School Board Budget Higher For Next Year

The Springfield Board of education approved a tentative budget for the year 1957 Tuesday night, subject to the approval of the County Superintendent, of \$321,510. This represents an increase of \$98,010 over last year's budget. This amount to be raised by taxation will be \$684,906.

The greater part of the increase is in the item of teachers' salaries, and is accounted for by two circumstances. One is the proposed new salary guide, which would provide a scale of \$4000 to \$6800 for teachers with a bachelor's degree, \$4200 to \$7200 for those with a master's degree, maximums to be reached in 14 and 15 annual steps respectively.

This guide in line with those being adopted in neighboring communities. The other reason for this increase is the necessity of employing at least eight new teachers to take care of increasing enrollment.

Other items showing increases are operations, including janitors' services, fuel, light, and telephone, where the increase is largely due to the addition to the Gaudineer School which will open in September 1957. This addition nearly doubles the capacity of that school. Furniture and equipment totals \$18,000, of which \$13,000 is for the Gaudineer addition; insurance is up \$6950, and debt service \$6500, representing interest on the bonds for the new addition. Veterans' liability of \$3000 in the pension fund is a new expenditure required by recent legislation.

The budget shows decreases in the items for office equipment, down \$6800 (bookkeeping machine was purchased in 1955), and walks and drives, down \$7000.

It was pointed out that the school enrollment now totals 1477, which is an increase of 100 since June 15, 1956.

Regional Budget Hikes Tax Rates

Springfield taxpayers will get a 15-point boost in the high school tax rate, a 1957-58 budget of \$1,518,895 having been adopted by the Regional Board of Education Tuesday night at a meeting held here in the local school.

These figures are higher by \$279,225.00 over the present budget and, according to Dr. Minor C. K. Jones, President of the Board, are due mainly because of salary raises, hiring of more teachers for increased enrollment, more textbooks and other equipment.

The 15-point increase will mean a hike for Springfield and the other communities in the region. The present tax is 1.87 per \$100 assessed valuation and Springfield will now pay 1.72 for Regional School operation.

Sorge Is County's Top Police Chief

The police chiefs of Union County have named Springfield's Albert Sorge as top chief in the county.

Chief Sorge was elected president of the Union County Police Chiefs Association Tuesday to succeed Fred Falzone of Garwood.

Other officers are: First vice president, Wilbur M. Personette of Roselle; second vice president, Patrick Murray of Plainfield; treasurer, Lyman L. Parks, Union County Park Police; financial secretary, Dominick Russo, Berkeley Heights; recording secretary, Joseph Gorsky, Fanwood; sergeant at arms, Charles H. Bettle, Linden.

Trustees, three years, William Muir, Clark; two years, Carl Engle, New Providence, and one year, Harry Erholm, Scotch Plains.


Life membership cards were presented to Chiefs Personette, Murray and Sorge.

Here's First "Skid" Report For Jersey's Highway Boss

Henshaw Avenue is still waiting for the much needed traffic light at the dangerous intersection at Mountain Avenue.

And, all Springfield is waiting for the Morris Avenue exposed and hazardous rails to be covered. But New Jersey State Highway Commissioner Dwight R. G. Palmer and his report authors are too busy with new highway spending to worry about Springfield.

Mayor Albert G. Binder, on behalf of the Township Committee, has sent letters to Commissioner Palmer asking the Highway Department to do something about reducing the number of accidents on Morris Avenue because of skidding on the exposed trolley tracks — BUT MR. PALMER HASN'T EVEN SHOWN THE COURTESY OF A REPLY. HIS OFFICE HASN'T EVEN AS-

The office of Springfield's Building Inspector Wilbert J. Binder is humming with activity—all because of the new construction projects already going on in the Township and the many more about to start.

The largest job right now is the new Saks Fifth Avenue retail establishment which is moving along on schedule by the Fuller Company despite some bad weather. The excavation work is progressing rapidly and Saks officials feel confident that the new modern store will be ready for occupancy on target.

Other building projects in Springfield include the elaborate garden apartment to be known as Troy Village, which is to be constructed along Shunpike Road with the schedule calling for completion of the first section by next Summer.

Inspector Sees Building Boom In Near Future

Records in the Building Inspector's office show that two construction jobs have been approved and permits granted for the Universal Cyclops Co., a steel warehouse at Commerce and Swann avenues in the Route 22 section, for a large building by the Thornton Closing Ring Co., also in the Swann avenue area.

Work also will start as soon as building permits are approved for the proposed Davega Discount Store expansion in Route 22, and addition to the Linoleum & Carpet Outlet, also on the highway.

A new split level and ranch type home development has been started on Mountain Avenue, to be known as Richard Estates. The 29 lots go back to the Baltusrol Golf Club property and the new homes will be individually designed eliminating the usual development "look." The property in Mountain Avenue is known as the Callahan land.

Fireman Day Draws Springfield Seal

With the acceptance this week of an official municipal seal, Springfield now has everything but a town flower.

The new municipal seal, designed by Robert E. Day of the Springfield Fire Department, shortly will be used on all official documents of the township.

In keeping with the early history of the community, the seal carries a Revolutionary War period theme. It is centered with a figure of a Colonial soldier encircled by 13 stars denoting the original 13 United States. On an outer circle is printed "Township of Springfield, Union County, N. J."

Township Committee decided recently Springfield should have a new official seal and that it should be typically of the Revolutionary period in character.

Talents of Fireman Day in the field of design were known to members of the governing body. He was invited to submit a drawing. After several months' drawing which he spent his free time developing ideas and making the drawings, he submitted several designs to the committee.

They included the one accepted. Members of the committee were so pleased with the work that they adopted a resolution expressing to Fireman Day their appreciation.



Local Rotary Launches Campaign To Establish Township Youth Center

Members of the Springfield Rotary Club are going to do something about providing a Youth Center for the Township.

The decision to spearhead a movement towards establishing such a center for Springfield came in this week's regular luncheon meeting of Rotary at the Baltusrol Country Club with a unanimous resolution to that effect and the appointment of a committee to explore the entire problem.

The resolution calls for a coordination of activities by all other civic, church and community groups so that the Youth Center project will be a Town-wide effort.

The committee appointed by the Springfield Rotary has Chairman of Commerce President "Ike" Freedman as its chairman with Ray Bell and Howard Flammer as co-chairmen. Other members of this survey committee are Rev. Marvin W. Green, Rabbi Reuben Levine, Charles Remlinger, John Grausam, Ludwig Stark, Kenneth Baadamer, School Principal Daniel Murray, Edward Reibold and Adam La Sola.

To Discuss Charter Study Information

On Wednesday, December 12, the Charter Study Committee of the Springfield League of Women Voters met at the home of Mrs. Joseph Seidel for the purpose of discussing the information thus far collected. The meeting was conducted by the committee chairman, Mrs. Leonard Atkin.

Mrs. Walter Cantor presented a review of the talk previously given to the group by Mrs. Denington, an active League worker on the Livingston commission. Parallels were drawn between Livingston's course of action and that path which Springfield might possibly pursue. It was pointed out that Livingston's method of working through a Citizen's Advisory Committee drawn from and representing all the Township's organizations was an extremely practicable solution to their problems.

Mrs. Seymour Weinstein reviewed the Faulkner Act which provides for the possible formation of a Charter Commission and also the eventual functions of such a Commission. Mrs. Leonard Atkin also presented a comprehensive discussion of our municipal government and pointed out the possible disadvantages in our present system which might be subjects for further League study.

entitled "An ordinance providing for all persons to be made to the existing Municipal Building of the Township of Springfield and an addition to be constructed thereon, and for the furnishing of equipment thereon and providing for the construction of a municipal garage on Township owned land; and providing for the expansion and modernization of the Springfield Free Public Library; and providing for the work and equipment to be done and furnished as a general improvement; and providing for the financing of the cost thereof and appropriating the necessary funds to pay therefor," as amended by Ordinance adopted on July 12, 1955 and September 12, 1956, is hereby repealed to the extent that said ordinance, as amended, appropriates moneys for the purpose set forth in Section 3 of this ordinance in excess of the appropriation herein made therefor and to the extent that said ordinance, as amended, authorizes the issuance of bonds or notes of the Township for said purpose set forth in Section 3 of this ordinance but nothing herein contained shall be deemed to impair the validity of any obligations of the Township heretofore incurred or now or hereafter incurred in connection with said ordinance as amended and so repealed, but all such obligations so incurred and now outstanding shall be deemed to be obligations incurred and outstanding pursuant to this ordinance.

Section 7. This ordinance shall take effect twenty (20) days after the first publication thereof in final page, as provided by said Local Bond Law.

AN ORDINANCE TO SUPPLEMENT AND AMEND AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED "AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE REGULATIONS GOVERNING AND RESTRICTING THE USE AND SUPPLY OF WATER FROM WHAT-EVER SOURCES FOR REFRIGERATION AND AIR CONDITIONING IN THE TOWNSHIP OF SPRINGFIELD."

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE Township Committee of the Township of Springfield in the County of Union and State of New Jersey:

1. That the above entitled ordinance be amended and supplemented by the inclusion of a new section to be inserted between Section 7 and Section 8 and to be known as 7 e, as follows:

Section 7 e. All installations of any individual or collective system of refrigeration and air conditioning equipment, or refrigeration and air conditioning equipment of three tons and over shall be equipped with a water conserving device as provided in Section 3 of this ordinance.

With the advice of the Township Engineer, however, the Township Committee by resolution may grant permission for a diffusion device which will return the water in a pure and uncontaminated condition, without loss or seepage into the ground. Instead of the device required under Section 3 of this ordinance, if permission is granted for such a diffusion device, it will be the responsibility of the property owner, tenant or other legal occupant of the premises served by such system of refrigeration or air conditioning equipment to insure that no water is wasted or contaminated thereby. It is the declared intent of the Township Committee that no diffusion well or recharge basin shall be permitted under this section, unless it is insured that all water used in such diffusion well or air conditioning system will be effectively returned in a pure and uncontaminated condition after use to the subsidiary sources from which the said water is obtained. No connection to steam or sanitary sewer shall be permitted under this section.

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3. That the above entitled ordinance be amended and supplemented by the inclusion of a new section to be inserted between Section 7 and Section 8 and to be known as 7 e, as follows:

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Section 3. There has heretofore been and is hereby appropriated the sum of \$64,272, said sum being indicative of the sum of \$5,735 as the down payment for said improvement or purpose required by law and now available therefor by virtue of provision in a budget or budgets of the Township previously adopted.

Section 2. For the financing of said improvement or purpose and to meet the part of said \$64,272 appropriation not provided for by application heretofore of said down payment, negotiable bonds of the Township, each to be known as "Library Bonds", are hereby authorized to be issued in the principal amount of \$58,537 pursuant to the Local Bond Law, constituting sections 40:1-1 to 40:1-88 of the Revised Statutes of New Jersey.

In anticipation of the issuance of said bonds and to temporarily finance said improvement or purpose, negotiable bonds of the Township in a principal amount not exceeding \$38,637 are hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to said within the limitations prescribed by said Law. The maximum rate of interest which any of said obligations shall bear is six per centum (6%) per annum.

Section 3. (a) The improvement hereby authorized and the purpose for the financing of which said obligations are to be issued is the construction in addition to the Free Public Library of the Township located thereon on the southeastern side of Main Street, and the reconstruction of the existing library building to the extent necessary for the use with said section, all as shown on and in accordance with the plans and specifications on file in the office of the Township Clerk heretofore and hereby approved.

(b) The estimated maximum amount of bonds or notes to be issued for improvement or purpose stated in said Section 3 there has heretofore been and is hereby appropriated the sum of \$64,272, said sum being indicative of the sum of \$5,735 as the down payment for said improvement or purpose required by law and now available therefor by virtue of provision in a budget or budgets of the Township previously adopted.

Born in Newark, she lived three years in Springfield.


