citizens Committee has in the school system and the fine work they have done in the past, the Board of Education has asked the Committee to re-activate itself and make a further study of future school requirements and how they can be met. The first meeting of the committee will be held on October 26th.

Construction of the addition to the Gaudineer School is progressing and it is anticipated that it will be ready for occupancy in September 1957. The 6th grades at present housed in the Caldwell and Walton Schools, will then be transferred, and the Gaudineer School will take care of the 6th, 7th and 8th grades as originally planned.

During the past few years the Board of Education and the Citizens Committee have made careful calculations based on the preschool census and estimates of housing units to be constructed. These studies indicate that with this addition, our schools should be adequate for a number of years, and that any increase in school enrollment beyond their capacity might be taken care of by an addition which could be built at the Walton School location. But a constant watch must be kept on population increases. (Continued on page 2)

## Challenges For Debate Exchanged In Telegrams

Very few political campaigns run their full course without challenges hurled at opponents to "public debate on the issues of the election" and the usual exchange of telegrams.

The first shot was fired Monday in a wire from Mayor Albert G. Binder and Eugene F. Donnelly, the Republican candidates for the two local spots on the Township Committee, and addressed to Francis J. Keane and Irwin Weinberg, the Democratic aspirants for Springfield governing body.

## Democrats Have Proof "Town Is Deep In Debt"

Francis J. Keane and Irwin Weinberg, Democratic candidates for the Township Committee today accused their opponents of using more runaway distortions to defend runaway taxes with their recent claim that the township is debt free.

According to the New Jersey Taxpayers' Association, Keane and Weinberg stated, as of the start of the present year, Springfield was in debt to the tune of \$245,000 for municipal purposes and in debt to the amount of \$2,248,000 for schools. A member of the Trenton body, Keane and Weinberg said, described as "ridiculous," any inference that Springfield is debt free.

"And yet," Keane and Weinberg said, "Binder and Donnelly have told the public of Springfield that we are debt free."  
"Such distortions by Binder and Donnelly," they continued, "constitute only another desperate effort by these men seeking a return to office at any cost, to avoid the responsibility of a runaway tax rate in Springfield, now carrying the highest tax rate in Union County."  
"When these same candidates say they have no control over rising taxes, taxes that have climbed 164 points alone during their last three years in office," Keane and Weinberg said, "may we again point to the truth of the matter. Namely, every community in Union County has the same growing pains as Springfield; the control of rising taxes is the responsibility of the governing body through proper planning to increase the income of the township treasury, thereby meeting the expanded needs of school and municipal services."

"We stand pledged," Keane and Weinberg said, "to take affirmative steps to halt runaway taxes by instituting such planning, while our opponents continue to rant that they have no control over rising taxes. Furthermore," Keane and Weinberg said, "we (Continued on page 2)

## CAP Head At Convention In Philadelphia

Captain Ralph Swanson, commander of the Springfield Civil Air Patrol Squadron attended the annual regional convention in Philadelphia last weekend. The Captain, accompanied by four other members of his staff, brought back information for the community regarding the CAP cadet program as well as the Air Search and Rescue mission of Civil Air Patrol.

The North Eastern division of CAP, it was learned, will be working more closely than ever before with the Air Force in their search and rescue operations; therefore, heavy responsibility is placed upon Springfield Unit as well as others in New Jersey, to train their ground rescue teams and pilots to be ready at a moment's notice in the event of local disaster, or national emergency.

The National Commander of CAP, Gen. Aage USAP, told of the ever increasing need of educating the youth of our nation toward air-mindedness, and stressed that the "great significance of CAP are the basis and backbone of Air Education in the country today."

The Springfield unit of Civil Air Patrol now has a roster of approximately 70 cadets from this and surrounding towns, and welcomes Cadet and Senior membership in the ranks at any time.

## Final Figures On New Voters - 1,046

Final figures released by the Union County Board of Elections show that the increase in registration for Springfield is 1,046 instead of the first reported total of 1,059.

This reduction resulted from the removal of the names of voters who have moved out of Springfield and the county.

The number of eligible voters here, 6,537, is an all time high for Springfield, the total registration for 1955 being 5,491.

The total for Union County is 241,647, topping by 17,544 the previous registration record of 224,103 set in 1952. Last year 211,905 persons were registered in Union.

phase of municipal operations, they failed to point out, is in charge of the true Democrat on the Township Committee.

"The Democrats talk about expansion of recreation, but offer no program. Contrast that with the basketball and baseball leagues, the Teen Age dances and establishment of a Recreation Commission under Republican administrations. The Democrat Keane who is belatedly Recreation campaign ediscussing, scored zero for our youth during his term in office. We shall continue to expand our Youth Program. We advocate wider use of new modern schools as Youth Centers to house these activities.

## Building Expansion

"The voters are afforded a striking contrast between the results produced by the Republican administration here and the promises of the Democrats. Springfield has been given a full-time engineering department; a full-time building inspector and a full-time sanitarian - plumbing inspector. Construction of a new municipal garage and additions to the Municipal Building and the Public Library will put our municipal departments on a par with the best in the state. This, together with expanding police and fire departments, has been accomplished by a tax rate increase in three years of only 10 1/2 cents.

"The Democratic candidates have indicated they will reduce taxes and yet won't cut salaries or take away any of the fine improvements we have made. They have not disclosed how they plan to give more and pay less for it. It doesn't add up. And they have, in making these promises, shown a woeful lack of knowledge of municipal financing.

"In this campaign the action of 7,000 people who chose to move to Springfield while it is being

administered by Republicans certainly shows that many residents can't be wrong. We believe they again will retain Republicans on the Township Committee," Mayor Binder and Commissioner Donnelly concluded.

and any possible unanticipated large building developments. The Board of Education is also requesting the PTA to conduct a new pre-school census so that all possible information of value in school planning may be available. It is believed that this kind of combined study by the Board of Education and the Citizens Committee will be the best way of keeping constantly in touch with the changing situation in the town.

## Democrats Have

stand strongly opposed to the plan offered by Binder and Donnelly that the solution to rising taxes is to cut the pay of policemen, firemen and other municipal employees.

"These employees are doing a fine job and providing adequate services to the community. They certainly are not the issue as Binder and Donnelly would have the public believe for political purposes. This is but another instance of dodging the issue and the shirking of responsibility by Binder and Donnelly, who insist they can do nothing to bring about a control of our soaring tax rate that may climb at least 73 points higher to approach a staggering \$11.00 rate per \$100 assessment by 1957.

"Several weeks ago," Keane and Weinberg concluded, "Binder and Donnelly boastfully said they stood ready to run on their record alone. We challenge them to run on their record alone, free of such distortions as having brought Springfield out of debt."

bearing over Mr. Cade's shoulder and with his parting like a hawk, saying "Drive a hard bargain, boy, now we got them where we want them."

"Mind you, all we asked for was a small stretch of a 'No Passing Zone' on the approach to a dangerous curve and what do we get. Recommendations that take no consideration of the town problems, let alone any consideration for our residents who are vitally affected."

"There are two points mentioned in Mr. Cade's report that would like to comment on. One is recommendation Nos. 2 & 3, for the moving of a stop sign from Shunpike and South Springfield Avenue to South Springfield and Shunpike, and the other, recommendation No. 14, eliminating one way traffic on South Springfield Avenue on Sundays."

"The stop sign mentioned in No. 2 was placed there on the recommendation of Mr. A. Vey, the State Highway Engineer, some years ago and for the Sunday traffic jam on a two way street, I suggest they send up a couple of State Troopers to untangle the mess, which definitely existed before this traffic pattern was established."

"To sum it all up, where do we go from here. I suggest we stick to problems where at least we have an even chance of getting the town of Springfield a break."

Nothing Else To Do?  
Just to give an idea of some of the subject matter, taken at random from this well typed, single spaced long winded letter, here are some excerpts from the Highway Department:

"Curves in both the horizontal and vertical alignment of these roadways definitely warrant the establishment of certain 'No Passing Zones.' The ordinance submitted by Springfield Township officials indicated their desire to establish a continuous 'No Passing Zone' along the entire length of County Road 509 Spur between Meisel Avenue and Mountain Avenue. However, 'No Passing Zones' should only be established where sight distance and visibility of approaching vehicles is limited to the extent that a passing maneuver would be dangerous. Therefore, on tangent or straight stretches of roadway where sight distance is adequate, 'No Passing Zones' should not be established."

(Isn't that clear?)  
If you want to try for the \$32,000 question, try to understand any of the others, taken verbatim from this letter and all pertaining to the request that Springfield is authorized to paint a white 'no passing' line on South Springfield Avenue. Here are some of the items:

You'd Never Believe This  
"Mr. Cade also recommends that certain 'No Passing Zones' be established; certain DO NOT PASS signs be installed; certain PASS WITH CARE signs be installed; the 'No Passing Zones' be marked with white reflectorized paint, and that all signs and pavement markings conform with the Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices for Streets and Highways, Public Roads Administration, August 1943, revised September 1954."

"The Template Method was used in determining the beginning and ending points of the 'No Passing Zones' and these points were then adjusted by field investigation. One vertical curve was found to be critical. This is situated just north of Northview Terrace on County Road 509 Spur. Otherwise, the 'No Passing Zones' were warranted because of a curve in the horizontal alignment."

Know Where You Are?  
"It is recommended that County Officials submit a certified copy of a resolution to the Director of Motor Vehicles, for his approval, designating County Road 509 Spur-Shunpike Road as a Through Street from, by not including, its intersection with County Road 509 Spur-Meisel Avenue to, but not including, its intersection with Mountain Avenue."

Any Kind of a Sign  
"DO NOT PASS signs, Type R-11, should be displayed at the beginning of all 'No Passing Zones' and PASS WITH CARE signs, Type R-12, should be displayed at the end of all 'No Passing Zones.' DO NOT PASS signs should also be displayed at intermediate points in the 'NO PASSING ZONES' length is greater than 500 ft."

We've Been In Violation  
"The one-way operation of traffic on County Road 509 Spur between Shunpike Road and Mountain Avenue should not be continued. Not only is this regulation illegal, but after the establishment of these 'No Passing Zones,' the one-way operation of traffic would cause involuntary violations of the 'No Passing Zones' by motorists, thereby reducing the effectiveness of these zones in other locations."

Figure This One Out  
"County Officials request Township Officials to provide setback lines to insure a future right of way sufficiently wide to ease the existing reverse curve in County Road 509 Spur just north of Meisel Avenue and widen this roadway to provide for four lanes of moving traffic."

**ST. WHOSIS OF WHATSAT AND WHY . . .**  
From our Catholic point of view, we're being a little irrev-  
erent. But we're only trying to crystallize some ideas on saints,  
confused by those who are not so familiar with God's heroes  
and heroines. Because that's just what they are: men and women  
who were so full of God that they could make water run uphill  
if they thought it would give Him greater glory.

The first business of Christianity is to make people holy—  
to make them like Jesus. If we can put Him out of us entirely,  
and fill ourselves instead with God, then we are saints. To  
show us that it can be done, the Church singles out men and  
women who have done it very well; men and women of dazzling  
holiness, people who were better than just amiable, kindly  
souls, better than mere philanthropists, and far above the usual,  
easy going, good-natured type. This sort of thing does not  
grow out of a heart only naturally kind. It comes from systematic  
day-by-day practice in praying and doing the hard thing for  
God.

Naturally, the Church is careful about whom she "canonizes,"  
or declares a saint. She investigates a man's life and writings  
ever so closely, while the "Devil's Advocate" (the Prosecuting  
Attorney—in this case) does his best to point out point out  
possible weaknesses in the candidate's virtue. Then, after sat-  
isfying herself that the person was really heroic and far above  
the ordinary garden variety of holiness, she asks what one  
might consider life impossible. She asks proof that God has set  
His seal on the candidate's holiness by working at least two  
miracles at his request. If no miracles are forthcoming, the  
case is dropped. The odd thing is that, very often, clear, well-  
attested proof of the miracles is brought forward. When that  
happens, the Church solemnly declares that the person is cer-  
tainly in heaven, a saint, and that his life of virtue may well  
be imitated by all Christians.

The last part of a saint's title is, usually, either the place  
he came from, or his family name. Thus, one St. Francis came  
from Assisi, another from Rome; one had the family name of  
Xavier, another of Sales; they became simply St. Francis of  
Assisi, St. Francis of Rome, St. Francis Xavier, and St. Francis  
deSales.

## 10 Page Letter Tells Why We Can't Have White Line

It all started because the Township of Springfield wanted official permission to paint a white line—a "no passing" white line on South Springfield avenue to help control traffic on that street.

About a year ago—September 28, 1955, to be exact—Springfield Township addressed a letter to the New Jersey State Highway Department, requesting authority.

It meant spending about \$1.40 for white paint and a few hours of work for a chap who could mark a straight line.

The chain reaction—the red tape that has entangled this simple request by Springfield can only be matched by Hollywood on the light opera.

**A LETTER—TEN SINGLE SPACED TYPEWRITTEN PAGES—** with seals of almost humorous do's and don'ts—has been received by the Township Committee, from Herbert J. Klar, Chief of the Traffic Engineering section, ALMOST A YEAR LATER IN REPLY.

Surveys were made—hours and days were spent by the Department experts—and the long, gobbledegoose instructions made the Springfield governing body give up in disgust.

Here is Mayor Albert G. Binder's written comments attached to copies of the long-winded letter to be submitted to other members of the Township Committee. None of the other members of the governing body would make any further comments because the Mayor's reply, they said, covers it very well.

**Mayor Binder's Statement**  
"I have read Mr. Cade's recommendations dated July 2, 1956 on our simple and relatively minor request to establish a 'No Passing Zone' on South Springfield Avenue between Florence Gaudineer School and Meisel Avenue.

"His seven (?) page recommendation reads like a thesis on rebuilding all of the roads in the state of New Jersey. It may be clear and concise to the State Highway Department, but it leaves me muttering to myself as I wander around the school trying to find my way in, around, and thru the multiple recommendations of Stop Signs, No Passing, Set Backs, No one way traffic, etc., etc., ad infinitum.

"I think this should climax lesson No. 1 for all Township officials. Do not make request for assistance of the State Highway Department unless you are prepared to lose your shirt and part of your pants in a bargaining set-to. I can see Mr. Dwight Palmer, State Highway Commissioner, (Continued on page 3)

## GOP Candidates Say Dems Have Lost Platform

"With Election Day less than two weeks away, the admission of the Democratic candidates for the Township Committee that they cannot sustain their charges of a 'runaway tax rate' marks the complete collapse of their platform," Mayor Albert G. Binder and Finance Commissioner Eugene F. Donnelly, Republican nominees for the governing board, declared today.

"The Democrats based their appeal on two points, an alleged 'runaway tax rate' and so-called 'dictatorship' Mayor Binder and Commissioner Donnelly said.

"This failed to hold up as thousands of residents immediately saw through the attempt to make voters believe the Township Committee is responsible for schools, Regional High School and county taxes. The Democrats' apparently, despite Abraham Lincoln's admonition, believed they could fool all the people all the time.

"At the 'Candidates' Night' held last week by the Springfield League of Women Voters, we exposed the hoax which the Democrats have been attempting to perpetrate. When we pointed out the tax rate for local purposes has increased only 10% in three years, they did not deny the statement. They made no effort to present any defense when confronted with the actual figures. The Democrats admitted, we quote them, 'Springfield citizens are getting adequate services for their tax dollars.'

**The Other Issue**  
"The other issue which has been given a steady beating on the Democratic snare drums is that of dictatorship. Although they have belabored the point in the press they tacitly admitted there is nothing to it when they failed to cite any incident to show that any member of the Township Committee ever has taken a dictatorial attitude toward his fellow committeemen or toward the public. As a result the Democrats have been left with a platform that can best be described in two words, 'Me Too.'

"At 'Candidates' Night' the Democrats conceded that purchase of new patrol cars, additional fire equipment and the municipal construction program were meritorious moves. Their only criticism was that the Township Committee had not attracted enough new industry in Springfield. That (Continued on page 2)

## Democrats Have Proof 'Town Is Deep In Debt'

Francis J. Keane and Irwin Weinberg, Democratic candidates for the Township Committee today accused their opponents of using more runaway distortions to defend runaway taxes with their recent claim that the township is debt free.

According to the New Jersey Taxpayers' Association, Keane and Weinberg stated, as of the start of the present year, Springfield was in debt to the tune of \$343,000 for municipal purposes and in debt to the amount of \$2,248,000 for schools. A member of the Trenton body, Keane and Weinberg said, described as "ridiculous," any inference that Springfield is debt free.

"And yet," Keane and Weinberg said, "Binder and Donnelly have told the public of Springfield that we are debt free.

"Such distortions by Binder and Donnelly," they continued, "constitute only another desperate effort by these men seeking a return to office at any cost, to avoid the responsibility of a runaway tax rate in Springfield, now carrying the highest tax rate in Union County.

"When these same candidates say they have no control over rising taxes, taxes that have climbed 164 points since their last three years in office," Keane and Weinberg said, "may we again point to the truth of the matter. Namely, every community in Union County has the same growing pains as Springfield; the control of rising taxes is the responsibility of the governing body through proper planning to increase the income of the township treasury, thereby meeting the expanded needs of school and municipal services.

"We stand pledged," Keane and Weinberg said, "to take affirmative steps to halt runaway taxes by instituting such planning, while our opponents continue to rant that they have no control over rising taxes. Furthermore," Keane and Weinberg said, "we (Continued on page 2)


## Real Estate Is Again Brought Into Campaign

 phase of municipal operations, they failed to point out, is in charge of the one Democrat on the Township Committee.

"The Democrats talk about expansion of recreation, but offer no program. Contrast that with the basketball and baseball leagues, the Teen Age dances and establishment of a Recreation Commission under Republican administrations. The Democrat Keane who is belatedly Recreation campaign conscious, scored zero for our youth during his term in office. We shall continue to expand our Youth Program. (Continued from page 1) hovering over Mr. Cade's shoulder and with his patriarchal like bearing, saying "Drive a hard bargain, boy, now we got them where we want them."

"Mind you, all we asked for was a small stretch of a "No Passing Zone" on the approach to a dangerous curve and what do we get. Recommendations that take no consideration of the town problems, let alone any consideration for our residents who are vitally affected.

There are two points mentioned in Mr. Cade's report that I would like to comment on. One is recommendation Nos. 2 & 3, for the moving of a stop sign from Shunpike and South Springfield Avenue to South Springfield and Shunpike, and the other, recommendation No. 14, eliminating one way traffic on South Springfield Avenue on Sundays.

The stop sign mentioned in No. 2 was placed there on the recommendation of Mr. A. Vey, the State Highway Engineer, some years ago and for the Sunday traffic jam on a two way street, I suggest they send up a couple of State Troopers to untangle the mess, which definitely existed before this traffic pattern was established.

To sum it all up where do we go from here. I suggest we stick to problems where at least we have an even chance of getting the town of Springfield a break.

Nothing Else To Do? Just to give an idea of some of the subject matter, taken at random from this well typed, single spaced long winded letter, here are some excerpts from the Highway Department:

"Curves in both the horizontal and vertical alignment of these roadways definitely warrant the establishment of certain "No Passing Zones." The ordinance submitted by Springfield Township officials indicated their desire to establish a continuous "No Passing Zone" along the entire length of County Road 509 Spur between Meisel Avenue and Mountain Avenue. However, "No Passing Zones" should only be established where sight distance and visibility of approaching vehicles is limited to the extent that a passing maneuver would be dangerous. Therefore, on tangent or straight stretches of roadway where sight distance is adequate, "No Passing Zones" should not be established."

(Isn't that clear?) If you want to try for the \$32,000 question, try to understand any of the others, taken verbatim from this letter and all pertaining to the request that Springfield is authorized to paint a white "no passing" line on South Springfield Avenue. Here are some of the items:

You'd Never Believe This "Mr. Cade also recommends that certain "No Passing Zones" be established; certain DO NOT PASS signs be installed; certain PASS WITH CARE signs be installed; the "No Passing Zones" be marked with white reflective paint, and that all signs and pavement markings conform with the Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices for Streets and Highways, Public Roads Administration, August 1946, revised September 1954."

"The Template Method" was used in determining the beginning and ending points of the "No Passing Zones" and these points were then adjusted by field investigation. One vertical curve was found to be critical. This is situated just north of Northview Terrace on County Road 509 Spur. Otherwise, the "No Passing Zones" were warranted because of a curvature in the horizontal alignment."

Know Where You Are? "It is recommended that County Officials submit a certified copy of a resolution to the Director of Motor Vehicles, for his approval, designating County Road 509 Spur-Shunpike Road as a "Through Street" by not including, its intersection with County Road 509 Spur-Meisel Avenue to, but not including, its intersection with Mountain Avenue."

Any Kind Of A Sign "DO NOT PASS signs, Type R-11, should be displayed at the beginning of all "No Passing Zones" and PASS WITH CARE signs, Type R-12, should be displayed at the end of all "No Passing Zones." 
