WATCHUNG FIRST AID SQUAD

The person who made the statement—"May you never need us—but, if you do, it is very comforting to know where to find us" must have had the Springfield First Aid Squad in mind.

We, here at the Springfield Sun, had occasion to see the local first aid volunteers in action at close quarters last week and the incident made all of us very proud.

A youngster was struck and badly injured by a bicycle rider ON THE SIDEWALK, according to the mother of the victim. The matter of bike riding on the sidewalk is something the Township officials should act upon immediately—but this is being written about the First Aid Squad.

The mother, holding the injured child in her arms, was brought into the Springfield Sun offices and a telephone call was immediately put in to Police Headquarters asking for the First Aid Squad.

Before you could say "State Highway Commissioner" the police were in the office, efficiently taking care of things and making room in Morris Avenue traffic for the almost immediate arrival of the First Aid Squad. The volunteers worked like "pros" and the mother and child were rushed to Overlook Hospital.

The remainder of the space in this column will be given over to the following letter, written by the distraught mother of the injured boy:

DO SOMETHING ABOUT BICYCLES

December 22, 1956

Editor, Sun:

Several years ago I was disturbed about a situation in Springfield which I recognized as a dangerous threat to the safety of our children. I considered writing you an "open letter" about it several times since then, but procrastinated for the usual, never-good-enough excuses one uses to justify such omissions.

I refer specifically to the careless manner in which bicycles are ridden on the streets of Springfield. Perhaps I ought to include the sidewalks, for reasons which will become obvious to you, but I only say that if local laws were observed, we would not have that part of the problem.

I shall do my utmost to be objective and unemotional in my discourse on this subject, but I find that a very difficult assignment. You see, at this moment, my son is lying in a hospital bed, a badly bruised, battered, and shaken five-year-old who is fortunate to be alive at all.

Thursday afternoon he fell victim to a fourteen-year-old boy who was speeding his bicycle down the sidewalk of Mountain Avenue.

The extent of the injuries became known only upon careful examination by the physicians at Overlook Hospital in Summit. I think you ought to know about them: four teeth knocked out of sight; they may be out entirely or imbedded deeply in the bone—that will be determined by oral x-rays when he is recovered sufficiently to be submitted to them. Several other teeth are chipped or loosened hopelessly. Mouth lacerations are too extensive to begin to list; his lips are a battered pulp behind which his usual mischievous grin has vanished. There are several scalp wounds and one severe bruise on the back of his head, apparently where he was knocked to the ground by the impact.

His left arm has suffered a fracture. His body muscles are spasmodic and sore from deep bruises. He sobbed to me that his shoulder hurts, his neck hurts, his tummy hurts, his arm hurts, his mouth hurts. He doesn't know that for more than twenty-four hours he has been watched for any sign of internal bleeding which would indicate a ruptured spleen, necessitating surgical removal of that organ.

This is a serious business. Every physician who has examined this child has expressed surprise that all of this was caused by anything less than an automobile. And we do know that a mishandled bicycle was the offending weapon.

I seek no revenge upon the rider of this vehicle. When the accident occurred he was a contrite, hand-wringing youngster ready to accept complete blame for not being able to stop his speeding bicycle in time. He impressed me as a well brought up child who had caused a terrible accident inadvertently and who would suffer punishment in his own private cells of memory. But he was also a dreadful example to me of that unsupervised threat which I first recognized several years ago . . . poorly protected drivers of two-wheeled vehicles.

MENACE EVEN TO AUTOISTS

How many times have I, as the driver of an automobile, had to swerve into the path of on-coming traffic in order to avoid bicycle riders proceeding two or three abreast in front of me?

How many times have I seen bicycles being ridden across the street oblivious to crossings or corners? How many times have I seen normal regulations such as traffic lights and stop signs completely ignored by cyclists who, for all intents and purposes, appear blind to such precautions?

How many, many times have I pushed my little baby in her carriage—and yes, my son too—when he was that small—upon someone's lawn in order to avoid a head-on collision with a two-wheeled instrument of assault?

These are questions I cannot answer. I never counted such occasions. I never stopped to listen to the fear which grew in my heart each time they happened. And now it comes to this; my son is lying in the hospital, suffering fever, shock, and extensive injuries.

Do you know how much further my fear extends? It goes to this; children such as this fourteen-year-old who are today a threat on their bicycles, will, in three short years, be in control of an automobile, and this in not a weapon of assault when mishandled; this is potentially a double-barreled weapon of murder.

The disregard for safety of oneself and others which appears on the bicycle becomes lethal when carried behind the steering wheel. By then it is usually too late to do anything about it.

Somewhere, somehow, this situation can and must be solved. I don't know just what is in the statutes of Springfield at this moment except that vehicles having wheels beyond a certain defined size are supposedly forbidden to ride on the sidewalks. I know this law is broken flagrantly. I know also that there is at least one town in the state of New Jersey which requires examination and licensing of all two-wheeled vehicles and their riders.

Perhaps, when I moved to Springfield years ago, I was immediately conscious of this deplorable problem of ours because I had grown up in that town and was duly impressed by the local law officials with the responsibility I incurred when I rode my bicycle. Bicycles were subject to the same rules as automobiles, including the usual traffic regulations, inspection for proper lights, and even hand signals. Infringement of the law brought us a traffic summons I think—I can't say for sure because everyone I knew was careful to obey the law. I am certain that this training can only be beneficial to the developing minds of our youngsters.

URGES WALKING THE BIKE

Where streets and roads are heavily trafficked and constitute a danger to even the most cautious bicyclist, as many parents will complain, the only safe answer is a detour to side streets or walking the bicycle on the sidewalk. Believe me, this is nothing of a hardship compared to accepting the responsibility of mutilating a child or being a victim of an accident yourself.

I urge every parent to search his heart and soul for a solution to this threat. I urge our governing body and law enforcement officers in Springfield to give this matter their serious thought. Above all, I urge the children who bicycle through the streets of our town to learn and practice the rules of safe riding.

Bike Fells Boy; Spurs Talk Of Safety Program

The first serious bicycle-pedestrian accident in Springfield Police records happened last Thursday when 5-year-old Jonathan Williams was struck down while walking on a Mountain Avenue sidewalk by a speeding cyclist.

The Williams boy was rushed to Overlook Hospital by the Springfield First Aid Squad where it was discovered that he had a fractured arm, face lacerations, mouth injuries, numerous bumps and bruises, and possible internal injuries.

The boy is the son of Dr. and Mrs. Arthur G. Williams of 513 Ashwood Road. He was able to leave the hospital and be home in time for Christmas, though his parents say it will be a long time before he fully recovers from the accident.

The accident brought attention to the bicycle safety situation in Springfield. Police Chief Albert Sorge said that his department is faced with the problem of estimating 500 young bicyclists into the streets or watch the hazard to pedestrians increase.

"There is a State law as well as a local ordinance prohibiting bike riding on any sidewalks," Sorge declared. "But I think far more youngsters would be killed and injured by automobiles if we chased them out into the street than will be hurt as pedestrians on the sidewalks."

The Police Chief pointed out that the Williams accident proves how dangerous a bicycle can be when improperly handled. He suggested that maybe Springfield should do what neighboring towns like Millburn have done and license all bike riders for safety rules and mechanical checks.

"This would probably cost the Township \$5,000 a year," Sorge estimated. "Because we would have to hire a full time man to issue plates, inspect bicycles and deliver safety information. It the people of Springfield want this system they must act through the Township Committee."

The indictment charged Mr. Clark and his wife Edith of 417 Milltown Rd., with failing to summon medical aid for their daughter despite the fact she had complained of being ill a week before her death. Mr. Clark is pastor of the First Century Church in Newark.

Judge Hughes asked that a legal assistant in the prosecutor's office look up the law on other cases in which, because of religious belief, neglect has occurred. If a conviction can be had, the judge said, the case should be prosecuted.

Mrs. Lopatin based her recommendation on the fact that all the witnesses, who are members of the family, refused to testify, and on the nature of the case, medically.

Emergency Calls Still On Upgrade

A twenty-one percent increase in emergency calls from January through November of this year as compared to the same period in 1955, was reported this week by the Springfield First Aid Squad.

An official stated that there were 352 emergencies or transportations involving the squad up to November 30, 1956. The same period last year logged only 291 calls.

There have been several occasions where both ambulances and a detailed report on November activities included 29 emergencies, 8 transportations, 6 tanks of oxygen, 487 miles clocked by the 2 ambulances and a total of 134 man-hours.

1957 Township Committee To Meet Tuesday


Springfield's Township Committee will hold its 1957 organization meeting at the American Legion Hall next Tuesday at noon but very few, if any, changes will be made in the official family.

Mayor Albert G. Binder is expected to be renominated to that same position in the Township governing body in recognition for his fine representation as the chief officer of Springfield in the past three years. During his tenure as Mayor, Springfield has made great strides in development as one of the fastest growing communities in this area, with many housing, apartment, industrial and retail establishment programs already under way.

Present incumbents are expected to be reappointed to the other Township offices and there is some talk of some of the working committee being reshuffled. There are also rumors of some new jobs being created to relieve the heavy load from some of the present town officials but there was no confirmation from any reliable source. Springfield has been growing so rapidly, these rumors have it, that too much work has accumulated in several departments and some assistance will be made available by creating new jobs.

Local Roads Get \$7,721 From State

Springfield will receive \$7,721, as its share of the \$274,161, sent to Union County municipalities, by the State Highway Department for road improvements in 1957. The funds are from the \$4,667,831 in Motor Vehicle Department revenues and individual grants to the state's 563 communities are based on population and road mileage.

The fixed minimum for each county is \$150,000. Money for highway maintenance and lighting is distributed immediately, but construction funds are held by the state until the municipality applies.
